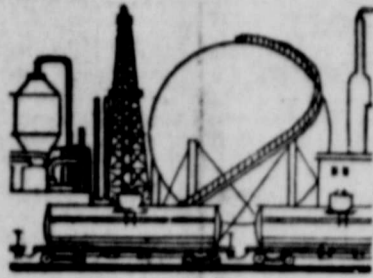

## MAN SHOT BY OFFICER WAS FUGITIVE

The 36-year-old Columbia, Tennessee man, shot last Friday night, Jan. 24 by Ranger Constable Ralph Vaele, in a cafe disturbance east of the city is wanted for burglary and forgery in his home state, according to a report by the Eastland County Sheriff, Lefty Sublett.

The man, identified as Horace Adkinson, is still in John Peter Smith Hospital in Fort Worth, where he underwent surgery following the incident.

Adkinson was shot in the stomach by Constable Vaele during a scuffle in the Ranger Hill Cafe. The wounded man was charged with aggravated assault of a peace officer.

Sheriff Sublett said the Columbia sheriff told him Adkinson had jumped bond after being indicted on one count of forgery and one count of burglary by a Columbia grand jury.

Adkinson will be brought back to Eastland and held for Tennessee authorities, Sheriff Sublett said. He added that the Columbia sheriff indicated he would initiate extradition proceedings if Adkinson failed to waive rights.

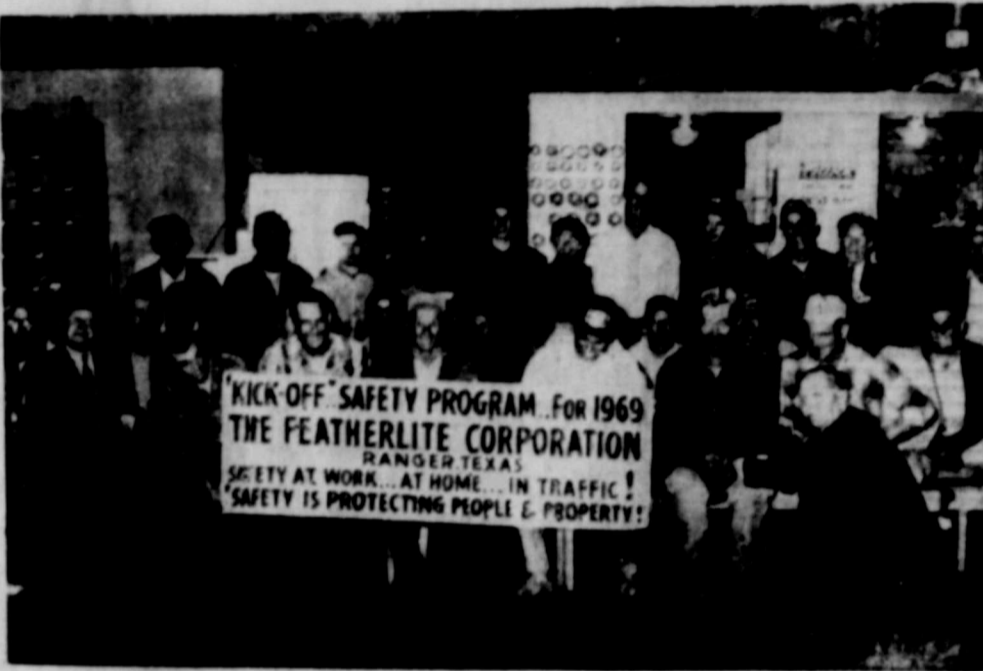
The school tax office remains at the same location in the Recreation Building with the Athletic Office in the old RISD location.

## BECKY ADAMS IS NAMED HOMEMAKER OF TOMORROW

Becky Adams has been named 1969 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow for Ranger High School on the basis of her score in a written knowledge and attitude test on homemaking given senior girls here on December 3, 1968.

Becky is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. G. Adams, Jr., 711 Paige St. She is a four-year member of Future Homemakers of America, a member of Future Nurses Club where she serves as reporter; is a four year member of Ranger High School Band and a member of the Sub Deb Club.

Miss Adams' achievements renders her eligible for state and national scholarships. She has already received a specially designed silver charm from General Mills, sponsor of the Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow.

A state Homemaker of Tomorrow and runner-up will be selected from winners of schools in the state. The winner will receive a \$1,500 college scholarship and her school will receive a complete set of Encyclopedia Britannica, runner-up will earn a \$500 educational grant. State winners accompanied by school advisors, will join an expense paid tour of Washington and Williamsburg, Va. next spring.

Initiated in 1954-55 by General Mills, this search emphasizes the importance of homemaking as a career. More than six million girls have participated during the fifteen years, and will, at the conclusion of the current program, have earned scholarships totaling \$1,591,500.

A total of 630,564 girls from 15,116 schools are registered for the 1969 program.

Mr. Brashier said that with the move into the new offices with expanded facilities the Association was confident of even greater progress during 1969. In addition to other facilities the Association now offers its customers Safety Deposit Boxes and night Depository for after hour payments on loans as well as additions to saving accounts.

Another facility of which the officers, directors and employees are very proud is the beautiful First Federal Ranger Room which will be available to civic and other non profit groups for meetings without charge.

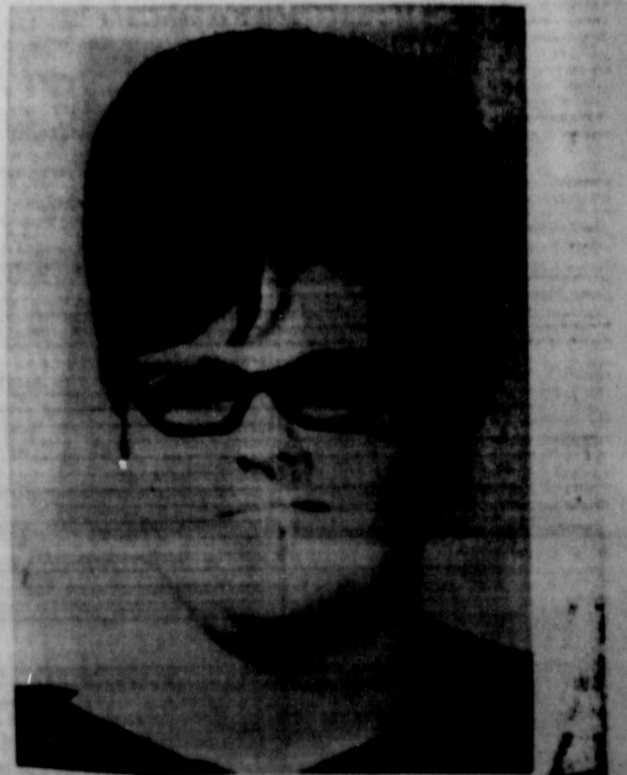
The Association plans an Open House for the near future but in the mean time every one is invited to come in and look over the new offices.

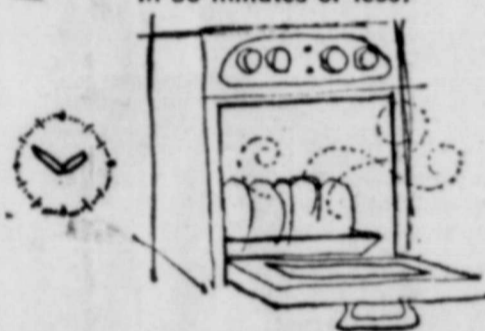

# Store Burglary Suspects In Custody In Anson Jail

Arrests of two Sweetwater men has solved 15 burglaries in this area, including the burglary of the Safeway Store in Eastland, County Sheriff L. E. Sublett reports.

Charges of burglary have been filed in Justice of the Peace Wells Dalton's Court in Eastland, naming Jimmy Michael Croan, 26, and Donald Gene Richardson, 24, with the Friday, Jan. 17, burglary at Safeway. An attempt was made at that time to peel the store's safe — but the try was unsuccessful. However, approximately 90 cartons of cigarettes, 25 beef steaks and six boneless hams were taken in the break-in, the sheriff said.

Croan reportedly gave statement, but Richardson declined, stating that he wanted to wait until Friday, when his wife was to arrive to talk with him. Croan was reported by

Sheriff Sublett as having said, "We've been stealing together steadily since Dec. 27."

Authorities in Colorado City, Sweetwater, Anson, Roby, Barnhardt, Meanard, Odessa, Haskell and Graham are reportedly talking with the two in the Jones County Jail where they are being held. They were arrested in Anson on Friday, Jan. 24.

The attempt at Safeway in Eastland was believed to have been their first try at cracking a safe. Sheriff Sublett said. He said Croan had been through Eastland about a week earlier and had "eased" the Eastland store and the location of the safe. The two gained entry, Sublett said, by stacking empty crates from the trash pile in back, and climbing onto the roof, from which they gained entry through an air conditioning opening.

Croan remembered that they were in the store from about 1:30 to 3 a.m. They went out a back door, and carefully removed the crates, and cleared all evidence of their entry. They still had some 41 cartons of cigarettes when they were arrested, Sublett

said, and had been getting \$2 a carton in Sweetwater.

Tools used in the attempted safe cracking included chisels, nail bars and hammers, it was said.

Both are ex-convicts, the sheriff said.

The case will be among those considered when the grand jury convenes on Monday or Friday, Feb. 13 or 14.

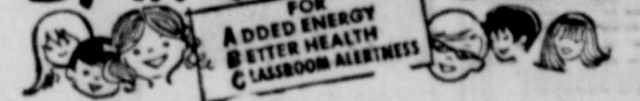
