Aztec Mobile Home Corporation will establish a major manufacturing-assembly plant in Eastland County, one mile north of Eastland, with construction to begin immediately, according to an announcement by officials of the company and the Eastland Industrial Foundation.

During its first year, the plant will employ from 65 to 100 semi-skilled employes and produce some 60 mobile homes per month.

Announcement comes following weeks of negotiations between Mr. L. M. Blalock of Camden, Ark., chief executive of the firm and members of the Eastland Foundation.




