

Lt. Vernon Sargee Receives Second Bronze Star Medal In Vietnam Action

First Lieutenant Vernon H. Sargee of Arlington, Tex., who ends three years of military service this month, was presented a second award of the Bronze Star Medal March 18 by Lt. Gen. Harry H. Critz, commanding general, Fourth U.S. Army, Fort Sam Houston, Texas.

Lieutenant Sargee, an operations officer in the ROTC division of the reserve forces office at Army headquarters, was cited for meritorious service in connection with ground operations against a hostile force in Vietnam, November 1967-November 1968. In Vietnam he was assigned to Company A, 2d Battalion (Mechanized), 25th Infantry, 25th Infantry Division.

He received his commission through officer candidate school in December of 1965. On completing basic training at Fort Polk, La., he served at Fort Hood, Tex., before assignment in Vietnam. His other decorations include the Silver Star.

Lieutenant Sargee graduated from Polytechnic High School in Fort Worth in 1959, and from Arlington State College in 1965.

He is the son of Mrs. Mae Sargee, 821 Spring Rd., Ranger, Tex., and his wife Judy is the daughter of Donald Agee, 1402 Apache St., Arlington.

New Mexico Junior College in Hobbs captured nine of a possible 15 blue ribbons and took the championship in the sixth annual Featherlite Relays in Ranger Saturday night.

Labor and Education Is Program for April 1

A third meeting of the Industrial Development Teams was held Tuesday in the Community Room of the First State Bank with twenty-seven businessmen present.

Glyn Gilliam, chairman of the Industrial Foundation introduced Bill Collings, manager of Texas Electric Service Company; W. T. Eaton, manager of Lone Star Gas Company; and H. R. "Pete" Tibbels of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, who lead the discussion on the Utilities offered in Ranger.

It was pointed out by Collings that the City of Ranger is supplied with water from Lake Leon. The water is treated by Eastland County Water Supply District with a capacity of 3,500,000 gallons per day.

The cost of water for residential use is \$3.50 for the first 2,000 gallons, and a rate of \$4.50 for the first 3000 gallons.

The City of Ranger operates an Imhoff System disposal plant with a capacity of 500,000 gallons per day. Rate for Sewerage Disposal for residential and commercial is \$1 minimum or five fixtures. Waste Disposal charges is \$1. for residential and \$2 for commercial, it was stated.

The City of Ranger receives its electrical power from Texas Electric Service Company. It was stated that Ranger is served with three main feeder lines with some 69,000 volts of electricity.

Natural gas service is provided for Ranger by the Lone Star Gas Company. The city is served by a 16-inch transmission line with a pressure of 300 pounds according to W. T. Eaton, manager of the gas company.

The city is served by Southwestern Bell Telephone Company with a complete modern dial system.

Mac Jones were in charge of the Sites and Zoning portion of the program.

It was stated that Ranger has three potential industrial sites available.

The location of one of the industrial sites is the Tiffin plant, two miles north of Ranger on the T&P Railway. There is 3.3 acres of land with the building. Also it was stated the Foundation owns 25 acres of land near the rodeo grounds which is near the railways and interstate highway.

Three guests were present for the meeting Tuesday. They were Wayland Nelson, representative of the Small Business Administration of Dallas; James Grigsby, manager of Southwestern Bell Telephone, and Howard Maddox of Texas Electric Service Co., of Fort Worth.

The topics for next week's session will be Labor, under the direction of George Kloss and Charles Arnett. Also Education and Training will be discussed by Dr. E. W. Mince and James R. Clark.

Range Anns Win Consolation In Amarrillo Tilt

Many fans from throughout the nation gathered in Amarrillo last week to watch the First Annual Women's National Invitational Collegiate Tournament, where the Wayland Flying Queens emerged as tournament champions.

The Range Anns of RJC, hoping to defeat the Flying Queens again, got sidetracked in their opening game but still managed to bring home some laurels by sweeping the tournaments Consolation Bracket.

A combination of frigid shooting and the loss of Angie Lowrance to the injury column spelled defeat for the Range Anns in their first game. Though outscoring their opponents in the second half, the Range Anns were too far behind to overtake Midwestern College of Dennison, Iowa, and the final outcome was a disappointing 58-42 loss.

RJC managed to hit only seven of twenty-seven from the field in the first half, while the Midwesterners went fourteen for twenty-four.

Finding themselves suddenly out of contention, the Range Anns determined to bring home a big trophy anyway via the Consolation route. They demolished Kansas State Friday night by a whopping fifty-point margin, 84-35, with Sue Ann Magee hitting twenty points, closely followed by Bernice Comisky with eighteen and Brenda Jacobs with sixteen.

The finals of the Consolation bracket found the Range Anns again facing Temple — the other junior college entry in the field. Led by Bernice Comisky and Brenda Jacobs, who combined for thirty-five points, the Range Anns proceeded to whump Temple for the fourth time this season, this time by a 53-41 margin.

All that remained was to lug the trophy home and begin planning for a bigger trophy in next year's event.



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Great Plain Plan Helps Aaron with Long-time Dream

A dream came true on the Johnnie Aaron farm with the help of the Great Plains Conservation Program. In 1943 Aaron bought 286 acres of land two miles south of Eastland, on the Leon River. Aaron could see the possibilities but where to start and how was the question. Ninety acres of the place was inundated 1 to 3 times each year by flood waters. The upland was stricken by drought each year due to a cover of woody vegetation of oak and mesquite trees.

"When I started operating the bottom land was shaded with hackberry and elm trees and bloodweeds were 10 and 12 feet high," Aaron remarked.

Aaron started to work clearing land and put 70 acres of bottomland into cultivation. He planted small grain, grain sorghum and alfalfa on the land. Aaron said, "I tried 15 consecutive crops without harvesting a single one in the river bottom. One crop of speltz had an estimated yield of 70

bushels per acre. A combine pulled in one afternoon and the next morning, when harvest was to start, the crop was covered with water."

In January, 1963, the Great Plains Conservation Program was activated in Eastland Co. Aaron immediately made an application for assistance through the Soil Conservation Service for a G.P.C.P. contract. On March 15 of the same year he signed a cost-share contract with the Department of Agriculture. The contract was based on Aaron's conservation plan developed with the assistance of a soil conservationist from the local work unit. By the middle of May two acres of critical area located in over-flow area had been shaped and sodded to coastal bermuda. 70 acres of former cropland had been sprigged to coastal bermuda. A cross fence of 1465 feet was completed. During the following two years 1964 and 1965 Aaron completed an additional 21 acres of pasture planting, 123 acres of range seeding, 3630 feet of cross fencing and 1070 feet of pipe line for livestock watering. "Converting the bottomland to permanent pasture has put a new complexion on the destructive floods. Overflows are beneficial to coastal bermuda. To make the job more complete, a small watershed program on the South Leon River would prevent my fences from washing out every time we get an overflow," commented Aaron.

Aaron hired heavy equipment to root-plot mesquite on the 123 acres of range land. He piled the brush and grubs by hand. He prepared a seed-bed with his own equipment and seeded it with a grass drill to mixture of sideoat grama and K.R. bluestem.

The place now carries 45 animals units where 15 were run before the program was applied. The cattle are rotated on 6 pastures of coastal bermuda from May through November. 2500 bales of hay are put up each year. "I sell enough hay to pay my fertilizer bill. The rest I store for feed in cases of emergency," says Aaron. He made one cutting on his coastal in 1968 and it averaged 104 bales per acre. The cattle are run on reseeded native grasses during the winter and spring months.

By experience he has found coastal makes good winter grazing if it has 12" or more height to it when frost kills it and then supplemented with cotyledon cake.

Since the job has been completed Johnnie Aaron said, "It would have taken a long time to meet my objective if it had not been for the Great Plains Program."

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

Coastal, Weeping Love Keys To Pastures Here

 What is Pasture Management and its purpose? It is the proper treatment and use of pastureland to prolong the life of desirable forage species; maintain or improve the qual-

ity or quantity of forage; provide soil protection and reduce water losses.

The two most common grasses found on our pastures in Eastland County are Weeping lovegrass. Coastal Bermuda is a vigorous growing warm-season perennial sod-forming grass which reproduces from both rhizomes and stolons but not from seed. It was developed and released from the Coastal Plains Experiment Station, Tifton, Ga., as an intraspecific hybrid, of a vigorous strain of Common Bermuda called Tift and a tall growing strain of Common Bermuda from South Africa.

Weeping lovegrass is a perennial warm-season bunch grass that was developed in South Africa and can be planted by seeds at the rate of about 3 lbs. per acre.

High quality green pasture is the most economical method of beef production. The type of grass, rate of fertilizer application and specific management practice necessary for improved pasture programs will usually pay good dividends. Although there are differences among grasses in their actual response to fertilizer, they require four major plant nutrients which are nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium, and calcium.

One should not attempt to establish improved pasture plants on low fertility soil without application of fertilizers, and it should be recognized that soils too poor to grow desirable plants produce low quality forage.

Rotational grazing is recommended for improved pastures, and a stocking rate to graze-off the forage in three to five weeks will usually give the highest yield of beef. For rapid recovery, a stubble of 6 inches should be left on Coastal Bermuda and 6 to 8 inches on Weeping lovegrass. Coastal and Weeping love should not be grazed until it reaches a minimum height of 8 inches and should be maintained at a minimum height of 6 inches.

A 6 to 8 inch stubble height produce about 8 to 10 thousand lbs. of forage per acre whereas a 2 inch stubble height will hardly produce enough forage per acre to pay for the fertilizer applied.


