

extension horticulturist at the Tarleton Station, used the morning school session to discuss Propagating Pecans by Inlay Grafting." He used pict-ure slides to illustrate his talk. He answered numerous questions from the floor.

contact as time neared for him to meet the plane. High winds delayed the plane. Either cautious or observant, the contact went East instead of South, and failed to make his rendevous with the Cessna 182. The plane was spotted by Carter, 12 miles south of Cisco at 6:50 a.m. and it circled, but did not land. He radioed officers on the ground to cover the Cisco

Officers arrived at the Cisco airport just in time to see the pilot race back into the plane after having touched down and running to make a telephone call. The plane flew away "right over our ears" Sheriff Sublett said. It flew northwest of Cisco, and un-known to its pilot, Deputy Carter and his crew were "upstairs" and watching when the plane began dumping its hills in that area. Aware that the transit plane was getting low on gasoline, the authoritwere notified to cover the Eastland airport where an e mergency landing was antici-pated. Eastland Policem a n John Morren was on hand at 7:40 a.m. Friday at the Eastland airport to arrest the man and woman when they came out of the plane. The plane was pill-less when it landed. but Carter was still in the air, and officers were being direted to the dump spots where boxes and cases of the illegal frues were recovered.

The Cisco man's house was marched and some 600 tablets were found.
