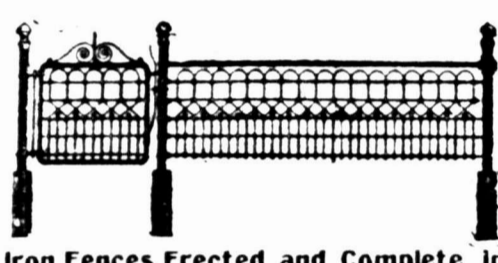

ANOTHER TERRIBLE MINE DISASTER OCCURS

Two Powder Magazines in the Daly-West Mine at Park City, Utah, Explode in the Night.

FEARFUL LOSS OF LIFE IS THE RESULT

Three Hours After the Accident Twenty-Seven Men Had Been Taken Out Dead and There Was Little Hope For the 250 Men Who Were at Work When the Powder Devil Let Loose.

Salt Lake City, July 16.—A telephone message just received from Park City, Utah, says that the magazine on the 1200-foot level of the Daly-West mine exploded shortly after 1 o'clock this morning. There were 150 men at work on the mine when the explosion occurred. Eighteen dead bodies have already been removed and it is thought that the number of dead will reach 100. Gas is issuing from the mouth of the mine preventing any one entering. It will be two hours before the exact number of dead can be ascertained. All physicians available have been sent to the scene of the accident.

One of Largest Silver Mines in Utah. Park City, Utah, July 16.—The Daly-West mine is one of the largest silver producing mines in Utah.

Later Report From the Scene of Disaster.

Park City, Utah, July 16.—Two powder magazines at the 1200-foot level of the Daly-West mine exploded about 1 o'clock this morning, causing loss of life, that at present cannot be estimated, nor even guessed at. At 4 o'clock 27 men had been taken out of the mine

dead and several others had been recovered in a half-lazed condition. These were all brought out through the Ontario mine shaft, which is a mile distant from the Daly-West, in which the explosion occurred.

In the Daly-West mine between 100 and 150 men were at work. In the Ontario nearly 100. It is not known how many of these are dead but the disaster extends to the Ontario. There are two powder magazines at the 1200-foot level of the Daly-West, one at each side of the shaft with a capacity of from one to two cars of powder each.

Members of a relief party, who went into the Ontario mine, shortly after the explosion occurred, have not yet returned and fears are entertained for their safety.

Thirty-Three Bodies Recovered.

Salt Lake, Utah, July 16.—A telephone message from Park City at 10 o'clock says that thirty-three bodies have been removed from the two mines. Officers of the Daly-West state there are only three more bodies in the mine; the miners, however, assert that twelve or fifteen are still unaccounted for.

A SNEAK THIEF MADE A GOOD HAUL

He Captured and Carried Off the Strong Box of the Southern Pacific's New York Office, Which Contained at Least \$5,000.

New York, July 16.—A sneak thief marched into the office of the Southern Pacific office at 334 Broadway and although there were several people there he calmly marched out again taking with him the cashier's box.

The box contained the day's receipts. Usually it holds \$25,000 to \$50,000 in negotiable paper and cash. On this occasion, however, it held only about \$5,000 in checks and notes and the cashier thinks less than \$100 in cash. As a rule the box is kept in the safe of the office, but the cashier had taken it out and placed it on his desk, intending to return it to the safe in a moment. He left his compartment for a short time and when he got back the box was gone and no trace of the thief could be found. The checks can, it is

thought, be readily cashed as many of them are for small amounts and the cashier has no record whereby he can stop payment.

LIFE TIME SPENT IN OFFICE.

Colonel Phelps to Leave the New York Custom House.

New York, July 16.—Col. Dudley F. Phelps who was appointed deputy collector of customs under general Chester A. Arthur 30 years ago, has resigned his position as deputy in charge of the ninth division.

Colonel Phelps has been granted a thirty day leave of absence, at the expiration of which he will retire to private life.

OPERATION FOR APPENDICITIS.

Raymond Hitchcock, the Comedian, the Last to go Under the Knife.

New York, July 16.—Raymond Hitchcock, the comedian, has been brought here from New York, says a Philadelphia dispatch to the World, and has been successfully operated upon at St. Agnes' hospital for appendicitis. He was in a serious condition when he arrived and the operation was performed as soon as possible to save his life.

SPEED'S SIDE OF THE CASE.

The Oklahoma Attorney Denies the Charges of Fraud.

Guthrie, Ok., July 16.—Horace Speed, United States attorney for Oklahoma, has made a statement concerning the civil suit authorized by the Pawnee county grand jury against him to recover \$8000 as fees received by Speed on a contract between him and the county commissioners for the collection of cattle taxes in the Osage Indian reservation in 1899. The main charge against Speed alleges that the contract was fraudulent. He says that every suggestion in the charge is false; that the contract was well known at the time of its making by every person in the county and that by it he secured to the county thousands of dollars in revenues. Mr. Speed was appointed from Indianapolis by President Harrison and afterward by President McKinley.

APPLE GROWERS' CONVENTION.

Preliminary Steps Towards Holding One at St. Louis.

St. Louis, July 16.—Representatives of the Mississippi Valley Apple Growers' association have held a conference here and taken preliminary steps towards holding an apple growers' convention. One of the principal steps taken was to arrange for co-operating between the different horticultural societies and this will be brought about by asking every society interested to send delegates to a meeting to be held here August 19. The congress will be held later in the year.

STEAMER WILL USE OIL.

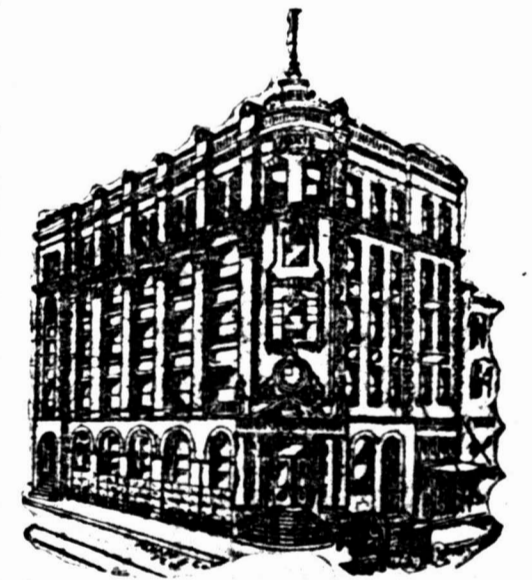
The Mariposa to Experiment With a Substitute for Coal.
