TEENS WILL DISCUSS SUIT FOR A STREET

Zane-Cetti Litigation to Be the Subject of a Mass Meeting Early Next Week—Story of the Case

A meeting of those property owners who are residents of the section of the city affected by the suit of Zane-Cetti against the city, which resulted in a judgment for Mr. Cetti, has been called for early next week.

This case involves a strip of land, forty-three feet wide on the south side, in part of what was formerly Grandview addition. It is 1,026 feet in length, and adjoins the Wharton mansion on the east.

The property was left un-enclosed and the public traveled over it at liberty and in such directions as they cared to go. Upon buying the property in the sheriff's sale Mrs. Cetti paid the taxes on the entire body of land and disregarded the effort of Drew Fruit to dedicate it and lay it off into lots and blocks.

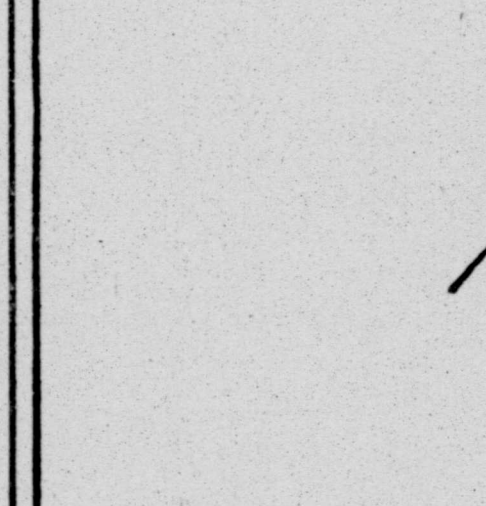
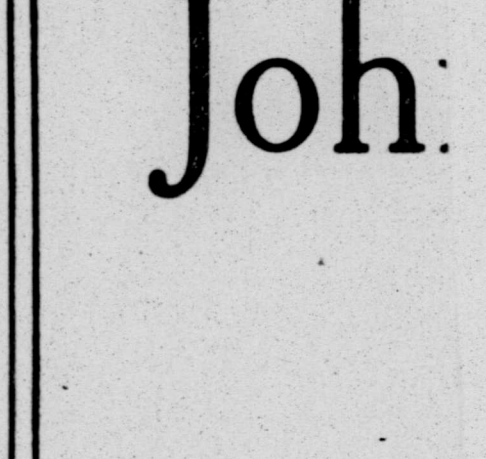

NO HOLIDAY AT THE POSTOFFICE

Citizens Will Be Able to Secure Their Mail Tomorrow as Usual

Washington's birthday will not be observed in the local postoffice as a legal holiday, although this is probably the only branch of the federal service that will not observe the day.

When seen in regard to the matter yesterday, Postmaster Burroughs stated that deliveries would be made as usual throughout the city and the office kept open as upon all other days.

The matter of observing the day as a holiday, he said, was made optional with the postmaster, and that he had decided not to suspend the regular work. The decision was made because of the fact that two of the twenty-three local carriers are on the sick list and because Monday being practically a double day at all times, too great a quantity of work would accumulate if a recess were taken from Saturday until Tuesday.

In the rural delivery service, however, the day will be observed, orders having been received from headquarters making it practically imperative. Persons living on the routes operated from this city will be able to secure their mail by calling at the city office. The day will also be observed in the railway mail service, and in the other departments of the federal government.

Children in the public schools will be given a holiday in honor of the day, as will the employes of the Texas and Pacific shops.

IN THE COURTS

Judge Irby Dunklin of the forty-eighth district court yesterday afternoon took up the divorce case of E. M. Kirtley against E. C. Kirtley, but because of the lateness of the hour the matter was not fully heard, and Judge Dunklin entered an order preventing the defendant from interfering with the plaintiff in the conduct of her boarding and rooming house. The case will be taken up later and heard on its merits.

In the case of the state against Eddie Gray, Judge Dunklin overruled a motion or a new trial, to which the defendant accepted and gave notice in open court of an appeal to the court of criminal appeals at Dallas.

In the case of T. T. McDonald et al against the Beaumont-Gulf Oil Company et al, Judge Dunklin entered the following order: Motion of E. Y. Prigmore for auditor's fees. Ordered judgment for 100 for services as auditor be taxed as costs of suit as prayed for in the motion.

SEVENTEENTH DISTRICT COURT. Very little was done in this court yesterday. In the case of Jim Tubbs a motion for a new hearing was overruled and the defendant sentenced to two years in the penitentiary for burglary of a store. Tubbs is a negro and was recently found guilty of burglarizing one of the packing houses and given two years in state prison. Notice of appeal to the criminal court at Dallas was given.

COUNTY COURT MATTERS. Two judgments were entered in the county court yesterday by Judge Milam as follows: In the damage case of Lula Jamison against the Northern Texas Traction company, damages a judgment for \$625 in favor of the plaintiff was entered. A judgment for \$500 was also given the plaintiff in the case of Shaw Bros. against the International and Great Northern railroad company.

The School Question. The question of putting the school district embracing North Fort Worth, under city government instead of county jurisdiction as at present, is receiving the encouragement of a majority of North Side residents who have shown their wishes in the form of a long petition which is being circulated for the purpose of having a special election ordered by the mayor to decide the question. Another issue which will make itself felt at the coming election is the tax rate question. The people insist that the present rate of city taxes is not sufficient to maintain a city government or at least this had been the experience of North Fort Worth. Before the election the candidates for aldermanic honors will be asked through the press to express themselves, and they may rest assured that the support of their friends will be governed largely by the position they take in this matter.
