

Sectional View of Russian Cruiser Boyarin, Wrecked by Its Own Mines



mpanying out gives an excellent idea of the method employed in the construction of the modern battleship. The Boyarin was blown up at Port Arthur, as readers of The Telegram dispatches will recall, by coming in contact with one of its own submarine mines. On board the Boyarin were 200 whitehead torpedoes which partly accounts for the terrific explosion in which 197 officers and men lost their lives. The Boyarin was a second-class cruiser, built with steel hull and having a displacement of 3,200 tons. The vessel was 347 feet long, had a beam of 41% feet and a draught of 16 feet. She was one of the fastest cruisers in the Russian navy, having a speed of twenty-five knots, with engines capable of developing 18,000 horse power. She was built at Copenhagen four years ago, and her armament consisted of six 4.7-inch quick-firing guns eight 1.8-inch guns two 1.4-inch guns and three quick-firing guns of small calibre.
