PRESIDENT STARTS ONJOURNEYSOUTH

Departure From Washington as Planned

WILL SPEND TWO WEEKS

New Orleans Last Point in Itinerary - Mrs. Roosevelt in the Party

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18 .- In redemption of a promise given more than a year age President Roosevelt started today on an extended trip through the states of the south. He will visit in the course of his tour all the Atlantic coast states, Alabama, Arkansas and Louisiana. On the completion of the trip, he will have visited during his administration as President every state in the union. After the arrangements for the trip had been completed an epidemic of yellow fever broke out in New Orleans, one of the principal points of the President's itinerary. He was urged by many of his friends he ought not to visit New Orleans at the time scheduled lest he be exposed to fever. To the people of New Orleans, the President suggested that if they preferred he would postpone his visit to that city until a later date. Assurances were given him, however, by Mayor Behrman and by officials of the marine hospital service that at the time of his proposed visit to New Orleans the danger from fever infection will practically be out of consideration. The quarantine of other states against Louissiana and New Orleans is still in force, however, and in order not to violate the quarantine regulation the President changed his itinerary so as to make New Orleans the last place he should visit. It is his intention after spending the day of the 26th in that city to board the armored cruiser West Virginia and make the return trip to Wash. ington by sea. He will make the trip from New Orleans to Norfolk, Va., on the West Virginia and journey up the Potomac river from Norfolk to Washington in
