



#### THAT SPECIAL SESSION

The Austin Statesman, published under the shadow of the state capital building, decants at some length on the necessity for a special session of the state legislature, but has nothing in the form of even an intimation to the effect that the governor is considering the propriety of convening the lawmakers in extra

Governor Lanham has pursued a very peculiar policy with reference to this matter, and notwithstanding the fact that a petition was filed with him goveral months ago asking for an extra session, coupled with a signed agreement by a quorum of both branches of the lawmaking body, pledging themselves to serve absolutely without pay, the governor has maintained a sphinx-like silence that has not comported well with the proprieties of the occasion. Those gentlemen who entered into that agreement to serve without pay in order to perfect legislation that is known to be in a horribly mutilated condition, should have been treated with just a little more consideration. The aged and distinguished author of the election law, who has complained most bitterly of the foul treatment accorded his measure, was entitled to something more than this deep and oppressive silence.

Judge Terrell consented to lay aside his dignity and forget the past high honors that had come to him and accept a position as a member of the state legislature in order that he might accomplish something of real value to his people. He returned to the very bottom of the political ladder in order that he might give his people renewed evidence of the patriotism that has so long beeen his inspiration, and he labored to give the state of Texas an election law as nearly perfect as the mind of man could devise. His measure was fought upon the floor of both branches of the state legislature by those elements in this state known to be unutterably opposed to fair and clean election methods, and the fight over the measure was a bitter and protracted one. In the end, however, Judge Terrell triumphed, and gave to the people of this state a law that he believed would answer the purpose. In the closing hours of the state legislature that law was disappoints its friends and readers. tampered with and the very provisions that its author had fought so bitterly and so determinedly were incorporated in the measure. It is true this fact has been explained as a clerical error, but it makes no difference how that wrong was perpetrated. It was done and the measure left in such condition as to warrant the assertion that much chaos is coming when elections are held under its conflicting provisions. The preservation of the rights of the people and the guaranty of immunity from the confusion that must necessarily ensue, would seem to demand action on the part of the governor to remedy the sitnation, especially as it could be done so easily and sbsolutely without expense to the state.

But Governor Lanham, through some unexplained reason of his own, has said and done absolutely nothing. Rumors have filtered out from the state capital occasionally to the effect that he was preparing to call the legislature together early in January, but the New Year is now almost upon us, and the executive has not yet broken silence. He has not said that he would or he would not call the honorable body together, and the plain people of the state cannot understand his actions. If there was occasion for secrecy or if for reasons of state it is deemed best not to give out any information the people could understand better than at present. But to understand the exisiting necessity for action-to hear the popular clamor for action, and then witness the action of the executive in refusing to give even an intimation of his intentions in the premises, is as exasperating as it is wholly and entirely unnecessary.

#### THE STATE LAND OFFICE

Hon. John J. Terrell of Wise county, present incumbent of the office of land commissioner, has become a candidate for the third term, and in his viola-. . . tion of democratic precedent, he is calling down upon his devoted head an avalanche of pretty caustic criticism. In commenting on the candidacy of the gentle-

man, the Rockdale Messenger says: We referred last week to claims made by one of safely accomplished.

Land Commissioner Terrell's friends that Mr. Terrell had been a great friend to the school children of Texas in protecting the school fund, and we suggested then that that was what Mr. Terrell aspired to do, took oath to do, and was paid to do, but even though he may have discharged his full duty, it need not be expected that the democracy will violate a democratic principle and give him a third term. Jeffersonian democracy believes the best public service is to come through frequent changes in public office. If Mr. Terrell excelled his predecessor, so may some other (C. E. Gilbert, particularly) excel Mr. Terrell. Most of the wrongs in public office, if not all of them, come

from long terms. However, it is not at all settled that it is to be conceded Mr. Terrell has been more of a friend to the school fund than he ought to have been-or that he has "saved" as much to that fund as he claims. We have before us a copy of his report for his first term. Subscribers failing to receive the paper promptly will In that he claims to have "saved" to the state on timber sales \$9,165, and in leases on 1,915,589 acres, \$18,-518.30, because, as he claims, he procured prices over and above the prices he found the land and timber on the market at. We don't know what his predecessor could have put the values at; but in the matter of timber we find that his predecessor, Charles R. Rogan, sold timber at an average price of \$5.35 per acre, while Mr. Terrell sold 8,260 acres at an average price of \$3.75, and as the pine forests of Southeast Texas are pretty much of equal value, we are disposed to think Mr. Terrell lost money to the school fund on timber sales. Had he sold at as favorable price as Mr. Rogan, he would have "saved" to the school children of Texas \$30,621.96 instead of \$9,165.96.

The cattlemen located out in West Texas have contended for the past two years that the action of Commissioner Terrell in arbitrarily advancing the price of school land, both under sale and lease, was nothing more than a matter of playing to the galleries for the sake of political effect. His pointing to the saving that he has made to the school children of this state, when considered in connection with his candidacy for a third term, will cause suspicion to almost assume the guise of conviction, and while he may gain favor in certain portions of the state, it is pretty certain that the opposite will be the case in West Texas.

Commissioner Terrell may have saved to the school children of Texas the sum of \$18,000 through his arbitrary action in raising the prices on land that was being leased by the cattlemen. But that saving was wrung from an industry during the time of its great oppression, and when it was powerless to raise its hand in its own defense. The cattlemen of the Texas range country have had a hard road to travel during the past three years, and many of them have been compelled to give up the fight and lose the accumulated savings of years. At this time-when the state of Texas should have been merciful to the men who were struggling for their very existence, Commissioner Terrell applied the official screws to these men and forced this blood money into the coffers of the state. He doubtless feels justified in his action, from the fact that it is advanced as reason why democratic precedent should be violated and the commissioner retained at the public trough. But there are a few thousand people in Texas who feel differently about the matter, and the live stock interests of this state. can be expected to express their entire disapproval of

The state of Texas wants a man in the position of land commissioner who is big enough and broad enough to do ever and exact justice to all interestsa man who is actuated by patriotism and not a desire for personal political preferment. Commissioner Terrell has made the mistake of letting his right hand know what his left hand was doing when he was fishing up this saving for the school children of Texas, and by so doing he has greatly weakened his cause.

#### OUR WASHINGTON LETTER

Special to The Telegram.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 28. The postal deficit for the fiscal year which ended June 30, 1905, was \$14,572,584, which is \$5,753,092 more than that of the previous year. This deficit apparently does not worry Postmaster General Cortelyou, for he says: "I am less concerned about the deficit than I am about tthe efficiency of administration." than I am about the efficiency of administration." postal revenue amounted to \$152,826,585.10, while the expenditures aggregated \$167,399,169.23. In the fiscal year 1904, the receipts were nearly \$10,000,000 behind those of last year. The postal treasury in 1904 received \$143,582,624.34, and it paid out \$152,362,116.70.

There was an increase in receipts over the previous year of \$9,243,960.76, but at the same time the expenditures took a much greater rise, and amounted to \$14,819,843.09 more than 1904.

Postmaster General Cortelyou, in the opening paragraph of his report, gives notice of the celebration of the two hundredth anniversary of the birth of Benjamin Franklin. The first postmaster general of the United States was born Jan. 17, 1706, and the postoffice department will celebrate the event by appro-

priate exercises. One of the features of Mr. Cortelyou's efforts for improving the service, has been the installation, as it were, of a merit system for postmasters.

Another feature of the work of Postmaster General Cortelyou has been the war on frauds in using the United States mall service. He has destroyed them right and left. The work of the department in this connection is shown in a comprehensive report.

The postmaster general discussed at length the pneumatic tube service. Mr. Cortelyou touches upon the matter of government control of this latest postal improvement. He recommends that all existing contracts, which are about to expire, be renewed for a period of ten years, with a well defined option for purchase outright by the government.

A recommendation is made for an experiment in one of the large cities of government ownership of

The postmaster general tells in detail the future policy of rural free delivery system, dwelling at length upon contemplated improvements. Mr. Cortelyou does not favor a parcels post service.

Commenting on the Philippine tariff reduction, the Boston Transcript concludes that it means a help for the islands and no harm for us. It says:

If under reduced duties the Philippines should in the next few years double or treble their contribution to the American sugar supply they would do all that their advocates expect of them. The contribution would be small to us, but it would be an immense boon to the islands, by so much reviving a great industry which war and pestilence have crushed to the ground. Politically the effect of liberal legislation would be immense since under our sway we have deprived the islands of the market they had in Spain without opening a new one to take its place. As to tobacco which is associated with sugar in the proposed legislation we should see little of the Philippine product, but by the reduction of the Philippine tariff on our tobacco, as is suggested, we should benefit their manufacturing. The Philippine cigarmakers feel the effect of German competition which they believe can be overcome by the employment of Connecticut tobacco in making their cigars.

#### AMONG THE EXCHANGES

The supreme court of the state has put its stamp on that scalping business and outlawed it. This is only simple justice to the railroads, upon whom the state imposes so many burdens.
