

> JOHN J. McCloskey, who has been appointed to manage the St. Louis the writer knew something about it Cardinals in the National League for and he said that they often read that next season, is well known to the oldtime baseball enthusiast in Texas, for he was one of the originators of the first baseball league in this state. That was the old eight-club league that was formed here eighteen years ago in 1888. It struggled through one season and then died a natural death from want of success in the middle of the follow-

ing year. The clubs forming that league were Fort Worth, Dallas, San Antonio, Houston, Galveston, Waco, Austin and Sherman. It is a peculiar fact that of mond of the two big leagues this comman, which has never been a paying baseball city. Teams at Austin have also been tried again and again, but

have never been made to succeed. McCloskey was owner of the Austin franchise in the beginning of the Texas League and acted as manager of the team. W. H. Ward, who is now owner of the Fort Worth franchise, also owned the first franchise that ever existed in this city, as he was the originator of the first team for Fort Worth in the 1888 league. He has been the manager of every league team that this city has had since then, with the exception of a half season in 1895, when Richards had charge of the team, although Mr. Ward took charge of it in the middle of the season and during the 1901 season, when Ted Sullivan managed the Fort Worth team.

McCloskey came to Texas in the year 1887, with the famous "Joplin" team, and set the Texas baseball world on fire by the way that he managed o beat everything in the state with his team. The following year he organized the first professional ball league in the state.

In Austin and in other parts of the state where McCloskey is well known it is declared that he will prove to be one of the greatest baseball 'leaders that the game has ever seen. He has turned a large number of players that have made names for themselves.



RESULT OF LEGISLATIVE INCOMPETENCY

The deficit existing in the Texas state treasury has long been a source of constant mortification to every patriotic and intelligent citizen of the state, and the causes leading thereto have been eagerly discussed from one end of the state to the other. While there has been a disposition to censure various state officials, pass the odium up to the present state administration, and allege graft and extravagance, The Telegram has insisted from the very beginning that It is a condition that should be charged up directly to the state legislature, and as yet that has been made manifest no real reason why that estimate of the situation should be changed one particle. There are various contributory causes which have added to the effect, but the main reason lies in the inadequate revenue laws that have been made to answer the purpose in Texas until the last legislature made such a determined effort to remedy the situation. If previous sessions of the state's lawmakers had taken hold of the situation in the proper manner the disgraceful situation so generally complained of could have been happily averted. But for several years Texas has been cursed with a class of legislators more intent on furthering their own political interests than upon looking after the real interests of the people. Half the men who have gone to the legislature have been imbued with a flaming and consuming desire to use the office as a medium for further political preferment, and instead of devoting their time to the work they were elected to perform, they have spent it in an effort to convince the people of Texas that they were created to adorn som higher official position. The remedy for this situation truly lies in the election of better legislative material.

And the people are to blame not only for the election of incompetent legislative material, but in other essentials as well. That fact is well brought out in the following extract from the Waco Tribune on the

The main deficiency in the revenue laws of Texas lies in the mode of the assessment of property for taxation. The statute makes it the duty of the county tax assessor to value the list of property rendered by the citizen for taxation. Does he do it? Ask him and he will tell you that he lets the citizen do the valuing and passes the question of the fairness of this valuation on to the county commissioners' court, which is the board of equalization. You know without asking why the county tax assessor doesn't value the property as the law makes it his duty to do. If he puts on a proper valuation one time he couldn't do it any more. The people wouldn't re-elect him.

And when the question reaches the commissioner's court, it is handled like it was a hot chestnut. The commissioners have to meet the people at the polls

Until some means of valuing property is devised that will get it on the tax rolls at a fair price trouble about revenue will continue and deficits will stare governors in the face and banish sleep from their

Some states have a valuation of real estate every three or five years by commissioners appointed by the court or grand jury. And the law at that same time fixes the valuation and that is what like property is selling for on the usual terms of sale. Therefore, it is not left to the judgment or whim of the commissioners to say at what price the property shall go on the rolls. All they have to do is to ascertain the question of fact-what is like property selling for in the community. They have no motive to make a wrong assessment. They have no eye on a re-election to dim their senses, and the court rarely has occasion to

change their valuations. But this is only matter of detail. The main defect in the revenue laws is the mode of valuation of property for taxation. Until this effect is removed, the

trouble will be on us all the time.

The revenue laws of the state of Texas are in deplorable condition, not only from the lack of attention at the proper moment, but from the fact that much of the remedial legislation enacted by the last legislature is now tied up in the courts, through the hostile action of interests opposed to such legislation. This latter feature of the situation is believed to be the animus of the governor's action in failing to call a session of the state legislature when there has seemed to be such a universal demand for such action. It is believed that the executive has only been awaiting the decision of the courts in these matters. so as to include them in the call for an extra session,

should the decision be unfavorable to the state. It is morally certain that the revenue laws of | much damage was done.

Texas must be still further perfected through the proper equalization of the burden of taxation. The state has ample taxable values to raise all required revenue without the semblance of imposition upon any interest, and the matter should be gone into with that idea always to the front. Men should be elected to the next state legislature who are capable and competent to deal with this very intricate problem, and in the meantime the people of Texas should resolve to deal with the state on a fairer basis. There should be no evasion of taxation, but every property owner should realize he has a plain duty to perform in the premises. That duty lies in the honest rendition of all property subject to taxation. The tax dodger must go out of business.

THOSE GREASY POLITICAL EYES

The Farmers' Union appears to be a constantly growing proposition in the state of Texas, and it is believed that it has not yet nearly reached the high water mark. And if the leaders can only make the politicians keep their greasy eyes off the organization it will be able to accomplish a great work for the agricultural interests.-Fort Worth Telegram.

The above is good, sound advice, plainly put, and should be regarded with consideration by every Texas farmer union man, and it is advice by which they should act when there is any danger of politics, and as this is campaign year, now is a good time to guard

the union.-Jacksboro Gazette. Yes; this is political year, and while the year is yet young and has made but little progress in its infantile career, the politician of every degree, from the man who aspires to be constable of the back country precinct to the most ambitious candidate for governor, is already actively at work striving to attain the coveted goal. And this army of candidates has its eye upon every influence and every institution that can be induced to lend any form of aid and en-

There are said to be more than 150,000 members of the Farmers' Union in the state of Texas, and it is not impossible that out of this large total a very considerable per cent is affiliated with the same desire for office that burns so madly in outside breasts. It has been impossible to form this big organization out of material that will be content to delve the earth and not reach out for some of the flesh pots that are so alluring to mankind generally. These members of the organization will insert the entering wedge by seeking the indorsement of their local unions in order to obtain an advantage over the other fellow. If the local union begins the work of indorsing local candidates, in order to appear consistent, it must proceed with the work until it has executed a like commission for every candidate from governor down to constable, and when it does this it has transformed itself into a great political machine and prostituted the purposes of its organization.

And when the Farmers' Union becomes a great political machine it will surely fall, even as its predecessors in such procedure have fallen. The Telegram does not say these things and indulge in this prophecy on account of any ill will or antagonism toward this great organization, but on account of a genuine desire to serve it. There is no reason in the world why the members of the Farmers' Union should not take In fact, they cannot be good citizens of Texas unless they do take an active interest in all things political. But that interest should be taken in an individual capacity, without pledging the order as a whole to any candidate or set of candidates. Indeed, it is extremely doubtful if such a thing as pledging the order as a whole could be accomplished. Take the matter of the governorship, for illustration, and while it is claimed that the Farmers' Union is almost unitedly behind a certain distinguished candidate, it is generally realized that such talk is only indulged in for the sake of effect. Every candidate for governor of Texas has followers and adherents among the farmers of Texas, and it is certain that these same conditions extend to the farmers' organization. A movement to indorse Campbell as the choice of the organization would certainly provoke a fight from the friends of the other candidates, and so on down the list. The organization is in no condition to submit itself to internecine strife and contention, and it is confidently believed that there is wisdom sufficient among its leadership to avert such a condition.

Bearing these facts in mind, it would be well for the members of every local union to carefully consider the dangers involved and abstain from any indorsement of local candidates. There are men who have become members for no other purpose than to seek such indorsement, and there are others who will apply for membership with the same object in view. As the ranks of almost every secret society is recruited every two years from the long list of political candidates, who seek in that way to obtain some real or fancied advantage, so it will be with the Farmers' Union. These men will become candidates for admission from purely selfish purposes, and it is well for those who have the good of the organization at heart to be on guard at all times. The doors will be battered down by the political battering ram this year, if it can be accomplished, and the organization turned over bodily to the greasy-eyed politicians. 
