





Plains Gardening

The following is the beginning of a series of hints to home gardeners on the Plains of Texas, authored by Dr. George Elle, professor of horticulture at Texas Tech, in the interest of good home gardening.)

Gardening on the Plains of Texas is different from gardening in any other part of the state. Weather, water, soil, and growing seasons make the general "rulesfo-thumb" error on home gardening in our area.

This series of articles is de signed to help home gardeners on the Plains selecting seed better suited for our soil, in preparing our land for planting, in planting, and in applying our water on our growing gardens.

o the mail-order seed buyer: Since our planting season started Feb. 1, you are almost too immediately. See the chart below ithe Plains soil. When buying for seed varieties, and check the second chart for planting times.



SABBATH OR LORD'S DAY WHICH?

The word "Sabbath" occurs a number of times in the Bible, but it never refers to a day for Christian observance. It belonged to the Jewish system, and ended with the passing of animal sacrifice, incense, and circumcision. Some erroneously teach that Sabbath observance antedated the giving of the law, but since Moses was present when the Sabbath command was given, we should let him speak. In commenting on the Decalogue which included the Sabbath command, he said. "The Lord our God made a covenant with us in Horeb (Sinai). The Lord made not this covenant with our fathers, but with us, even us who are all of us here alive this day." (Deut. 5:2, 3.) The Sabbath, then, was not given to the Patriarchs, but to the Jews who were alive when Moses uttered these words. According to Nehemiah, God came down on Mount Sinai and made known the holy Sabbath. (Neh. 9:13, 14.) It is true that God rested from His creative work on the seventh day, but a period of 2500 years expired before He commanded any living person to keep the day. The Sabbath had its beginning with Judaism; it also ended with Judaism.

It was observed in honor of a Jewish event. Moses said. "Remember that thou wast a servant in the land of Egypt, and that the Lord, thy God brought thee out thence through a mighty hand, and a stretched out arm, therefore, the Lord thy God commanded thee to keep the Sabbath day." (Deut. 5:15.) If a man should snatch from the postman a letter bearing the name and address of some other person, he would make himself ridiculous. So does he who claims the Sabbath which was given to Jews

The Jews of Paul's day sought to bind the Sabbath on Christians, but were severely reprimanded by the apostle. He taught that the law had been nailed to the cross of Christ, and that Christians should not let Judaizers bind on them Jewish feast days, and Sabbath observance. (Col. 2:14-17.) He said, also, "Christ is become of no effect unto you, whosoever of you are justified by the law; ye are fallen from grace." (Gal. 5:4).

Christians are to observe the first day of the week called the "Lord's Day." (Rev. 1:10.) On this day Christ arose from the dead. (Mk. 16:19). On this same day He was declared to be the Son of God. (Rom. 1:4.) On this day He met with the disciples successively, between the resurrection and ascension. (Jno. 20:1-19-26.) Pentecost came on the first day of the week. (Lev. 23:15.) The events of the second chapter of Acts then, came on the first day of the week. On this day the Spirit came, the gospel was preached, the kingdom was established, and the first citizens were set in. It is no wonder that the church from that time on met on the first day of the week to observe the Lord's supper, and to perform the other items of Christian worship.
