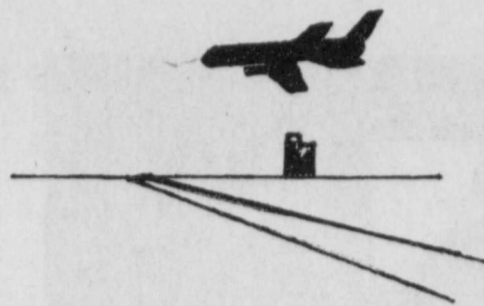

Lighthouse Electric honors three long-term employees

Lighthouse Electric Cooperative recognized three of its long-term employees at the 44th annual report meeting Saturday.

Ed Pollen, an employee for 35 years and Jackie Duke and Nolan Arney, employees for 30 years, were honored at the annual meeting. Also two long-term directors, Tom Porter and Henry Scarborough, retired from the board at this meeting. They were recognized for 34 years of cumulative service on the board.

The report of operations stated that last year 73 percent of the operating cost was wholesale power. As of March 1983 86 percent of the operating cost was wholesale power.

Lighthouse was adversely affected by the sagging farm economy. With the cotton ginning activity down an average of 60 percent and considerable expense and damage to poles and equipment due to severe storms, Lighthouse is looking into areas to find savings such as load management and peak periods.

Lighthouse plans to build a new substation in the Flomot-Turkey area. In June Lighthouse entered into a contract with Crosbyton to purchase its power requirements from Lighthouse.

This will result in 12 million kilowatt hours sold annually. This should have beneficial effects for the Lighthouse system.

This is the 19th year Lighthouse has sent high school students on a Washington D.C. tour. This year Lighthouse will be sending Shawnda Brock and Rob Pratt. Rob presented his speech at the meeting.

Three new board of directors were elected. From district six, Gaylord Groce was elected. From district seven, Jerrold Vinson was elected and from district nine James Richburg was elected.

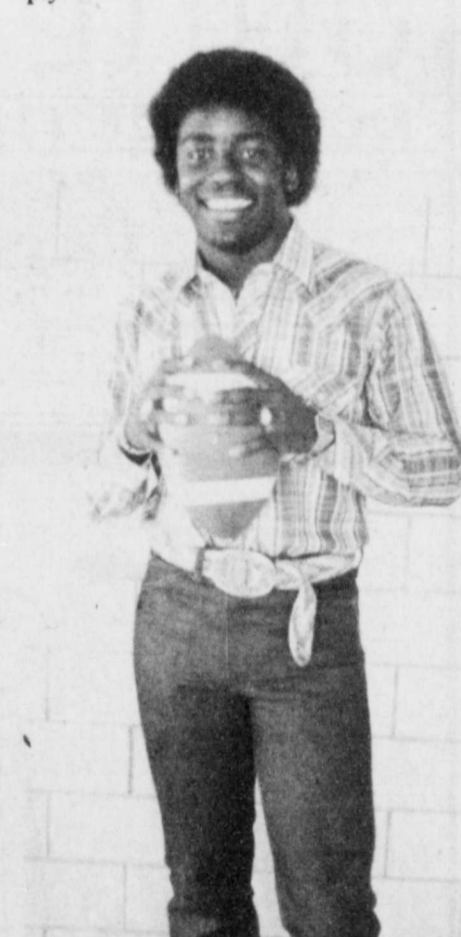

Wills Day has local origin

Saturday, the population of the tiny town of Turkey, Texas will join the throngs of Bob Wills enthusiasts for the Bob Wills Day celebration.

The 12th annual reunion will feature many of the former Texas Playboys, two dances, a fiddlers contest, and an arts and crafts show. This annual country music salute to Bob Wills was started by Harold Brown, a native of Floyd County.

In the fall of 1971, Brown organized a board of interested people to start an honorary day for Bob Wills. Included in the first meeting were Vincint Smith also a native of Floyd County, who now resides in Floyd County, Bud Townsend, author of San Antonio Rose—The Life and Music of Bob Wills and Brummet Echohawk, an artist and performer.

Brown, an avid Bob Wills fan, and Tom Christian (who was in the State legislature at the time) later met with the citizens of Turkey and decided to have the celebration on the last Saturday in April.

They expected about 600 people to attend the first commemoration. Their expectations were surpassed when over 6,000 people attended the initial festivities, which featured Bob Wills and the original Texas Playboys.

Wills began as a barber in Turkey. The barber shop is still operated there. It is managed by Harold Ham, whose father barbered with Wills. The original chairs are still used in the shop. Wills got his start in country music by answering an ad for a fiddle player.

Brown now resides on his ranch in Cushing, Oklahoma.

Scouts learn home security

About 20 Floydada Boy Scouts attended the Neighborhood Watch meeting Monday April 18. Neighborhood Watch organizer Bill Gray, discussed the purpose of Neighborhood Watch and Crime Call. The seriousness of vandalism, its punishments, home security and crime prevention hints were also discussed.

One security hint that was keyed on was the report of bogus phone calls. A number of these calls that relay alleged death, injury or sickness in the family have been reported in the Lubbock and surrounding areas.

The phony calls, by callers claiming to be with the police department, highway patrol, or sheriff's department,

appear to be attempts to lure the resident away from their home, making the residence an easy prey for possible burglary. Two incidents such as this resulted in house burglaries in Lubbock.

Citizens who receive such calls should remain calm and ask for the callers name and the agency they represent. The number for the institution the caller claimed to represent should be looked up and called to verify the message. Law enforcement agencies do not deliver notice of death by telephone, these calls should be disregarded.

Anyone receiving such phony or suspicious calls should report it to the police or sheriff's department immediately.

Three arrests made in connection with bribe

Three arrests were made in Floydada Friday after a two-month grand jury investigation. Texas Ranger Jim Mull and Floyd County deputies, Raymond Hamilton and Don Pennington arrested three black males in connection with offering bribes to Floydada police officers.

Two of the males, from Floydada, are being held under a \$50,000 bond for allegedly offering a bribe to Floydada police officer James Hale concerning bootlegging. The third, from Plainview,

is being held under a \$75,000 bond for allegedly offering a bribe to Floydada police chief Doug Brewer concerning gambling and after hours business. The business, a billiard parlor, opened on Monday April 18 and the bribe was offered on Tuesday April 19.

The investigation was under the supervision of Floyd County grand jury and with the knowledge of the Floyd County Sheriff's Department and Floydada Police Department.

Texas Hospice

Organization holds first meeting

The first Texas Hospice Organization meeting was held in Midland, Texas, at the Midland Hilton, April 6th through the 9th. Providers of hospice, a concept of care for the terminally ill and their families, and other persons who value the concept met to attend workshops, pass by-laws, and elect the first THO directors and officers.

Elaine Magruder of Hospice of Midland is President; Vice President is Mary Lou Gillespie, RN, VNA Hospice of Dallas; Vicky White, Director of Community Hospice of Saint Joseph Hospital of Fort Worth is Secretary-Treasurer. Elected to the THO Board of Directors is the Right Reverend Sam Hulse, Lubbock, Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Northwest Texas.

Lee Battey, R.N., of Floydada and Director of Nurses and Coordinator of Hospice of Visiting Nurse Service, Inc., of Lubbock was elected to the state Nominating Committee. Mrs. Battey also received a special certificate of appreciation for being a member of the original steering committee of THO. Visiting Nurse Service, Inc., of Lubbock was one of the thirteen Hospice providers given the prestigious Charter Provider Membership. The NHO board member representing this region is Mary McKenna, Director of the Southeast Texas Hospice, Orange, Texas.

The first two days of the meeting were devoted to the National Hospice Organization Southwest Central Regional Meeting with attendants from Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, Missouri, and Arkansas. NHO President Don Gaetz and other NHO staff presented a seminar, "Hospice Reimbursement: How to Make it Work," sponsored by a generous grant from the Kellogg Education and Training Project of the W.K. Kellogg foundation. Gaetz and the team are presenting ten such seminars throughout the nation. President Gaetz was instrumental in writing the legislation approving Medicare reimbursement for hospice services.

On Friday, Bishop Sam Hulse taught a workshop on, "Spiritual Aspects of Hospice." He discussed how hospice team members band together to help patients and families experiencing terminal illness and that they are not isolated or abandoned. He also taught the dynamics of grief and bereavement. He said "Hospice is a wonderful word we never want to forget. It means a place that gives space. In hospice, we give space to dying people. It is space making and space giving. I value that word." Hulse concluded that for the hospice patient, death is the last learning process and the "we can learn something from the patient's experience of loneliness, isolation, and fear. We should value the lessons we can learn from the dying patient and his loved ones." Hulse began Hospice of Midland, Inc. four years ago. Since his relocation to Lubbock, he has become a member of the Visiting Nurse Service, Inc. Advisory Board.

Mrs. Battey stated her pride in the formation of THO saying "Hospice is new in the United States, less than 10 years. There has been considerable interest in hospice in the Lubbock area since October, 1979. The interest is natural since Lubbock is a cancer treatment center and because Lubbock serves such a large medical area. Visiting Nurse Service (VNS) began hospice service April, 1981. Our program has grown and we continue to develop it. Currently we are teaching a Hospice Training Seminar each Tuesday evening which will conclude May 10th. At this time we have about 30 Lubbock hospice patients. The hospice legislation has very stringent regulations as to the methods of delivering hospice care and the interdisciplinary team requirements. It has been a tremendous fulfillment to me both personally and professionally to have been a part of its infancy and continuing development.

The THO meeting was arranged and hosted by Hospice of Midland, Inc. staff and volunteers.

State Farm Life announces changes

Owners of State Farm Life Insurance Company policies will benefit from a \$60 million companywide increase in policy dividends beginning July 1, according to State Farm agent James Bigham of 111 B. East Missouri, Floydada.

Bigham said the more than 30 percent increase in dividend scale is the company's largest ever, surpassing the \$45 million increase of 1981.

With the \$60 million increase, State Farm Life will pay close to \$255 million to all policyholders in the United States and Canada during the 12-month period beginning July 1.

Bigham said the amount of dividend increase on an individual policy will vary, depending on three factors: (1) the person's age at the time the policy was issued; (2) the year the policy was issued; and (3) the type of insurance policy.

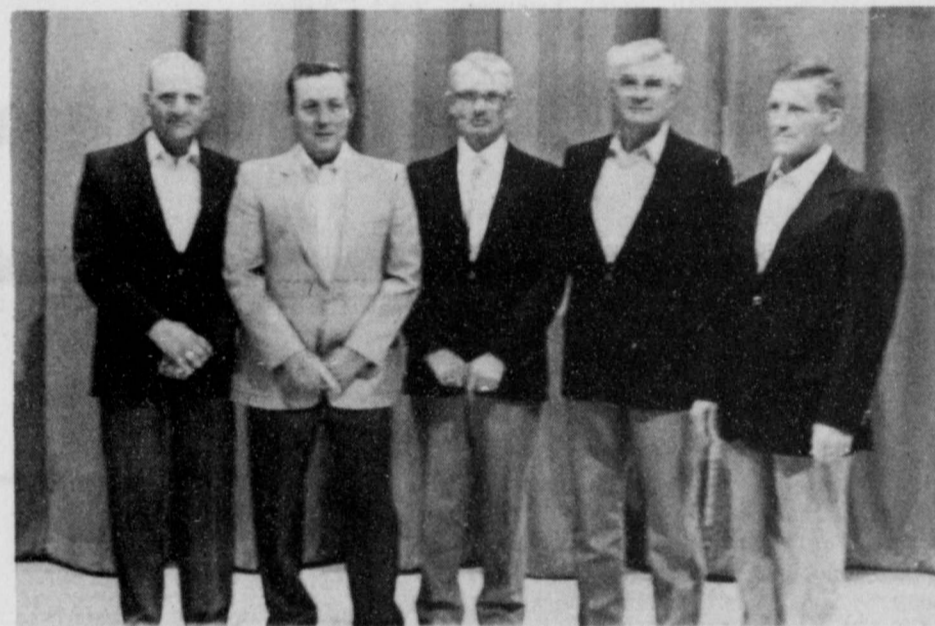

Chamber Clips

As previously reported, Kristy Dawdy, a 6th grade Gifted and Talented student, as a project has been studying at the Chamber offices for 5 weeks to see what we do and what we're about. She has learned, and will report on, Floydada facts, free enterprise, programs and projects, membership development, member services and has helped answer inquiries about Floydada from the many people requesting information by mail. Here, for your reading pleasure, is her report - if only everyone knew as much about the Chamber and was as enthusiastic, there is nothing we, and all citizens of Floydada, couldn't do!

History of Floydada

Mr. and Mrs. James B. Price came to Floyd County from Missouri. Mr. Price deeded a site 2 miles north of the present Floydada, three years before its actuality. This land was specified for future use of the citizens of Floydada. M.C. Williams convinced Prices to relocate the future Floyd City to the present Floydada location.

As the town grew and developed people established businesses, residential lots were laid out, streets were made and beautiful (or so Floydada

thinks) recreational parks came into being. Napoleon and Washington parks were the first two parks planned.

The first building of Floyd City was a Saloon, also used as a gambling hall, lodge room, general store, and bank. This building was located where the present First National Bank is.

You're probably wondering who thought up the name, Floyd City. The post office did. They submitted it to the authorities for approval. They found out that another town in Hunt County had a similar name. Floydalia was then requested. Confusion of the name by the authorities led to the present identification, Floydada.

Before Floydada was formed, two other towns Della Plains, and then Lockney. These three towns, including Mayshaw located near the Muncy School, formed Floyd County which was established on May 28, 1890. But who would take the position, as county seat? The debate came in 1889. Then came the political move. Lockney gave their support to Floydada which combined voting power. Floydada became the seat by getting 55 votes to Della Plains 33 votes.

Community Survey

Floydada is located 50 miles east of Lubbock. Our estimated present population is 4,983. The annual average temperature is usually 60 degrees. The monthly average in January is 42 degrees. In July, the monthly average is 77 degrees. The annual average of rainfall is 20.73 inches. And there is usually light snowfall. Floydada's religious variations consist of several Protestant churches and one Catholic church.

Floydada has two nicely furnished motels and one nicely furnished hotel. Also for your clothing, personal needs, or just about anything there are three large department stores. Floydada has two elementary schools, (Author B. Duncan Elementary and R.C. Andrews Elementary) one Junior High.

Veterans eligible for benefits

Information is being passed by Sgt. Richard D. Hall, N.P.D. of a bill passed in Congress recently which will give all World War II veterans a dividend of 65% per \$1,000 of their GI insurance for each month of service.

This refund is due regardless of whether or not the insurance is still carried. This dividend cannot be received unless it is requested.

The Veterans Administration is urging all World War II veterans to apply regardless of whether any insurance was held. The VA will check for eligibility. The refunds are not going to make anyone rich but a couple hundred dollars would be welcome.

For example, a veteran who had \$10,000 in insurance would be entitled to dividends as follows: 12 months-\$70; 24 months-\$156; 36 months-\$234; 48 months-\$312.

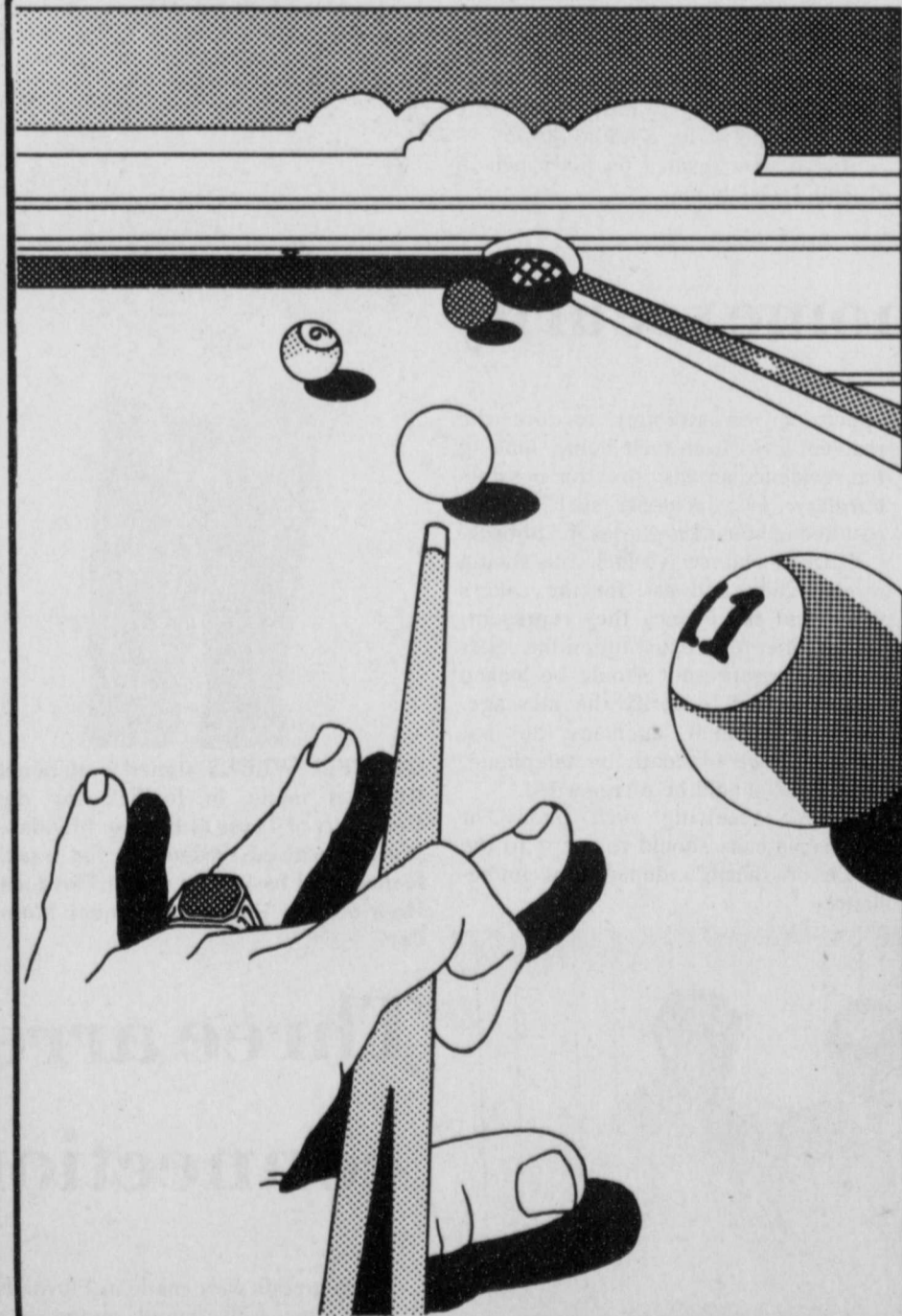

What's Cooking

Mrs. Myria Dade has been cooking since she came to Floyd County in 1935.

Her favorite foods to cook are breads, two of her favorite bread recipes are below. She said she enjoys cooking for large groups of people.

"Just give me time, tell me how many and I've got it," she said.

Her Butter Flake Biscuits recipe is from Jacksonville, Texas handed down to her by her aunt Mandly Davis. Her quick roll recipe came from Mrs. Lola Richey in Ralls, Texas and her cheese roll recipe came from a friend Mrs. Lucille Cates.

Myria still cooks, mainly for sick people and people who need her help.

Here is Myria's biscuit recipe she got from her aunt. She says "They are good with butter and jelly for breakfast. Remember to handle the dough gently."

QUICK ROLLS

1/2 cup warm water
1 pkg. dry yeast
1 cup buttermilk
2 Tbls. shortening
3 1/2 cups flour
2 Tbls. sugar
1/2 tsp. soda
1/4 tsp. salt
1 tsp. baking powder
Sprinkle yeast on warm water and let set 5 minutes.
Add buttermilk and shortening. Sift dry ingredients and stir into mixture. Roll out as for biscuits and place in greased pans. Let rise about 1 hour. Bake 15 minutes at 400 degrees.

BUTTER FLAKE BISCUITS

2 cups all purpose flour

1 tablespoon baking powder
3/4 teaspoon salt
1 1/2 cups granulated sugar
1/2 cup (1 stick) plus 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
2 eggs, well beaten
1/2 cup cold milk

Sift dry ingredients together. Cut butter or margarine into mixture with pastry blender. Mix well beaten eggs and milk. Add to mixture and mix lightly with fork. Shape dough into ball and turn out on lightly floured surface. With rolling pin, lightly roll dough into rectangle about 1/2 inch thick. Fold dough in thirds and roll into oblong 2 more times with dough 1/2 inch thick. Cut into two-inch diameter biscuits. Bake on ungreased baking sheet in preheated 475°F oven until biscuits are puffed and golden brown. Makes 24 two-inch biscuits.

Handle dough very gently both in mixing and rolling out the dough.

CHEESE ROLL

6 oz. cream cheese
8 oz. Velveeta cheese
2 garlic buttons (chopped fine)
Chili powder
8 oz. old English sharp cheese
1/2 cup chopped nuts
Paprika
Soften cream cheese, English cheese, Velveeta cheese together and mix. Add nuts and garlic. Shape into rolls, put paprika until covered with color. Wrap in waxed paper and store in refrigerator. Slice and serve on crackers.

This is Myria's cheese roll recipe. Chili powder was suggested instead of paprika. But Myria said paprika was good too. Her quick rolls are also good for breakfast.

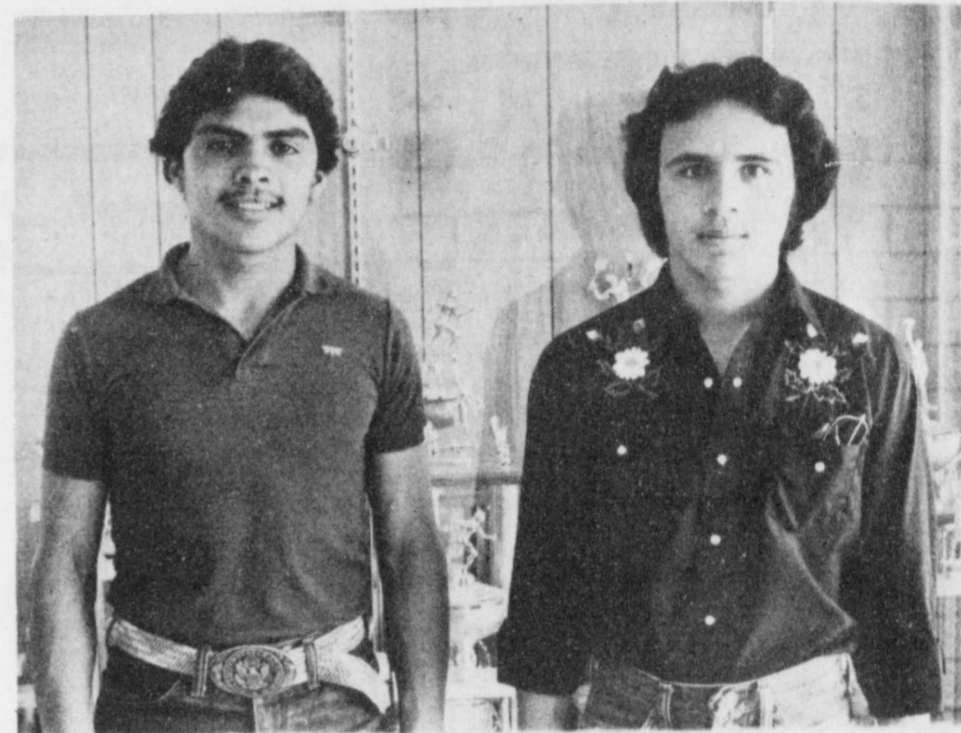
