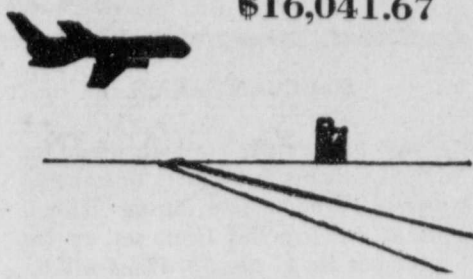

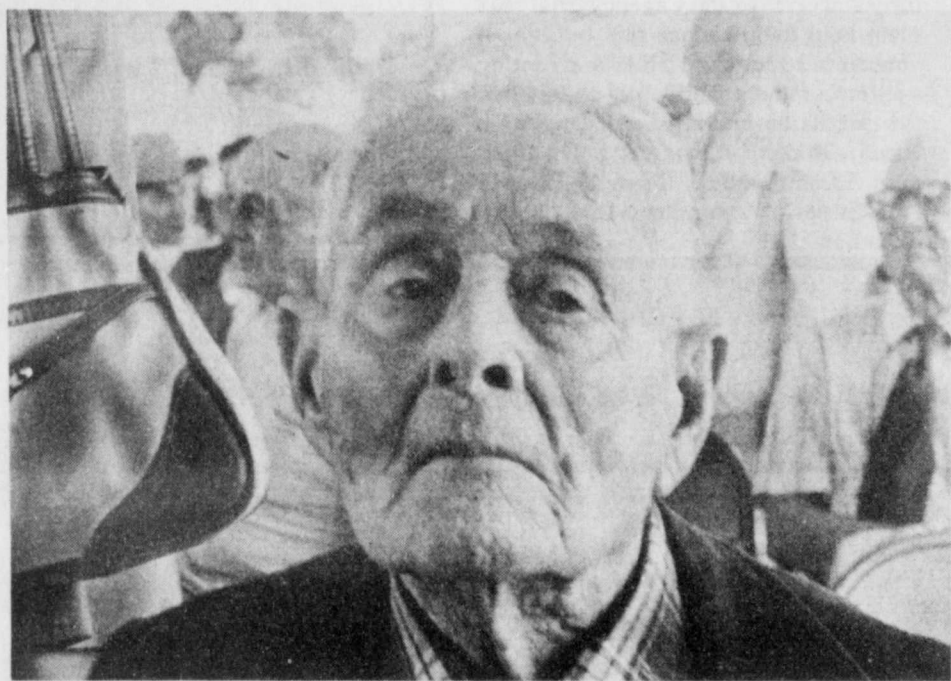

Large crowd attends 69th annual pioneer reunion



WARNIE HILTON was honored with the distinction of being the oldest man at the Old Settlers' reunion Saturday. He is 101 years old.

The Floyd County Courthouse square filled and overflowed with people as the 69th annual Floyd County Old Settlers' Pioneer Reunion got underway Saturday.

After G.C. Applewhite led the invocation, Ann Swepton read the minutes of last year's meeting, opening the business meeting. The businesses who contributed to the barbecue dinner were recognized. They were Lockney Coop Gin, Consumers Fuel Association in Lockney and Floydada, Lighthouse Electric Coop, Floyd County Farm Bureau, the Production Credit Association, Floydada Coop Gin and Producers Coop.

J.D. Copeland, chairman of the nominating committee, read the nominations for the officers of the next reunion. With no more nominations the officers were elected by acclamation. The new officers are Sam Spence - president, John T. Carthel - vice president, Hubert Frizzell - treasurer and Ann Swepton - secretary.

Judy Allen led the memorial service. Approximately 200 past and present residents of Floyd County have passed away since the last reunion. She was accompanied by Dell Gray on the piano.

David L. Jester, president of Wayland Baptist University, was the feature speaker. He gave a brief history of Floyd County, highlighting the early churches and schools. He spoke about how good the land is here and that we are fortunate to have the same land that the early settlers had.

Jester also said that crops from fruit to lettuce have been grown in this area and this "could easily become the bread basket of the world."

He said when the sun rises in this area, "the whole earth is filled with the glory of God." And, "This is a fantastic country, there is much here to praise God for."

The oldest man at the reunion, W.H. Hilton, 101, and the oldest woman at the reunion, Mrs. Jess Shurbet, 89, were recognized. Samuel Wistar Ross was chosen the Outstanding Pioneer

Man and Mrs. Pauline Sams was chosen the Outstanding Pioneer Woman. The Outstanding Pioneer Couple was Mr. and Mrs. Jim Conners. Mr. and Mrs. Fred Martin traveled the longest distance to the reunion from South Africa.

After the crowd listened to the pioneer and traditional songs, the barbecue dinner was served. About 571 people were served at the dinner. The Playa Playboys and Westwind bands played for the crowd before the parade started.

After the parade, the Country Caravan from South Plains College performed for a large, enthusiastic crowd. Country Caravan was provided courtesy of the Floydada Chamber of Commerce.

Bond Real Estate renamed

Bond Real Estate, one of the oldest business organizations in Floyd County, will be operated under a new name, Bond Lands, Inc.

Hollis Bond had been the owner of the business from 1961 until his recent death. Mrs. Hollis R. Bond, Tom Farris, and Frances Ashton have since formed the new corporation.

The business was founded originally when Wm. M. Massie came to Floydada and began operations under the name of Wm. M. Massie General Land Agent in 1890. When his brother, J.M. Massie, joined him a few years later, the business assumed the name of Wm. M. Massie and Brother General Land Agents. He always rejected the use of the words "real estate."

In 1928 Hollis R. Bond became associated with the business. Upon the death of Wm. M. Massie in 1949, the business name was changed to Massie

and Bond Real Estate. The name was used until failing health caused J.M. Massie's retirement.

According to Mrs. Bond, one man who attended Mr. Bond's funeral said his family had been doing business with the business firm for about seventy years. Another man wrote that his family had been doing business with their office for nearly a hundred years.

Mrs. Bond added, "It is with a spirit of humility and gratitude that all the members of Bond Lands, Inc. express the hope that we shall be here for another hundred years, providing the same type of service that has made it possible for our organization to be able to continue."

Larry S. Jones will serve the corporation as vice president and real estate broker, and Wilson Bond will act as a consultant. The corporation will continue in its present location at 107 South 5th Street.

Williams named new bank officer

Editor's Note: The following is the Floyd County memorial service Judy Allen read at the Old Settlers' Reunion Saturday.

Another year has passed since the last Floyd County Old Settlers Reunion. Records show that over 200 Floyd County residents (present and past) have passed away in this 12-month period.

There is no way to determine who will be on this list a year from now as there is no certain type or age person who will be called away from us. This past year there were farmers, former teachers and educators, retired people, business people, and one young man just two years out of high school beginning a career. This brings to mind that all ages are susceptible to death -- there were the very old, ones from middle age, as well as those in the prime of life.

We are never ready to say goodbye to friends and neighbors and family, but as we look at the lives of the older people especially, we see their accomplishments and experiences and can profit from them. For example, Nancy Morckel was well known for many years as home economist at Lighthouse Electric Cooperative. How many of her recipes do we use so often?

Ruth Williams and Helen Dunlap taught many of us as well as our children and served as fine examples in the field of education. We of Floydada saw Hollis Bond at work through the years - how many times I have visited with him at the post office as we each made our daily visits to pick up the mail. Then as neighbors, I would see him going home or walking in the neighborhood.

As I look over the Sunday morning worship service, several faces are missing. Maurice Campbell comes to mind. The various people he came in contact with surely miss his quick wit in the stores, at the livestock sale barn, and at community gatherings. Yes, all these and more are truly missed by our community.

When Michael Self was so tragically killed in a vehicle accident, as a parent of boys who were schoolmates with him, I sensed anew the fragility of life and how quickly a young, healthy person can be taken from us. Only through God's help could a parent bear up under such a tragedy.

Friends and neighbors are missed, but surely family members are missed even more. My cousin Charles Beedy was truly a fine example of courage. His health had been bad so many years, yet we were still not ready to part with him. We looked up to and admired Charles and now surely miss him in many ways and at many times, possibly especially when gathering around the "84" table for a game. Those memories of family gatherings are precious.

Though sadness is inevitable when we realize the ones who are gone, we have a happiness for having had contact with these friends and for having had the experience of knowing them. Undoubtedly each of you here today has special memories of several on this year's list:

Meet Our Pioneer Citizens



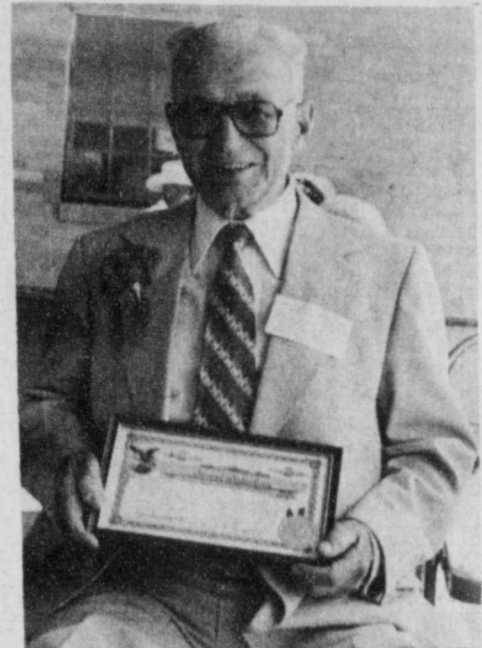

Probation officer attends workshop

Polly Campbell, adult probation officer of 11th Judicial District joined approximately 90 new probation officers from throughout the state at the 1983 Adult and Juvenile Probation Basic Workshop at the Criminal Justice Center of Sam Houston State University last week.

Sessions designed specifically for the adult or juvenile officer were conducted by professional consultants from the field of corrections. Don Dillard of Tyler reported on the role of the probation resource officer and Dr. George Pryor addressed the issue of the role of the Texas Adult Probation Commission.

Dr. Frank Williams, Associate Professor of Criminal Justice told a Wednesday morning juvenile group that the lack of adequate research clouded the issue of the learning disabled child and juvenile delinquency. He said, "No research exists that supports the popular notion that children and adolescents with learning disabilities are more likely to be juvenile

delinquents. All kinds of things cause delinquency, but learning disabilities is not one of them, at least as far as scientific evidence tells us."

Dr. Jeanne D. Young, Associate Professor, brought an informative update on child placement procedures and availabilities. Much of the problem with child displacement is the fault of the parents, according to Young, but she added, "Few parents want bad things to happen to their children. Believe it or not, most of them do care. And, deep down where they live, they want to be good parents."

Those listed on the 3.50 to 4.00 honor roll include Penny Marie Kirtley, an accounting major.



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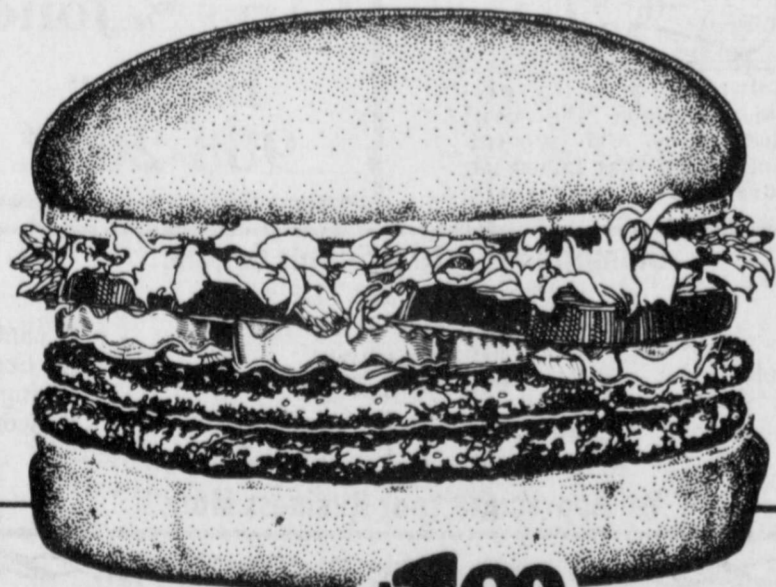
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
