Old Settlers Memorial Message

"If we did not go to sleep at night - We'd never awaken to see the light, and the joy of watching a new day break - Or meeting the dawn by some quiet lake - Would never be ours unless we slept - While God and all His angels kept - A vigil through this 'little death' - That's over with the morning's breath - And death, too, is a time of sleeping - For those who die are in God's keeping - And there's a 'sunrise' for each soul - For life, not death, is God's promised goal - So trust God's promise and doubt Him never - For only through death can man Live Forever!"

There are many good memories of the time spent in their home and on their farm - gathering eggs from the hay stacks, riding horses, playing the piano together - with Chloma and Maye there to guide us.

month of each other in tragic accidents. There was a man and his son-in-law - Earl Bishop and Riley Teague - who died within weeks of each other - a husband and wife, the Ollie Meeks, within a few months of each other - and brothers died within days of each other - Chloma and Raymond Williams.

Others from various walks of life died - ones each of you had personal contact with during your lives, I'm sure.

a view from The Lamplighter

The Lamplighter column has been relinquished to guest writer, Maudine Miller, this week in respect to the Old Settlers celebration.

Journal entry May 26, 1984

We arose an hour early in order to arrive at the courthouse for registration at 9:00 a.m. Old Settlers who had lived in Floyd or surrounding counties 50 years were given free tickets for lunch. We were so thankful that people had name tags to jog our poor memories. One of the first one we saw registered was Joy Allen. Her presence caused us to recall her mother, Mary Holmes Grigsby and her grandmother, Mrs. M.B. Holmes who was a charter member of the Sandhill Home Demonstration Club. We remember her as a true example of the courageous pioneer woman. According to Joy, (her husband), "Lloyd has his good and bad days."

When we saw Will Martin we asked, "When did you come to the county?" He was born here 75 years ago! "I am a native. Son of Wes and Sallie Martin, who lived two miles west of town on the Sandhill Road in a half-dug out, when I was born on November 2, 1908." He and Bea had a three generations picture made with Carolyn and her daughter. He asked us where to go to register and after we told him, he laughed heartily as he replied that he wanted to stay away from the funeral home tent.

Bernita Patterson Campbell of Alto, Texas visited with us a few minutes. She first came to the county with her parents in 1923. She's the daughter of Harvey R. and Bettie Marshall Patterson. Her family still called her 'Sissy'. Her sister, Myrtle Finley claimed that she bossed her seven brothers and five sisters as she was the oldest girl. Nita said, "Mother is 88 years old and able to come to Old Settlers for a while."

Cager Pope, who once lived three miles west, north west of Floydada, told us he first came to Crosby County in 1924. He lived there until Pearl Harbor Day, December 7, 1941. That day he moved to Floyd County. "It rained and rained on us," he said. Cager now resides in Plainview and enjoys visits from his son, Don, and his two daughters, Jane Irwin, and Joyce Grant.

Eva Mickey of Canyon, a former Sandhill schoolteacher came. She came to Floyd County with her parents in 1902. They were Robert McPhail and Eliza Helen May. She had four brothers and four sisters. Eva was married to Elmer Mickey in 1923. He was of an early pioneer family also.

Dorothy Slaughter was a Griffith before her marriage to Burton Slaughter. She was born December 19, 1921 four miles north of Lockney. Her parents were Clevo Albert and Axie Leach Griffith. "I went to church and school at Prairie Chapel until I got to high school. Then Dad sent us to Lockney until I finished there." She had four children. They are Darlene, Eddie, Derrel and Lonnie.

It was certainly good to see Gilbert and Betty Shirey there. They live in Torrence, California. Gilbert was born in East Texas at Johtown and came here in 1925. His twin sister, Beulah Frances Finley still lives in Floydada. He and Betty have three daughters. He must love reunions for he said, "We will be in Floydada in October for the school reunion."

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SOS anniversary observed

"The Father comforts us in all our troubles, so that we in turn may be able to comfort others in any trouble of theirs and to share with them the consolation we ourselves receive from God." II Corinthians, 1:4. Helen Martin, president of the Floydada Spirit of Sharing, stressed that "the organization is a benevolent extension of the churches in the community. The S.O.S. provides a need within the community that government services can no longer fulfill resulting from budget cuts in the current administration." Martin emphasized that "the Center should be regarded as a short-term emergency organization, which often acts as a referral agency to other agencies such as the Health Provider."

"The Spirit of Sharing is an all volunteer service. In fact," Martin confided, "many workers often use their own funds in purchasing office supplies or other necessities the budget cannot cover." Martin emphasized that "the Center must have the support of the community, for without the feeling of belonging to Floydada, it will not endure."

The idea for the Center was initiated one year ago in May. It originally was conceived to be a county organization, but the ministers from the City of Lockney expressed the desire to implement a center of their own. The churches of the community united their resources, both human and financial. Participating area churches selected one director and one alternate to serve on the board of directors.

By pooling the resources of the city churches there is less duplication of services. The S.O.S. tries to perform a thorough job of screening all applicants. A set of guidelines are adhered to by the various volunteers. For instance, all persons asking for assistance must sign an authorization to furnish information form. Cash in the form of vouchers are presented to area merchants to provide services that the center cannot provide, such as lodging or gasoline. No more than \$25 can be given to transients, and residents of the county cannot be given more than \$100. Family units can only be given assistance once every three months. Persons needing medical assistance are referred to the South Plains Health Provider.

Martin explained that "sometimes a family who is consistent in paying their bills will be suddenly faced with an emergency, and as a result, will be short of funds one month. The S.O.S. can help meet this need by assisting with funds or food. Many families can find themselves in this predicament." "The occasion may arise this summer with the influx of migrant workers," Martin related, "that the Center may

face an emergency of its own. The S.O.S. still is in need of continued donations of food with emphasis on peanut butter, canned meat, instant potatoes, and masa flour. Children's and infant's clothes are in demand and the Center is in need of an upright vacuum cleaner. Financial support is always appreciated. More volunteers are also needed this summer so that the regular volunteers will have some time off."

Since the grand opening on January 22, 181 families have been interviewed, 158 families helped, resulting in 590 persons given assistance. 67 families have been helped with food and 127 families aided with clothing. 15 families have been helped with lodging and transportation. Transportation to doctors out of town has been provided for the indigent elderly and others needing aid. In fact 20 trips have been logged since February 22. A clothing thrift shop has provided service to the community and resulted in a small source of revenue.

The Spirit of Sharing is located at 619 E. Houston Street in Floydada. It is open Monday through Friday from 2-5 p.m. However, call forwarding provides 24 hour service. An interviewer, receptionist, pantry worker, and two clothing volunteers are usually always on duty.

According to Martin, "the S.O.S. has a good foundation, but needs more nurturing. The volunteers are very appreciated and are the life's blood of the organization, giving both of their time and love." Martin states that "the staff of the S.O.S. has discovered how much the community has in common. This has resulted in wider understanding and more tolerance." Martin has witnessed attitude change among volunteers, and this has extended throughout the City of Floydada.

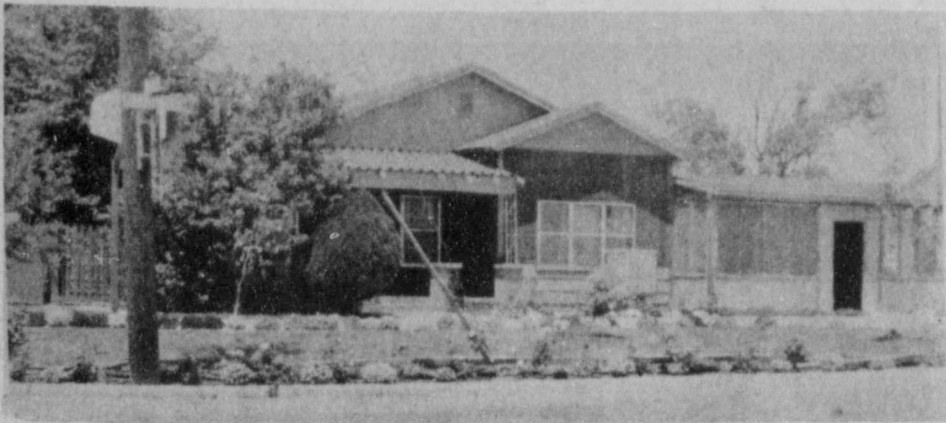

Sometimes, when we would get too tired to sit longer in the wagon, we would get out and walk beside the trail, with Bob driving the wagon."

The Duncans were my grandparents, and on June 1, I am planning to join one or two of my cousins in a search of Blanco Canyon to locate the dugout where the Duncans first settled, and where my mother was born.

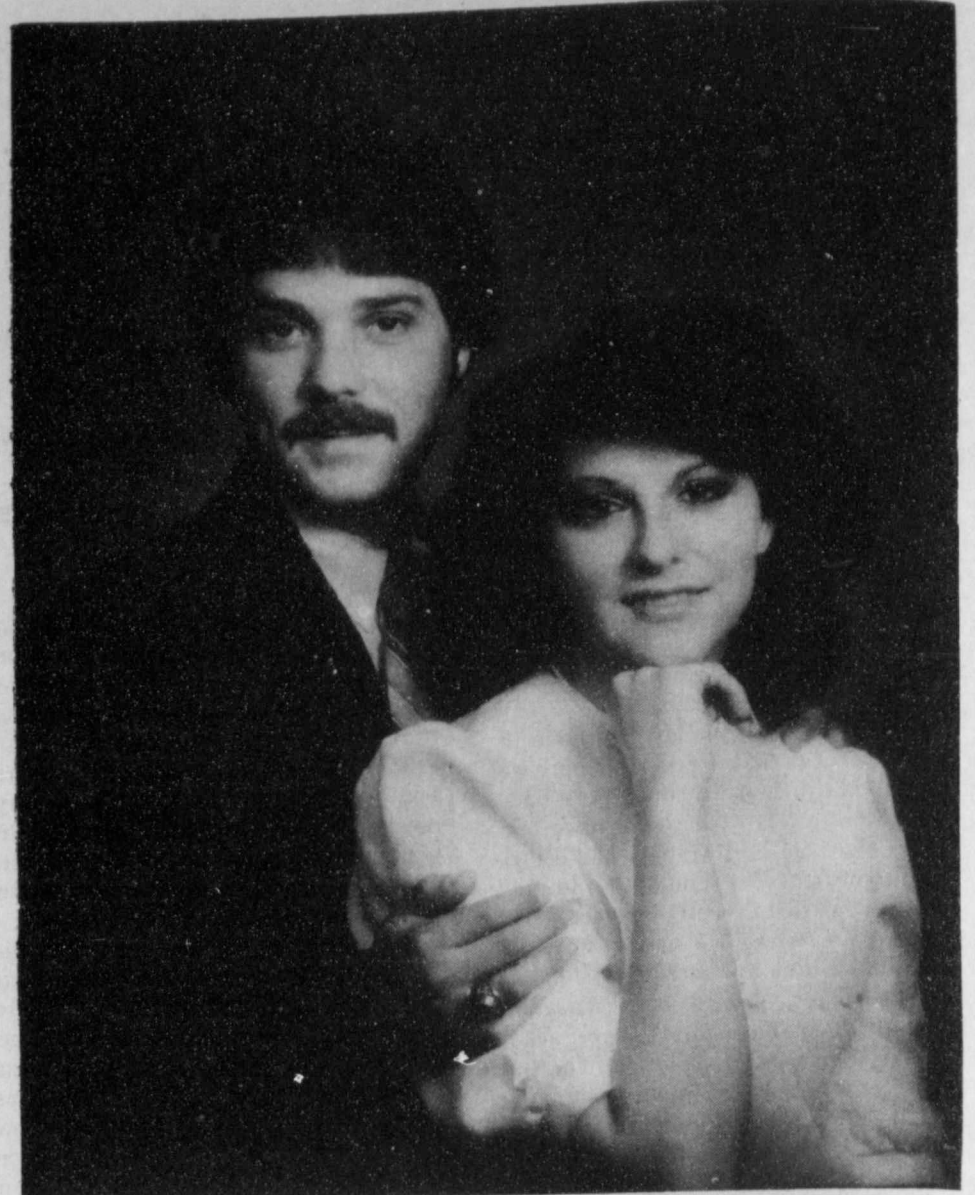

Youth Employment Opportunity Wage may create many jobs

Secretary of Labor Raymond Donovan announced that the Youth Employment Opportunity Wage, which would soon be introduced in Congress, is "a realistic and reasonable approach to creating jobs for our nation's youth."

The proposal will apply to youths under the age of 22 from May 1 to September 30. It will allow employers to hire young people at \$2.50 per hour, or about 75% of the regular \$3.35 per hour, without requiring employers to complete the paperwork that is required under other programs for youth.

However, it also prohibits employers from substituting youth for current employees. Employers who discharge, transfer or demote workers for the purpose of employing eligible youth are subject to various legal remedies and sanctions, including a \$10,000 fine, six months in prison, and payment of back wages. It also prohibits employers from reducing the wage rate below \$3.35 for youth employed by the employer at any time during the 90 day period prior to May 1 of each year.

According to a survey by the department of labor, enactment of the proposal at the federal level would create over 500,000 new summer jobs for youth. Moreover, if those states with minimum wage laws also provide for a \$2.50 summer minimum for youth, the employment increase would be raised to over 800,000 new jobs.

Based on the industry distribution of current minimum wage jobs, over 2/3's of the new jobs would be created in firms other than eating and drinking establishments, such as department stores, food stores, and various wholesale companies.

Low-income youth, particularly minorities, would benefit the most from the increase in summer jobs, because studies have shown that such youth have suffered the greatest reductions in employment due to the minimum wage.

Field Day successful at Ed Warren farm

Barry Love, district sales manager from Pioneer Brand Seeds, conducted a Field Day on the farm of Ed Warren, three miles south of Floydada on FM 1958. Two new pureline varieties of hard red winter wheat were introduced to area farmers. The new wheat varieties 2165 and 2157 were developed from the wheat research program in the Pioneer laboratories.

Love explained that "Pioneer was concentrating on the variety, 2157, because of the stress tolerance." However, in tests conducted at Oklahoma State Experiment Stations, both Pioneer varieties have outyielded TAM 105, Vona, Chisholm and Newton, Variety 2165 yielded 66.3 bushels per acre and Variety 2157 averaged 62 bushels per acre.

Both varieties have outstanding grazing potential. Warren stated that he "liked the variety 2157 real well. As far as the grazing potential is concerned, it has a darker green color in the spring." Warren explained that "to date all he can evaluate is the grazing superiority. The proof will be when it is harvested."

Love stressed that "both varieties have shown to be very winter hardy, which has been easy to evaluate this year, with the tough December that was experienced." Love further explained that "both varieties have displayed excellent straw strength which enhances standability."

Soil borne mosaic virus can reduce wheat yields up to 50%. Love pointed out that "studies based on Kansas State

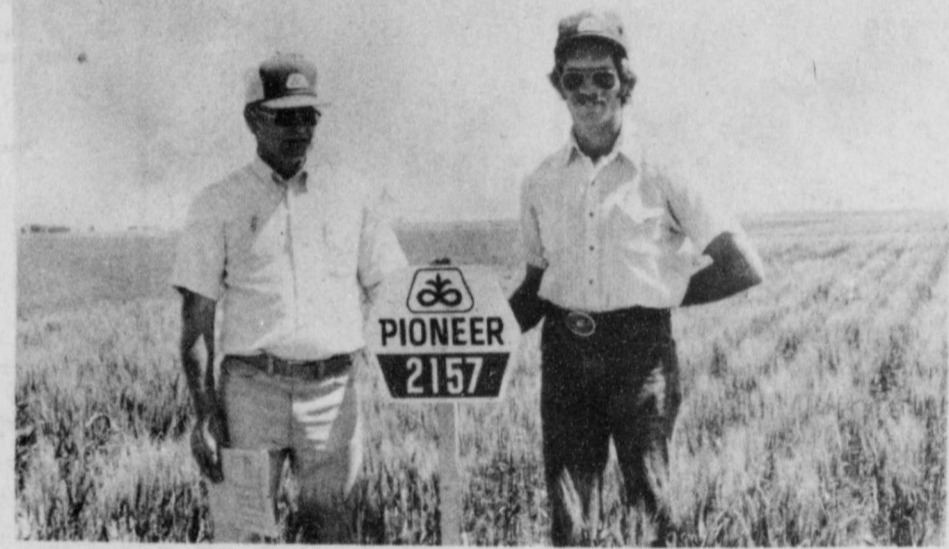
University and Pioneer Research Tests, both Pioneer varieties 2165 and 2157 have more resistance to soil borne mosaic virus, leaf rust, and the hessian fly."

Love explained that "Warren is the only farmer with a comparison plot in the county." However, in Dumas, Sherman and Olton, the Pioneer variety 2157 averaged 60.4 pounds per bushel and the variety 2165 averaged 58.7 pounds per bushel easily outweighing the Vona and TAM 105. Protein content was also higher in both Pioneer varie-

ties in comparison with the Vona and TAM 105."

Conversing with a fellow farmer, Warren expressed that he "hopes more farmers in the area will plant the Pioneer varieties 2157 and 2165, which are selling for \$12.50 per bag for the certified seed." He emphasized again that it is not a hybrid.

Warren also has test blocks of corn, milo and soybeans and is tentatively scheduling a Field Day in September.

Local farmers seek ways of economizing

With energy costs rising and the water table declining, farmers who irrigate in Floyd County are looking for ways to save money and water.

One such farmer is Oliver Clark. "I just wanted to see what shape my wells were in," says Clark. "I asked the Soil Conservation Service to come out and evaluate my wells. They showed me that my gas well was only 7% efficient. The SCS also explained that the national average for gas wells was 17%."

"I had the pump man check out the 413 Chrysler engine, but it turned out that the pump was worn out. The gallons jumped from 600 gpm to 900 gpm when I had the pump replaced. On another well, I went from a 318 Chrysler with V-8 to a 292 Chevy with 6 cylinder. I know I made the right move," continued Clark. "because this year's utility bill is \$700/month less than it was during the same time last year."

Another Floyd County farmer trying to economize is Don Rainer. "It was well worth it to me to have the wells evaluated," says Rainer. "When you put it down on paper what it is costing you per hour to water, you can tell whether or not your wells are running efficiently." Rainer had six wells evaluated in 1983. Two of these wells were worked on as a result. One well was a 4" 25 hp submersible. It cost \$1.56/hour to water. Rainer replaced it with a 3" 40 hp submersible. It is now costing \$1.41/hour. The second well was a 5" 40 hp turbine costing \$1.94/hour. It was changed to a 4" 25 hp submersible. It now costs \$.58/hour. "I expect the utility bill on this well to be 50% less this year," said Rainer. "I lost 20 gallons after the changes, but it was costing me twice as much to improve it. I believe the changes I made will more than pay for themselves this year in fuel cost alone."

Curtis Sanders is another farmer who sees the value of well evaluations. "It looks like I'll be saving \$1000 a year on one well alone," says Sanders. "I replaced a 50 hp turbine with a 25 hp submersible. Last year's bill at this time was around \$1500/month. This year it is \$600/month. I lost 25 gallons but I have improved the efficiency. On another well, I went to a 15 hp submersible from a 40 hp turbine. I lost 10 gallons on this well but I think I cut my utility bill in half. I feel good about making the changes," continues Sanders. "It cost me money to make these changes, but it will pay for itself fast."

Sanders also sees the value of well evaluations from the contractor's point of view since he is the owner of a pump

company as well as being a farmer. "I would recommend to anyone to have their irrigation wells evaluated," says Sanders. "but it is important to have them evaluated before making changes. It is important that you know the gallons of water each well is pumping and the drawdown. Then design the pump to fit the gallons. It is worth it to sacrifice a few gallons in order for the well to run more efficiently. Utilities are just too high."

Charles Carr, who also farms in Floyd County, said that his landlord would not have worked on the wells without a well evaluation. Carr found out that the 8" pump was the original pump installed in the well. It had never been worked on. The pump was replaced. Carr says they now get 1/2 more water at a lower cost. Other farmers like C.L. King, Reed Lawson, and Lyle Miller all agree that their fuel bills are cheaper this year after repairing or replacing pumping plants.

According to Gail Thompson, soil conservationist with the Floyd County

SCS office, the SCS evaluated 41 pumping plants in 1982. 4% of these wells were running efficiently. 32% were repaired or replaced. 64% made no changes or made changes at a later date. 55 wells were checked in 1983. Out of these, 11% were efficient; 33% were repaired or replaced; and 56% either made no changes or changes were made at a later date. In 1984, 23 pumping plants have been evaluated so far. Data is still being collected. "These figures are based on those changes made that we know about," says Thompson.

As energy costs increase, an efficient pumping plant becomes more important. Pumping plant evaluations are free. It is a service provided by the Soil Conservation Service working through the Floyd County SWCD. Most of the equipment is provided by the High Plains Underground Water District. All programs and services provided by the USDA and SCS are available to everyone without regard to race, color, creed, sex or national origin.

DAMAGE AND LOSS IN DRY CLEANING.

Since dry cleaners are in the business of caring for clothes they try to be "careful" when it comes to your garments. Sometimes accidents happen, however, and a garment may be lost or damaged.

Contrary to what many people believe, dry cleaners are not insured against loss or damage that may occur to items during the dry cleaning process. These claims come out of the dry cleaner's expenses.

A consumer should follow these tips when he or she has a complaint about a dry cleaned or commercially laundered item:

- Keep all receipts.
- Return item to the cleaner and explain the problem.
- The dry cleaner may offer to send the garment to a lab for professional analysis if they believe the consumer or the manufacturer was responsible for the damage. If they do not, ask that this be done.

If the damage is found to be the manufacturer's responsibility the dry cleaner will suggest that the item be returned to the retailer for an adjustment. It's the manufacturer's responsibility when the product is not made to withstand accepted wear and care procedures or if it is incorrectly labeled for care.

The dry cleaner has no further responsibility if the damage is found to be the consumer's fault. Examples include a stain that can't be removed without damaging the garment, color loss caused by misuse or spillage of bleach or insect damage that did not become apparent until after article was cleaned.

If the damage is a dry cleaner's fault and the article can't be restored, the dry cleaner will offer compensation. Compensation is based on the age and condition of the item, its replacement value and life expectancy. More infor-

mation on garment values and life expectancies can be found in the Fair Claims Guide, a book used to settle consumer insurance claims as well as dry cleaning damage claims.

Usually a satisfactory agreement can be reached between the dry cleaner and consumer. If no such agreement can be made, contact the Better Business Bureau, Chamber of Commerce or Consumer Protection Agency. The can be of help in planning your next step.

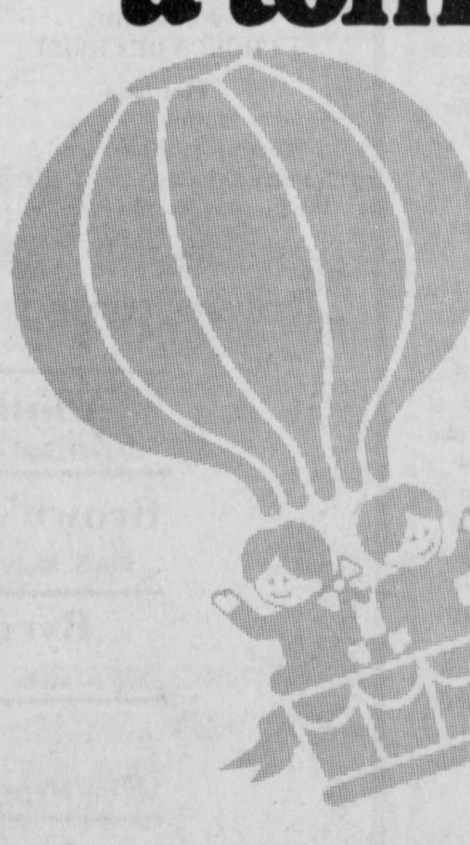

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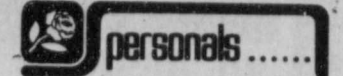
