## BRET HARTE THE CALIFORNIA POET.

Francis Bret Harte was both a novelist and poet. In 1856 be went to California, dug gold, taaght school, ,engaged in the express business, set type in the office of the Golden Era; became editor of the Californian, a literary weekly, and was appointed secretary of the United States branch mint in San Francisco in 1864. Some of the poems which he published in San Francisco papers during the following years-"The Pliocene Skull," "John Burns of Gettysburg," etc-attracted great attention, and in 1868 he started the Overland Monthly. The two sketches which he contributed to this paper, "The Luck of Roaring Camp," and "The Outcasts of Poker Flat," created quite a sensation, and with the publication in 1870 of his poem, "The Heathen Chinee,"
 in 1878 , in 1878, and at Glasgow in 1880
afterwards resided in London.
Among his books are: "Condensed Novels," "Poems," "Echoes of the Foothills," "Tales of the Argonauts," "On the Frontier;" "The Crusade of the Excelsior," "A Phyllis of the Sierras" and "Clarence."
The following extract from Current Literature of January 1895, gives a correct representation of this renowned poet:-
"He is a polished critic, a man of the world, an epicure, carry ing everywhere the independence of a distinct personality. He talks as he writes-like a gentleman. This is a subtle attribute
but one which England never fails to recognize and value, and it but one which England never fails to recognize and value, and it
is the prime cause of his popularity in the United Kingdom, wher he bas resided for a number of years. Characteristic attributes of the man continually in evidence are those thoughtful and ar nicety' nicety in dress, nicety in speech nicety in thourt This nicety pervades his life and writings, It is'a singular qual ity to be found in combination with his emotional breadth an dramatic sweep as a writer, but it is the one that finisties an polishes as a whole the splendid genius of this deeply sympathet ic American poet.
