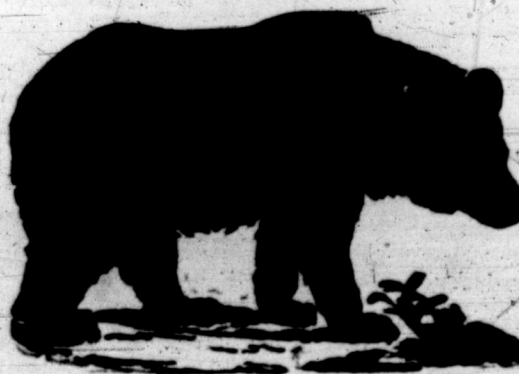

Circular of Information Sent to From the Texas Experiment Station.

Circular of information issued by Dr. M. Francis, veterinary department Texas experiment station. College Station is a postoffice, express office, freight office and telegraph office on the main line of the Houston and Texas Central and on the International and Great Northern railroad (Fort Worth and Houston division.)

Shipment of stock, should be made to College Station—not to Bryan. Attention is called to section 12 of the regulations of the State Live-Stock Sanitary commission which requires that all cattle brought into Texas, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Kentucky, Tennessee, Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa, Nebraska, Missouri, and certain other states, shall be inspected by a veterinarian as to the presence of tuberculosis, and that a clean bill of health be given under oath, in duplicate, one copy of which is to be attached to the bill of lading and the other sent to M. M. Hankins, Quanah, Texas. Cattle affected with tuberculosis will not be permitted to remain on the experiment station grounds.

The demands for practical demonstration of the process of inoculation of cattle against Texas fever have caused the station authorities to more than double its facilities for this work. The station can handle about 150 animals at one time in the best possible manner. All pens are provided with either argean water or deep well water of the finest quality.

The station offers its services to the bonafide stockmen of the state for this purpose. It reserves the right to refuse those who wish to use the state's services for the purpose of speculation.

The most satisfactory subjects for inoculation are cattle from 10 to 16 months of age. Calves from 4 to 8 months of age are liable to become thin, weak and stunted, unless they have nurse cows. We do not like to be bothered with nurse cows because they more than double the expense, are liable to injure the calf or some other calf, and because they may bring ticks into the pens.

No cattle should be shipped to the station unless the owner has made all arrangements in advance with the authorities for their treatment. Cattle that have been exposed to ticks will not be inoculated. Animals will be received from November until March either by express or freight. Freight and express charges must be prepaid or funds must be sent in advance to meet the charges on arrival of animals.

If there be a number of animals from one individual, we prefer to have the owner's man remain with them, because the experience he gains will enable him to give them proper attention after they are shipped to the ranches. In such cases, we cannot permit a change of men in charge of stock, until the experiments have closed. Written reports about the animals will be sent to the owners about once a week. The station has no feed for sale. All feed and supplies will be purchased on the open market at current rates. The veterinary department does only the veterinary work. Remittances should be made by check to the veterinary department—not to individuals. As a general rule, animals are held about 60 days. The cost per head will range from \$15 to \$25. Animals are at the owners risk while at the station. We cannot permit bulls to do service because they become reckless and unmanageable. Charges against animals must be paid in full before they will be re-

leased for shipment. Because of the larger number of cattle that will be under treatment at the college, and the responsibility attaching to their care, the veterinarian will not be expected to visit other portions of the state for the inoculation of cattle, except at his convenience. During the past 4 years more than 2,000 animals have been treated by the station. Of these, less than 10 percent have died with fever.

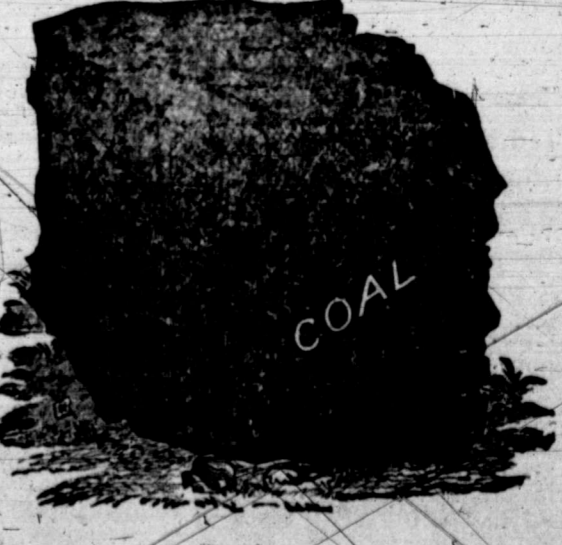
