SPECULATORS—SETTLERS.

Evolution has to do with the history of countries as with animal matter. First comes the pioneer and hunter, then the range man; after him the speculator and then the true settler or tiller of the soil. While this is not always the case in all countries, it has been the general rule throughout the great Southwest.

These changes, covering certain periods of time, have back of them good and sufficient reasons a few of which only will be noticed here. First, when ever lands pass a certain price in market value they cease to be longer profitable for use as strictly ranges for stock and so we have the passing of the range era. And it, as is the case on Plains land today, this increased price is due to agricultural possibilities, then comes in the speculative period and this usually lasts until fixed values, or in other words, certainty and stability bring the home maker.

Now there can be no question but that today the Plains country is entering on this speculative epoch. Men from everywhere, chiefly however of the northern States, are ready buyers of Plains land; they, with proverbial Yankee insight, are taking it for "a good thing," something that they can in the near future dispose of at a long profit. A right smart chance of Randall County land has this year been vested into the hands of these northern speculators; they, bless their little hearts, knowing that ere long the actual settler—the farmer—will want them are holding them, the lands, in trust for that occasion.

As it is according to the very nature of things, we will have to put up with the speculator, as one of the necessary evils in the development of this fertile prairie country, but you may set it down right here that until the home builder takes hold for "keeps" that permanent good cannot attach itself to either town or country.

The Panhandle Herald says the Santa Fe Railway is having a survey made from Panhandle to Amarillo, and that it is the intention of the Santa Fe to take up their present road from Panhandle to Washburn and make a road straight through from Panhandle leaving out the town of Washburn. If this is true, then Canyon City's cherished hope of a cut off from Washburn to Canyon must be a vain one.—Clarendon Chronicle.

Sure enough "if this is true," Bro. Blake, your conclusion is right, but it isn't probable. It may be that a survey is being made, but when it comes to "the intention of the Santa Fe" it is hardly likely that the Panhandle Herald is the only duly constituted oracle. Perhaps,

THE RAILROAD.

Wednesday morning L. T. Lester as chairman of the right-of-way committee received a telegram from Tallmadge and associates at Chicago, requesting that said committee complete its work not later than Nov. 10. The committee was also notified that the survey out of this town could be secured by application to Avery Turner.

As this work requires at the hands of the committee clear title deeds to the lands included in said right-of-way and the raising of the necessary pledges or cash to secure them, it will be observed that it, the committee, has no sinecure, but rather a tough job on its docket. The committee acting on the correct principle that getting the necessary cash subscribed is the first step, is bending its energies in that direction, but as yet it has fallen short of the estimated cost, which is \$5,000.

Now, as The News has previously stated, it is up to the people of both town and county to say whether or not this committee, appointed by our citizenship and now working in their behalf, shall fall down or not.

THE ROUTE

The right-of-way as finally adopted from the town south to the county line is outlined as follows:

Beginning on the Pecos Valley tracks west of the depot and also of the water tank; thence in a curve with concave east between the residences of G. W. Palmer and T. B. Ketner and running east of the Lee Vansant residence and west of C. T. Word's pasture lot into the W. F. Heller home section; thence through said Heller section No. 62, west of the residence and to and across the northwest corner of section 67; thence across the S. W. corner of No. 66, and through sections 95, 98, 128, 129, 1, 14, 2, 3, 4, 5, 46, 45, 44, 58 and 59 to its south line which is also the north line of Swisher county. This terminal point is 3 1/2 miles east of a direct line drawn south from Canyon City. The News does not pretend that this is accurate in every particular, but it is amply sufficient to show, by the aid of a county map, not only the surveys through which the road will go but about the
