### STATE NORMAL FOR PLAINS COUNTRY

R. A. Terrill, of Canyon, who was chosen as a member of the Clubs and newspaper men in Lubbock, at which time the Federation of Commercial Clubs and Newspapers of the Panhandle, Plains and South Plains was organized is sending out the following petition to be signed by citizens of this section and presented to the Committee having in charge the location of the State Normal for Western Texas:

To the Honorable Thomas M. Campbell, Governor, A. B. Davidson, Lieutenant Governor, R. B. Cousins, Superintendent of Public Instruction.

Gentlemen:-We the undersigned citizens of-Texas, hereby petition your committee, which has in charge the location of the West Texas State Normal School, provided for by the recent legislature, to locate said school at some town in what is known as the Plains of Texas.

school should be located on the try has to offer. Plains we especially call your attention to the following:

1. It is the healthiest portion of the State.

2. It is developing more rapidly than any other portion of the State.

3. Modern and up-to-date teachers are required more each year on the Plains, and the State Normal would give this section of the state better opportunity for the education of teachers needed in this district.

4. This section is far removed from any state school.

5. The great Plains country has not a state institution of any

6. The Plains counties pay into the state school fund far more than they receive from the state.

7. The people of the Plains country are progressive and believe in patronizing good schools. 8. The climate is unexcelled being uniform at all seasons of

the year.

The petition was circulated here this week, and more than two hundred Lubbock citizens signed it, not a man to whom it was presented refusing to endorse it with his signature. Lubbock people believe that as a matter of simple justice and as a publie necessity this school should be located on the Plains.-Lub buck Avalanche.

The large number of petitions sent out are now being returned to this city and the response that is being given the movement far exceeds the expectations of the sender. It clearly shows that the people of the Plains and south Plains country are a unit in the sentiment that the Plains should have and does deserve the location of the new state school.

Relative to the petition there can be no gainsaying of any one statement contained in the reasons set forth for the location of the school in this high altitude. Every reason set forth is valid and a just one, and when the many other good reasons for the location are brought to the attention of the locating committee there certainly cannot be anything else which would overcome the necessity for such a school accepted.

STATE COMMISSIONER OF AGRICULTURE VISITS THIS SECTION AND REPORTS.

The Texas Panhandle section is in the midst of great development. Wonderful transformation has taken place there within the past few years. Towns and villages have sprung up like magic, beautiful and commodious farm homes are crowning every hillside and dotting every valley. An industrious and thrifty population is pouring into that section in an unbroken stream, and and the center of the State's population is fast moving westward.

The citizens of that section feel that they have been overlooked, and when they invited Agricultural Commissioner Kone to pay that section a visit they did so day we made our way to Plain- State. with little faith in his doing so. But Judge Kone, desiring to render service to every section of the state, accepted the invitation and prepared at once to make the trip. He took with him two of the best known men of the state, Col. D. H. L. Bonner of Arp, and Tom Frazier of Bosque. The trip was made by automobile over a beautiful and fertile country, but very sparcely settled compared to the older sections of the State. For the most part the land is level, but covered with a carpet of nutritious grasses. Lamesa is a beautiful little village as new and clean as a pin, and the citizens very public spirit and progressive. We organized a large institute here with W. R. "Our next stop was at Tohoka, the county seat of Lynn county. Our trip to Tohoka was also made in an automobile, but was a most delightful one. 





In our last issue we reported the shipment of three cars of hogs from this city to the Fort Worth market. There were 238 head of the hoge shipped in three cars, the hogs averaging in age from eight months to eleven months in age and entirely raised and fattened in this county. The hogs were the property of Judge C. T. Word and were marketed on last Friday, a day when the average market is supposed to be off according to shippers.

The hogs averaged 213 pounds C. F. Zoeller and wife, of Nina, each in weight and brought the

Experienced hog men who examined the cars of hogs state that the hogs were the best that had been shipped from the Panhandle, being almost uniform in size, weight and color, things that go to make a desirable hog when taken in a bunch. They were mostly Poland China and were raised on Judge Word's hog and alfalfa farm near this

The hogs were fattened on alfalfa and Kaffir corn and Milo maize chops having been fed Indian corn only for about a week before shipment.
