On the land outside the enclosure it required the services of three men and a pack of hounds to care for one thousand ewes, and only 95 per cent of the lambs were saved. This per cent could not have been saved without the assistance of the hounds.

"I consider this fence a splendid investment since it easily pays for itself in three years. difficult and sometimes impossible to get men during the lambing season. For this reason the money value of the fence can hardly be estimated."
