County Milo Fields Found To Be Infested with Aphids & Greenbugs

BAIRD — Several milo fields in Callahan County have been found to be infested with heavy populations of corn leaf aphid and greenbugs. These aphids can cause considerable damage to grain sorghum especially in the younger stage. Count of insect populations range from 200-1000 per one foot of row in a field inspected in the Baird, Clyde and Denton Valley area.

Control of these aphids is generally not too difficult if the right insecticide is used. Extension Entomologists re-

commend the following material for the control of the corn leaf aphid:

Carbophenothion - Demeton - Diazinon - Dimethoate - Disulfoton - Malathion - Parathion - Phorate.

For further information on restriction of these chemicals, we suggest you obtain a copy of Extension Bulletin, MP-339, Suggestions for Controlling Insects and Mites on Corn, Sorghum and Small Grain, from your County Extension Office.
