ALLIED PEACE DELEGATES WILL HAVE REPLY READY BY END OF NEXT WEEK.

Paris. - Positive instruction have been issued by the council of four to all commissions working on the reply to the German counter-proposals to complete their reports as soon as pos-

Premier Lloyd George, because of a division of opinion and differences among the British experts working on reparations, is acting as his own expert and is attending the meetings of the reparations commission.

The Italians are showing great uneasiness over the unsettled Adriatic problem, as Premier Orlando insists that it must be settled before the Italian parliament meets June 18.

A general drive along the line for a speedy completion of the reply to Germany has been noticeable for the last two days. The experts have been meeting constantly and there is a general disposition to wind up differences, which a member of the American delegation said would be reconciled speed-

In French official circles there is a growing conviction that Germany will not sign the peace treaty. The reply will be submitted as an ultimatum with a short time limit in which Germany will either have to take or leave the condition's as offered them.

The most important modification up der consideration, namely, the question of reparation, probably will not involve any matedial changes in the treaty as originally presented.

The instructions to the reparations commission in the proposed supplementary agreement would enable the Germans to know at once the amount of reparations due under certain "categories" of reparations, such as pensions, separation allowances, maintenance of war prisoners and the destruction of ships at a fixed figure per

It is understood that the question of a plebescite in Upper Silesia practically has been decided affirmatively. No change with regard to responsibilities, punishment of the former emperor or the disposition of the Ger-

man colonies is regarded as probable. "I am convinced that our treaty project violates none of my principles," President Wilson is quoted by the Matin as having said when he was made acquainted with the German counter proposals to the peace treaty.



7. Look out for sore shoulders and backs, especially in plowing. Be sure that your collars fit. A collar too big is as had as one too small. If the collar rides up, use a martingale, or a girth running from trace to trace back of the forelegs.

8. When the horses are at work on a warm day, lift the collars now and then to wipe off the sweat and dirt them with a measure of success, one with a bunch of grass.

9. Wipe off the harness marks on your horses when you stop work at noon and at night, and clean the inside of the harness, the collars especially. The salt sweat, drying on the skin and on the harness, is what makes the trouble.

10. If the skin is wrinkled under the collar or saddle, bathe it with diluted vinegar or witchhazel. If the skin is broken, bathe it with clean warm water containing a little salt. Fix the collar, with padding or otherwise, so that it will not touch the sore spot the next day. A little carelessness at the beginning may cause a lot of trouble to you and suffering

to the horse. 11. Clean your horses at night, water them, give them a good bed, and water them again after they have eaten their hay so that they will not be thirsty all night. Few turkeys develop to marketable size in less than six months. Provide them with ideal environment and it may be done. Certain phases of the weather, such as long drouthy or repeated drawn-out storms, directly hinder the young bird's growth. The earlier the eggs can be hatched after May 15, the longer the period of growth before the first holiday demand. A marked difference in size exists between turkeys with ages varying but by two weeks, nor does the discrepancy ever seem to be overcome. Eggs should not the kept too long and it is very difficult this spring to get eggs of any kind.

Their vitality depreciates rapidly. The little turk, issuing from the egg set as soon as laid, is noticeably sturdy. If, in addition, the eggs are the product of hens two years old or more, the young have a double heritage of strength. In recognition of this fact, most growers set surplus turkey eggs under ordinary hens. As soon as the turkey hen shows a decided intention of keeping her nest, she should be given her eggs. Incubators can be used, but one runs less risk of tampering with the vitality of the unhatched bard by entrusting it to a hen or turkey. Thus is uncovered one secret of the successful raiser-a sturdy hatching.







When I assumed the duties of State Health Officer, January 21st of this year, the Health Department was composed of the following: Bureau of Vital Statistics, Bureau of Veneral Diseases, Bureau of Rural Sanitation, Bureau of Sanitary Engineering, Laboratory Department and Coastal and here that my appointment to the job of State Health Officer was not so much a political appointment as had been the case heretofore, but was largely due to the influence and good will of many of the leading doctors of the State Medical Association. This fact makes me doubly appreciate the honor which has been conferred upon me, and I take this opportunity to say that the Texas State Medical Association has the right to expect the good will and fullest co-operation of the State Health Department.


