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Saturday will be the primary election in Texas. It is quite evident that the race is between Thomason and Neff. Both are good men, morally. Both stand for the highest in citizenship. The Neff speechmakers devote hours to telling what a good man he is, but have never attacked the life of Thomason. The only thing left for the voter to decide is the difference in their executive ability. Neff has thrown out a vote-catching land plank. His speechmakers point out there are millions of acres in the Panhandle and south Texas held by speculators. There is little sense in the argument. There are thousands and thousands of manless acres all over the Panhandle, and all over West Texas, and all over South Texas—acres just waiting for some man to come and buy them and cultivate them. It takes money to buy land, and if Mr. Neff can find a means to bring in more capital there will be land and a plenty offered for sale at a reasonable price. The land plank is nothing more than a vote catching device thrown out for Texas-tenants. Thomason is a western man. The west is having its very first chance to elect a western man who is qualified for the office above any of his opponents. If the west throws away its opportunity by voting for a central Texas candidate who knows nothing of the west, then the west should not kick at the results if he is elected. The majority of the west will stay with Thomason Saturday.

Governor Hobby has ousted the Galveston police officials who have refused to abide by their oath to enforce the law. Hobby has made himself strong with the people of Texas, and it is to be regretted that he is not a candidate for re-election. By the way, Hobby has done exactly what Bailey said a few weeks ago he would do if elected Governor but so far has not given the Governor any credit for this act. Bailey has treated the matter just as carelessly as he did the State Highway Commission statement last week.

In introducing ex-Senator Bailey a few days ago a Texas congressman stated Thomason was unfit for governor because he lived "almost in Mexico." As we recall the geographical situation of El Paso, it is considerably closer to Austin than Washington which has at least been the home of Bailey's family for fifteen or more years even though Joe may claim his official residence in Cooke county, which is a border county to Oklahoma.

A great deal is being said during the gubernatorial campaign regarding the part the Baptist church is taking in the campaign for Pat Neff. The News is not connected with the Baptist church. The News is not for Neff. Neff would probably be our last choice of all the candidates in the field. But we consider the charge as mere political rot. The leaders of the Baptist church certainly have sense enough to know that in this day and age a church denomination cannot put over one of their number in a state political race.

Franklin D. Roosevelt has dignified the candidacy of vice president by adding some pep to the campaign. Senator Harding has taken occasion to make remarks about the democratic party. The way young Roosevelt comes back at him makes one wonder if there is such a distant relationship between Franklin and the original Teddy. The republican nomination for the vice presidency has been roaring like a clam.

The band of Canyon needs a band stand. The band needs new uniforms. The band is going to get all of these things through the cooperation of the people of Canyon. Attend the concert in Canyon next Saturday night. There will be things on sale which will go to pay the expense of a band stand and the new uniforms.

Are you getting ready to plant some shade trees this fall? The lo-

Relating to Taxation by School Districts.

Senate Joint Resolution No. 17.
Proposing an amendment to Section 3 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by exempting independent and common school districts from the limitation of a total tax of one dollar on the one hundred dollars valuation for any one year and making an appropriation therefor.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 3 of Article VII of the Constitution be so amended as hereafter to read as follows: (Creating a new section 3.)

Section 3. One-fourth of the revenue derived from the State occupation taxes and a poll tax of one (\$1.00) dollar on every inhabitant of this state, between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years, shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools; and in addition thereto, there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem state tax of such amount not to exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred (\$100.00) dollars valuation, as with the available school fund arising from all other sources, will be sufficient to maintain and support the public schools of this State for a period of not less than six months in each year, and it shall be the duty of the State Board of Education to set aside a sufficient amount out of the said tax to provide free text books for the use of children attending the public free schools of this State; provided, however, that should the limit of taxation herein named be insufficient the deficit may be met by appropriation from the general funds of the state and the legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts by general or special law without the local notice required in other cases of special legislation; and all such school districts, whether created by general or special law may embrace parts of two or more counties. And the legislature shall be authorized to pass laws for the assessment and collection of taxes in all said districts and for the management and control of the public school or schools of such districts, whether such districts are composed of territory wholly within a county or in parts of two or more counties. And the legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within all school districts heretofore formed or hereafter formed, for the further maintenance of public free schools and the erection and equipment of school buildings therein; provided that a majority of the qualified property tax-paying voters of the district voting at an election to be held for that purpose, shall vote such tax not to exceed in any one year one dollar on the one hundred dollars valuation of the property subject to taxation in such district, but the limitation upon the amount of school district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns constituting separate and independent school districts, nor to independent or common school districts created by general or special law.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1920, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "For the Amendment to Section 3 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing that the limitation upon the amount of school district tax of one dollar on the one hundred dollars valuation shall not apply to independent or common school districts created by general or special law," and all those opposed to said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots "Against the amendment to Section 3 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State

of Texas, providing that the limitation upon the amount of school district tax of one dollar on the one hundred dollars valuation shall not apply to independent or common school districts created by general or special law."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the state.

Sec. 4. That the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

Authorizing One and One-half Per Cent Ad Valorem Tax by Cities and Towns of Five Thousand or Less Population.

Senate Joint Resolution No. 12
Proposing an amendment to Section 4 of Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by increasing the total tax rate that may be levied by cities and towns having a population of five thousand or less than one-fourth of one per cent to not exceeding one and one-half per cent, and making appropriation therefor.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 4, Article XI of the Constitution be so amended as hereafter to read as follows:

Section 4. Cities and towns having a population of five thousand or less may be chartered alone by general law. They may levy, assess and collect such taxes as may be authorized by law, but no tax for any purpose shall ever be lawful for any one year which shall exceed one and one-half per cent of the taxable property of such city; and all taxes shall be collectible only in current money, and all licenses and occupation taxes levied, and all fines, forfeitures and penalties accruing to said cities and towns shall be collectible only in current money.

Sec. 2.—The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1920, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "For the amendment of Section 4, Article XI of the Constitution increasing the total tax rate that may be levied by towns and cities having a population of five thousand or less from one-fourth of one per cent to not exceeding one and one-half per cent of any one year," and all voters opposed to said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "Against the amendment of Section 4, Article XI of the Constitution increasing the total tax rate that may be levied by towns and cities having a population of five thousand or less from one-fourth of one per cent to not exceeding one and one-half per cent of any one year."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and to have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Sec. 4. That the sum of Five Thousand Dollars, or as much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

Relating to the Matter of Compensation of Public Officials.

House Joint Resolution No. 7.
A joint resolution of the Legislature of the State of Texas, proposing an amendment to the constitution of the State by adding to Article 16 thereof a new Section, to be known as Section 60; providing for the compensation of public officials.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That there is hereby added to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, a new section to be known as Section 60 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, which shall read as follows:

Section 60. Compensation of Public Officials: All State, district, county and precinct officers within this State shall receive as compensation for their services a salary, the amount of which, the terms and methods of payment and the fund out of which such payments shall be made, shall be ascertained, declared and fixed by the Legislature from time to time; provided that the Legislature may make such exceptions as it may deem advisable.

This section shall supercede all other provisions of this constitution fixing and declaring the compensation of officers by salaries, fees or otherwise and all provisions for salaries or other compensation for public officials, executive, legislative or judicial.

Sec. 2. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to cause to be issued his necessary proclamation for an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1920, at which election this amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this State for adoption or rejection and shall make the publication required by the constitution and laws of the State. Said election shall be held under and in accordance with the General Election Laws of the State, and the ballots for said election shall have printed or written thereon in plain letters the following words:

"Official ballot" "For the amendment to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, adding thereto Section 60, providing for compensation of public officials."

Those voters who favor such amendment shall erase by marking a line through the words "Against the amendment of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing compensation for public officials."

Those voters who favor such amendment shall erase by marking a line through the words "Against the amendment of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing compensation for public officials."

officials." Those who oppose such amendment shall erase by marking a line through the words "For the amendment to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing compensation for public officials." And the result of the election shall be published and declared according to the majority of the votes cast in such election.

Sec. 3. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury not otherwise appropriated for the purpose of paying the necessary expenses of the proclamation and publication of this amendment and the election to be held hereunder.

DRIVES

One of the legacies of the war that begin to be a little wearisome is the drive. Faced with the necessity of raising unheard-of sums for military and charitable purposes, the American people discovered the tremendous possibilities of organized solicitations backed by the compulsive force of public opinion. Under that stimulus it accomplished results that were almost miraculous.
 When the war ended, we expected drives also to cease. But they have not ceased. There are still a multitude of causes—many of them as good, if not as immediately pressing, as those to which we contributed in war time—and those who are especially interested in them have had too illuminating a demonstration of the efficacy of the drive to forego the use of it. We are still pursued by endless organized appeals to our generosity, each of them supported by the supposed coercive opinion of that part of the public which is particularly alive to its importance.
 Most of these causes, as we have said, are good. We want to give to them when we can and as much as we can. But those interested are inclined to ask of us more than we can afford and to visit us with the disapproval of "public opinion" if we fail to respond. There was something of that tyranny during the war. In some cases the individual's right to decide for himself what he ought to give was in effect denied. Many persons were restless under the methods used, though the emergency was so great that they kept silent. It is a mistake to try the patience of the community further, even in the best of causes.
