Sibert, director of the Chemical Warfare Service, has said that the Germans were never able to manufacture more than ten or fifteen tons of mustard gas a day. At the time of the Armistice the United States had completed a chloride plant with a capacity of 100 tons a day. If the war had gone on, the American Forces would have been supplied with enough mustard gas to overwhelm the enemy in every bat-






