The workmen, members of Local 333, United Marine Division of the AFL International Longshoremen's Association, officially left their jobs at 12:01 a. m. (EST) as the result of a wage dispute with the tugboat operators, organized as the New York Tugboat Exchange. Joseph P. Ryan, president of the ILA, said the 35,000 longshoremen of the parent union would support the walkout by refusing to load or unload any ship which normally would be handled by the strikers. About eight hours after the walkout started Capt. William Bradley,

president of the tugboat local, said the strike was "98 percent effective. Bradley said the last time New York Harbor was tied up by a strike as extensive as the present one was in 1919 when the men stayed out

for seven weeks. Morning meetings were scheduled with both union and company offi-cials by Edward C. Maguire, labor advisor to Mayor O'Dwyer, and William C. Liller of the U. S. Conciliation Service, in an attempt to settle the strike.


In today's hand, for example when East cames into the bidding at the two spade level, the missing




high cards are marked in his, especially when West opens the king of spades.

Let us assume that declarer plays the ten from dummy on the first spade, and wins the second one. He knows that East must have the king of hearts and king of clubs to justify his two spade overcall, so his first play is a small heart to the ace and the six of hearts back. East wins and leads a spade, which South wins. At this point, declarer must cash the queen of hearts and play the nine of hearts. When West
