135 Thrown In Jails After Fracas Ends

Civilian Police Help In Carolina Rioting

FLORENCE, S. C.—(AP)— A railway station melee in which military police were reported to have swung their blackjacks freely landed 135 negro soldiers in jail here on charges of "disorderly conduct, resisting arrest and interfering with an officer.'

Police Chief J. A. Price said the negro soldiers, most of them just back from overseas, charged six M. Ps. Wednesday night in an attempt to free five of their number arrested on a troop train for disorderly

The soldiers, with whom the M. Ps. were traveling, left the train in the wake of the M. Ps. and the five under arrest, and after a brief consultation among themselves, charged the smaller group, Price said.

The M. Ps., Price added, began wielding blackjacks to ward off the surge of the soldiers. Several men were knocked down but no one was hurt seriously the police chief said, before the M. Ps. brought the situation under control by summoning civilian peace officers armed with

Price reported the unruly soldiers then were lined up and marched single file through the streets for about a mile to two separate jails to await a hearing before the city recorder.





Australian Country Boy

It seems incredible that so violent a dispute could have been provoked by Australia's original dispassionate suggestion that, before reparations are finally imposed upon the former Axis nations, it should be determined whether they can be paid.

So far as can be determined from news dispatches the Aussies did not question whether the reparations asked by Russia and her satellites are justified, or dispute that they are payable. Colonel Hodgson, Dr. Walker and Beasley appear merely to have proposed that the nations that will be asked to sign the treaties should be informed what the facts are.

Soviet spokesman Vishinsky says that Colonel Hodgson is like a country boy come to the big city and eager to try out the gadgets. That is not only untrue and unfair, but the weakest sort of argument.

Colonel Hodgson apparently has read history. He knows what happened when, after World War I, the Allies imposed impossible reparations upon Germany. He has seen that wars are conceived whenever any vigorous, potentially powerful people is so degraded, so enslaved that it must fight for existence like a cornered rat.

It is extremely doubtful that the Aussies have any sympathy for any Axis nation. They may be 15,000 miles from Paris, but they have plenty of gold star homes to prove that they were at the very heart of World War II. That, however, is not the real point.

Colonel Hodgson and his associates contend that the small Allied nations are entitled to a voice in the peace they fought to make possible. He feels that no nation; however small, should be expected to sign a treaty unless it has been told what has gone into that treatyuntil it knows whether it is making peace or sowing the fertile seeds of more and worse wars.

Maybe he is wrong, though it is hard to see how any sincere believer in democracy could argue against his

Right or wrong, he has the right to make the argument. If the preservation of peace henceforth is to be in the hands of a United Nations, in which all peaceloving peoples are participants, then the fact that his country is small, located thousands of miles from Paris, is immaterial. It would be equally immaterial if Hodgson, Walker and Beasley were country yokels instead of the educated, traveled cosmopolites they really are.

It was high time that somebody should raise the question whether the glorious world of the future is to be fashioned by open covenants openly arrived at by macovenants forced by the Big Four upon everybody else.

Under the \$10,000 limit, the GI is squeezed in by rising prices. To get a priority to build, his house and lot together can't cost over \$10,000. And \$10,000 bought more house last spring when the limit was fixed than it does today. The veteran has to cheapen his dream home today-or keep on dreaming.

Non-veterans are out unless they buy existing construction. The FHA will accept application for priorities from non-vets in "hardship" cases but few such priorities are granted. Non-veterans can't even buy a new home, built since last March until after veterans have had a 60day crack at it. And few new homes today stay on the open market 60 days. Non-vets also have to wait 30 days for veterans to decide whether they'll take new rental

These restrictions don't apply to construction started before last Even Wyatt's version of the

housing situation isn't as rosy as it first appears. He admits that he hoped for 250, 000 factory-built houses, or prefabricated dwellings, this year. After waiting for six months, he cut his estimate to 100,000. Factories haven't tooled up at the rate he

expected. He says 225,000 houses and apartments have been completed already this year. But 72,000 of these are temporary re-use housing, conversions or just plain trailers. Another 113,000 houses and apartments were started last year and have just been finished. The other 40,000 finished were largely started

in the first few months of the year Another half a million were started and may or may not be completed before the year is out. Only 331,000 of these were listed as new permanent dwellings. The others could be anything from trailers to Quonset huts.

Even so, the home-hunting veteran who plans to build or buy a house isn't as badly off as the one who has to rent a home, apartment or even a room. Steelman says 45 per cent of all units started this year, including those "tempor-ary units (like Quonset huts) and conversions (like barracks) are rental units. But he goes on to admit that, on the basis of FHA reports, "many of the permanent units which received priority assistance as rental units may never reach the rental market." 
