Gulf Taking DST At 8-E McKnight, NW Crane Wildcat

By JAMES C. WATSON Oil Editor Gulf Oil Corporation No. 8-E McKnight, Northwest Crane County wildcat to 9,100 feet, one mile north of the McKnight field, and 660 feet from south and east lines of section 23, block B-17, psi survey, had drilled to 6,550 feet in lower Permian lime, and was taking a drillstem test.

No indications of petroleum had been logged, but there had been some soft drilling and it was decided to run the investigation. Stanolind Oil & Gas Company No. 35-A Hendrick, Central-West Winkler County deep prospector, four miles west of Kermia, perforated 5 1/2-inch casing, which had been cemented on bottom at 13,815 feet, in the Ellenburger, at 13,760-815 feet, with four shots to the foot—and not at 7,050-8,015 feet, as was reported Monday—through error.

Operator swabbed 16 hours and recovered 250 barrels of salt water, with no shows of oil or gas. The project was shutdown for orders, at last report. Shell Oil Company, Inc., No. 1-E Scarborough, Northwest Andrews County wildcat to the Ellenburger, in the Union field, had penetrated below 8,554 feet in Montoya, upper Crdovician, lime and chert, and was going ahead slowly. The formation was extremely hard. Top of the Montoya had not been reported.

Waiting On Roads Shell No. 1 Clark, North Glasscock County possible discovery from the Mississippi, eight miles north of Garden City, was shutdown, on plugged back total depth of 9,775 feet. Waiting for dirt road to dry, testing could be resumed. Storage has been erected and it is expected that the value of the shows for production in the prospector will be fully determined soon.

Ralph Lowe No. 2 Sealy-Smith, stepout from the same operators' discovery for flowing production from the upper Clear Fork in South-Central Winkler County, to open the Lowe field, was coring from 5,235 feet. Some Oil—Some Water A test for one hour at 5,090-5,140 feet recovered about 1,700 feet of fluid—about half oil and half water. Some observers think the water was from the drilling mud.

Magnolia No. 1 R. B. Cowden, flanker to the discovery for Devonian production in the North Goldsmith area of Northwest Ector County flowed 198 barrels of 36.2 gravity oil in 22 hours, through a 3/8-inch choke and is now taking potential test. Total depth is at 8,070 feet.

Phillips Petroleum Company No. 1-G TXL, east extension to the Wheeler field, in West Ector County, 660 feet from south and west lines of section 11, block 46, TP survey, T-1-S, reported a 24-hour flowing potential of 1,716 barrels of oil from the Ellenburger at 10,420-625 feet, through perforations opposite saturated streaks in the formation. The pay had been treated with 1,000 gallons of acid.

The well will be tested and completed from the Devonian and will then be finished as a two-zone producer. In Granite Wash Phillips No. 1-J TXL, one mile northeast of nearest Ellenburger production on northeast side of the TXL-Elleburger field was bottomed at 11,219 feet, in granite wash, and was taking Schlumberger survey. No shows of oil were developed in the Ellenburger. Operator has not reported what will be the next activity at the wildcat.

Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1 Elkins, one half mile northeast of the discovery for Ellenburger production in the Polar field, in Southwest Kent County, cored at 7,834-41 feet. The Ellenburger lime recovered did not have any shows of oil or gas. Operator is now drilling ahead below 7,847 feet.

Showdown Looms On Meat Control

Two Passengers Killed In Plane At Cheyenne

CHEYENNE, WYO.—(P)—Two passengers from among 46 persons aboard a San Francisco to Chicago United Air Lines mainliner were killed Tuesday when the four-engined ship crashed on the Fort Warren Military Reservation a mile and a half northwest of Cheyenne.

Coroner Wesley Schrader announced that one of the dead was William Wang, about 35, San Francisco. The other victim was a woman about 50 years old. Efforts to identify her had not proven successful several hours after the accident.

United Airlines officials announced that only two or three other passengers were hospitalized, and their names and the extent of their injuries was not immediately known. Cause Not Determined What caused the plane to crash as it approached the airport for its stop between San Francisco and Chicago, was not immediately known. The accident occurred about 5:33 a. m. (CST).

Sheriff Norbert E. Tuck said the large plane broke in two when it crashed on the military reservation not far from the post ammunition dump. The sheriff and company officials said the plane did not catch fire. All cargo and mail was saved.

Defense Pleas In Archbishop Trial For Collaboration

ZAGREB, YUGOSLAVIA.—(P)—Defense counsel for Archbishop Alojzije Stepinac asked his acquittal Tuesday on charges of collaboration with the Axis in holding the Roman Catholic prelate could not be held responsible for the crimes of the occupying forces.

In an hour and forty minute summations before a three-judge people's court, Ivo Politeo, one of the leading lawyers of Croatia, challenged some of the documents presented by the prosecution. He said the defense of the archbishop had been made difficult "not because of the charges but because of the newspaper campaign in Yugoslavia to sway public opinion and to blame the archbishop."

Politeo said the 48-year-old head of the Catholic Church in Yugoslavia could not have been responsible for such things as pro-Nazi articles in the Catholic press because, "under the oppression of the enemy, we had to do what people said, and millions of people—clergy, judges, citizens of the cities—worked under that force."

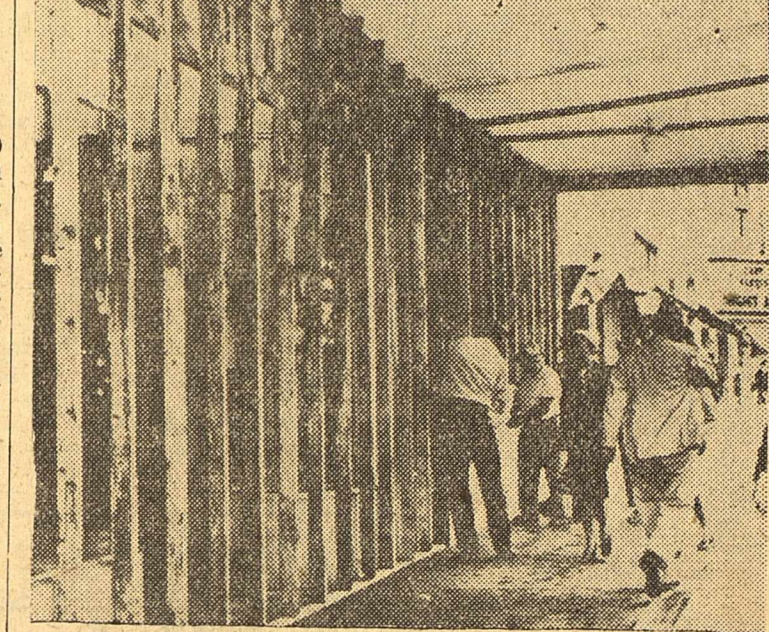
He added that the prelate could not have been responsible for offenses committed by other churchmen among the accused because most of them had been under the direction of other dioceses. The archbishop and 15 others are on trial, accused of aiding the puppet Croatian regime of Ante Pavelic and his terrorist Ustashi organization.

Coast Guard Tows In Lost Shrimp Boat

FREEMPORT.—(P)—The shrimp boat Bertha Lee, missing in the Gulf of Mexico since last Wednesday, was towed into port here Tuesday by the Coast Guard. Two crew members aboard were well. Floyd Hester, a crew member of the Bertha Lee, Monday swam two and one-half hours to shore to seek aid for the stranded boat.

Hester said the Bertha Lee had sent up gasoline flares to attract attention of passing boats after the boat's anchor broke. The signals were unsuccessful, and the Bertha Lee later developed engine trouble and began drifting. Fishing nets were dropped in an attempt to steady the craft.

LATE NEWS FLASHES

LONDON.—(AP)—A Foreign Office spokesman said Tuesday Greece had asked Britain to supply arms for the use of Greek civilians "in fighting bandits" in the northern provinces of that troubled kingdom.

NUERNBERG.—(AP)—Herman Goering wept quietly—the only break in his otherwise rigidly correct deportment—as he packed away his pictures of his wife and daughter to be sent to them after his execution, a Nuernberg jail official said Tuesday.

PARIS.—(AP)—Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin of Great Britain told the peace conference Tuesday "unity was the foundation of our victory and must be the foundation of our peace."

NUERNBERG.—(AP)—The coffee which Hjalmar Schacht threw at Associated Press Photographer B. I. Sanders August 29 was the last cup the irascible former president of the Reichsbank ever got in Nuernberg prison, Maj. Frederick Teich said Tuesday.

STUTTGART, GERMANY.—(AP)—Lt. Gen. Lucius D. Clay, deputy military governor of the American occupation zone, demanded Tuesday that the German provisional government "take vigorous action" to stop German farmers from hoarding their food supplies.

Cattlemen Given Right To Petition For Price Release

WASHINGTON.—(P)—The fight for decontrol of beef headed for a showdown Tuesday when the Beef Advisory Committee formally authorized filing of a petition to remove price ceilings from cattle, beef and veal.

The committee voted 11 to 1 to petition for decontrol, and authorized Robert G. Thomas, executive vice-president of the Lima Packing Company, Lima, Ohio, and Roscoe G. Haynie, committee chairman and vice-president of Wilson & Company, Chicago, to sign the appeal.

Haynie told reporters that the petition will be based on a contention that, under terms of the price control act, beef is eligible for decontrol. One eligibility requirement is that beef cattle be in ample supply.

An OPA official told reporters the agency now is working on new regulations which he said deal with distribution of meat supplies and increases in prices on some meats.

The decontrol action came as the War Department announced that negotiations are under way for a "loan" of 20,000,000 pounds of beef belonging to Great Britain to meet requirements for troops overseas.

The department had said earlier the negotiations were for Argentine beef, to be taken from Argentina's exportable surplus.

Tuesday's announcement said that under plans being discussed with Britain the United States would repay the British with meat, pound for pound, prior to February 28.

The Agriculture Department meanwhile maintained strict silence on tentative plans for easing the domestic meat shortage as it awaited a formal demand that livestock price controls be ended.

The Army announcement said: "The purpose of these negotiations is to provide meat to relieve the precarious food situation for troops in both the European and Pacific theaters and also to lessen the calls on the United States domestic meat sources."

The War Department said Monday that if 20,000,000 pounds of meat extra could be found it would relieve an immediate shortage by approximately 5,000,000 pounds weekly pending an expected increase in cattle slaughter about one month hence.

Camp Hood Soldiers Face Kidnaping Charge

RICHMOND, VA.—(P)—Clarence Fred Krummelt, 19, and Frank Valentine Farnar, 20, Camp Hood, Texas, soldiers charged with a series of offenses including the kidnaping of a Sulphur Springs, Texas, girl, were indicted here Monday on another kidnaping charge.

A grand jury indicted the two youths on charges of kidnaping Ruth and Wilson Abernethy, daughter and son of a Richmond minister, on September 3.

Charges of kidnaping the Abernethys resulted when state police stopped a car which Wilson Abernethy was driving. Abernethy told State Trooper Ivey Collins that the two soldiers had hitchhiked a ride in the car, held up the occupants, forced another couple in the car to get out, and then demanded a ride to New York.

Two Missing Following Crash At Corpus Christi

CORPUS CHRISTI.—(P)—Two persons are missing following the crash of a Navy plane at the Corpus Christi Naval Air Station Monday night.

One Navy man was rescued by crash boat personnel a few minutes after the plane burst into flames upon landing. Capt. E. O. Riggsbee, public relations officer at the base, did not disclose the home base of the PBV plane, the names of the Navy personnel involved or the condition of the rescued man.

Riggsbee said the crash held up landing of planes flown here from Pensacola, Fla., to escape possible hurricane damage. He said 105 planes were scheduled to be transferred here from Pensacola.

Mrs. Doris Fuller has been conducting duplicate games in New York longer than any other person and has probably started more people playing duplicate bridge than any other woman in the country. Just recently she moved her duplicate games into Carnegie Hall. Mrs. Fuller has always been recognized as an outstanding player and is best noted for her daring.

South put in a good shut-out bid on today's hand, but when the bidding got around to Mrs. Fuller (East), she decided to show the whole strength of her hand, with a bid of four spades. Her partner's cue-bid of five clubs showed good trump support, first round control in clubs and a hand that could be beneficial. That was all Mrs. Fuller needed—she jumped right into six spades.

Looking at all four hands, there would not seem to be much of a problem. Nevertheless, Mrs. Fuller had to decide immediately whether to play for all of the spades to be in the North hand, or to try to drop a singleton king or jack in the South hand.

There was also the problem of the diamond finesse. As South was the shut-out bidder and had already shown up with the king and queen clubs, Mrs. Fuller decided to find out if North held the diamond king.

She led a diamond from dummy, took the finesse, and when it held she went over to the king of hearts and led a small spade. She could now make a trump safety play. When North put on the nine, Mrs. Fuller played the ten, and thus was assured of losing only one trump trick.

The study of bidding inferences is a distinct and most interesting part of the game of contract. When Mrs. Fuller bid four spades on today's hand, West knew that he probably held sufficient cards for a slam, which he made possible by showing that control.

Terminal Pay Bonds Go To Finance Centers
WASHINGTON—(AP)—Crisp new five-year treasury bonds headed for their final ride through government channels Tuesday, en route to pay off some \$2,700,000,000 in terminal leave claims for World War II veterans.

The bonds, for settling most claims totaling more than \$50, are expected to be in the hands of all service finance and disbursing offices this week.

Pending receipt of the bonds, only small claims could be settled in cash. Army officials hope they will be able to pay claims within 60 days of the date of application.

An estimated 15,000,000 service men and women are eligible for the terminal leave payments voted by the 79th Congress.

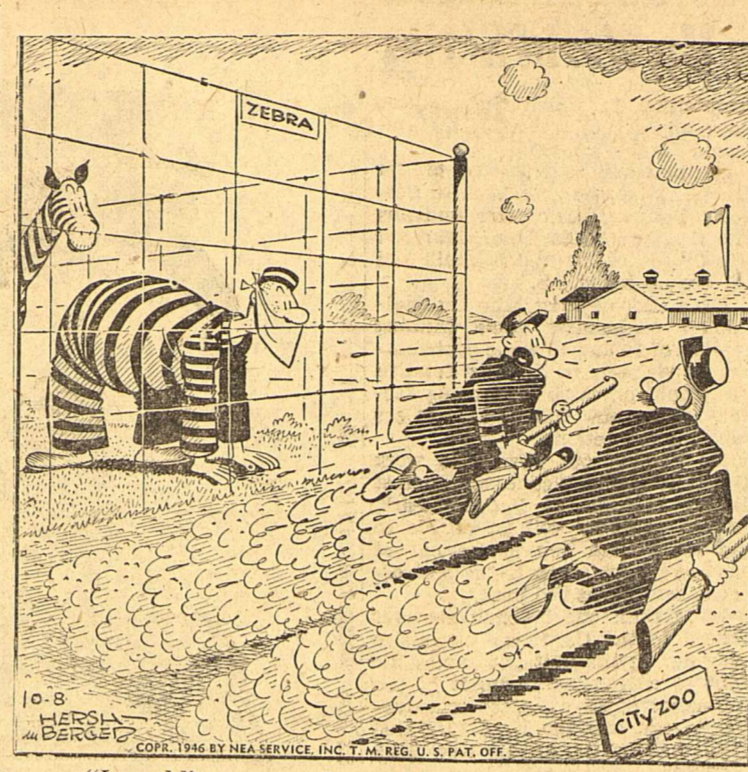

More than one baseball observer sensed in the Cardinals' aggressive play during the first two games the hint of a tremendous upset of the pre-series dope—an upset comparable to the one the fleet 1942 Red Birds handed the mighty New York Yankees.

Dyer Inspires Players

Billy Southworth was gone, but Eddie Dyer, a new type of inspiring leader, had come along with a blend of young players and such holdovers as Terry Moore, Enos Slaughter, Whitey Kurovski, Marty Marion and Stan Musial, then a rookie with the '42 World Champs.

While losing the opener in 10 innings 3-2, and grabbing Monday's second game 3-0, the Cardinals have turned back Johnny Pesky, a .335 hitter, without a hit at nine at-bats. They also have held the great Ted Williams with the "Dyer shift" to one hit in seven trips. Rudy York's game-winning homer in the first game was the only Boston extra base hit. The Birds have registered four doubles and a triple.

Dyer's lefthanded pitching by Pollet and Breechen deserve credit for shackling the Sox power.

The series now will continue at least through Friday at Boston, and is quite likely to be carried to a sixth game Sunday back at Sportsman's Park. A seventh, if necessary, will be played in St. Louis a week from Tuesday, after a Monday off for selling tickets.

69 AP Sports Writers Put Texas First, 21 Army, 15 Notre Dame

NEW YORK —(P)—After two years Army has finally been rooted out of its spot at the head of the nation's football parade.

The nation's sports writers, voting in The Associated Press' first weekly poll of 1946 on the top teams in the country, boosted Dana X. Bible's touchdown-happy Texas Longhorns up to the head of the class.

Michigan was in fourth place, UCLA fifth, and others in the top ten were Alabama, Penn, Georgia and Tennessee eighth, and Northwestern.

All told, 108 ballots were cast from coast to coast, and 69 of them voted the straight Texas ticket. Army got 21 first-place votes, and Notre Dame, finishing third, drew 15. One voter balloted for a first-place tie among the Longhorns, the Cadets and the Irish. University of California at Los Angeles and Pennsylvania each drew one of the other two first-place nominations.

Nine Deaths Caused By Football This Year

CHICAGO —(P)—Nine deaths have been attributed to football this season. The Associated Press noted Tuesday. Eight of the victims were high school youngsters and one a college student. Six fatalities directly attributed to accidents on the gridiron were reported for the entire season last year.

"An estimated 450,000 schoolboys are playing football this season," H. V. Porter, executive of the National Federation of High School Associations, said.

"Although there have been eight high school deaths reported this season, the number may not appear too great in comparison with the number of boys participating. Any football fatality is purely accidental. It is very unfortunate any death should occur. But there is no reason to believe there will be more."

He said that a survey showed most of the injuries resulted from "power plays and hard contact through the middle" and that the federation code provided for a more wide-open game.

The only fatality in collegiate football was reported last week when Billy Joe Wheeler, reserve fullback for Texas Tech, died after being injured in practice.
