The juxtaposed heavenly bodies were supposed to have been lined up about 40 degrees above the Southeastern horizon just before dawn at approximately 4:30 a. m. Walter L. Oliver, Dallas astronomer, said "it would have been a good show" except for obscuring clouds. Since the frequency of an alignment of these three bodies of the great magnitudes is punctuated by centuries rather than years Oliver said "none of us will liv to see it come again".

Off-The-Record Opinions

Elliott Roosevelt's reply to the Newsweek magazine account of his alleged statements at a reception in Moscow raise an interesting question about the scope and sanctity of off-the-record utterances, and the legitimacy of news.

The Newsweek article credited Roosevelt with some

opinions which, to say the least, were arresting. The story has it that he charged the United States government, among other things, with doing nothing to advance the cause of peace; with being in the United Nations purely for selfish, imperialistic reasons; and with welching on its Tehran, Yalta and Potsdam agreements.

Roosevelt said he was misquoted, though he declined to specify how. He also said that he had made it plain

that his remarks were off the record. "Of the record" is a safety signal that has its legitimate uses. It is employed when a speaker wishes to give the press some background information that might involve national security or expose honest but confidential matters to the light of publicity. It is useful to newspapermen in making predictions of events or actions which are still in a formative state, and whose premature To Be Good For publication in full detail might jeopardize the most fortunate outcome or solution.

(Makes about 11/2 cups) Two tablespoons cornstarch, 1/2 cup cold water, 11/2 cups light corn syrup, 4 tablespoons fortified margarine, with flavoring to taste -(a) 1 to 2 tablespoons ciden vinegar or wine (sherry, madiera or port) or brandy; (b) 1/8 teaspoon powdered mace or cinna mon or anise; (c) 6 to 8 small red cinnamon drops (candies).

If spices are to be used for flavoring, mix with cornstarch; then add water to mix to smooth paste. Add to corn syrup. Stir over low heat until rich and clear (5 to 8 minutes). Remove from heat; add margarine.

If spices were not mixed with cornstarch, add flavoring at this time.



Treasury Officers Working On Plan To Permit Husbands, Wives To Split **Incomes Equally For Tax Purposes**

NEA Staff Correspondent WASHINGTON - (NEA) - Treasury officials are working on a plan that would permit husbands and wives in all states to split their income equally for income tax pur-poses. At present this can be done only in nine states and Hawaii, which have what are known as Community Property laws.

General Counsel Joseph J. O'Connell, Jr., mentioned this idea in a recent address before the California State Bar. Stanley S. Surrey, tax legislative counsel of the Treasury, discussed it a few days later before the American Institute of Ac-

It is estimated that if such a provision were introduced without any offset through increased tax rates, it would cost the federal treasury around \$1,000,000,000 a

There is potential criticism on two other scores. One is that such a change would constitute a tax reduction for those above the lower incomes, but not for families with less than \$2,000 of taxable income after deductions and exemptions. The other is that single persons would not benefit.

But these flaws, it is pointed out, could be balanced by compen-sating provisions for the lower incomes and for single persons. And thus far, no way other than this has been found to deal at the same time with two existing discrimina-

(1) That between married couples in the ten community property areas and in the rest of the states;

(2) In non-Community Property states, the discrimination between families who depend principally upon the husband's wages — and cannot split those — and families with investments who by gifts, joint tenancies, family trusts, and similar devices, do succeed in splitting their joint incomes and lowering

Woodpecker Is Bringing About His Own Death


SANTA FE, N. M. -(AP)- A pesky woodpecker has posed a problem here that may boomerang him in the end.


