

The Lesson On Inification

The unification plan for our armed forces and the events leading up to it offer an example which the world's governments might observe with profit. For the compromise which finally emerged was an achievement that the nations some day must consciously strive for-an organizational structure that promises security and peace through a limited surrender of sovereignty.

There was a basic similarity between the feelings of the Army and Navy and those of the wartime Allies. Under threat of defeat they joined forces with admirable sprit, mutual respect nad singleness of purpose. But before and after that threat was present, their attitudes

were decidedly different. Many high officers of each service regarded the other branch with a jealousy and suspicion which matched the viewpoints expressed during the least admirable moments of postwar Big Three relations. Secretiveness was the order of the day, and with it an obvious inclination to exaggerate the errors and shortcomings of the rival service and the virtues of one's own.

It took many months of quiet, patient, hard work to break down the walls of sovereign pride which surrounded the two services. But they finally gave way before the combined forces of logic and experience. Victory and defeat to ght the same lesson—that to remain isolated perative in the face of danger is to invite dis-

n the compromise result was revealed, the sacrinich each service made seem scarcely important enough to have warranted all the heat that apparently was generated in reaching it. Both Army and Navy retained their internal sovereignty. Tradition, pride and morale seem untouched by the change. None of their former distinctions is abolished.

The Army gave up control of its Air Forces, to be sure. But it would have been folly in the light of air power's contribution to victory, and greater folly in the light of air power's future role, to deny this mighty arm of defense a separate budget, administration and development unhampered by the overlapping authority of grudging, ground-minded officers.

that has really happened under unification is that organization and planning are integrated in the interest of greater safety. Whatever else may happen, it is doubtful that a lack of central authority and co-ordinated planning in our defenses will again help to make us the target of aggression.

If, as seems likely, the unification plan is approved by Congress, the country will be able to face an uncertain future with greater confidence. For this plan is the beginning of an intensified campaign for peace through strength. That campaign probably will have to continue until it is supplanted by a plan for peace through reason.

And when peace through reason is achieved it will surely be because the nations, in the interest of survival, have practiced the sort of thinking that achieved the Army-Navy compromise. Bartol Research Foundation of .: Swarthmore, Pa.—concluded that most mesotrons are born in the earth's atmosphere from protons. or charged particles of atoms. Previously there was a question as to nature of the mesotron's par-

The mesotron is only on fraction of the cosmic ray. Other fractions include the negative electron; the proton, 2,000 times heavier than the electron but of equal positive charge; and the proton, which Dr. Swann has described as "a kind of ghost particle representing light and other forms of electromagnetic

In a geographic society statement telling of their findings, the two scientists said that protons apparently split into ten mesotrons in the earth's atmosphere. Each mesotron has proportionate share of the proton's energy. But they live for as short a time as a two-millionth part of a second.

Machine Counts Mesotrons

The counts showed the mesotrons are more abundant at higher altitudes, as was expected.

But the ratio at which mesotrons increase is only 33 per cent at 33,-000 feet. At the lower altitude of 25,000 feet the rate of increase



Takes No_Lip Hawaii To Reach Statehood In 1947

By JAMES MARLOW

WASHINGTON - (P) - Hawaii wants to be a state and maybe it will make the grade this year.

At least its representative in Congress thinks Hawaii's chances for "some action" are better in 1947 than ever before.

Hawaii has tried to become a state ever since Congress made it a erritory in 1900. Joseph R. Farrington, Hawaiian

delegate to Congress, said recently: "The chance for some action this ear is more favorable than any

time in Hawaii's history."

Farrington expects the House
Committee on Public Lands to start hearings within a couple of weeks. Here is the history which led up to all this:

Discovered in 1778 Hawaii—a group of Pacific islands 2,400 miles from San Francisco—was discovered in 1778 by Captain James Cook, an English-

By the middle of the 1800's Hawaii had its own laws and legislature, under a king. The ruling

queen was deposed in 1893 A republic was set up then. Congress in 1898 annexed the islands, and, in 1900, made them a territory, the last step before statehood.

It has a governor, appointed by the U.S. President; two federal judges; a U. S. attorney and marshall; other officials connected with government departments; its own local laws and judges; its own elected legislature, with a 15-man Senate and a 30-man House.

And every two years it elects to Congress a delegate who can represent Hawaii there and introduce bills but who cannot vote.

By being a state, Hawaii would have two representatives and two senators: it would get all the federal benefits any state gets; and would elect its own governor. Petitioned Congress 14 Times

Since 1900 the Hawaiian Legislature has petitioned Congress 14 times to make the territory a state Last year a congressional com-mittee went there, came back, and recommended statehood. Nothing

And last year President Truman urged statehood but nothing hap-

Farrington says the Hawaiians voted 2 to 1 in 1940 for statehood and, if voting now, would want it by 4 to 1 or better.

Hawaii is stepping up its campaign. It has opened a publicity of-fice here called "The 49th State

And, with this Congress only a month old, already various con-gressmen have introduced a dozen bills to make Hawaii a state.



A-Bomb Secrets Are Important To US In Dealing With Foreign Countries

By J. M. ROBERTS, JR.

AP Foreign Analyst Foreign policy as well as military security is involved in the newly-displayed interest of Congress and of David Lilienthal in the security. of U.S. atomic secrets.

The international control agreements which we hope to attain would stand as powerful precedents for control of all war, and just to find that such agreements are possible would be an important step, But the one hope that other countries will surrender sufficient sovereign rights to permit agreement lies in the pressure exerted upon them by our unique possession of this weapon.

Congress has passed a law requiring absolute secrecy in certain fields of atomic development while permitting publication in other fields when approved by the new Atomic Energy Commission which Lilienthal is to head.

Lilienthal described the Smyth Report, officially-approved account of Manhattan District and its work which was published soon after Hiroshima, as the greatest breach of security since work on the bomb began. Almost as he was speaking hitherto secret atomic information was being circulated to newspapers. One of the many items referred to what was once one of the top secrets—a substance off which neurons will "bounce." Its importance is too involved for explanation here but it was once considered something which might help lead foreign scientists to the bomb. Presumably it is no longer believed to be a secret. But the point is that, while publication is made now from what were supposed to be "death penalty" files, it hasn't been a sec-

sional committee in on the details of security and foreign spying. One thing that is likely to come up then is the belief of those responsible for security that they can spot for-eign agents and make them ineffec-

tive without arrests, deportations and embarrassing hullabaloo. The Canadians found, however, that zealots at home who opposed the secrecy in principle had combined with Russian spies to produce a situation which could only be handled by direct action.

We don't know that such a situa-tion exists in the United States. Only that the political and military issues involved make the subject worth all the attention it can get
