LONDON —(AP)— The United States, Britain and France worked Tuesday on tentative plans for economic consolidation of Western Germany, whose industrial potential may be a major factor in the European recovery

Diplomatic sources said the failure of the Conference

of Foreign Ministers will :intensify efforts to speed the reconstruction of Western Germany. Eastern Germany is occupied by Russia.

Exploratory conversations will begin Tuesday night at a dinner given by French Foreign Minister Georges Eidault, who told a news conference he would accept a merger of the three zones of Western Germany, provided it was profitable to France.

URBANA-CHAMPAIGN, ILL.-A new, sharpshooting gun for cancer is described by Dr. Lester S. Skaggs, of the Michael Reese Hospital, Chicago, now working at the University of Illinois on developments of betatrons.

This gun, Dr. Skaggs says, will be a betatron of 35,000,000 electron-volts and it is expected to be the most powerful weapon yet made for fighting cancer.

Betatrons are electrical energy

machines which whirl the minutest known particles of matter, electrons, until they are traveling close to the velocity of light, which is 186,000 miles a second. At those speeds the electrons can be drawn from the betatron in the form of a

It is such a beam that Dr. Skaggs wants for cancer. This beam, at 35,000,000 electron-volts, he says, will exceed anything ever before used for cancer.

Cost \$250,000

This beam, while having full effect on destroying the cancer aimed at, will have no effect beyond that point. This is unlike X-rays and radium rays, which keep on going past the cancer, damaging the tissues beyond.

Industry has betatrons of the energy wanted for cancer, but Dr. Skaggs says no hospital or research center has one. He estimates that it will cost \$250,000 to build a cancer betatron and says this money has not been raised.

Dr. Skaggs is working with Professor Donald W. Kerst, of the University of Illinois, inventor of the betatron in 1940. The university is planning one of these instruments to deliver around 200,000 -000 electron-volt beams for re-





### General Urges Use Of Parachutist' Tanks


WASHINGTON -(P)- Maj. Gen. James M. Gavin says the tank of the future must be light enough to fly into action with parachutists and airborne troops.



Meyers was in the Army 28 years. As a Major General his base pay—straigth pay without extras, such as for housing-was \$8,800 a year. He was retired for disability, which means he was considered physically unfit for further active

What kind of disability? There's been no official statement on this. W. Stuart Symington, secretary of the Air Force, indicated at a news conference that Meyers was retired for a nervous breakdown. His retirement pay of \$550 a month (\$6,600 a year) was 75 per cent of his straight, active pay of

Case Not Unusual Unusual? No. Any general officer, an officer above the rank of colonel, can retire at 75 per cent of his active pay after 30 years' service. But no matter how short a time he had been a general officer, if he was retired for disability he'd get 75 per cent of his active pay. An Army board decides on the disability. The board could, if it wished, discharge an officer with

one year's pay and no more. What has been said so far here applies to all general officers whether they're regular Army men or reserve officers, and so on. Gimmick For Non-Regulars


COUNTY COURTHOUSE AND JAIL TAXES






