Truman Asks 17 Billions For Marshall Aid Plan

Cost-Of-Living Bill Heads For Passage

WASHINGTON—(P)—Final passage of the Republican-sponsored voluntary price curb bill was virtually assured Friday when the House ordered it considered immediately under procedure restricting amendments and limiting debate.

House approval is expected to head the legislation toward President Truman's desk by nightfall as the Senate passed the bill Thursday by a 77 to 10 vote.

Only one hour of debate was permitted by the House under procedure which Democrats condemned as "super-gag." The only amendments allowed will be those backed by the Banking Committee, which has no amendments to offer.

Based primarily on voluntary action to halt inflationary price rises, the bill, introduced by Senator Taft (R-Ohio), would:

1. Permit the President to consult with industry, business and agriculture representatives to encourage agreements to keep prices in line.

2. Extend until February 28, 1949, the President's power to control exports.

Food-Saving Program

3. Continue until the same date controls over rail transportation facilities.

4. Set up a food conservation program in this country and a program to promote food and livestock feed production in non-European countries, both to be voluntary.

5. Request, but not direct, the President to submit to Congress a detailed program to parcel out cost-of-living items when they reach the "critical shortage" stage, with Congress to act on the program, one way or the other, within 15 days.

6. Restore the President's wartime authority to restrict the use of grain in liquor production.

Congress Ready To Air List Of Grain Gamblers

WASHINGTON—(P)—Congress seemed ready Friday—barring a last minute change of heart by House members—to turn the public spotlight on speculators who have been buying and selling the food and other products that have helped skyrocket the cost of living.

A writer of political charges left one unassailable fact—Senate Republicans and Democrats are unanimously agreed Secretary of Agriculture Anderson ought to tell all he knows about the men who deal in the commodities markets for a profit.

Whether the opposing political parties could agree on the same objective in the House remained to be determined.

Anderson, leaving a cabinet meeting at the White House Friday morning, told reporters his department is working on the lists.

Protection Planned

He could not say how long it would take to get them in shape for publication. It is necessary, he explained, to check identifications of all those named to protect the innocent in cases where speculators bear the same names as well known persons who are not speculating.

Speaker Martin (Mass) promised to try to rush through, ahead of Friday night's adjournment goal, a Senate-approved resolution clearing Anderson of the legal obligations he said prevented his barring the list of speculators to the Senate Appropriations Committee.

Marshall Greeted By Truman, Cabinet

WASHINGTON—(P)—Secretary of State Marshall returned at 8 a. m. Friday to report to home-folks on the failure of the London Peace Conference and head up a drive for a long-range European recovery program.

President Truman, who says he's still hopeful of world peace despite the breakup of the Big Four foreign ministers meeting, was on hand to greet Marshall at the National Airport.

Also present was the entire cabinet.

Truman, shaking hands with the secretary as he stepped down from the Sacred Cow, was overheard to say to Marshall: "I think you did a good job."

January Crude Allowable Shows Slight Increase

AUSTIN—(P)—Little change in the amount of Texas crude oil production from December to January appeared in store Friday, following release of the Railroad Commission's oil order for the initial month of 1948.

The net allowable for January will be the same as the current figure of 2,565,282 barrels daily, but a slightly smaller percentage of underproduction will allow an increase of 8,208 barrels in the actual flow of crude.

Actual production is expected to be 2,368,293 barrels daily, the Commission order indicated.

All fields except East Texas will continue to operate on a 31-day basis, and the East Texas field will remain on a 20-day schedule.

Natural gasoline and distillate production was figured at 214,350 barrels daily for the coming month, boosting total liquid hydrocarbon output to 2,582,627 barrels. This is 272,627 barrels more than the Bureau of Mines estimate of market demand for Texas production in January.

JERUSALEM—(P)—Ten Arabs, including five children, were reported killed, and five others were injured by bombs and gunfire Thursday night in a Jewish attack on the village of Khisbas, in Upper Galilee.

An official report said two cars of Jews drove into the village in darkness, threw a number of bombs and opened fire. Two houses were destroyed.

Swift Action Measure Is Led

WASHINGTON—(P)—President Truman Friday to commit America to a European recovery program and a "bold" move against "totalitarian pressures." free

Truman proposed that this vast sum be four and a quarter years "as a major step toward a just and lasting peace."

As the first installment, he asked to spend \$6,800,000,000 in the first 15 months.

His message, outlining the largest spending program in the nation's history, went to the closing regular session of the 80th Congress, so the recovery program could begin April 1.

He predicted the "grave and significant" opposition, announced by European states, would result in further chaos in the hope that the way for totalitarianism.

Even American security, American way of life are at stake, the Chief Executive declared.

He asked Congress to "grave and significant" favor of the "Marshall Plan," which has been sponsored since the war ended. The decision he said, will:

"Determine, in large part, whether the free nations of the world can look forward with hope to a peaceful and prosperous future as independent states, or whether they must live in poverty and in fear of selfish totalitarian aggression."

Major Companies Increase Prices On Oil Products

HOUSTON—(P)—Gasoline is going up in Texas.

Gulf Refining Company announced increased tank wagon prices on refined oil products Friday morning on the heels of a similar boost by The Texas Company Thursday night.

Both companies announced 1 1/2 cents per gallon increases, effective Friday morning. Gulf advanced prices on third grade, used mostly for appliances and tractors, two cents a gallon.

The increases will be put into effect at service stations.

Cosden Leads Off

Thursday night, the Newell Oil Company, distributor of Gulf products in the Trans-Pecos region, had announced 1 1/2 cents per gallon increases, effective Friday, at its stations in the Alpine area.

Earlier this week in Big Spring, the Cosden Petroleum Corporation became the first Texas firm to make the gasoline increase.

Magnolia officials have hiked prices in Arkansas but indicated the Texas price situation was still being studied.

The boosts follow a recent 50 cents per barrel increase in the price paid for crude oil.

TWO NEW PROJECTS STAKED IN DOLLAR HIDE REGION

Magnolia Petroleum Company has staked two new locations in the multi-pay Dollar Hide field of extreme Southwest Andrews County, for immediate drilling.

Magnolia No. 3-C E. P. Cowden will be 660 feet from south and west lines of the southeast quarter of section 5, block A-55, psi survey. It is slated to go to at least 9,000 feet, to test into the Devonian.

Magnolia No. 7-B E. P. Cowden, will be 660 feet from north and east lines of the east half of the northwest quarter of section 4, block A-55, psi survey. It is slated to dig to about 9,000 feet, to try to develop commercial production from both the Devonian and the Silurian.

This project is a twin well to Magnolia No. 5-B Cowden, recently completed Ellenburger producer. That development showed for production from the sections which No. 7-B will explore.

DEEP PAY EXTENDER IS TO COMPLETE IN OPEN HOLE

Magnolia No. 6-B Cowden, one half mile south extender for the Ellenburger zone in the Dollar Hide field, and 3,300 feet from north and 1,980 feet from west lines of section 4, block A-55, psi survey, is on a total depth of 10,003 feet in Ellenburger and is to complete and put on production.

The seven-inch casing is cemented at 9,978 feet, and the open hole section will be the only portion of the Ellenburger which will be produced at this time.

Top of the formation was at 9,890 feet. The horizon between that point and the casing seat had shown for good flowing production—but that will be left cased off for the present.

NE RUNNELS VENTURE WAS BARREN IN LATEST REPORTS

Lion Oil Company No. 1 Daventport, Northeast Runnels County wildcat, six miles east of Winters, and 466 feet from south and 1,400 feet from west lines of sub-division 23, J. J. Ximenez, was drilling ahead below 4,603 feet in the Ellenburger.

It ran a two hour drillstem test at 4,447-4,503 feet. Recovery was 72 feet of drilling mud, with no shows of oil, gas or water.

Stanolind Oil & Gas Company No. 8-B University, slated deep wildcat in the Taylor-Link shallow field of East Pecos County, and 780 feet from north and 660 feet from east lines of section 13, block 18, University survey, was on a total depth of 4,438 feet in lower Permian lime, and was shutdown for orders.

This project has shown for some free oil in the zone between 4,000 feet and 4,100 feet. It was originally slated to go to about 7,700 feet, to try to locate and test the Ellenburger.

CLEAR FORK WAS BARREN IN SE ECTOR PROSPECTOR

Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 4 Yarrowburgh & Allen, Southwest Ector County deep wildcat, 2,357 feet from north and 576 feet from west lines of section 31, block B-14, psi survey, and about four miles south of the discovery for flowing production in the Taylor-Link shallow field, was making hole below 5,364 feet in the Clear Fork-Permian.

Bears, Purdue, SMU Called Most Improved

NEW YORK—(AP)—California, Purdue and Southern Methodist are rated the most improved football teams of 1947 in the annual Associated Press season-end poll of writers, coaches and athletic directors. The same group tabbed Ohio State and Iowa as the greatest disappointments.

Rated on the basis of recovery after a shaky start, the honors would have gone to North Carolina, Oregon and Alabama, which finished strong.

Tarheels, Tide Rally
Southern Methodist, led by Donk Walker, swept through the Southwest Conference with a perfect record until tied by Texas Christian in its final game. A 14-13 decision over Texas was the clincher. Coach Matty Bell's Mustangs won only four of 10 in 1946.

The North Carolina club, highly touted in pre-season talk, bowed to Texas and Wake Forest before sprinting to seven straight victories.

Alabama also started slowly, losing two of its first three, but the Tide bowled over seven successive foes to move into the Sugar Bowl opposite Texas.

Mustangs, Penn State Are Tops In Runbacks

NEW YORK—(AP)—The past performance charts advise Cotton Bowl fans to be in their seats early on New Year's Day.

Because the antagonists—Southern Methodist and Penn State—rank one-two in the nation for the 1947 football season in running back kickoffs, according to figures supplied by the National Collegiate Athletic Bureau.

Each is quite capable of going the distance with the opening kick. Both returned kickoffs for touchdowns, Southern Methodist against Santa Clara on Doak Walker's 98-yard dash, and Penn State against Bucknell with Larry Joe going 95 yards.

The SMU Mustangs returned 21 kickoffs 659 yards in their 10 games, for the top average of 31.4 yards per runback. Penn State ranked second, with an average of 26.8 yards on 14 returned.

Odessa, Brackenridge Are Favorites In Semi-Finals

Next to last shots of the Texas schoolboy football campaign will be fired Saturday on widely separated fronts as mighty Odessa, overwhelming favorite to repeat with the championship, meets Highland Park at Dallas and Brackenridge (San Antonio) battles Longview at San Antonio.

Similar to the 1946 race in which West Texas played North Texas and South Texas engaged East Texas in the semi-finals, the round is expected to produce a finals game between Odessa and Brackenridge.

Fifty thousand fans are due to turn out for the two contests. At Dallas, the big Cotton Bowl appears likely to attract 30,000, while San Antonio's Alamo Stadium anticipates 20,000.

No team ever was more widely favored than Odessa over Highland Park. The general opinion is the great Bronco team will crush the coughy Scots. The Brackenridge-Longview game is considered a virtual toss-up, with Brack to edge through if there is a decision of any kind.

Scots Due Bad Day
Brackenridge, paced by the running of Bill Sweet and Jack Scheuening, has enough offense to score on Longview. That's about all that's needed. Longview won't do enough scoring to cause even a ripple—that is, unless they have some stiff over in the Pine Woods they haven't yet paraded before the fans.

Everything points to a bad beating for Highland Park. The Scots are much better than they were a month and a half ago, when Wichita Falls battered them, 48-0, but they would have had to come many miles to match an Odessa team that's as great as anything the Interscholastic League ever had to offer.

Strangely, the Highland Park folks are not in the least pessimistic. The turn-about of their Scots last week in licking an Arlington Heights (Fort Worth) eleven, rated three touchdowns better, gives visions of an upset Saturday in the Cotton Bowl.

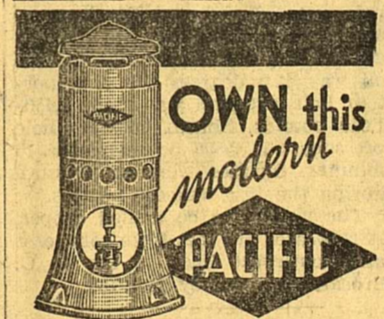

McKenney on Bridge

Over a pre-emptive three bid most players use the three no trump overall to indicate that they think they can make that contract. One of these players is Alexander Weiss of New York, who last Spring won the national masters individual tournament over a field of 36 outstanding players.

Weiss held the East cards in today's hand. When his partner bid three no trump over three clubs, he decided, due to his freak distribution, to go to four spades. North of course was equally pleased to double that contract, but I think that Weiss would have

finessed dummy's nine-spot. When it held, he led the king of clubs and trumped it, then playing the jack of spades, leaving North with the good ten of spades, the deuce of hearts and the queen-ten of diamonds. A small heart was led, the ace winning, and then the ten of hearts was led. If North trumped with the ten of spades, he would have to lead away from dummy's ace-jack. If he refused to trump, and discarded the ten of diamonds, Weiss would simply give him the last trick with the ten of spades.

made the contract even without the double.

He won the opening lead in dummy with the king of diamonds and immediately led the king of spades. North won and led the nine of clubs, which Weiss trumped with the deuce of spades. He then led the queen of spades, and South's club discard gave him the bad news.

The queen of hearts was led next, which is the correct play when dummy holds the ace-ten (you play for the honors to be split). The queen lost to North's king and back came the eight of clubs, which Weiss trumped. Then he led the six of hearts—and

Woman Convicted In 'Death Kiss' Mountain Slaying

NEVADA CITY, CALIF. —(AP)—Lois Hunt Hardy, adjudged a murderer for luring a man into a mountain tryst where her male accomplice shot him to death, looked Friday to a second trial, on an insanity plea, to save her from possible death in San Quentin's gas chamber.

A jury late Thursday found the 22-year-old New London, Conn., woman guilty of first degree murder for her part in the "kiss of death slaying of James W. McClain, 48, a motorist who had offered a ride to her and her hitchhiking husband.

The prosecutor did not ask for the death penalty, but the verdict carried a mandatory death sentence because the jury made no recommendation for mercy.

The woman testified she remembered "being embraced by McClain," a Burbank, Calif., Veterans Administration employe, but had no recollection of holding his head in position, as the state charged, so her common law husband, Joseph L. Hardy, could shoot him.

Hardy, recently recaptured in Sanderson, Texas, after escaping jail in Nevada City, is awaiting trial on a murder charge. He was returned here while the jury was deliberating.

vey, was drilling ahead below 4,752 feet in lower Permian lime.

It ran a two hour drillstem test at 4,170-4,736 feet. There was some gas at the surface after one hour and 40 minutes. Recovery was 100 feet of drilling mud, 330 feet of heavily oil and gas cut mud, and 140 feet of salt water.

SCHLEICHER VENTURE HAD NO SHOWS IN TEST

Skelly Oil Company No. 1 Jackson, Central Schleicher County exploration to try to find the Ellenburger, about one and one half miles northwest of Eldorado, and in the Sally Renshaw survey, No. 781 1/2, was making hole below 7,000 feet, in Pennsylvanian lime. It ran a drillstem test at 6,877-6,957 feet, with the tool open three hours.

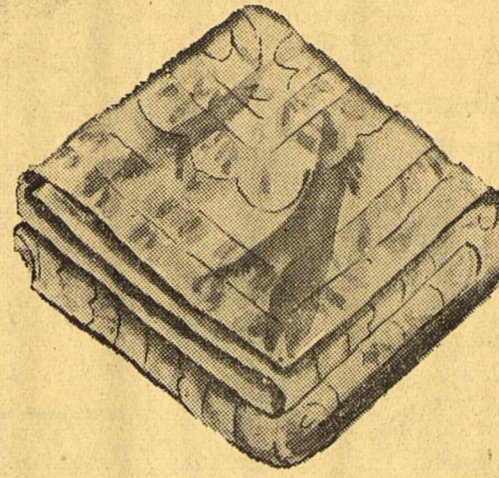
