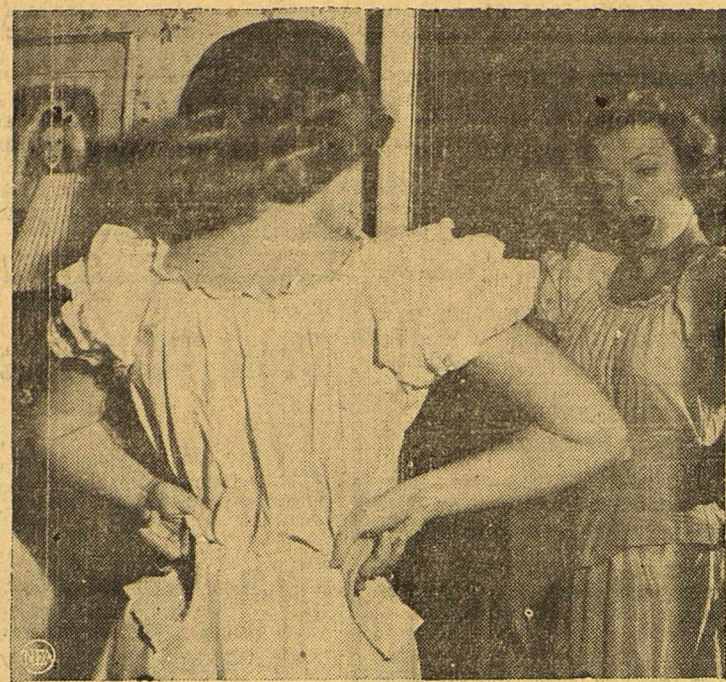

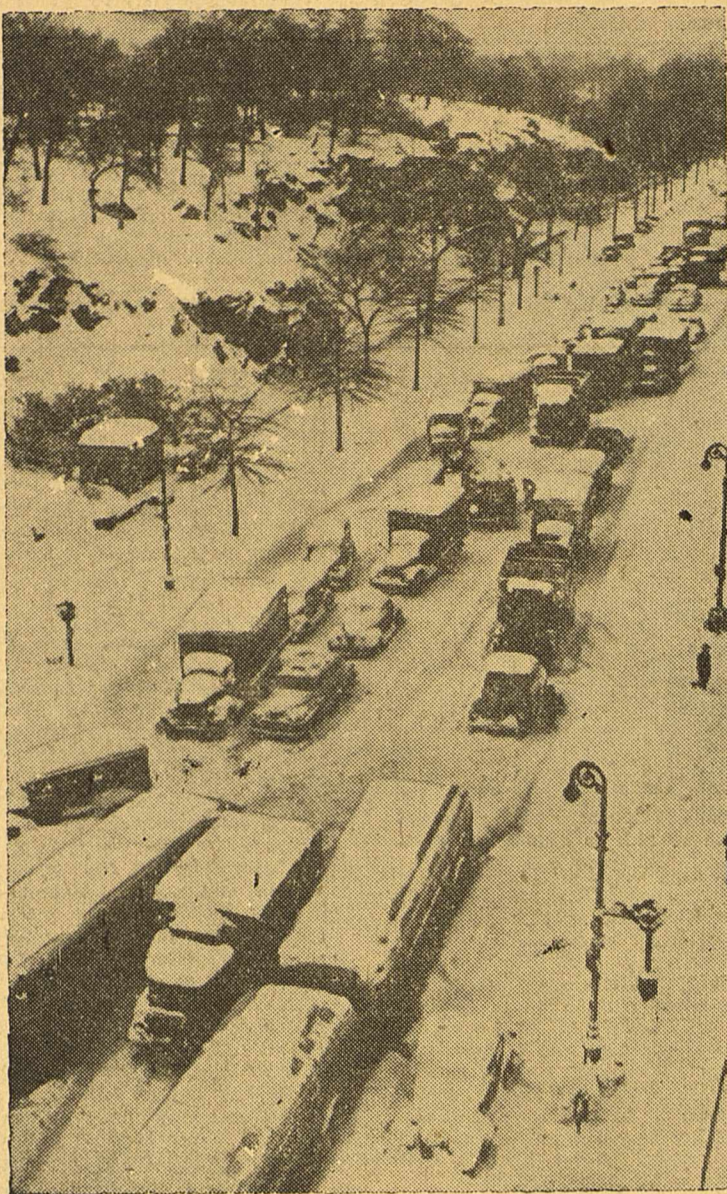

DEEP RELVES VENTURE IS DELUING AHEAD IN LIME
 Argo Oil Corporation No. 1 Ikims, sl tied 11,500-foot wildcat in Southeast Reeves County, one mile south and slightly west of the discovery well on the Verhalen field, and about 12 miles northeast of Balmorhea, was making hole below 6,619 feet in Delaware lime.
 A drillstem test was tried for one hour at 6,445-6,565 feet. There was a hole in the drill pipe and the test was not satisfactory. Recovery was 1,170 feet of drilling fluid, with no shows of oil, gas or water.

SECTOR DISCOVERY IS SHUTIN FOR STORAGE
 J. W. McMillen No. 1 Emmous, new discovery from the San Andres-Ferriam, five miles south of Odessa, and one and one half miles south of the South Cowden field, in Southeast Ector County, was shutin while storage was being erected. Some oil had been flowed to the pits and the well is standing full of oil. No gauge on the production has been run. A test likely will be made by the end of the week.

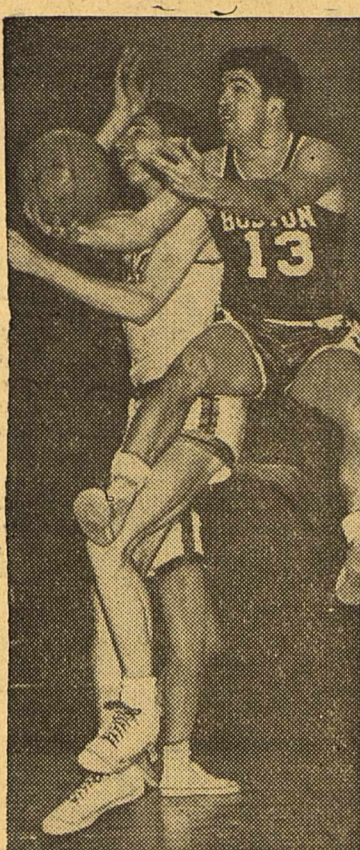
Kiwanians Consider Ways In Which Club Might Be Improved

PERRE, S. D.—(P)—Hunters weren't the only men afield in South Dakota during the fall upland bird and big game seasons. The state Game, Fish and Parks Department says wardens and other officers hauled in a total of 196 hunters, who paid fines totaling \$6,255 on charges of game law violations.
 Most of the arrests were for shooting game birds out of season, exceeding daily bag limits and shooting hen pheasants. One hunter, however, was different. He shot a pelican.

It Was A Busy Day In Justice Court

Burmese Newsmen To Fight Press Act

RANGOON, BURMA—(P)—Burmese publishers and newsmen have agreed to boycott all government news releases and ignore news of government activities until the Burma press emergency act is repealed, it was announced.
 Under the act the government is entitled to suspend any newspaper whose policy is considered prejudicial to government interests. The government announced its intention of enforcing the act for a period of six months after Burma achieves independence from Britain in January.

PLANS LARGER ARMY
PARIS—(P)—France plans an army of 323,832 men for 1948, an increase of 39,243 over 1947. Max Lejeune, a deputy, told the National Assembly's Finance Committee Monday.

WORKER ELECTROCUTED
FORT WORTH—(P)—E. R. Lineham, a crane operator for a construction company, was killed here Monday when the boom of his crane touched a high tension line and sent a charge of 7,200 volts through his body.
