Walker, Northwest Coke County wildcat, four miles south and across the Colorado River from the Jameson field, was flowing to cleanout and test from open hole in the crinoidal lime of the Pennsylvanian at 6,230-60 feet.

Operator loaded the hole with water and swabbed to pits for two hours, through a one-eighth inch choke. Tubing pressure was 1,000 pounds and casing pressure was 800 pounds.

At the end of two hours the well was turned to tanks and was flowed through various sized chokes for 12.5 hours. Then in a three hour period from 4 a. m. to 7 a. m., Monthe well flowed through a 14/64th inch tubing choke and made 28 barrels of 48 gravity oil, and seven barrels of wash water. Tubing pressure was 1,100 pounds

and casing pressure was 1,150 pounds. Gas-oil ratio was 1,061-1. Total recovery, during 15 hours of swabbing and flowing to tanks,







Hope For The DPs

One Year

The plight of Europe's displaced persons has at last attracted the attention of some Americans who are in a position to help relieve it. Two influential Republican senators, Taft of Ohio and Smith of New Jersey, have urged that the government take immediate steps to admit ts share of the homeless unfortunates. And farm groups in the Middle West have begun surveys to see what homes and jobs might be available for them.

We don't know why the sudden flurry of interest. The essential facts of the displaced-persons problem have not changed in a year or more. Maybe it is just coincidence. Or perhaps the practical as well as humanitarian spects of the problem are only now becoming apparent. But whatever the reason, the interest is encouraging.

Senator Smith, recently returned from a trip to Europe, thinks that this country should admit a reasonable number of displaced Europeans immediately, outside the mmigration system. Senator Taft, who also calls for immediate action, would admit America's share under quotas now unfilled because of the wartime halt of immigration.


There are about 800,000 persons, Smith explains, who cannot be resettled. These are the last remnants of the 3,000,000 uprooted by the European war. Driven from ountries now dominated by Communists, the 800,000 will not go back home for fear of persecution.

Almost all of them are in the American, British and French zones of Germany-about 530,000 in the Amerian zone alone. They cannot be left there because, as Smith says. "the German economy cannot support them and, of course, the United States Army cannot support them indefinitely.'

All this has been argued before. But now, all of a udden, the arguments are being listened to. One reason or the Middle West's interest undoubtedly is the serious ecline in our farm population. More than 2,000,000, persons who left our rural areas during the war did not ome back when it was over.

With aid to Europe shaping up, American farmers have a big job ahead of them, and they know it. It is ot a pleasant job to face when they are short-handed. o the move to bring displaced persons to this country, and find work for them, is more than an act of charity.

The great majority of these DPs are from the Baltic Slavic countries. Thousands from those same counes came to America in the last 75 years and settled in e Middle West. They became good farmers and good mericans. There is no reason to believe that their unppy, uprooted countrymen of today might not do as But before they are given that chance, two things ust be done. Congress must pass legislation allowing hem to enter. 

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
