
Dimmitt's students have two holdays coming up.

THE SON OF GOD

esus let those who heard Him know about His relationship with God. He taught that to know Him was to know God. In John 14:8 Philip said, "Lord, show us the Father, and it sufficeth us. Jesus saith unto him, Have I been so long time with you, and dost thou not know me, Phillip? he that hath seen me hath seen the Father." Teen Music Deafens Mice, **Display Shows**

AMY TAYLOR, 11-year-old fifth grader at North Grade School in Dimmitt, captured first place in the elementary medicine and health division of the Panhandle Science Fair in Amarillo Friday.

HER DISPLAY was entitled, 'Does Loud Music Affect Hearing?" Here, in her own words, is how she did it:

"This experiment took 11 mice -six experimental mice and five control mice.

"The experimental mice were put into a playhouse 8 by 10 feet, with the door and window closed. The control mice were kept in the house.

"I PLAYED three pop records: one by Petula Clark, one by the Beach Boys, and one by Herman's Hermits. I played the records about 412 hours on weekdays and about 61/2 hours on weekends for a total of 45 hours. My record player was turned up as high as it would go. The caged mice were placed by the record player.

"The first two days the music played, the experimental mice acted nervous. The third day, four of them huddled in the corner, and two mice got sick and died. The sixth, seventh and eighth days, it didn't bother them.

"EVER SINCE I started the music, the experimental mice ate twice as much as the control mice. The experimental mice are deaf. Every time I tested with a sound (whistle), the control mice jumped and acted frightened, but the experimental mice didn't hear it.

'When I played the music loudly to both groups, the control mice acted scared and nervous, but the experimental mice didn't."

Amy conducted her experiment under the guidance of her fifth grade teacher, Mrs. Bob Farrer, and with the cooperation of her parents-and probably of the neighbors.

ALTHOUGH the jolting pop music stopped the mice's hearing, that seems to be all it stopped. Amy reports that since her experiment began, her 11 original mice have grown to a colony of

The Easter Story

The Easter story is ever so simple, but means ever so much. This story tells about living forever, and everybody wants that if the forever life is good. We want our friends and dear ones to be with us in that life.

The events of that first Easter happened like this: A Man whom many people loved and who helped so many by acts of goodness, and who spoke with such great wisdom that He could tell the greatest truths with stories and words everybody could understand, was put to death by Roman soldiers on the false accusation of treason: that He had claimed to be Christ the King. He had said He was king, but that "my kingdom is not of this world.

His friends and followers thought Him too good to die: that He never would die nor could! All of us think somewhat like that about those we love. But, after He had been nailed on a cross for a few hours. He did die, and the door of a tomb was closed on His body, many thought, forever. His followers were confused. It seemed to them their greatest Friend had let them down.

On Sunday following that black Friday, some women took spices to the tomb to embalm Him. It was very early in the morning. To their amazement, the great stone door had been rolled aside, and a dazzling messenger of God sat upon it. They were terribly frightened. "Do not be afraid," said the angel. "He is not here. He is risen. Go and tell His followers . . . " His sacrifice for us on Good Friday voices the sure hope that those we love can live, and we with them, and that the forever life with Him is good.
