PLANS COMPLETED FOR TWO-DAY MEAT SHOW

FIRST FLOYD COUNTY MEAT SHOW TO OPEN TOMORROW MORNING; MANY ENTRIES EXPECTED

Floyd County's first meat show will be held in the Chamber of Commerce building here beginning Friday morning of this week. The show is under the supervision of S. W. Ross, secretary of the local Chamber of Commerce, and Miss Martha Faulkner, county home demonstration agent.

Judging in the exhibits will begin Friday afternoon; first second and third place ribbon awards will be placed by judges furnished by the Extension Department, through Miss Myrtle Murry, district home demonstration agent.

Plans are being made to accommodate many Floyd county residents who will be in attendance at the show both Friday and Saturday, and who will derive much benefit from the exhibits. Proper methods to be used in cutting, curing and canning will probably be given by the judges of the show in connection with judging activities.

Many entries are expected in the different classes including cured and canned meats. The prime purpose of this exhibit is to determine whether or not a high quality of meat and meat products are produced in Floyd county by Floyd county farmers. It is believed that a very high class of cured and canned meat is prepared in Floyd county. The show will also serve to further home consumption of products.

The entry list arranged includes the following exhibits: Canned—3 number 3 cans of roast; 3 number 2 cans of roast; 3 number 2 cans of chili. Pork Products: Canned—3 number 3 cans of roast; 3 number 2 cans of sausage; 3 number 2 cans of liver; 3 number 2 cans of mince meat; 3 number 2 cans of scrapple.

Chicken Products: Canned—3 number 2 cans of boned chicken. The entry list for cured meat products includes the following pork cuts: 1 ham, 1 Picnic Shoulder, 1 side bacon, 1 sack smoked sausage, 1-2 gallon lard and 1 cake of soap. Three cans of canned products will be necessary as the judges will open one can for inspection and the other two will be placed in the display.

Any person in Floyd county has been made eligible to enter products in any of the classes, no entry fee is being required. Specifications have been given regarding the requirements on the entry blanks which have been sent out.

This show is one of the few of its kind that have been held on the plains-panhandle of Texas and the interest in the affair is widespread. Winners in this show will be entitled to place exhibits in the Lubbock Meat Show at which event cash prizes will be awarded winning products in all classes. This exhibit is known as the Panhandle-Plains Ham, Bacon and Meat Show. It is to the advantage of all exhibitors in the Floyd County Show to be participating in the event.

Miss Martha Faulkner, county home demonstration agent, will have charge of the placing of winning products in the Lubbock exhibits. The Floyd County Meat Show, in addition to demonstrating, to the public the high quality of meats cured and canned in Floyd county, will serve as an instructive event. New methods of cutting, canning and curing of meat products will be given careful consideration of the officials in charge.

Plans have been under way since the announcement of the event in the latter part of January and it is believed that this show will be one of the most successful exhibits of its nature ever staged in this section.

MANY FARMERS WILL ATTEND LUBBOCK MEETING MARCH 18

Importance of cash crops on the farm and the improvement of products marketed will be brought to the attention of several hundred farmers around Lubbock on March 18, when the first annual Swift Day is held at the Palace Theatre. Producers of butterfat, poultry, and eggs will be told how their products are marketed and how they can produce better returns for what they have to sell, by experts from the A. & M. College of Texas, county agents, and others. The program is sponsored by the local produce plant of Swift & Company.

The meeting, which will be an all day affair, will be called to order at 9:30 by R. F. Humphrey. G. V. Jeck will discuss poultry ills that cause heavy losses to farm flocks. F. M. Simpson of Chicago, will talk on how the butter, eggs, and poultry of Texas are marketed. D. F. Eaton, county agent, will offer some helpful hints, and Prof. S. C. Evans, A. & M. College of Texas, will discuss "Relief from Low Prices." The motion pictures include "A Tale of Two Bulls," "Blood Will Tell," and "Producing Quality Chickens." Luncheon will be served to those in attendance.

SECOND DAY—SATURDAY

Forenoon—Team demonstration by two members of Floyd County Clubs. These will make a demonstration on Canning Equipment at Lubbock. This event will begin at 10:30 o'clock.

Afternoon—Exhibits will be on display for the remainder of the day. Cured and Canned meats showed.

DATES GIVEN FOR TEACHERS EXAMINATIONS

The dates for the 1932 teachers examinations are as follows: April 1 and 2; June 3 and 4; July 1 and 2; September 2 and 3; December 2 and 3.

Examinations for Floyd County teachers will be given in the County School Superintendents' office here. Anyone wishing to take these examinations are required to register on or before the 20th day of the month prior to the date of the examinations.

The fee for taking the examination is four dollars. The questions covering the examinations are released by the state of Texas and papers will be sent to the examination board of the state for grading.

ANNUAL EXAMINATION GIVEN POST OFFICE CLERKS WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

The annual examination was given to Floydada Post Office mail clerks, Wednesday afternoon, by W. D. Davis Chief Clerk Railway Mail Service, from Fort Worth. W. B. Henry and L. T. Bishop were examined.

During the course of the examination, 801 cards were thrown and 100 separations. L. T. Bishop threw 3 cards incorrect and W. B. Henry threw 1 incorrect.

This examination is given to mail clerks in Post Offices in every town in Texas.

SECOND CENSUS REPORT FOR CURRENT YEAR SHOWS 10 LOSS IN LONE STAR

The second district census report was received in the County Superintendent's office Saturday from the census trustee of Lone Star district. A total of 62 scholastics were reported from that district, showing a loss of 10 scholastics from last year.

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FIRST SCHOOL CENSUS REPORT MADE BY MUNCY DISTRICT

The first census report to be completed was made by O. B. LaFrance of the Muncy district Friday, March 11. This was the first census report to be received at the County Superintendent's office for the current year. The report revealed that there had been a 5 scholastic loss since the report last year, only 30 are now enrolled.

Superintendent Price Scott is mailing to each of the school census trustees an assortment of material for taking the school census for the district. The school census will be taken during the month of March this year.

Mr. Scott is urging that all school census trustees exercise extreme care in enrolling every scholastic in the district, otherwise some child may be overlooked and money due the district will be lost. The scholastic age is now 6 to 17 years inclusive, the child must be six years of age or older than September 1, to be included. If a child is 13 years of age or older than September 1, it is an over-scholastic.

Mr. Scott states that last year a few children were overlooked in the county and that some money was not allowed which was due the district. He further asks that the trustees of the county to obtain the information on the scholastic census blanks exact as the census records, both common and independent become a part of the permanent record of the County Superintendent's office.

GRANDMOTHER OF MARTIN BROWN DIED LAST THURSDAY

Martin Brown returned to Floydada Sunday after attending the funeral services of his grandmother, Mrs. J. W. Carico, who died Thursday at her home in Smithville. Services were held and interment made in Smithville.

Edd Brown reports that the south Texas fruit crop was killed by a freeze during the past week. He said that the coldest weather since 1889 was had in the recent cold wave.

Floyd County Commissioners court met Monday in the regular session of that body.

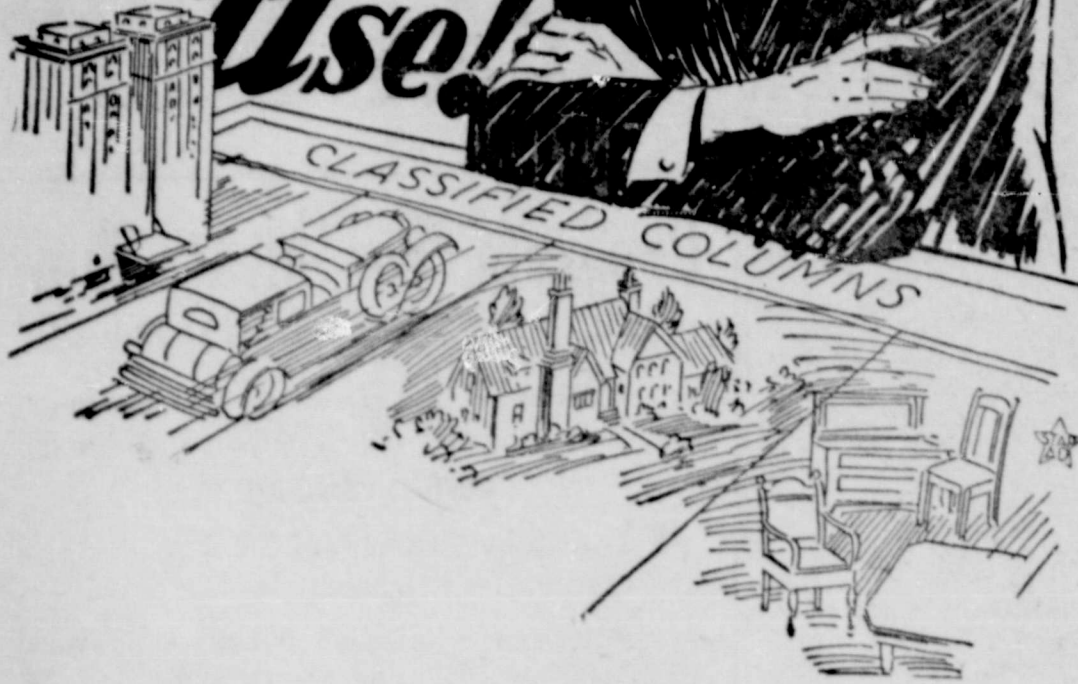
The regular routine business was transacted in the meeting. Accounts were allowed.

CHURCH OF THE NAZARENE

We, as the pastor of the Church of the Nazarene, wish to clear some things that seem to be struggling in the minds of some of our Floydada friends. First, are we a well organized systemized church? Second, are we a tongue movement or connected therewith?

First, we are a well organized church with system. Dr. P. F. Breese organized the first Nazarene church at Los Angeles, California, in 1895, with 135 charter members, with a preaching body of two Elders. This church was organized without one penny's worth of property. We numbered in January, 1932, 99,127 lay members with a preachers body of 2,304 Ordained Elders and 1031 licensed ministers, making a total of a preachers body of 3,335.

We own nine colleges, eight accredited schools valued at \$1,783,970. We own church buildings valued at \$11,103,480 and own rescue homes and hospitals valued at \$175,000.00; a publishing house and headquarters at Kansas City, valued at \$499,476.

We received into our connection in 1931, 20,999. We paid our pastors \$1,225,593. We have a Sunday school enrollment of 403,908. The Nazarene Young People's Society consists of 23,861 active members with 10,277 social members. They raised for home missions and evangelism \$56,076. The Womens Missionary society consisting of 19,042 active members 5,838 social members. They raised 136,982. We have four bishops or generals. We have forty eight districts with 48 department superintendents in the United States. We have seventy six foreign missionaries on the field. With an indebtedness of 25 1/2 percent, we hold property worth \$13,457,706. Our government is largely Methodist, also theologically. We are on the field because there is room and need of such a movement.

We are out and out for a whole bible for the whole world, without fear or favor or compromise. We are prohibitionists to a member. No anti-prohibitionists can fellowship us. Now, in regard to whether we are connected to the Tongues Movement or not, we are in no way connected therewith and never have been.

Remember, you are always welcome to our church, no matter who you believe or disbelieve. Don't allow financial embarrassment to keep you away from our services.
