# Ford Offers New 8-Cylinder Car; Also An Improved '4'

## ENGINE OF 90° V-TYPE; INSURES SMOOTHNESS

CYLINDERS AND CRANKCASE CAST IN ONE PIECE.  
DOWNDRAFT CARBURETOR, FUEL PUMP,  
NEW VALVES OTHER FEATURES.

Complete details of the new V-8 cylinder Ford car which was introduced March 31st, were made public here this week by B. K. Barker, of Barker Brothers, local Ford dealer.

The New Ford is large, long, roomy, fast, powerful and alert. Its V-8 cylinder engine develops 65 horsepower and it is capable of 75 miles an hour, Mr. Barker states.

Fourteen body types of modern, streamline design are offered. A four-cylinder engine developing 50 horsepower also can be supplied with any of these body types at a lower price.

Numerous mechanical advances are incorporated in the new car. These embrace a synchronized silent gear shift and silent second gear, rubber engine mountings, down-draft carburetor and carburetor silencer, automatic spark control, fuel pump and rear fuel tank. Other improvements include a newly designed rear spring, thermostatically controlled Houdaille double-acting hydraulic shock

absorbers, large four-wheel brakes, newly designed electrically welded steel-spoke wheels with large hubs and hub caps and large tires. The chassis and running gear are cushioned by rubber insulators in the spring shackles and shock absorber links. The body is insulated from the frame by rubber pads.

The new bodies are fresh and modern from the gracefully rounded V-type radiator to rear bumper. The air-flow lines are carried out by the long hood with its rustless steel strip, the slanting safety glass windshield, and rounded roof line. The convex lamps, full-crowned fenders and long, low running board harmonize with the balance of the design.

Body interiors are roomy and richly furnished. Seats are of new style, designed for utmost comfort. Driver seats in all closed cars are adjustable. A large ventilator is provided in the cowl. The oval instrument panel is in engine-turned finish and has a rustless steel mounting strip. Inside

sun visors, which fold out of the way when not in use, are provided in all closed cars.

The New Ford V-8 engine is remarkably free from vibration. Frequent and overlapping impulses deliver the power in a smooth constant flow.

The engine is of the 90-degree V-type, developing 65 brake horsepower at 3400 r. p. m. The 65-pound crankshaft is of the 90-degree type, with its four cranks at right angles to each other.

The crankshaft is statically and dynamically balanced and its throws counterbalanced. The crankshaft, connecting rods and pistons also are in balance so that the engine operates with remarkable smoothness at all engine speeds. Pistons are of aluminum alloy and have three rings, the lower acting as an oil-control ring.

Cylinder blocks and crankcase are cast in one unit, giving exceedingly rigid engine construction. New type, one-piece valves, which eliminate tappets, operate directly from the crankshaft without pushrods.

Connecting rods from opposite pistons are placed side by side on each 90-degree crankshaft throw. These are mounted on new floating steel bushings, babbitted inside and out which serve to give the benefit of the full crankpin bearing area to each connecting rod thus affording longer wear.

A cast aluminum cover embracing the intake manifold forms the top of the engine, giving it an unusually finished appearance. The down-draft

carburetor and the fuel pump are mounted on this cover.

The gas is preheated in the intake manifold by a hot spot created by hot exhaust gases surging back and forth through small passage in the manifold cover plate. Exhaust ports are on outside of the engine blocks, the left exhaust pipe being carried around the front of the engine.

The distributor operates directly from the front end of the camshaft eliminating the use of interposed gears. Spark control is automatic. Crankshaft and crank pin bearings are lubricated by pressure as are the main bearings of the camshaft. Pistons and valves are oiled by spray and splash.

A fan of airplane propeller type and two centrifugal water pumps together with the large surface of the radiator insure ample cooling under all driving conditions.

The rugged new double-drop frame is formed to the shape of the body and, with the new low rear spring, provides a low center of gravity, with consequent increase in roadability.

The riding comfort of the cars is due to many factors, but particularly to the new flexible transverse cantilever springs, larger tires, rubber insulation and the newly designed shock absorbers.

The new features have been introduced in the Houdaille hydraulic double-acting shock absorbers. One, a thermostat control which compensates for varying temperature conditions, and the other, a special valve which automatically lessens the ef-

fect of sudden road shocks.

The Ford rear spring is of new design, being flatter and lower. It is mounted on perches at the rear of the axle housing and bowed out so as to clear the differential housing.

The new brakes have a braking surface of 186 square inches. Wheels are 18 inches in diameter. The large hubs enclose the bolts which attach the wheel to the drum. There are 32 steel spokes, sharply pitched and electrically welded to the drop-center rim and hub shell, forming an unusually strong unit. Tires are 18 by 5.25 inches. Each is balanced to prevent "tramping" or vibration at high speeds. The drive is of familiar Ford torque tube type, the drive shaft being of tubular construction.

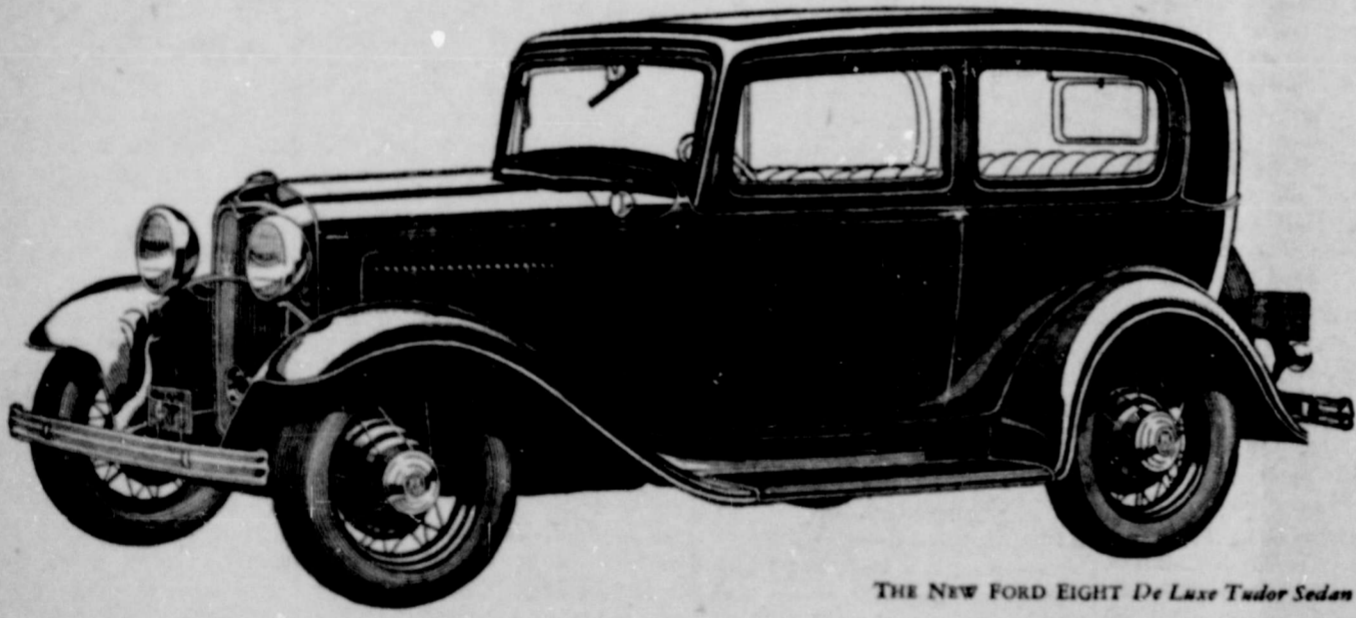

**FARM RELIEF BILL IS DISCUSSED BY W. ED BROWN**

There are some very gross discriminations against the farmers of the United States in connection with the Reconstruction Finance Corporation plan of doing out the aid to the farmers from the fifty million dollars set aside for this purpose by Congress.

If I can read and understand plain English, the Congress of the U. S. passed this relief act and made this fifty million dollars available to our farmers without any strings tied to it. (Read the bill and see how you interpret it.) After passage of this measure it was heralded to the nation that the farmers trouble would soon be over and that they would soon be restored to prosperity through the workings of this great fifty million dollar relief plan.

Have you ever analyzed this plan? Let's take a look at it. This great scheme that was to work wonders for the farmer and put him to where he could pay off his mortgage against his farm, pay his debts and his taxes, and restore his purchasing power, has resolved itself into this situation:

Instead of this money being made available to the distressed farmers without strings tied to it to where it would aid in the production of the 1932 crop, it becomes available only after requirements of an extreme nature are met—any many of these requirements cannot be met by our farmers. I would like to ask who is responsible for these requirements and this red tape? I have asked six or eight of our leading Senators and Representatives, both Democratic and

Republican, many pertinent questions concerning this farm relief but to date not one has ever "Spilled the Beans". Someone is responsible for this red tape and these criminal discriminations against the farmers of our country. Someone or several someones passed the rules and regulations to govern the lending of this fifty million dollar relief fund to the farmers. Congress said: "We have set aside fifty million dollars for farm relief for 1932 and we have not tied any strings to it; we want this money to become immediately available to the farmers throughout the nation; we want the Department of Agriculture to take over the matter of lending this money to the farmers." What is the result? Committees were appointed to pass on the manner of making this money available to the farmers "Without red tape and without strings tied to it to where the purpose of the act would not be thwarted."

Here's what these committees finally decided: If a tenant farmer needs aid for making the 1932 crop he may have this aid from the government provided he doesn't want to borrow very much, gives about double or triple, on an average, the crop security demanded of him by his banker; also, provided he secure a waiver of all rights and claims against the crop from his landlord or other mortgagees, binds himself under penalty of a heavy fine and imprisonment to reduce his cotton acreage 35 percent, and gives also a mortgage on any and all wheat that he may have up and growing at the time.

To show the gross injustice of this plan and these requirements made of the farmer, let's see that requirements are made of the "Big Interests" who also are permitted to borrow from the R. F. C. Remember now that all this money, both for the farmers and the "Big Interests" comes from the same act of Congress. Mr. "Big Interest" is eligible to borrow up to two hundred million dollars. \$400.00 is all that any one farmer is eligible to borrow. Does Mr. "Big Interest" have to secure "waiver" from those who hold a first lien or first mortgage against his property before he can secure his loan's approval? Is he told that he must reduce his activities 35 percent before this money will be available to him? Is he told that before he is qualified to borrow any of this money from the Government he must give as additional security (if he gives any security at all) a mortgage on certain other property, separate and apart from the main item on which the loan is being made, to match the mortgage on wheat that is being exacted of the farmer? I will leave you to say whether these

requirements are made of the "Big Interests." I have asked many of our Senators and Representatives this very direct question, but I have not been able to find what the requirements of the department are to these "Big Fellows." I have every reason to believe that they are entirely different to the demands made of the helpless farmer.

Here's another angle from which to view the situation. (Can you see the point?) There are more than ten million farmers in the U. S. Allowing the average five to the family and you have fifty million souls directly dependent on the farm in the U. S. for a livelihood. This leaves approximately seventy million who are dependent on other occupations, trades, etc., for livelihood. Congress appropriated two million dollars to the R. F. C. to start the wheels of industry back to activity. The fifty million dollars to agriculture and the farmers represents 2 1/2 percent of the total—A magnificent sum of \$1.00 per capita. The one billion nine hundred millions for other industries represents 97 1/2 of the total—a per capita of more than \$27.00.

Our politicians and statesmen say that the farmers are the backbone of the nation—that all commerce and industry is dependent on the farmer for its existence and prosperity—that we need not expect a return of prosperity until we put the farmer back on a state of prosperity. Is this a true statement? Do our statesmen and big men believe this? These very acts do not show it. Why set aside \$1.00 per capita to re-establish an industry that is dependent on the farmer before the farmer is "Re-established?"

As matters now stand I seriously doubt if more than about one farmer in four will be able to qualify for this government aid. Landlords in hundreds of cases cannot sign the waivers exacted of them for various reasons. Landlords are about as hard up financially as the tenant at this time. Many landlords all over the country have mortgaged their interests in the tenant's crop on debts of their own. This makes it impossible for them to sign a waiver for the tenant, which means that this tenant cannot borrow a dime from the government. If the few who are qualified to borrow this government money meet all the requirements necessary, they will be tied up to where they can hardly turn over and "regulated" for the benefit of those who have not borrowed government money.

It is a crime for our government to act with such discrimination against the farmers in connection with this government aid and if all of us would protest against this abuse right now, with a pledge to carry the matter to the polls from here out, you would soon see a "change" made in Washington relative to this aid for our farmers and they would be able to borrow this money in a decent manner and not be forced to get down on their knees, with hat in hand, to ask for something that is justly due them. Every farmer in Floyd County, and in the nation as far as that matters, should write today to his Congressman and demand for this aid for the farmers be made available to him immediately on the same basis as it is available to the "Big Interests."
