## DEPOSITORS AND CITIZENSHIP TO PETITION FOR LOCAL MANAGEMENT OF FLOYD CO. RECEIVERSHIP BANKS

As a result of an open house meeting of the Floyd County Farm and Home Owners Protective League, held Saturday, a petition is to be submitted to 'proper authorities' asking for local management of the Floyd County National Bank in Floydada and the Security State Bank, of Lockney, receiver banks in this county.

The motion calling for the petition was made by D. D. Shipley and reads in substance: "I move that the Farm and Home Owners Protective League frame a petition, to the proper authorities, in behalf of a change of management of The Floyd County National Bank. This petition to be presented to the citizenship of the county for endorsement at the

next meeting of this league next Saturday."

An amendment and addition, to the original motion, to include in the petition the Lockney bank was suggested by Y. M. Moore. Mr. Moore's amendment was voted on and carried as did Mr. Shipley's.

The petition which will be submitted to a general meeting of citizens, both depositors and non-depositors, Saturday afternoon next will contain a call for the Floyd County banks to be put under local management.

Bank Situation Discussed  
Conditions arising following the closing of The Floyd County National Bank were discussed in length during the session Saturday. John L.

West, president of the Farm and Home Owners League introduced the question and stated the purpose of the meeting.

Mr. West stressed the need of strength, both personal and financial, of all the people of the county in the moves made by the League. He said that a remedy for the situation could be found if the people would unite for that purpose.

Statements, made by depositors, creditors and others during the afternoon, centered generally about the conditions arising following the closing of the bank. Several remedies were suggested. Discussions were heard from many present.

The meeting was held in the district court room.

## Depression's Worst Year Is Best Year in Health Says State Health Officer

The worst year of the depression has been the best health year, according to Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer, in commenting on the low death rate during the past year.

Of great importance was the almost entire freedom from epidemics, until the influenza epidemic in December. Weather conditions throughout the year were good. The depression, undoubtedly, has curbed overeating and over drinking. The auto, there have been fewer deaths charged to motor traffic, because there has been less such traffic.

Accidents in industry have been fewer as the outcome of curtailment of employees and hours of work. The people, although against their will, had more leisure and more out-door life. All of these factors have evidently more than counter-balanced the ill effects of worry incidental to unemployment and difficult circumstances.

But perhaps more than any single factor, the protection given by the effective functioning of the health departments, by the generous treatment from physicians, and by splendidly organized relief work has operated to conserve life and health.

Whatever economies must be effected in view of economic conditions, there must be no further radical curtailment of the support required to permit adequate functioning of health departments. The unfavorable aspects of the 1932 health record are increases in the number of deaths from heart disease, cancer, diabetes, and suicides.

## Floydada Independent School District Gains 34 Scholastic Census Shows

The 1933 census for the Floydada Independent School District shows a gain of 34 scholastics over the number of last year. According to the census, which was compiled by L. A. Marshall and sons, there is a total of 807 scholastics within the district in 1933.

In the rural school district census a total of 14 districts in the county have reported. In these 14 districts there are a total of 724 scholastics. Several of the larger districts have not reported. The census report had not been received from Lockney yesterday.

"We know almost that the total of the entire county will not be an increase over last year and can only hope that we can hold our own," County Superintendent Price Scott said.

Census for the entire county is due to be completed not later than April the first.

Our country is now paying the price of cheap money and easy credit during the boom days. That is all that lies at the bottom of our present difficult financial situation. The situation is no different, except in degree, from similar situations which have followed every previous boom in our history. This time the whole world was taking part in the frenzy of speculation with easily borrowed money, and not only in America but in every other nation, debtors today outnumber the creditors, and creditors are reluctant to consent to the scaling down of debts and starting all over again.

It seems to us inevitable, however, that that is what must happen. In some directions this movement has already begun. No one who lent money on Kreuger bonds or Insull securities, or on some of the obligations of foreign governments expects to get his money back, or any material part of it. In many parts of

Bank loans made in flush times on securities then worth many times what it is worth now, constitute an enormous burden of debt which hangs like a millstone around the necks of hundreds of thousands or millions of small business men and manufacturers.

We do not believe that a return to real prosperity is possible until some means is found of scaling down these and other unpayable debts. We think all classes of creditors have got to take their medicine. We have no particular plan to bring this about, but we are confident that it is bound to come about sooner or later.
