Another attraction was an exhibit of 100 various gin supply boxes and machinery firms.

Field Workers Should Understand viewpoint of Aged Citizens

Austin.—"Knowing their business yet being courteous, our field workers must understand the viewpoint of the many aged citizens whose homes they enter," said Orville S. Carpenter, executive director of the Old Age Assistance Commission, this week in explaining the setup.

Investigators have been calling at the homes of applicants for three weeks now. Some 140,000 aged have applied, and as there were 300,000 blanks distributed, many more applications are expected to be filed.

"We are sending men from the State Office to the twenty district offices and are holding schools for investigators. Our field workers must have a thorough understanding of their work.

"All investigators in a district meet with the men from the central office at the headquarters city of that district. Policies of the Commission, the law itself, and technical questions are explained to the assembled field workers.

"We have a humane purpose; we have good workers. The Commission is anxious for the aged of Texas to receive the most good possible from the old age assistance law," Mr. Carpenter declared.

"Applicants are cooperating with us and they realize that we are doing everything we can to facilitate these investigations which the law requires," he added.

Employees of the State Office and those of the twenty districts have been working fourteen and fifteen hours a day. As some 140,000 separate investigations must be made (and many more are expected to make application,) an enormous task faces the Old Age Assistance Commission.

"Payments will start just as soon as investigators complete their work as required by law. We hope to complete all investigations and approve applications before July 1," the Executive Director said.

"Records of birth dates, property owned, cash in bank, residence, and citizenship (if the applicant is a naturalized citizen) should be ready to show the investigators when they call during the next few weeks," Mr. Carpenter advised.

Approximately 200 or 250 people attended the open house held by the Floydada Sewing Room project and Home Economics Project last Friday. Each room had their work they had done displayed with one of the clients explaining what they had learned and profited by their employment in the rooms.

Special guests including Mrs. Albert Walker, district supervisor, and also Mrs. Hattie O'Hare, both of Lubbock, Mrs. J. A. Hope, supervisor of the Home Economics Project in Plainview and Mrs. Summers, of Plainview, and other officials from the offices in Lubbock and Plainview visited the formal opening. Many men and women of Floydada and nearby communities visited the rooms and showed much interest in the projects. Employees in the sewing room at Lockney also visited the rooms here.

Sewing Room Opening

Floydada Sewing Room is under the supervision of Miss Wilma Fuller, who has charge of twenty women. About 150 garments were displayed of which was a part of last month's work. The garments included: Infants layettes, men, women, boys and girls' clothing, rugs, quilts and chair cushions. Many beautiful pot plants, that was loaned by local business people, made the room more attractive.

Home Economics Training Project

The Home Economics Training Project is under the supervision of Miss Audrey Farris, who has charge of ten relief clients. The three rooms, including the study, breakfast and kitchen rooms were open for inspection. The guests were served coffee and cookies by the women. They had on display the following articles: Children toys, rugs, footstools, book cases and clock shelves. Spring blossoms and pot plants were placed about the room. The flowers were donated and loaned by local business people.

Each patrol gave a short entertainment and each boy brought articles showing his hobby. Following the entertainment light refreshments were served.

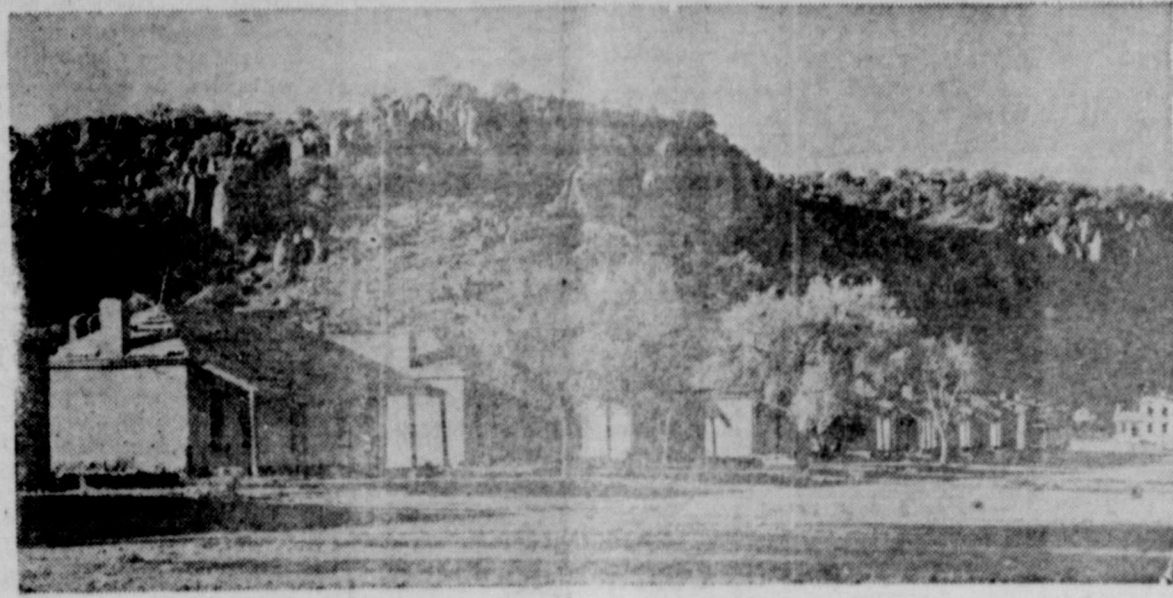

School Trustee Election Will Be Held Saturday Over Floyd County

An election will be held Saturday at the County Court House for the election of trustees of the Floydada Independent School District board. There will be two elected to fill the position of J. B. Turner and L. H. Derrell, whose terms have expired. The polls will be open from 8 a. m. until 7 p. m.

Those having charge of the polls will be Mrs. Nora Cox, E. A. Russell and Mrs. Myrtle Roberts.

An election will be held in each common school district for the election of trustees in the rural schools. Three county trustees will be elected consisting of one trustee at large and one for each precinct, 3 and 4. A county trustee at large will be voted on at each box in the county.

NEWS ITEMS OF INTEREST TO FARMERS FROM AGENTS OFFICE

Floyd County has been divided into three districts for the purpose of discussing the new farm program and to elect men to serve on the committee. A meeting will be held in Floydada April 11 beginning at 2 o'clock in the county courtroom; a meeting will be held at Cedar School House at 2 o'clock April 1; and on April 9 a meeting will be conducted at Lockney to be held in the City Auditorium at 2:00. Three committeemen and one alternate will be elected at each session.

The county has been divided into the three following districts:

Floydada—McCoy, Sandhill, Harmony, Allmon, Blanco, Starkey, Lake view, Pleasant Hill, Antelope, Dougherty, Baker, Floydada and Campbell.

Lockney—Providence, Aiken, Irick Prairie Chapel, Pleasant Valley, Muncy, Ramsey, Sterley, and Lone Star.

Cedar—Edgin, South Plains, Rose-land, Cedar, Fairmont, Center, Fairview, Hillcrest and Liberty.

A special meeting will be held Saturday, April 4, by the Farm Organization for the purpose of the president, George Fawver, to appoint a man to take charge of the meetings and discuss the new plans.

Beauty Operators Met Wednesday Night At The Vogue Beauty Shop

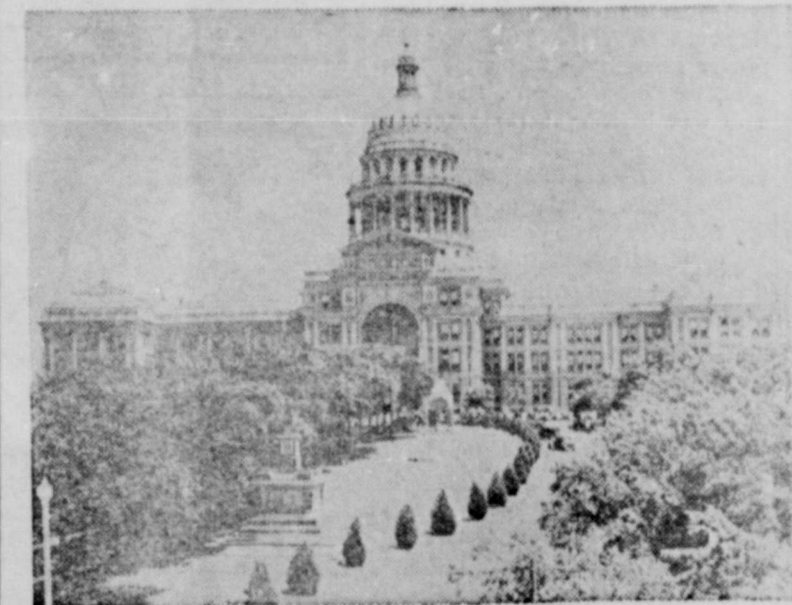

Land Will Be Measured For New Wheat Contracts Covering 1936 to 1939

The county office of the Wheat Association has been advised by agents measuring land covered by applications for 1936-1939 wheat contracts with the measuring to be started the latter part of this week.

Producers that sign applications for 1936-1939 wheat contracts will be paid for 1936 wheat provided they have complied with the regulations as to seeding of wheat and proper use of adjusted or contracted acres.

The wheat office was instructed not to advise any producer of an excess acreage of seeded wheat as there is no way to correct this type of non-compliance and any producer who has seeded more than the allowable acreage will not receive 1936 payments.

The regulation as to adjusted or contracted acres places no restriction as to the use of this land after January 6, 1936, so far as the wheat contract is concerned.
