**Proof of Age Is Important In Claiming Old Age Insurance**

Amarillo, March 20.—Inaccuracy in giving one's age when applying for a social security account number may delay the payment of old-age insurance benefits when the time comes to make a claim. Dewey I. Reed, manager of the Amarillo office of the Social Security Board, informed insured workers today.

"Under the Social Security Act," Reed explained, "old age benefits are not payable until attainment of age 65, except in the case of death, when a lump-sum payment is made to the wage-earner's relatives or estate. Proof of age is required of those who file claims for the single cash payments made to workers now reaching 65, provided the claim is for more than \$100. Lump sum payments in Texas in January averaged \$54.57; in New Mexico, \$60.13; and in Louisiana, \$41.87. In Texas, total payments during the month amounted to \$31,509.80; in New Mexico, \$1,262.73; and in Louisiana, \$10,174.57.

The Board will accept as unquestionable proof of age: First, a copy of a birth certificate; second, a copy of an infant baptismal certificate; and third, the sworn statements of two persons, such as a physician and a nurse, who have personal knowledge of the date of birth. Recognizing that in many cases it is virtually impossible for older people to obtain such primary evidence, the Board has provided for the submission of secondary evidence. It has ruled that when the applicant for benefits explains in writing that such evidence cannot be obtained without great difficulty and considerable expense, other evidence will be considered. In general, documents or copies of documents of many types showing the individual's age may be submitted, if they were executed prior to August 14, 1935—the date of the signing of the Social Security Act.

"For example," Reed explained, "the birth record in the old family bible may be brought forward, or a search of old school records may reveal the worker's birth date."

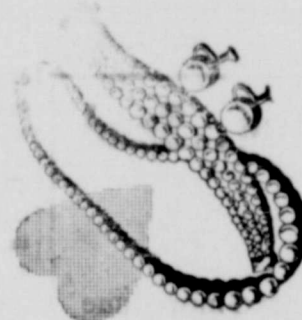

## MAYOR SUMMARIZES CITY PROGRESS IN PAST TWO YEARS

Mayor Glad Snodgrass this week has submitted a summary of the City's affairs and projects for the past two years. Mr. Snodgrass states that much profit and success depends on odds and ends being utilized.

The summary follows:

"In July, 1938, we were successful in making a deal with the State Health Department in locating here and operating in 52 other counties out of Floydada. (The City of Floydada underwrote the project) which developed in several families moving to Floydada etc. In making this trade we agreed that we would furnish one office girl at an expense of \$900 a year which we agreed to pay, also office space. Through the courtesy of enterprising Floydada Citizens, this amount was raised by public donation at no expense to the tax payers. Later, we made a trade with the health department wherein we furnished the office equipment instead of spending the \$900 yearly for office girl. We furnished the office with \$1000 new furniture and omitted the salary of \$900 a year and we are at no expense in operating the State Health Department, which is an asset to any city, through the courtesy of Dr. Cox, Austin, Texas.

The City is sponsoring and operating the sewing room in Floydada wherein several women are paid monthly approximately \$1000, under what is known as W. P. A. project. Our quota in this project would be approximately \$300 monthly. We are operating this project on approximately \$60 monthly, as we now have purchased and own all the machines out right and they belong to the City of Floydada as well as equipment.

We have purchased and paid for a street maintainer and grader, a pick up truck, spent several hundred dollars on streets and culverts, placed new roof on City Hall with many other City improvements and have all bills paid. Setting up something over \$600 for emergency breakdowns in the water department fund. Forty two cases have been before the Mayor's court, forty one of these have paid fines at the City Hall (most of these for intoxication on streets) a revenue of approximately \$574.00.

We owned and were to maintain the two miles of paving on highway 70 through Floydada and the road became in bad condition. We figured with several paving contractors and found this would cost us approximately \$3,600, which the city was unable to pay. On October 10 we were successful in making a trade with the State Highway Department. They agreed and did place a double coat topping on the two miles, also placed under ground drainage under highway 70 at an expense of approximately \$3,600 and the City was out approximately \$500 for one car of asphalt. At the same time they purchased and erected a nice warehouse in the City limits of Floydada at no expense to the City. Later we secured one mile paving connecting up with what we call the Silverton highway at no expense to the tax payers. (We owe the entire State Highway Commission thanks for assisting us in working out these problems at such small expense.

Indebtedness: Two years ago we owed in bonds \$376,000 on principal and we have paid off \$33,000 of this principal, paid all interest due and have secured a saving of approximately \$2,000 in discounts, also having a reserve set up for next interest paying date. These bonds are all due and payable in 1941 and we hope to have the City's business in shape at this date, that is by payments on principal and keeping the interest paid up, to make satisfactory arrangements in 1941.

Municipal Light Plant: The City voted \$120,000 6% bonds to erect a municipal light plant and we haven't done so bad on this. We are build-

ing approximately \$150,000 light plant and the time spent waiting hasn't been so bad as sometimes its best to be careful when you are spending a lot of money, as on October 3, 1938 we received a grant from W. P. A. of \$67,735.00 and a loan from the Government of \$83,000.00 at 4% interest.

\$120,000 at 6% interest is \$7,200 yearly interest. 4% interest on \$83,000 is \$3,320 yearly, a difference of \$3,880 a year saved in interest and running a period of twenty years or the life of the bonds will be and is a saving of \$77,600 an interest.

The difference between \$83,000 we owe on the plant and the \$120,000 we would have owed on the original plan is \$37,000 saving here and add that to the saving in interest of \$77,600 and we have a saving of \$114,600 during the life of the bonds over the original plan, and will have a \$150,000 municipal light plant for \$114,600 less money than the original plan was costing us, figuring the duration of the twenty year bonds."
