#### THE FLOYD COUNTY PLAINSMAN MAYOR SUMMARIZES CITY PRO-**GRESS IN PAST TWO YEARS**

has submitted a summary of the plant and the time spent waiting City's affairs and projects for the hasn't been so bad as sometimes its past two years. Mr. Snodgrass states best to be careful when you are that much profit and success de spending a lot of money, as on Ocpends on odds and ends being uti-

The summary follows:

in making a deal with the State Health Department in locating here and operating in 52 other counties of \$3,880 a year saved in interest out of Floydada. (The City of Floydada underwrote the project) which developed in several families moving to Floydada etc. In making this trade we agreed that we would furnish one office girl at an expense of \$900a year which we agreed to pay, tesy of enterprising Floydada Citizens, this amount was raised by public donation at no expense to the tax payers. Later, we made a trade with the health department wherein we \$114,600 less money than the original furnished the office equipment instead of spending the \$900 yearly for the duration of the twenty year office girl. We furnished the office bonds. with \$1000 new furniture and omitted the salary of \$900 a year and we are at no expense in operating the State Health Department, which is an asset to any city, through the courtesy of Dr. Cox, Austin, Texas.

The City is sponsoring and operating the sewing room in Floydada wherein several women are paid monthly approximately \$1000, under what is known as W. P. A. project. Our quota in this project would be approximately \$300 monthly. We are operating this project on approximately \$60 monthly, as we now have purchased and own all the machines out right and they belong to the City

of Floydada as well as equipment. We have purchased and paid for a street maintainer and grader, a pick up truck, spent several hundred dollars on streets and culverts, placed new roof on City Hall with many other City improvements and have all bills paid. Setting up something over \$600 for emergency breakdowns in the water department fund. Forty two cases have been before the Mayors court, forty one of these have paid fines at the City Hall (most of these for intoxication on streets) a revenue of approximately \$574.00.

We owned and were to maintain the two miles of paving on highway 70 through Floydada and the road became in bad condition. We figured with several paving contractors and found this would cost us approximately \$3,600, which the city was anable to pay. On October 10 we were successful in making a trade with the State Highway Department. They agreed and did place a double coat topping on the two miles, also placed under ground drainage under highway 70 at an expense of approximately \$3,600 and the City was out approximately \$500 for one car of asphalt. At the same time they purchased and erected a nice warehouse in the City limits of Floydada at no expense to the City. Later we secured one mile paving connecting up with what we call the Silverton highway at no expense to the tax payers. (We owe the entire State Highway Commission thanks for assisting us in working out these problems at such small expense.

Indebtedness: Two years ago we owed in bonds \$376,000 on principal and we have paid off \$33,000 of this principal, paid all interest due and have secured a saving of approximately \$2,000 in discounts, also having a reserve set up for next interest paying date. These bonds are all due and payable in 1941 and we hope to have the Citys business in shape at this date, that is by payments on principal and keeping the interest paid up, to make satisfactory arrangements in 1941.

Municipal Light Plant: The City voted \$120,000 6% bonds to erect a municipal light plant and we haven't done so bad on this. We are build-
