TICKETS TO THE crucial Baird-Clyde football game will be on sale all day Friday in the office of Supt. L. B. Howard.

School officials decided to make the tickets available early so fans who wish to can avoid standing in line to buy them at the gate. The price will be the same as at the gate -- \$1 each for adults.

Attendance this Friday night should easily be the largest of the season for the Bears Den. We suggest everyone who can take advantage of the advance sale to avoid congestion around ticket booths at the game.

Since there will probably be a lot more people at the game than there are seats, everyone will have to be a little more good natured and courteous than usual to avoid any unpleasantness.

WE HAVE NEVER had opportunity before this year to see a Baird-Clyde football game, although we heard a great deal about the keen rivalry between the two during our years in Abilene.

It goes without saying that we are looking forward to this year's meeting with extra interest since it will be our first time to be present.

IN LOOKING OVER the District 10-A schedule this week, we had one idle thought.

Wonder if the De Leon Bearcats have started basketball practice, or if they are still thinking about football. The Bearcats have completed their grid schedule, but still have a mathematical chance at getting into the playoffs.

Should Baird and Albany both lose Friday night, De Leon, Ranger and Clyde would move up to make a five-day tie for first place with 4-2 records.

A coin flip would then be necessary to determine who goes to bi-district.

GOLDTHWAITE IS IN the same position in District 9-A as is Baird in 10-A. If the Eagles win this Friday, they're in the playoffs. If they lose, the district goes into a three-way tie.

We can't ever recall before a district race in which, going into the final night of action, either of two teams could become champion, they might be co-champions, or it could end up with five co-champs.

And neither Albany nor Baird has an easy time on tap Friday night. Either could be defeated without raising too many eyebrows.

SPEAKING OF THE close district race, this week we took another look at the pre-season choices in 10-A by the Abilene Reporter-News.

Playoff Berth Hangs on Game

All the marbles will be on the line Friday night when the Baird Bears aim for their first football playoff berth in some four years by hosting the arch-rival Clyde Bulldogs.

A Baird victory would assure the Bears of a district championship and a bi-district date against the District 9-A representative. A Clyde victory would either hand the championship and playoff spot to Albany, or throw the league into a five-way tie, depending on the outcome of the Albany-Ranger game.

Eastland is at Cross Plains in the other last-round district game Friday night.

Full House Expected
A packed house is expected in

the Bears Den for the 7:30 p. m. kickoff.

The Bears and Albany now share District 10-A's top spot with 4-1 records. But since Baird holds a win over Albany, the Callahan County team will go to the playoffs in the event of a first-place tie for championship honors.

Clyde, very much in the running for the championship until last week's 31-16 loss to Albany, still has some hopes for making the playoffs. If Baird and Albany both lose this week, Clyde, De Leon and Ranger would join them as co-champs and a coin flip would be necessary to choose the playoff representative.

Incidental to the showdown this year is the long rivalry behind the Clyde-Baird game, which always makes the game a big one for both teams. But in recent years, a championship has not hinged on the outcome the way it does this time around.

Best in County
Friday night's winner will also be the Callahan County champion, since both teams have blasted Cross Plains.

Baird's Bears will also be shooting for a 9-1 season record, one of the best ever for the school.

Both teams figure to be at virtually full strength for the game. Both have been hampered by injuries through much of

the season, but should have everyone available for at least some duty this week.

Only Bear missing will be Jimmy Ault, hurt Monday in an auto accident.

Baird has rolled up 248 points against nine foes this year, an average of almost 28 points per game. And, while the offense has been productive, it has been the Bear defensive alignment which has had a key share in the season.

Baird has given up 83 points to nine opponents, an average of about 9 points per game. Only one team -- De Leon -- scored more than twice against Baird.

Three Score Twice

Three teams have scored twice against Baird, but all three were in one-sided games where there was little doubt about the outcome. Santa Anna, Roscoe and Cross Plains each managed a pair of TDs against the Bears. Clyde, on the other hand, has had a less productive offense but a stingier defense than Baird. The Bulldogs have scored 174 points an average of slightly more than 19 points per game, but have given up only 74 points vs over 80 points per contest.

And most of those 74 points came in two of Clyde's losing causes -- 28 scored by Class 2-A Haskell and 31 by Albany last week.

Action is scheduled on two fronts for Baird High School basketball forces Tuesday -- at Baird and Cisco.

Baird Bearettes, whose home opener was postponed from Monday to Thursday night of this week, will host Lueders girls for a double-header next Tuesday, while the Baird boys team is to be in Cisco for two games.

If the Baird football team beats Clyde Friday night to gain the Class A playoffs, the games at Cisco will be cancelled, however.

The order will be reversed in Tuesday night's Bearette games against Lueders. The varsity game will begin at 6:30 p. m., with the B team match to follow.

Boys and girls from Baird High are scheduled to visit Eula Thursday, Nov. 19, for a pair of games. The Baird-Eula boys game will also be called off if Baird gains the football playoffs.

Agriculture Census To Come in Stages

Plans for taking the 1964 Census of Agriculture in Callahan County were announced today by Floyd M. Johnson, newly-appointed census crew leader for the county.

The job will be done in three stages, the crew leader said. First will come recruitment and training of enumerators to count all farms in the county. About one enumerator for each 150 farms will be needed.

Shortly after Nov. 9, the Bureau of the Census, an agency of the U. S. Department of Commerce, will start the second stage by mailing agricultural census questionnaires to all rural boxholders in the county. This will give farm and ranch operators, who are required by law to fill out the forms, a period of time to consult their records and fill in answers to the questions.

In the final stage, enumerators will visit each farm in the county to collect the questionnaires. At the time of this visit, the enumerators will help farmers complete answers to any questions the farmers may have had difficulty with. Enumerators will take about three weeks to complete their work, the crew leader estimates.

Services Held in Baird for Two Teenagers Killed in Auto Crash

Rites for two Baird teenagers killed in an automobile accident Monday near Abilene, were held in Baird, with burial in Ross Cemetery under direction of Godfrey Funeral Home.

Killed were Bobby Don Atwood and Charles Donovan Saunders, both 18 and students in Baird High School. Jimmy Lynn Ault, 17, and also Baird High student, was seriously injured in the mishap and is in Abilene's Hendrick Memorial Hospital.

Services for Saunders were at 3 p. m. Wednesday in the Baird Church of Christ with the minister, Dick Marceau, officiating. Military graveside rites were conducted by the Naval Reserve unit from Abilene.

Atwood's services were at 3 p. m. Thursday in First Baptist Church of Baird with the pastor, the Rev. Richard Lewis, officiating.

The three were en route to a Navy Reserve drill in Abilene at the time of the accident. An apparent blowout caused the car to skid out of control, striking a concrete culvert on Old Highway 80, some five miles east of Abilene.

Investigating officers said Ault was driver of the car. Saunders, son of Mr. and Mrs. Uthell Saunders, was a sophomore in Baird High School. He was born May 7, 1946.

Surviving, in addition to his parents, are three sisters, Mrs. Darlene Nisle of Okinawa and Sandra and Sheila Saunders, both of Baird; a brother Jimmy of Baird; and his grandmother, Mrs. Letha Shelton of Baird.

Pallbearers were Dyer Windham, James Jaggars, Brent Hughes, Maxie Gordon, Wayne Morrow and Robert Noneth. Baird High sophomores were honorary pallbearers.

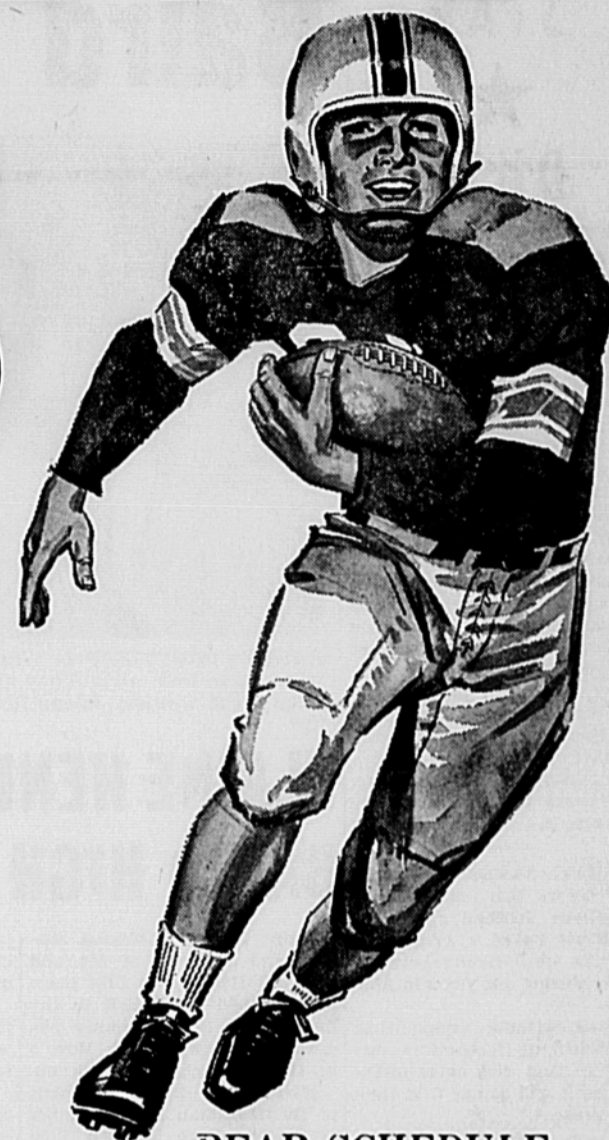
Atwood, son of Mrs. Viola Atwood, was a Baird High senior. He was born July 19, 1946.

New Veterans Pension Law to Aid Those in Lower Income Bracket

Older veterans in the lower income brackets will be able to receive at least \$100 a month through the new law liberalizing veterans pensions and providing basic cost of living increase to most pensioners, including widows and children, according to Glyndon Hague, manager of the Waco Veterans Administration Region Office.

The new law, signed by President Johnson Oct. 13, becomes effective Jan. 1.

The law provides basic cost of living increases of 6.4 per cent to most pensioners, higher increases for those with greatest need, and the greatest increases as well as medical benefits, to the most severely disabled veterans.

The last category includes those who are permanently housebound and who are blind or need constant aid and attendance.

Hague pointed out that the law also liberalizes the definition of "income" which veterans or their dependants may receive and still be eligible for pension.

Persons who were on the pension roll prior to July 1, 1960, and receive pension payments under what is called the "old system" are not eligible to benefits for the new pension increases.

To become eligible for the new increases they can notify the VA

of their wish to elect pension benefits under the current pension law which went into effect July 1, 1960 as Public Law 86-211.

Hague said many pensioners are expected to make this election.

While the new law does not change the monetary income limitations which were set up in 1960, it allows recipients to exclude certain monies when reporting annual income as required by law.

These new exclusions are:

1. 10 per cent of the payments to an individual under any public or private annuity or retirement plan, including social security pension.
2. Amounts paid by a veteran for the last illness and burial of his spouse or child.
3. Profit realized from sale of real estate or personal property other than in the course of business.
4. Payments received for jury duty.
5. Payments under the war orphan education assistance act.
6. State bonuses paid to veterans.
7. Exclusion of all of a spouse earned income, or \$1200 of her income whichever is most advantageous.

Under the new law permanent-

ly housebound veterans may receive an extra \$35 a month.

Also under the new law, veterans who are blind or need constant aid and attendance of another person will receive an increase from \$70 to \$100 in their monthly allowance.

The new law permits the VA to furnish physician prescribed drugs and medicines to veterans who receive the aid and attendance allowance and to increase from \$35 to \$38 per month the death pension paid a child where there is no widow.

The VA will automatically adjust payments to those now eligible and will notify others of their possible entitlement. Hague said that the increased amounts will be contained in checks received on or about Feb. 1.

McCurdy-Blair Field Gets Third Well Completion for Callahan

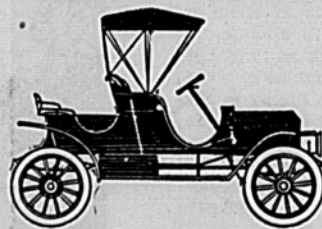

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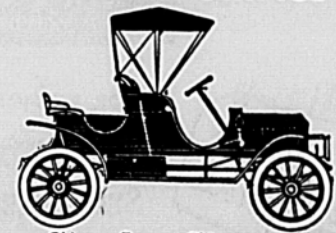
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McCurdy-Blair Field Gets Third Well Completion for Callahan

Third well has been completed in the McCurdy-Blair, East (Mississippi) Field three miles southwest of Baird.

The oiler is Oil & Gas Property Management, Inc., of Fort Worth No. 1 Gene L. Harris. Location is 660 feet from the north and 330 feet from the west

lines of Block 24, Victoria CSL Survey 336.

No. 1 Harris had a daily potential of 134.17 barrels of 41 gravity oil. Flow was through a 14-64-inch choke with packer set on the casing and 375 pounds tubing pressure.

It is producing from 634 perforations at 4,529-50 feet, treated with 5,000 gallons of acid. The 4 1/2-inch casing is set at 4,579 feet and the hole bottomed at 4,580. Gas-oil ratio was 1,863-1.

Location is one-third mile southwest of the firm's No. 1 C. H. Latimer, wildcat re-entry completed as the field opener.

R. H. Andrews Cisco, No. 9 J. S. Hart was completed as a water injection well in the regular field 10 miles north of

Putnam. Site is 750 feet from the north and 2,050 feet from the west lines of Section 6, D&DA Survey.

The 4 1/2-inch casing is set at 409 feet and the hole bottomed at 420 feet.

Laco Oil Co., Abilene, staked No. 7-A High Ross in the EGN (King Sand) Field two miles northwest of Baird.

Having to proposed depth of 1,700 feet with rotary, it spots 100 feet from the north and 680 feet from the west lines of Section 103, BBB&C Survey.

Site is 1,220 feet from the south and 680 feet from the west lines of a 240-acre lease. The field presently has four wells.

Dixon Drilling Co., of Abilene has completed two gas wells in northwest Callahan County.

No. 1-B Gayle Dyer Akers is a Moran Sand gas discovery 6 miles northwest of Clyde. Location is 46 feet from the north and 2,280 feet from the east lines of Section 77, Block 8, SP Survey.

The strike had an absolute, open flow of 9,900,000 cubic feet of dry gas daily.

Production was from four perforations per foot at 3,386-90 feet after 5,000 pounds of sand oil treatment. The 4 1/2-inch casing is set at 3,477 feet, total depth.

Dixon No. 1 Buelah Dyer was completed as a Moran Sand gas well one-half mile south of the discovery. No. 1 Dyer is 467 feet from the north and 2,900 feet from the east lines of Section 39, BBB&C Survey.

The outpost had an absolute open flow of 665,000 cubic feet of gas, plus seven barrels of distillate daily. Production was from four perforations per foot at 3,434-3 feet after 5,000 pounds of sand oil treatment.

The 4 1/2-inch casing is set at 3,623 feet, total depth.

Lone Star Gas Co. has connections for both wells.

Laco Oil Co. of Abilene completed a regular field well 15 miles southeast of Abilene. It is No. 7 Mrs. Max L. Logan Estate, 2,556 feet from the north and 220 feet from the west lines of Section 28, BBB&C Survey.

Daily potential was 19.04 barrels of 40.6 gravity oil, plus 30 per cent water. It is pumping from an open hole at 1,488-96 feet.

Laco Oil Co., filed application to re-enter to 1,850 feet to test the Cook Sand at a regular filed project one-half mile southeast of Eula.

It is No. 1 Carl Ingram, located on a 54.80 acre lease. Location is 1,050 feet from the north and 1,650 feet from the west lines of Section 22, BBB&C Survey.

The venture was originally drilled as WES-TEX No. 1 Jeff Boyd, and plugged at 1,911 feet.

B. L. Hoover of Pampa completed a regular field well five miles southwest of Cross Plains. The oiler is No. 1-A A. R. Cavanaugh, 200 feet from the south and east lines of Block 47, Comal CSL Survey 181.

Staked as a proposed 550-foot rotary venture in the regular field five miles southwest of Cross Plains was F. O. Calvert, Cleburne, No. 2 F. W. Stacy.

Site is 150 feet from the north and 1,074 feet from east lines of Section 43, Comal CSL Survey 181.

R. R. Bloomer and Skinner Corp., Abilene, staked No. 5 Mrs. Max Logan in the regular field seven miles southwest of Clyde.

The planned 1,550-foot rotary Moutray Sand venture spots 2,058 feet from the north and 220 feet from the west lines of Section 23, BBB&C Survey.

It is 288 feet from the north and 220 feet from the west lines of a 60 acre lease.

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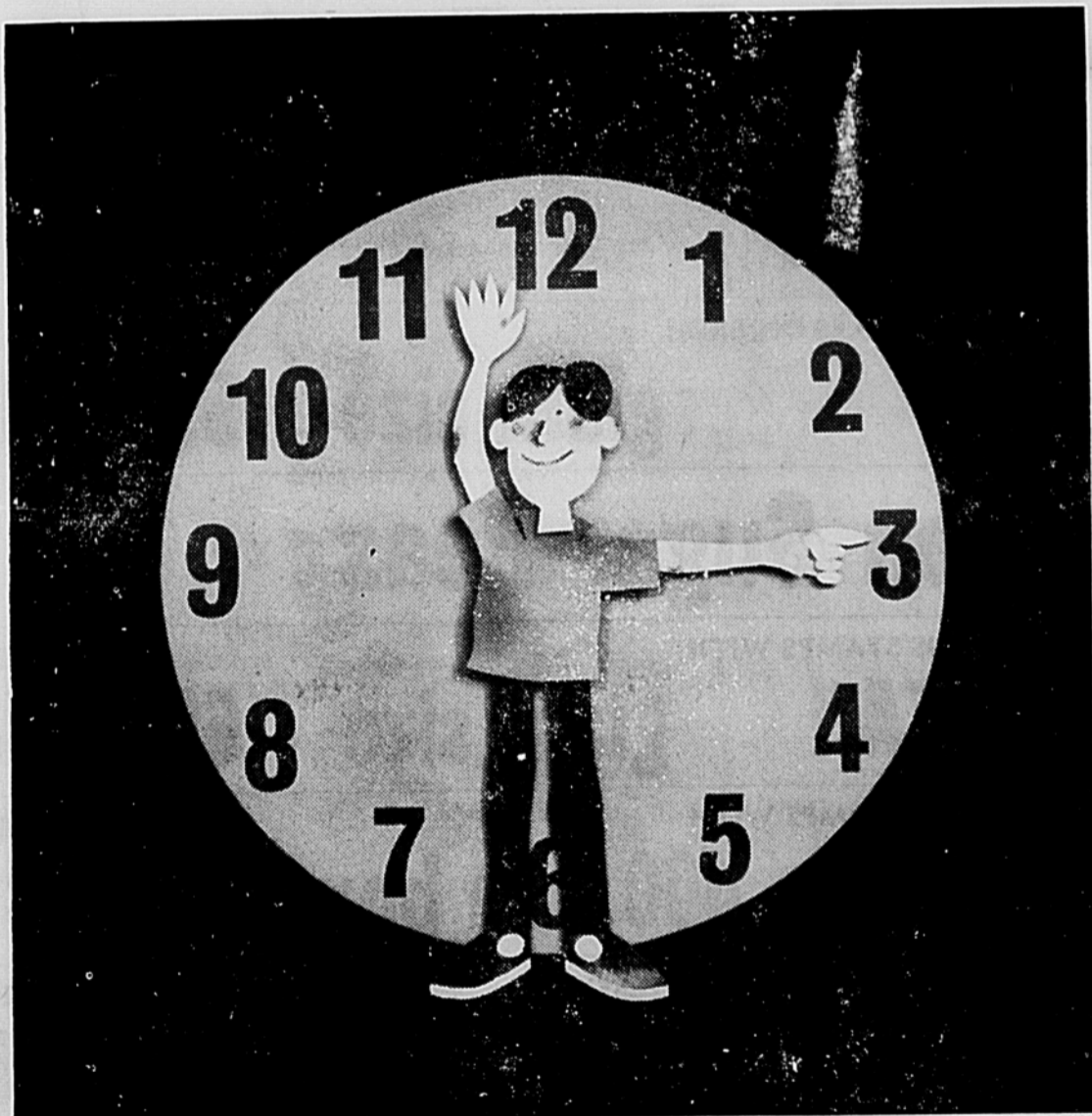
