## Funeral Services For Joe Drerup At Nazareth Mon.

Joseph A. Drerup, age 28, was stricken with appendicitis April 4, and submitted to an operation on the same day at the Tulsa hospital. He was relieved of his earthly suffering at 11:45 Friday morning.

Joseph was the son of Frank H. and Mary Drerup. He was a respected and prominent young man of the Nazareth community. He was born at Glendorf, Ohio, on Oct. 6, 1906. Later the family moved to Castro county, Texas, where he resided with his parents until the time of his death.

He was a third degree member of the Knights of Columbus and a member of the Holy Name Society. An abundance of friends mourned his unexpected death.

He was survived by his parents and four sisters, Mrs. Joseph B. Schulte of Columbus Grove, Ohio, Mrs. Harry F. Britten of Groom, Texas, Mrs. Alfred Schacher of Nazareth, Texas, and Lucy Drerup of Nazareth. He is also survived by two brothers, Frank and Edward, both of Nazareth. One brother and two sisters preceded him in death.

Requiem High Mass was sung by the Nazareth choir.

Funeral services were conducted Monday at 9 a. m. at the Holy Family church at Nazareth by Rev. Alphonse Bock O. S. B. Interment was made at the Nazareth cemetery.

## New Relief Set-Up Requires Special Auditing System

The complete termination of CWA activities on April first placed the burden of supplying relief to indigent families of Texas on the shoulders of the following programs to be conducted by the Texas Relief Commission: Work Division (work relief), Direct Relief, the Subsistence Homesteads and the Rural Rehabilitation Projects.

The successful carrying out of these programs in Castro County has entailed the creation and installation of a materially changed accounting system. The new system, known as the Donnell installed system of relief accounting, was made up under the supervision of George R. Donnell, Auditor of the Texas Relief Commission.

Of particular interest in the new set-up is the new "work relief card" which will enable the administration to properly supervise the "work division activities." Those unemployed, who are actually destitute and are physically able to work, will be given the opportunity to earn up to their estimated relief needs.

Staff auditors J. M. Ralston and W. C. Orr conferred with R. W. Dent and his administrative personnel in Amarillo last week concerning the relief set-up in Castro county. Thos. F. Bice has taken charge of the new accounting system in Castro county under the local administration of Mr. Dent.

Chief Auditor Donnell emphasizes that this is a relief program, not a project program. Under the CWA group employment was provided which approximated current business wages, whereas the present relief program can only supply relief to the destitute.

## Emergency Crop Loans Available

Farmers seeking loans from the \$40,000,000 Emergency crop loan fund are requested to see Mrs. M. Headley who is the official application taker in Castro county.

The rules and regulations governing Emergency crop loans are as follows: Before any applicant may make application for this loan, he must first get a certificate of co-operation from the County Production Council at the County Agent's office.

Any farmer seeking a loan up to \$150 may apply direct to the Emergency crop loan office at Dimmitt.

Applicants applying for a loan of \$150 or over must first make application to the Plainview Production Credit Association. If he is not eligible for a loan from this agency he will be given a letter of rejection addressed to the Emergency Crop Loan office. The borrower presents this letter of rejection to the application taker of the Emergency crop loan office and the farmer may then make application for an Emergency crop loan.

Loans will be limited to \$250 to any one farmer, based on \$2.50 per acre on grain crops and \$3 per acre on cotton.

The government is requiring an absolute first lien on all crops growing, planted or to be grown and harvested in 1934.

No loans will be made to any applicant who has a means of livelihood other than farming.

No loans will be made to minors, executors, administrators, agents, corporations or partnerships.

All farmers who are seeking this loan are requested to come on and get this money now while the getting is good, as April 30th will be the last day applications will be accepted.

The Crop Loan office in Dallas is now giving 24 hour service on approving applications and getting the money to the farmers.

All farmers are especially requested to get their complete land description, as this is very important, before making out the application.

## NEWS EDITOR HAS ARTICLE IN WEST TEXAS C. C. JOURNAL

The current issue of West Texas Today carries an article entitled "Little Fellow," by W. W. Hick Halcomb, editor of The Castro County News.

West Texas Today is the official monthly magazine of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

The article has to do with the alleged waste of natural gas in the Panhandle field. It is an answer to an article which appeared in the magazine last month and which presented the picture from the viewpoint of the Panhandle Conservation Association.

The Panhandle Conservation Association is a group of large pipeline operators, large land owners receiving special benefits and others directly interested in the large gas pipelines which transport gas to midwestern cities leaving no profits and practically no taxes in Texas.

Their efforts are in the direction of repeal of the "sour gas" law which permits independent operators to make a little profit rather than be drained by the monopolies.

There is, of course, tremendous waste in the huge Panhandle gas field. Gas is going into the air every day and it cannot be replaced. But the independents contend that it is better to waste it that way than to waste it by virtue of permitting some of the big outfits to literally drain their properties dry. There is a State Senate investigating committee looking into the matter now.

### "Lobbyists Must Be Controlled," Jim Allred Says

Opening his campaign for Governor of Texas in his old boyhood home of Bowie, Montague county, James V. Allred, last Monday afternoon took advantage of the occasion to tell Texans of the dangers that existed under the present system of permitting the professional lobbyists to operate unrestrained.

Allred was emphatic in stating that if he were elected he would demand passage of an adequate lobby law free of loop-holes and "jokers!"

"So long as paid lobbyists of certain predatory interests are allowed to carry on, without regulation of their practices during legislative sessions, we will make no progress whatever in dealing with the problems of the people," Jimmie said. "Under corporations influence a system of lobbying has grown up which is a menace to free government."

No criminal cases were tried this week, as the docket was clear prior to the return of the indictments above mentioned.

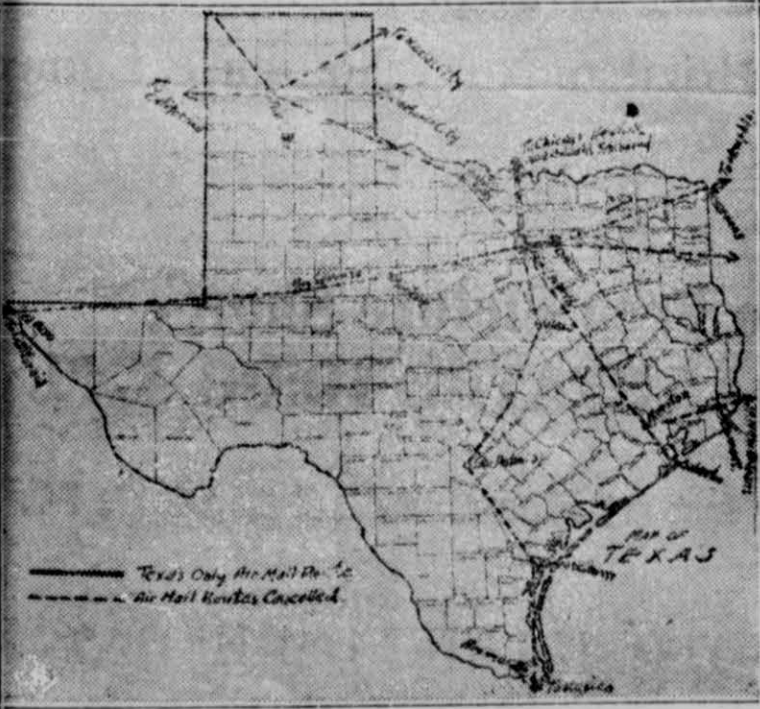

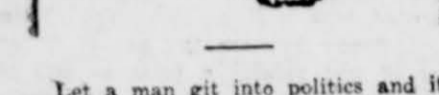
