

The affirmative side of the question was defended by Jack Isaacks and Roland Perry, while the negative side was championed by Tom Patterson and Straughan Cowden. Each speaker was allowed ten minutes for his first speech and four minutes for rebuttal, and the leader of the affirmative was allowed three minutes for rejoinder.

The boys showed by the way in which they handled the subject that they had given 'deep and accurate study to the question in all its intricacies. Their first speeches were comprehensive and logical, and their rebuttals showed that their work had taught them the possibilities of the question and that their practice in debate in their debating clubs had made them ready in rejoinder. Each boy spoke with such force and enthusiasm that the audience quickly caught an interest not only in the work of the boys but also in the question itself. In delivery and in the handling of the subject each boy reflected great credit upon himself, and o praise one is to praise all.

In accordance with the decision of the judges, Jack Isaacks, winner of first place, was presented with five dollars in gold by President F. G. Jones, of Midland College, on behalf of Wight & Anthony. Tom Patterson, winner of second place, was presented with a check of three dollars by Judge Isaacks, on behalf of the Midland High School Literary Society. Senior Declamation Contests

On Thursday afternoon a large and enthusiastic crowd gathered in the auditorium of the Christian, church to witness the senior declamation contests, one for the boys and one for the girls, of the high school. The applause accorded to each speaker seemed in itself ample reward for the prodigious efforts and the long time spent in perfecting the orations. As an inspiring prelude to the contests a beautiful piano solo was rendered by Lorene Edwards and a well interpreted and sweetly sung vocal solo was rendered by Jean Mackinzie, two high school seniors. As an interlude between the two contests, four members of the faculty, J. E. Nelson, N. Y. Henry, W. W. Lackey and E. P. Hornady, sang a beautiful male quartet, 'The Guiding Star," by Bierly. Each speaker, both in the girls' contest and in the boys' contest, showed great skill in delivery, indicating nuch practice and pains taking effort n training for these contests.

While the judges were making up their decisions, the audience was favorder with a rich bass solo by E. P. Hornady, "Asleep in the Deep," and a delightful two-part song, "The Land of Dreams," by the girls' choral club of the high school. Mr. Hornady declined to respond to the hearty en-
