

Property Exchanges Lead City's Report

With fifteen changes in ownership in city property, the property exchange has edged upward from the 12 recorded during the past two months in Friona and doubles the seven as recorded in February in the county clerk's office in Farwell.

According to the city report as issued during the first week of July, 87 delinquent tax statements were mailed on June 5 and as a result, \$389.76 was collected.

There were also 119 delinquent water accounts and four cut-offs were made. All but five came in and paid; the five were carried over, due mostly to persons being on vacation, said the report.

Four new residences and a

commercial building were on the building permits for the month of June for a total of \$181,000. The four residences were estimated at \$146,000 and Circle K Food Service received a permit for \$35,000.

Three purchase orders and 102 work orders were processed and eight requests were made for tree limb removal; four for trash and five dog complaints received.

On June 12, Jim Mormon, Texas Municipal Retirement System, visited the city office and discussed the possible participation of the City of Friona in the retirement system.

During the month of June, 35,164,800 gallons of water were pumped and 27,028,000 gallons were accounted for in sales. City Manager Arley Outland said this indicated 76.9 percent efficiency in the distribution system. The figures indicate an average of 1,172,160 gallons used per day, and up around 30 percent over the same time last month.

Three new water taps were made during June bringing the total within the city to 1,306 and the fire hydrant at Ninth and Prospect was replaced because of leakage.

Through a cost sharing plan with Crow's Food Lockers, 1,030 feet of six inch water main was extended south of the railway to the Crow business to provide the locker with adequate water supplies.

A total of 6,864,144 gallons of wastewater were processed during June. This was an average of 228,804 gallons per day and is comparable to the amount handled during May. Two new sewer taps and one reactivation were made during the period of June and now the active sewer taps in Friona number 1,272.

Eight fire alarms were answered during the month. Five were outside the city and three inside. The only loss reported was to the Joe Guerra residence west of Hub, at a loss of \$10,000.

During training in June, firemen held a sectionalized session on Maintenance, Ladder operations, use of Pumping and Breathing equipment. Also new protective clothing was issued the firemen.

The Friona water distribution system was checked by a representative of the State Board of Fire Insurance, and following the testing, he approved the water distribution and fire-fighting system.

Three adult interments were held at the cemetery during June and the park was watered twice and mowed during the month.

Rain on June 12-13 caused a slight increase in routine maintenance and grading, and street sweeping was done on four days.

During the latter part of the month, members of the street department assisted the water department.

Two aerial sprays with Baytex solution were made on June 15 and 24th by Bengier Air Park. This is a new larvaicide which is expected to control mosquitos much better than weekly dustings, said City Manager Outland.

The mayor, city manager and fire chief attended a meeting in Hereford on June 5, in which K.B. 'Tex' Watson, president of Pioneer Natural Gas, outlined potential natural gas problems in the future.

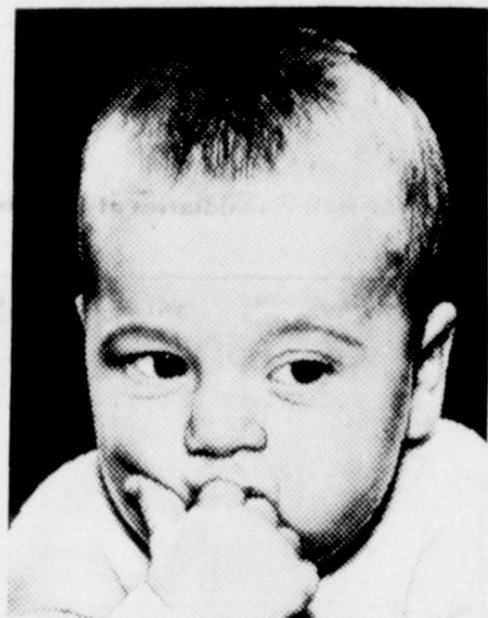





**At Home In

IMPROPER CARE of chicken, summer's menu delight, can result in poisoning.

Many shoppers don't realize how important it is to store, cook and handle poultry carefully.

Food poisoning can mean diarrhea, nausea, abdominal pain and vomiting—not a very pleasant situation.

What many people sometimes assume is a 24-hour virus is frequently an attack of salmonellosis—an infection of the intestinal tract caused by salmonella bacteria which have contaminated foods such as fresh meat, poultry, fish, eggs and dairy products.

Homemakers can follow eight steps to avoid this illness.

—Refrigerate poultry and other perishable foods to be used within a few days at 35-40 degrees F. For longer storage, freeze poultry.

—Clean all surfaces on which raw poultry was prepared. Treat wooden cutting boards that absorb juices with chlorine laundry bleach after washing. Never place cooked food on surface used to prepare raw poultry unless you've carefully cleaned it.

—Wash knives, spoons, other utensils, dishes—and hands—after contact with raw poultry. —Defrost poultry in refrigerator. If you must thaw it more quickly, put poultry in a waterproof plastic bag, seal tightly and place under running cold water.

—For turkey, cook to an internal temperature of 185 degrees F. Never partially cook and finish cooking later. On stuffing, do so right before roasting.

—Heat poultry leftovers until they are HOT throughout. Bring gravy to a full rolling boil.

—Never allow cooked poultry to stand at room temperature after serving, as food may not be safe to eat if held more than an hour or two at temperatures where food poisoning bacteria grow rapidly—and that includes preparation, storage and serving time.

—A good rule—keep hot foods hot (above 140 degrees F.) and cold foods cold (below 40 degrees F.)

This prevents bacteria like salmonella from growing.

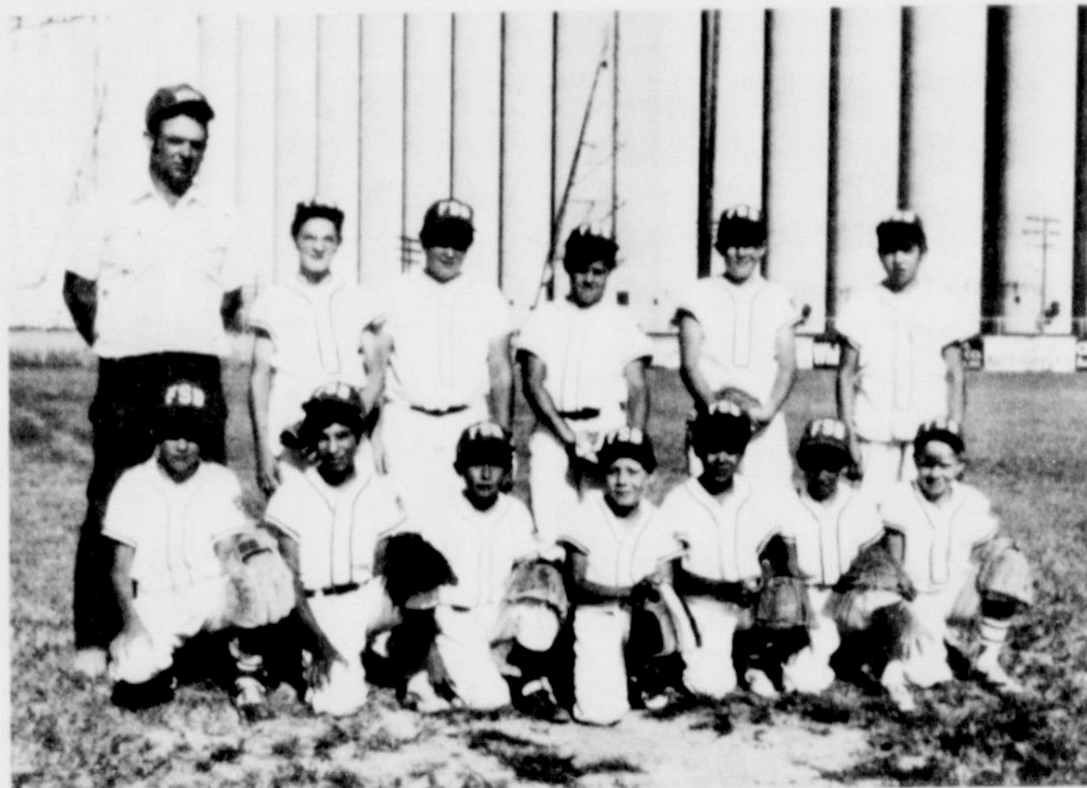
