OFFICIALS OPTIMISTIC

Local UF Drive Now In Full Swing

The Friona High School Chieftains are off to one of their best starts in years--and prospects seem to look up as the season goes along.

Following the loss to Muleshoe, the spirit drooped slightly. However, the next week, Muleshoe walloped Littlefield, 42-14, and the Chiefs white-washed Springlake, 47-0, and things took on a new perspective.

Halfback Louis Lee, who was hurt in the Muleshoe game, re-joined the team this week, and could be available for duty Friday.

This week's opponent, Dalhart, will be a suitable "final tuneup" for district play.

With four or five boys on the 1972 Chieftain team who are capable of scoring whenever they carry the ball, it is an exciting team to watch. If you haven't seen the team play, then you should go out this Friday. Football and Indian Summer weather is an unbeatable combination.

We suspect that the heightened interest in football in Friona High School is at least partly responsible for the increased interest in our annual football contest.

The second week of the contest set an all-time record with a total of 231 entries. We've also had 227 and 221 on other weeks, and although it finally dropped below 200, the fifth week found 195 still in the contest.

There are not many people dropping out of the contest, which is proving to be the most competitive we have had.

So competitive is the contest that the present leader, "Judge" Barker has correctly picked 63 of 79 possible games, a "cool" average of 80 percent accuracy. And he just has a one-point lead.

Last Friday night must have set some sort of record as far as Homecoming games were concerned for Parmer County football teams. The three largest schools, Friona, Bovina and Farwell, each were observing Homecoming. The fourth, Lazbuddie, played at Amherst's Homecoming, having had their own a week earlier.

For the record, Friona and Lazbuddie won, while Bovina and Farwell were losing. Everything else being equal, there should have been a record number of corsages sold in Parmer County during the week of October 5.

Pretty soon, a large segment of the nation will find out what high school "football fever" is like in Texas.

A producing company from New York has been in Brownwood and Iowa Park for the past month to film a feature-length documentary on high school football. The documentary centers on the Brownwood-Iowa Park game this Friday.

In the meantime, the story has come out that the New York filming crews have become "caught up" in the football fever, so that the crew in Brownwood is rooting for that team to win, and the crew in Iowa Park is all for the Hawks.

"At first, when we came to Texas to shoot this film, we were uninvolved with everything except producing a documentary. Now things have changed. We have been caught in the 'Texas Football Fever' and also in the warmth of the Texas people," said Jeff King, co-producer of the film.

Don Pierce, the other producer, says "Texas high school football is like nothing else in the country. We want the rest of the country to be able to live, as we have been doing for the last month, through a season of high school football."

We'll have to watch for this documentary. Sounds like it should be good.

One more note on football (perhaps we should submit this column to the New York people, if they need any further proof of how we West Texans go for football--)

Noting in the press box last Friday that after he had the privilege of escorting homecoming queen candidate Carol Reeve prior to the game, in which he scored three touchdowns and had 215 yards rushing, one of the press box "officials" suggested that we allow Bartlett to escort Miss Reeve prior to every game.

The Friona Area United Fund kicked off its 1972 drive Tuesday, as city and rural zone chairmen and the Fund's executive committee laid plans for the drive at a kickoff breakfast.

Cecil Maddox told the group that he thought that with a little harder push the local goal of \$5800 could be realized this year. The fund drive has come up short of its goal the past two or three years.

Zone Chairmen are being asked to find block chairmen and work their areas as quickly as possible, and turn in their money by Saturday of this week.

Maddox and Baker Duggins are co-chairmen of the 1972 drive. Andy Hurst, assisted by Hollis Horton, was in charge of the advance drive.

Byron Hardgrove is serving as city drive chairman. Wesley Foster is in charge of the business area downtown, and Charles Allen is contacting the businesses on Highway 60.

Rural workers include Mrs. Bill Brandt, Rhea; Mrs. Billy Dean Baxter, Hub; Otho Whitefield, Lakeview; Mrs. Ellis Tatum, Black; Bob Riethmayer and Grady Nelson, south of town, and Ralph Wilson, west of town.

Allen, who is chairman of the United Fund's local executive committee, pointed out that Friona's per-capita giving to United Fund for the past few years has been among the lowest in the state, standing at around 20 cents per capita.

It was also suggested that residents refrain from contributing to other individual drives, in order to persuade these drives to join the United

Fund and make the UF truly a "one-time effort" for all charities.

Agencies which currently benefit from the fund drive, and the amounts they are slated to receive from the 1972 drive, are as follows:

Boy Scouts--\$1500; Girl Scouts--\$1560; Red Cross--\$1200; Salvation Army--\$900; USO--\$125; Texas United Fund--\$50 and local emergency fund--\$465.

Donors may make their checks payable to any of the particular funds if they wish, or omit any of the six agencies.

Building Tops \$90,000 Here In September

Figures released this month by City Manager A.L. (Jake) Outland showed that seven building permits were issued by the City of Friona during the month of September, amounting to a total of \$92,700.

Four of the building permits were for new residences, amounting to \$91,500 of the total. Three additions/alterations added \$1,200 to the total.

The city received \$10,336.48 from the state comptroller's office on September 28, as the city's share of the sales tax for the second quarter.

Four new water taps were made during September, bringing the number of active taps to 1,295. Five new sewer taps were made, making 1,260 active services in this department.

Dalhart, 3-1 Should Prove Good Primer

The Dalhart Wolves are expected to furnish an appropriate team for the final non-district warmup game for Friona's Chieftains on Friday.

The game, set for Chieftain Field, will begin at 8 p.m. Dalhart brings a low-scoring defensive-minded team, which has a 3-1 season record. The Wolves have scored only 38 points for the season, compared to Friona's 132, but have given up only 30, to Friona's 40.

However, the Chieftains (4-1) have played one more game than Dalhart has.

The teams have met no common opponents, but will have by the season's end, as Dalhart

blanked neighboring Dimmitt, 12-0 last Friday.

Dalhart's largest score has been 16 points, in a 16-14 win over Tucumcari. The Wolves also edged Stinnett, 10-9 for their other win. Dalhart fell to Guymon, Okla., in their season opener, 7-0--a game their regular starting quarterback had to miss.

"We feel that personnel-wise, the two teams are about equal, and that the team which makes the fewest mistakes will probably win," says Chieftain head coach Bob Owen.

Owen said he hoped that the Chieftain defense could hold the Wolves, and that the offense

could move the ball.

The Friona coach said that Dalhart was basically a running team, although they could pass when necessary. They also have better than average speed, as seen in the fact that both of the Wolves' scores against Dimmitt came on long (over 50 yard) runs.

Tailback Pete Priestley scored both of Dalhart's TDs against Dimmitt, and he is termed "one of the top individual athletes in the Panhandle" by Coach Owen.

Friona will be at near peak strength for the contest. Halfback Louis Lee, who was in-

Vote Potential All-Time High

Several late registrations brought Parmer County's voting potential up to 3,967 as of the deadline prior to the November 7 election, County Tax Assessor-Collector Hugh Moseley said this week.

The number, which is easily an all-time record for the county, is almost 50 percent more registered voters than the county had in 1968, the last presidential election, when a total of 2,689 were registered.

However, there are still some 40 percent of the county's population of age 18 and over who did not register, despite the new record.

Las Escarbas Old XIT Headquarters Given To Texas Tech Museum

Fifth Division Headquarters of the sprawling XIT Ranch, Las Escarbas, an old two story stone building located on land owned by Reinauer Brothers Land and Cattle Company, was donated in an official ceremony last Saturday to the Texas Tech Museum Ranch Headquarters.

The old headquarters building is located 20 miles northwest of Friona. Since the structure is in poor condition, the owners felt that by donating it to the museum, it could be repaired and preserved. As a part of the Ranch Headquarters outdoor museum of the ranching industry, the building will be the museum's largest exhibit.

A gift represents Joe F. Reinauer Sr., of Hereford, John G. Reinauer and the late Fred Reinauer of Oklahoma City. A donation of \$50,000 was also given by the family of the late Monroe B. Sawyer and his wife, the late Rebecca S. Sawyer, to restore the building.

The \$50,000 gift was pledged for restoration of Las Escarbas as a memorial to the Sawyers who were early Texas pioneers.

Las Escarbas was constructed in the late 1880's. It has two fireplaces, and is built of natural materials: caliche blocks, stone and wood, and it is partially overcoated with stucco.

The name in Spanish means "the scrapings," and comes from 19th Century Comancheros who obtained water there by scraping shallow holes in the bottom of nearby Tierra Blanca Draw.

Joe Reinauer Sr. bought the land from the Alice Walker estate, making his first purchase of 8,000 acres in 1941. His total ranch eventually was 18,000 acres, and the two-story Las Escarbas remained its headquarters house for some years after his purchase.

The donation of Las Escarbas was made as a part of the observance of Ranch Day in Texas, as proclaimed by Governor Preston Smith.

With his brother, John G. Reinauer, of Oklahoma City, Joe Reinauer Sr. explained that the decision to give the structure to the Ranch Headquarters was a "happy" choice because it allows for restoration and preservation of the historic building.

"We think what we did was the best thing to do," said Joe Reinauer of the decision to give Las Escarbas to the Tech museum. "It can be preserved forever--we hope to be able to have the support of the community on this decision."

To be placed next to the Tech museum, the Las Escarbas exhibit will cover from five to six acres of land. Texas Tech is interested in acquiring furnishings for the building now.

Fred Robert Reinauer was a German immigrant to the United States, who settled first in Wisconsin and then homesteaded in Oklahoma. He was the father of John G., Fred, and Joe F. Reinauer.

In 1935 Joe R. Reinauer Sr. left Oklahoma and came to the Hereford area where in 1941 he purchased the 8,000 acres which contained Las Escarbas.

His operations eventually became the Reinauer Brothers Land & Cattle Company. Holding interest in it now are Joe Reinauer Sr., his son, Joe Reinauer Jr., and the elder Reinauer's brother, John G. Reinauer of Oklahoma City, and the widow of his brother, Fred; Mrs. Mae Reinauer, also of Oklahoma City.

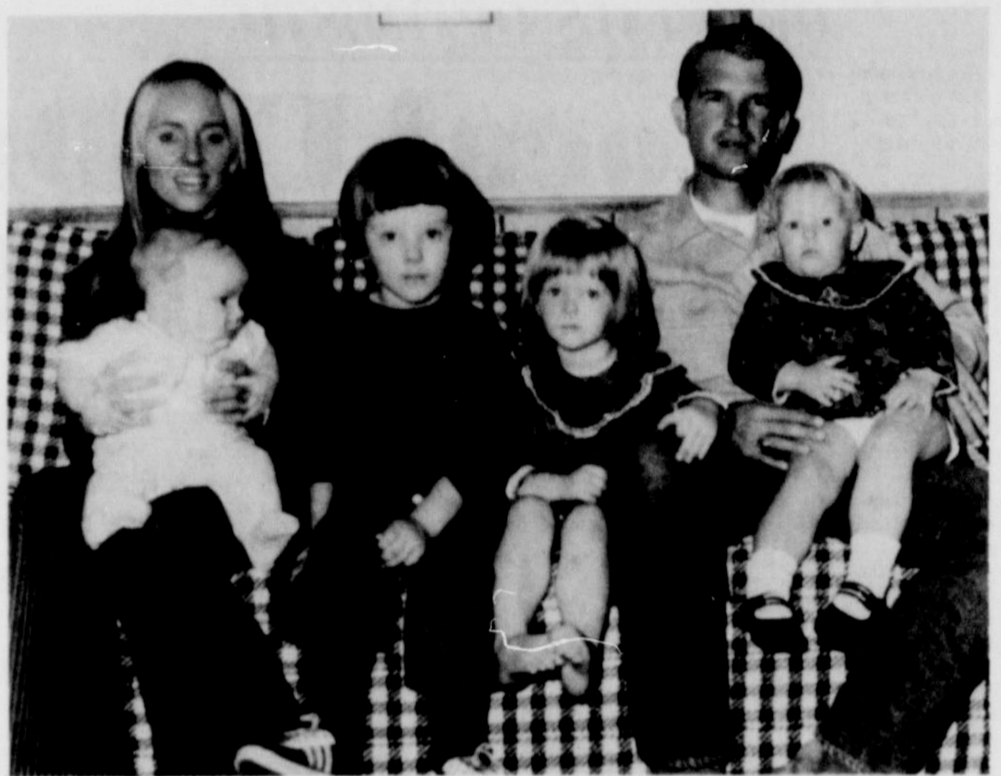

I read a little story that came to me by way of a church paper from Seminole, Texas, who got it from "The Texas Presbyterian" and others had seen it in a church paper from Abilene and one in Houston.

"America is God's Crucible, the great Melting-Pot where all the races of Europe are melting and re-forming."

This quote from Israel Zangwill's drama "The Melting Pot" describes the real source of American strength.

The driving force that has caused the United States to become one of the world's leading nations did not originate in any single country, nor was it brought about by any individual group of political or religious zealots.

A quick review of American history will show several ethnic and spiritual backgrounds all striving to present to the World a nation of peace and freedom.

Along the two hundred year road mistakes have been made--plenty of them: however these errors are shared by all concerned, no one ethnic group has been at fault.

Every important document, every heartbreaking war and every step forward from 'sloughs of despond,' all have been due to shoulder to shoulder work by people of vastly different backgrounds.

The Melting Pot that Zangwill portrayed in his drama of 1908 described the advantages of cooperative effort by millions of people who gave their best to achieve a common goal.

He had no quarrel with a person respecting his ethnic customs or beliefs.

He is remembered chiefly for his writings and lectures concerning Zionism.

Born in London, England, of Jewish parents he spent his adult life in attempting to explain the need of a homeland for the Jewish people.

He never lived to witness the establishment of modern Israel, but he would have been the first to acknowledge that its formation was brought about by a worldwide program.

We Americans may be justly proud of our many backgrounds. To feel pride in being descended from freedom loving Europeans, or Asians, or Africans, or any other race or culture is a noble thing.

We need feel no shame because of our humble beginnings; the great task ahead should be our chief concern.

There are present in today's world forces that play upon differences in people.

The principle of "divide and conquer" motivates our enemies who realize that a truly United America will never fall. We are not Afro-Americans, nor Spanish-Americans, nor English-Americans, nor even Indian-Americans.

We are Americans, "One Nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

From the "Crucible of God" we have been given a skeleton of steel, let's not defile it with muscles of wax!

40 YEARS AGO--OCTOBER 12, 1932

The action, taken at a meeting in the Hotel Jim Hill at Hereford October 2, was a followup of recommendations made at recent county meetings in the district. Only one dissenting report was presented against the well permit and spacing action. Farmer County farmers, Committeeman Bruce Parr reported, are opposed to any rule which would limit their freedom in drilling wells.

10 YEARS AGO--OCTOBER 11, 1962

It was a case of "almost but not quite" for the Friona Chiefs in their bid to snap the 21-game losing streak at FHS last Friday. The Chiefs, who visibly were out to beat the unbeaten Happy Cowboys, didn't make many mistakes, but the ones they made were costly, and Happy was able to avoid the upset and remain unbeaten, 24-20. The game produced Friona's biggest point production of the season and best offensive showing.

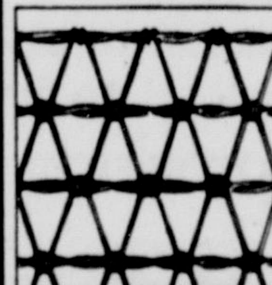

Williams states that about 28 per cent of all private letters are not using zip codes and this is very important as the letter sorting machines that are now in use route mail by use of a punch key that sorts mail at the rate of 30,000 letters per hour if zip codes are on the mail.

This, compared to hand sorting with no zip codes is some 28,000 times faster per hour.

"It is very important that you use zip code and use it in your return address also so that the people you correspond with will have your zip code for their use," the postmaster said.

"We are glad at all times to furnish you with a zip code that you do not have, so feel free to call us if you need a zip code. We have zip code books at the office if you are mailing a letter and need the zip code, ask for our zip code book or we will look it up for you," he continued.

FHS Offense Rolls As Lockney Falls

Although they didn't score the points to prove it, Friona High School's Chieftains rolled up their best offensive marks of the 1972 season in downing the Lockney Longhorns, 25-6 here last Friday night.

The game climaxed Homecoming activities at FHS, Cindy Hutson was crowned as Homecoming Queen in pre-game ceremonies.

Halfback James Bartlett came up with the top individual performance of the season, scoring three touchdowns, gaining 215 yards rushing and catching a pair of passes for 57 yards, both for scores.

The Chiefs bolted from the starting gate like Olympic sprinters out to set a new world record. Bartlett raced 69 yards with a pitchout from Johnny Bandy on the first play from scrimmage, shooting Friona into a quick 6-0 lead as Kevin Wiseman's kick was low.

However, the fireworks fizzled for the Chiefs for the remainder of the half, as the team would get scoring opportunities but not cash in on them.

As a matter of fact, the team was in great shape directly following their touchdown, when Bartlett darted downfield to recover the kickoff on the Lockney 24. However, a penalty wiped out a potential first down, and the Longhorns took over.

Lockney then fumbled on its first offensive play, and Friona had the ball back at the Longhorn 23. This time a bad pitchout thwarted the scoring bid, as Wiseman's attempted field goal on fourth down never got over shoulder high.

On the team's fourth possession, Friona drove from its own 40 to a first and goal at the Lockney eight. Four plays gained a net of only two yards, however, and the score was still 6-0.

Lockney took the momentum late in the first half, driving from their 17 to the Friona 30 with 26 seconds left on the clock.

Two straight pass completions tied the score for the Longhorns with 20 seconds left in the half. A running try for points was stopped by the Chieftain defenses.

Johnny Bandy came out passing after the short kickoff gave Friona the ball at its own 39. He hit brother Clay with a 17-yard strike with 11 seconds left, and then on third down as the clock ran out, he lofted a long pass that Bartlett caught over his shoulder at about the five and sailed in for the TD. Bartlett had two defenders, but still made the catch.

Wiseman's kick was good, and Friona had scored on the first and last plays of the half for a 13-6 halftime lead that should have been much bigger.

Early in the third quarter, FHS drove to the Lockney 13, only to again lose the ball on downs. The team got the ball back, however, and set sail on a determined bid to dent the Longhorn goal, not having completed a sustained drive all night.

Finally, on a desperate fourth down try from the 13, Clay Bandy took a pitchout and lofted a pass that Bartlett caught at about the five and raced for the flag to score. Wiseman missed his second kick, but the lead became 19-6 with 15 seconds left in the third frame.

Early in the fourth, the Friona offensive line began opening wide holes, allowing Bartlett, Clay and Johnny Bandy to make sizeable gains. The team marched 80 yards in only eight plays. Mario Perea made the last two yards for the score. A running try for points was stopped, leaving the score at its final margin of 25-6 with 7:34 left in the game.

Coach Bob Owen let his reserve offense take over at this point, with Clay Bandy moving to quarterback. Neither team mounted a threat in the closing minutes, although Friona had

begun to move following a pass interception when the gun sounded.

Friona's 330 yards rushing and 426 total yards were season highs for the team, as were

Bartlett's personal totals.

The win was the ninth for Friona over Lockney against five losses, and seventh in the last nine meetings between the two schools.

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Bartlett Is Team's Individual Leader

James Bartlett is the leading rusher for the Friona High School Chieftains, according to statistics compiled through the team's first five games.

Bartlett, who missed one game (Muleshoe) leads the team with 484 net yards rushing—averaging over 100 yards-per-carry.

Louis Lee, who has played only the equivalent of two games, is second leading rusher with a total of 242 yards, and a 5.9 yards-per-carry average. Lee was injured early in the Muleshoe game and has not seen action since.

The Chieftains have rolled up good offensive totals through their first five games, amassing 1308 net yards rushing, a fine team average of five yards per carry. The team has gained a total of 1644 net yards, including 336 yards passing.

Friona leads its opponents in first downs, 89-40. The Chieftain defense has held five opponents to an average of 90 yards rushing per game and 30 yards passing.

Bovina has been held to the lowest total yardage—only ten net yards, and Muleshoe gained the most—187.

Friona's biggest total has been against Lockney—426

yards, and its least against Muleshoe—239, although the team outgained the winning Mules.

The new fiscal year began October 1, 1972. Each farmer on the GSPA mailing list will receive his membership application through the mail.

The Grain Sorghum Producers Association is the organization that has established a remarkable success story while working for the grain sorghum farmers. Its work in this direction led to the 1970 Congressional action that tied grain sorghum government price supports to corn according to nutritional value. This has given grain sorghum farmers an increase in the loan rate of 18¢ per hundredweight since 1970 and also an increase in the support payment.

Working to increase the demand for grain sorghum around the world, the Grain Sorghum Producers Association has been a leader in developing new markets for U.S. feed grains, and, in particular, for grain sorghum. By inviting teams of key feed manufacturers, buyers and specialists from foreign countries to come and visit the grain sorghum production area, GSPA has helped to make grain sorghum one of the major feed grains of the world. Production and demand has increased 800% during the last 20 years.

GSPA is a leader in research on insect and disease problems affecting grain sorghum farmers. GSPA President, A.W. Anthony, Jr., a grain and livestock producer of Friona, Texas, expressed the importance of every grain sorghum farmer's mailing his annual membership dues of only \$10.00 immediately. Anthony said, "1973 is a critical year in the life of farm pro-

grams, Congress must extend or rewrite the law since the present program expires next year. Grain sorghum farmers must be properly represented."

The Grain Sorghum Producers Association membership extends from South Texas to Nebraska, covering the major grain sorghum production area of the United States.

Anthony was recently elected by members of GSPA in Parmer County to serve as their representative on the Board of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association.

SCS News

How many dust storms will we have next year? Farmer and city folks alike might wonder why talk about dust storms in the fall of the year. The reason the SCS and the Parmer County Soil Conservation District are concerned is because of new information developed at the Big Spring Experiment Station.

The Big Spring Index, as it is called, is a method of predicting the number of days with blowing dust in West Texas. The method utilizes evaporation, precipitation and average daily wind movement for September through December to predict the number of days with blowing dust in the following calendar year. With this information steps can be taken to reduce potentially severe dust storms.

When severe dust storms are forecasted it will be possible to apply extra effort to get dust preventive conservation practices applied, such as growing cover crops, mulching with cotton burs, and leaving grain sorghum stubble on the soil surface.

These are some of the reasons why conservationist are dust storm conscious this time of the year. For more information contact the Soil Conservation Service in Friona.



On The Farm In Parmer County MACK HEAD County Agent

Cattle fever ticks have been found in several South Texas counties, and livestock producers are cautioned to be on the lookout for the costly livestock pest.

Fever ticks were first reported near Alice several weeks ago and have since spread to neighboring counties. Infested counties that are under state quarantine include Jim Wells, Duval, McMullen, Live Oak, Nueces and Brooks.

All infestations have been traced to cattle shipped from the infested herd near Alice. Therefore, cattlemen who have purchased cattle from that area are especially urged to check these animals for fever ticks.

Federal and state livestock inspectors are engaged in checking cattle herds to pinpoint infestations and initiate eradication procedures. A Cattle Fever Tick Eradication Center has been established in Alice.

Officials of the Texas Animal Health Commission have labeled the outbreak as the most serious in the last 30 years. However, eradication measures have been effective and officials believe the outbreak is under control. Should the tick infestation spread, eradication could become a long-term process due to the life cycle of the insect.

The cattle fever tick can cause a fever or disease called babesiosis or piroplasmiasis. Symptoms of the diseases are similar to anaplasmosis.

If ticks are found, a sample should be placed in alcohol in a screwworm vial and sent to Austin for identification. The mailing address is: State-Federal Brucellosis Testing Laboratory, 702 Colorado Street, Room 301, Austin, Texas 78701.

The cooperation of all producers is vital so that all infestations of the cattle fever tick can be traced back to the original infestation where eradication procedures can be initiated. This action is essential to minimize the spread of the fever tick.

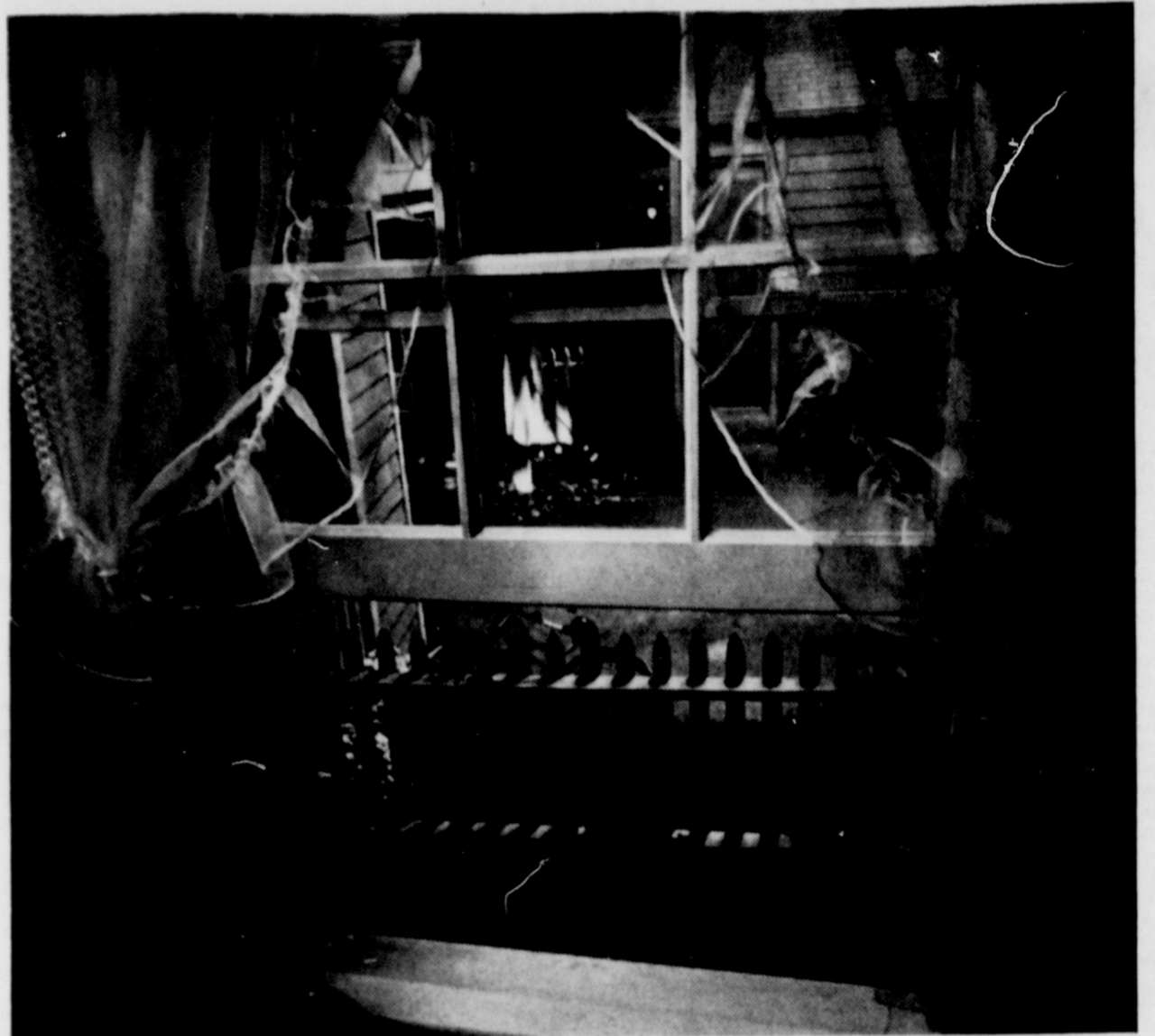

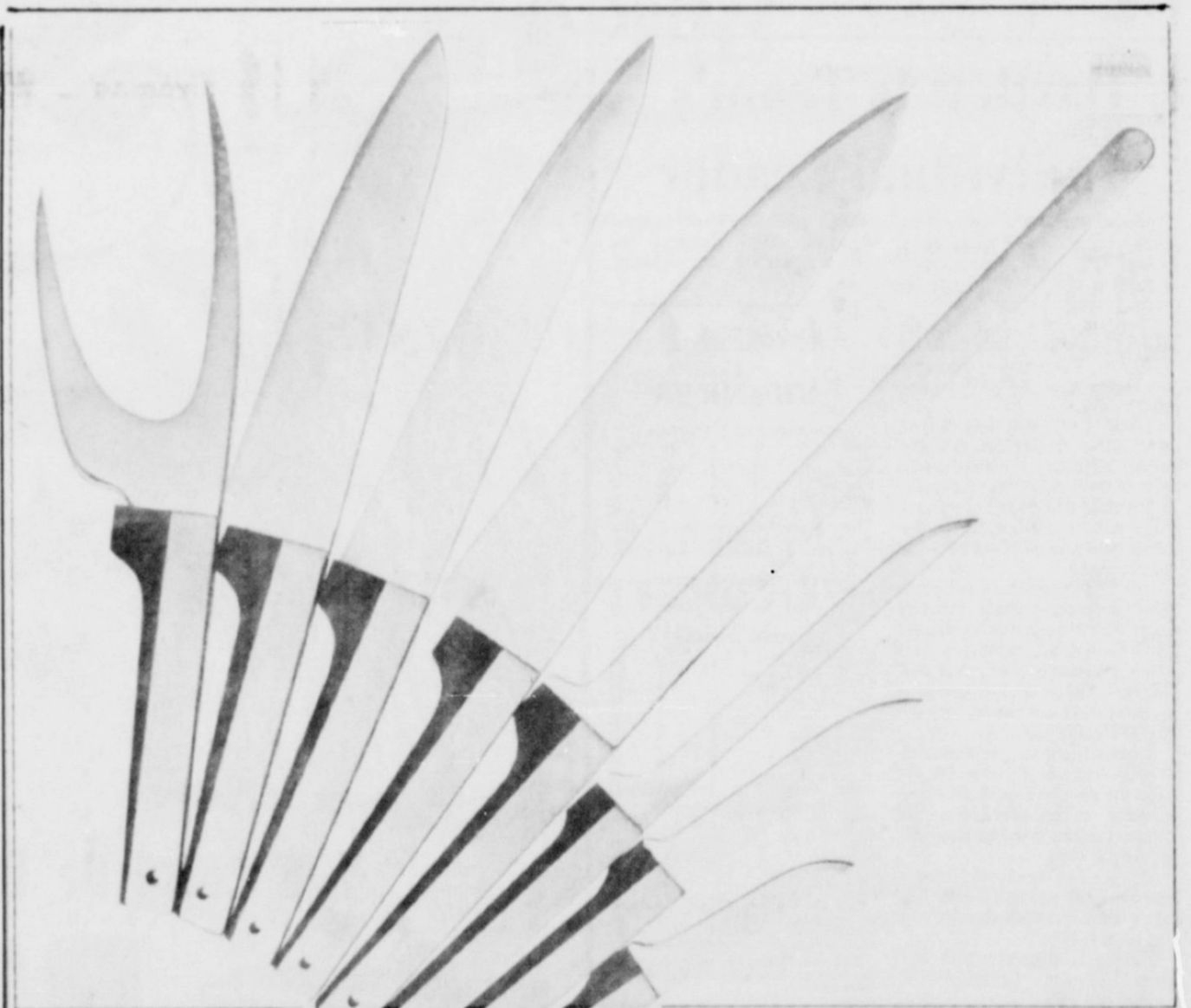

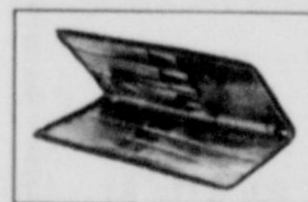

Renner also placed fourth in the 36-hole medal tournament Friday and Saturday, which was attended by television star Dale Robertson.

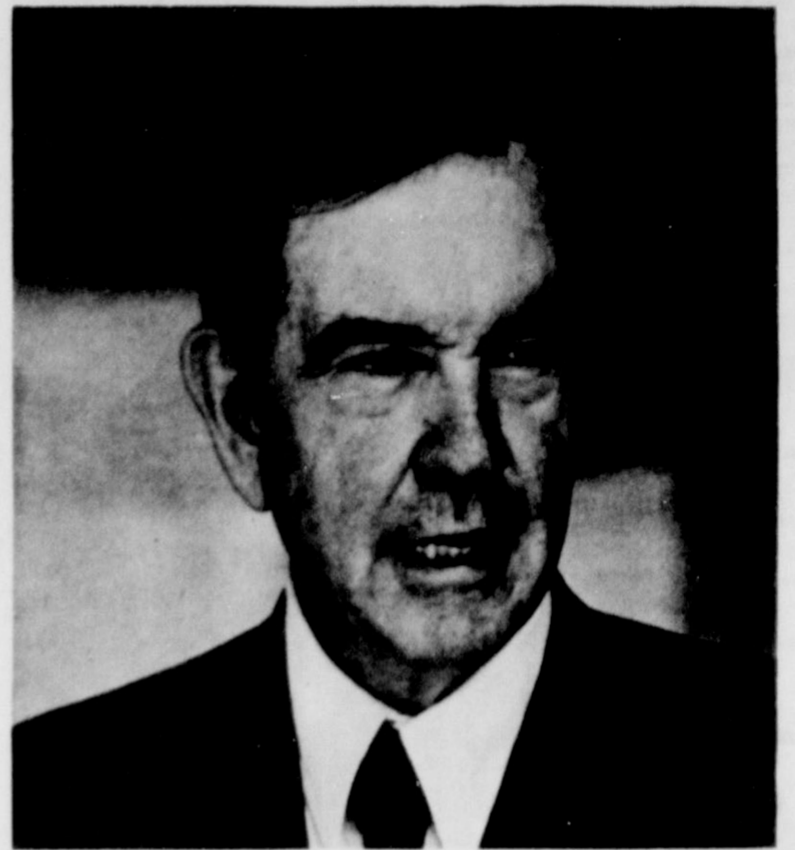
