THE SOCIAL EVENT of the year is scheduled for Friona Monday evening, when the annual Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture banquet is held at the Community Center-Showbarn.

The Chamber banquets have long been popular with Friona folks, and since the event has been held at the Community Center, an extra touch of class has been added to the affair.

The 1976 banquet should be every bit as nice as the other two which have been held at the Center, and perhaps even nicer, owing to the Bicentennial theme which banquet planners say they are following.

We have heard Dr. Blakely speak, and we feel that Friona area folks will especially enjoy him. He is out of the same mold as such former banquet speakers as Dr. Charles Jarvis, and Art Holst, who helped inaugurate the Community Center in 1974.

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AS OUR SPECIAL section indicates, Friona was blessed with a growth year during 1975, and according to all barometers, the Bicentennial year should also be a banner year for the local area.

We still have all of the factors working for us that have helped to make the area great. Having just harvested one of the best agricultural crops in the area's history, things are looking up from the farm standpoint. And the cattle situation continues to rebound and seek its former level. All of this is good for the local area.

Friona State Bank's quarterly report, which is based on money on deposit at the bank as of December 31, 1975, shows an increase in deposits of \$2,489,726 from the same date a year earlier.

The gain was registered even though the bank received competition of sorts in the form of a branch Savings & Loan office, which observed its first anniversary the first of the year in Friona.

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THE POLITICAL POT continues to simmer on the local level, with the announcement this week by W. L. (Preach) Edelman that he would run for county commissioner for this precinct.

The announcement by the former Friona mayor insures a race, since Raymond Euler had earlier announced for the Democratic nomination.

Longtime commissioner Tom Lewellen has indicated he will not seek re-election, so Precinct 1 will apparently have a new commissioner beginning in 1977.

At the other corner of the county, three candidates, including the incumbent, are seeking the nomination for the commissioner's post at Farwell.

A couple of weeks ago, a race for the county sheriff's office was assured with the announcement by Bill Denney of Friona.

As a voter, it behooves each of us to get registered for 1976 voting purposes. County officials have been in a quandry over a recent law, which left it vague as to whether the recent method of automatic registration would be valid for 1976.

As a precaution, officials urge all voters to re-register for voting during 1976. Voters will have to get registered by the first of April in order to be eligible to vote in the May 1 primary.

Better do this at your earliest opportunity, so you will be eligible to have a part in what bids to be a big political year.

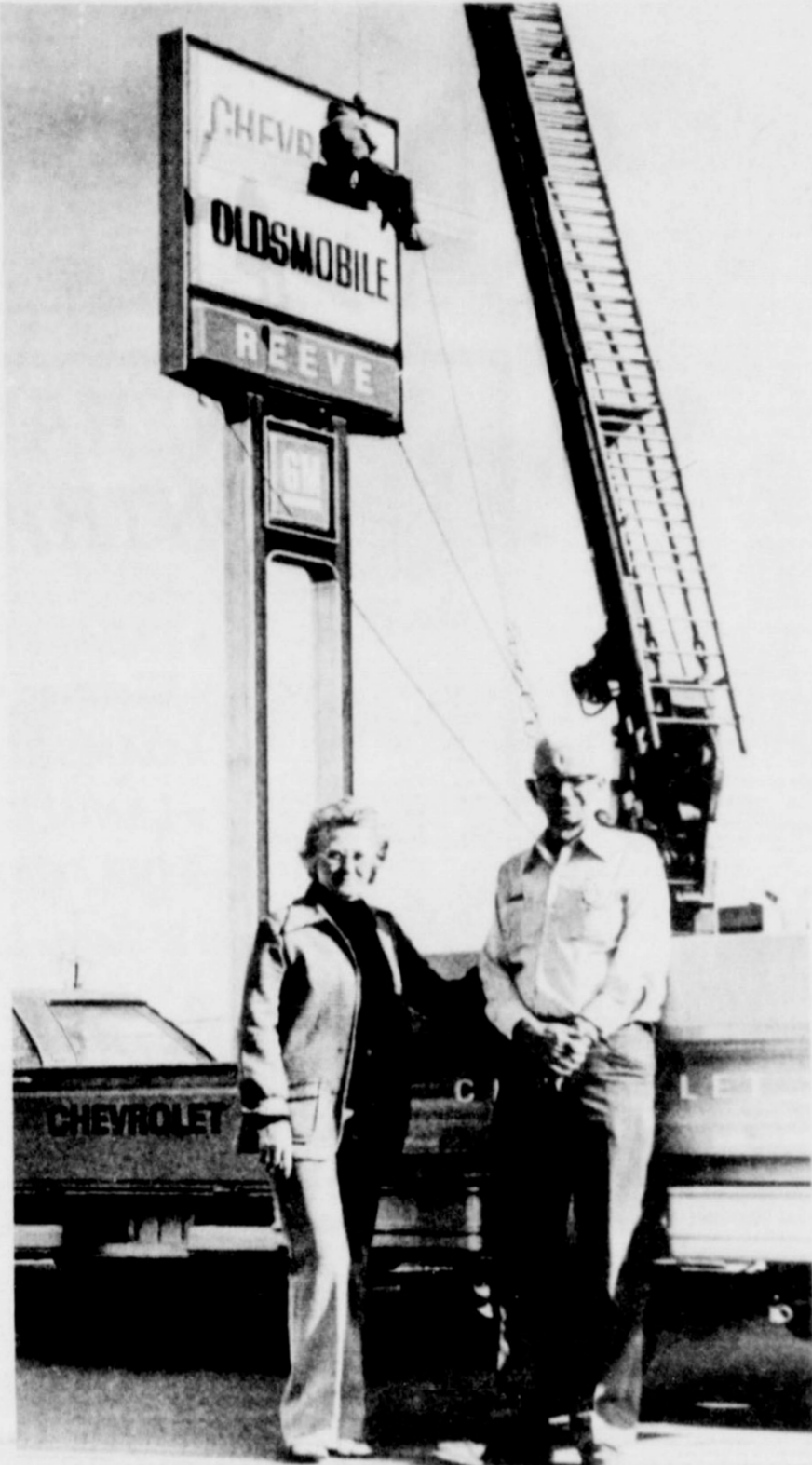
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SUNDAY IS "D DAY," and all football fans in the state will be occupied at least one more afternoon with the game between the Cowboys and the Oilers.

Edelman In Bid For Commissioner

W.L. (Preach) Edelman, longtime resident of the Friona area, announced this week that he would seek the Democratic nomination for county commissioner, Precinct 1.

Edelman, farm and civic leader and former Friona mayor, said "Based on my educational training and my record of service to Friona and Parmer County, I respectfully solicit the votes and influence of the people of Precinct 1 as the Democratic nominee for county commissioner."

Edelman received his BA degree from Texas Tech, majoring in government and minoring in business administration. He spent 15 years as a teacher, including six as Superintendent of Schools.

Edelman served four years as mayor of Friona, and was instrumental in getting the Highway 214 overpass project moving.

The longtime resident served four years as chairman of the Soil Conservation District's board of directors, 12 years as county director of Plains Cotton Growers, 12 years as a trustee of the High Plains Research Foundation, and has served 10 years on the board of directors of Girltown, USA.

A charter member of the Friona Lions Club, Edelman has had an active role in Lions affairs, including service as district governor. In 1975, he was voted into the Texas Lions Clubs Hall of Fame.

He was selected as Friona's "Man of the Year" in 1967 by the Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture.

"If elected, I pledge my abilities and energy to the best interests of Parmer County and Precinct 1," Edelman concluded.

Court In Hectic Session

The Parmer County Commissioners purchased a large piece of equipment for Precinct 3, approved county officers' salaries, approved payment of \$10,000 to county fire departments, set the county's tax rate for 1976, and worked out an arrangement for court house insurance during a busy session Monday, January 12.

A back hoe for Precinct 3 was purchased, on a bid of \$9,848 from Tucker Equipment Company of Clovis. Other bids were received from...

The annual supplemental payments to the four county fire departments, to help cover expenses incurred in fighting rural fires, were approved. \$2,500 each is paid annually to the fire departments at Bovina, Farwell, Friona and Lazbuddie.

The county tax assessor was authorized to proceed with preparation of a tax ratio of 15 per cent of true or market value.

After discussion of bids from five firms on insuring the court house and its contents, it finally was suggested that the five insurance companies all participate in the business, and each write one-fifth of the coverage. Companies involved were Aldridge Insurance Company.

20 YEARS AGO—JANUARY 20, 1956

15 YEARS AGO—JANUARY 19, 1961

10 YEARS AGO—JANUARY 20, 1966

5 YEARS AGO—JANUARY 21, 1971

"Good things come in threes." Perhaps that should be adopted as the theme at Parmer County Community Hospital, where last week the second set of triplets were delivered within three years. Mr. and Mrs. Dale Cunningham's triplets, two identical twin girls, and a boy, arrived shortly after midnight the morning of December 15. The multiple births came within three minutes of making history another way—having one with a different birthday. Sherry Ann, the smallest girl, was born first at 12:03 a.m. Shelly Gail was the second child born at 12:18 a.m. The boy, Corey Dale, was the last to be born, at 12:54.



Hog Killing

Soon after the first good, hard freeze it was time to kill hogs. Relatives or friends from nearby would come over early that morning. Water was heated in several cast iron pots out by the windmill. All the necessary equipment was collected and put in place—a large scalding vat (sometimes a tilted barrel was used), a scraping table, usually made from wagon side boards, a single tree, cotton sacks and assorted knives.

The hogs were killed and bled at the hog pen, then brought up to the tank. Boiling water was put in the scalding vat by the scraping table. A cotton sack was draped over the table and down into the vat. The carcass of the hog was placed in the vat, scalded, then rolled out on the table by using the cotton sack. The hair was removed from the skin by scraping with butcher knives. The carcass usually had to be dipped back in the vat a time or two during the scraping process.

When all the hair was removed, a single tree was hooked into the leaders of the back legs and the carcass was hoisted with a block and tackle, hind part first, into a vertical position. The head was removed and the carcass was gutted. The guts looked pretty bad and smelled worse but nothing was thrown away, all the parts were good for something. The carcass was then cut in half and taken to a table where some parts were removed to be eaten fresh and others were set aside to receive the curing agent.

The curing agent could be "boughten" or could be made at home from one of many different recipes. Sometimes plain salt was all that was used. One popular cure was made (or so I'm told) with four ounces of salt peter, four ounces of pepper and five pounds of salt. You made a thick syrup of the brown sugar and covered the meat with it, then applied the salt generously. That recipe was enough for two hundred pounds of meat.

The curing agent stayed on the meat for about ten days,

enough time for it to go into the meat. After that the meat was washed and a thin layer of fresh salt was rubbed on. Then it was hung from the rafters in the smoke house, where it stayed until it was to be used.

The things I remember as a boy when hog killing was done was getting to watch, fetching things or helping start the fire. Later in the day the lard was rendered off, that is, all the fat was cooked out. Hog skins were fried in it in the big pots. I remember they could be eaten right there as soon as they cooled. What a treat!

One time it was so cold our tank had frozen over. We kids decided to "skate" on it, with just our shoes, of course, we didn't have any skates. The others were skating near the edge but I was brave and decided to go straight across the middle. To this day, I've never been fond of swimming in ice water. When I crawled out on top of the ice, I expected the grownups to come running to help but they didn't. They had to stay with their work. I ran fast to the house. Ice was frozen all over my clothes when I got there. It took most of the day sitting in front of the fire for me to warm up. It also took most of the fun out of that hog killing day.

'City With A Heart'

Sets Annual Project

When you're 100 years old, you need all the heart you can muster! So say the businessmen who designed the world's largest valentines to celebrate the 100th birthday of the internationally known Sweetheart City of Loveland, Colorado.

Their giant creation measures two by three feet and was designed especially for those people who want the Loveland cachet and postmark on their valentines. Last year 150,000 people sent their own valentines to the Loveland postmaster for remailing.

Postmaster Henry Porter says, "This was quite a job even with the scores of volunteers who did the cachet stamping."

The cachet changes each year, but always has a cupid and a poem in red and white. This is stamped on the outside envelope.

Leon Feddersen, prominent Loveland businessman and the leader of Cupid's

Rendezvous, an organization to promote the valentine image, felt a special Loveland Valentine would be appropriate.

"We had the special valentine designed by an artist with 'big ideas. His creation has five hearts, five verses and is personalized. We think it is a great idea because you can't buy one anywhere in the world except Loveland, Colorado," Feddersen said.

Loveland became internationally famous for the valentine mailing in the forties, and the volume has grown steadily since. Each year a high school senior is elected "Miss Valentine," and she reigns over the town from one Valentine's Day to the next.

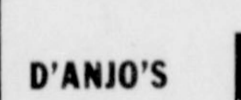

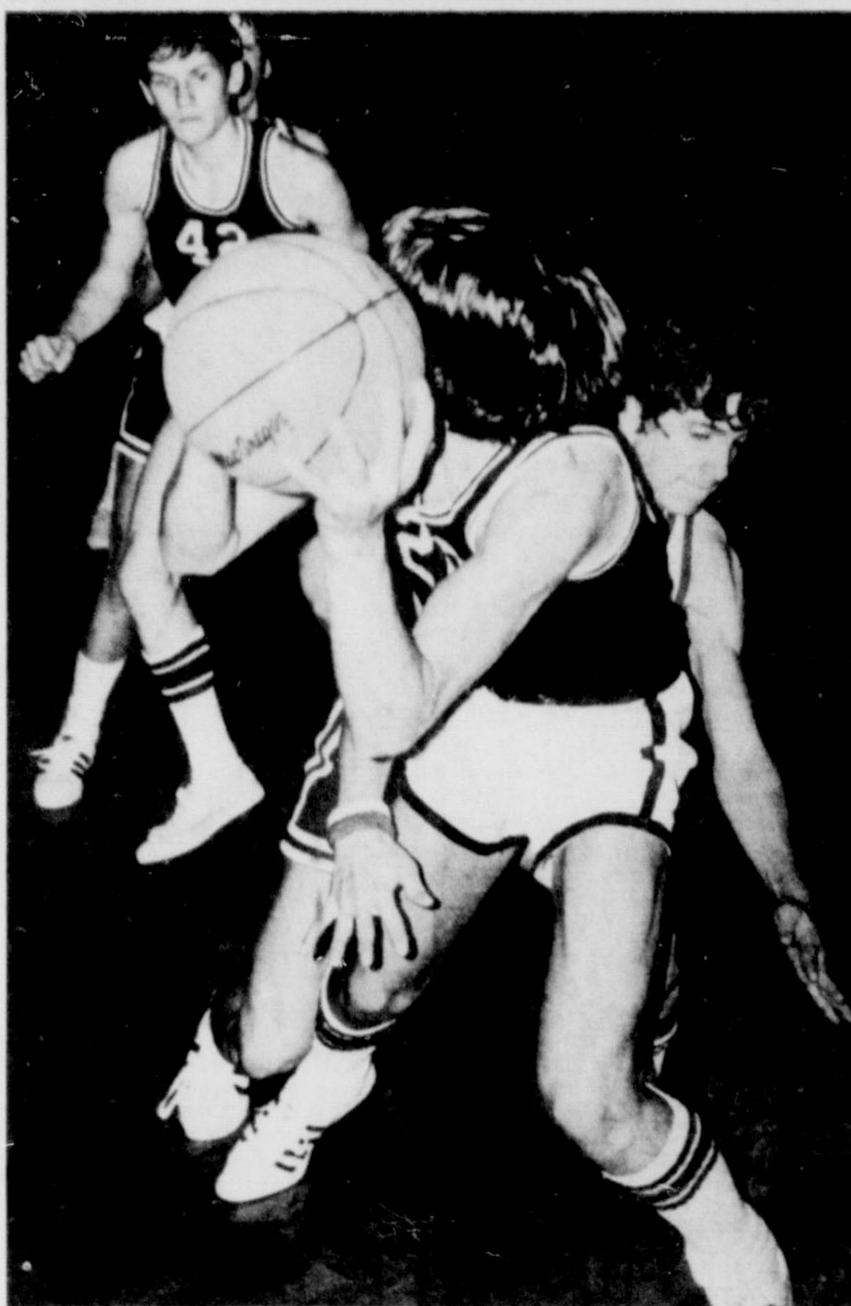

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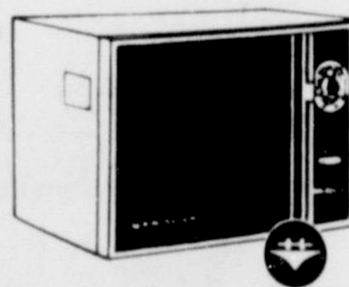

SCS Report

The Purple Martin has received a lot of publicity lately. It seems that everyone is interested in attracting this elusive bird. With all the interest, just what do we know about

them? Purple Martins are the largest member of the swallow family. They are from seven to eight inches long. They spend the winter in Central and South

America. Most of them usually go to the Amazon Basin. The migration that brings them north begins in late winter and they usually reach south Texas by early February.

The males arrive first, stay a short time, and disappear for awhile. The next time they appear, the males pick a nesting site and stay to defend it.

About this time the female arrives, picks out a mate, and stays with him for the remainder of the nesting season.

The birds feed on flying insects such as house flies, mosquitos, ants, wasps and dragonflies. The fly and mosquito eradication is the reason they are so popular.

In this area sparrows compete with the martins. The competition is mainly for nesting areas. If you would like to provide a site for martins to nest, it must be protected from the sparrows.

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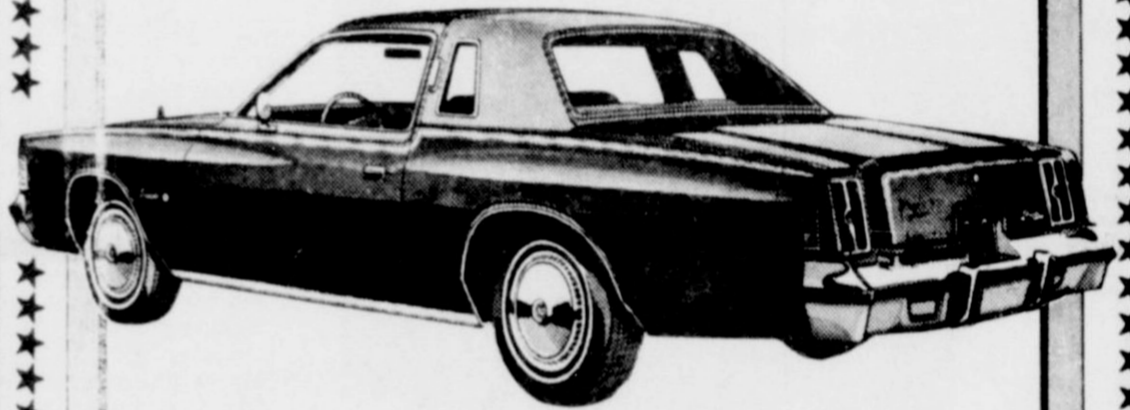

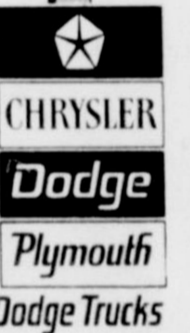

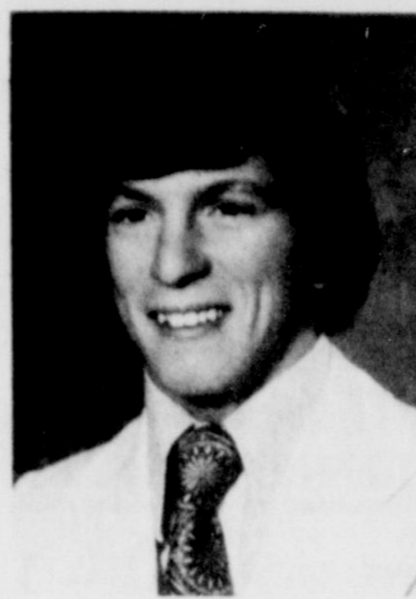
Nineteen Bandsmen Rate All-Regional

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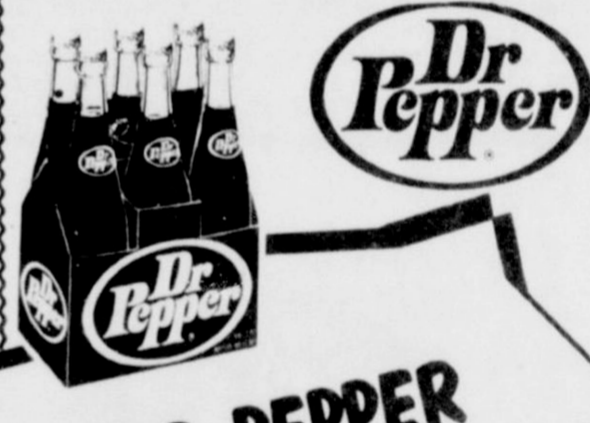
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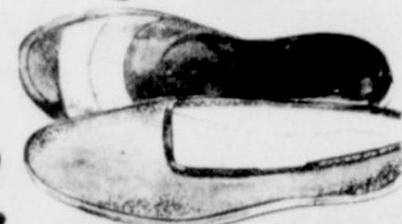

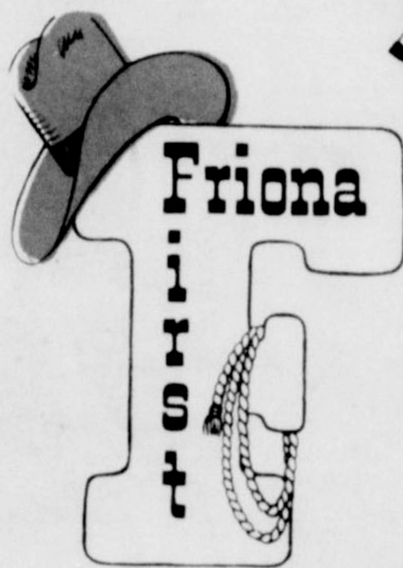

1975 IN REVIEW

Friona Logged Several Gains During Past Year

The year 1975 was another big year for the city of Friona, a check of the record reveals.

Glancing through the headlines of the Friona Star, it was evident that 1975 was a good business year for Friona, with at least three major new businesses added during the year, and big expansion programs completed for three more.

Tri-County Savings & Loan Assn. opened its Friona branch office on January 6, with Mike Gamble as manager.

Later in January, Perry's Variety Store Chain, which operates 118 stores in Texas, Arkansas and Louisiana, opened in Friona. The store opened here a month ahead of schedule.

Herring Implement Company held open house for its beautiful new building on West Highway 60, February 8, the first of three such openings held during the year on West Highway 60.

On April 17, open house for Parmer County Implement Company's new home was held. J. Patrick Kaine, president of International-Harvester Company, attended the opening.

Gibson's Discount Center opened its newest store in Friona on Monday, June 9. Mayor R.L. Fleming assisted with the ribbon-cutting ceremony. It was the 13th store in the regional

Gibson chain with headquarters in Pampa. Officials said they hoped the store would be their "lucky thirteenth."

A Sears-Roebuck catalog store, owned and operated by Dale and Laura Hart of Friona opened at 511 Main on June 23.

Reeve Chevrolet-Olds completed the cycle of open house observances on West Highway 60 when they opened on August 15 in their re-modeled home.

The Friona post office got a new home during 1975, and the office re-located on North Main Street in September. Open house was held October 18th with postal officials attending.

Work on another major facility for the city, a nursing home, was begun during the year. A steering committee was appointed early in the year, and they brought about a bond election which carried by a 23-1 margin April 20 to provide \$350,000 to build the 60-head facility.

Contract for the nursing home was awarded in late September. Official groundbreaking was held on October 28, and construction was well underway as the year ended.

Ribbon-cutting was held September 23 for another long-awaited project, the bridge leading into the Friona city limits from the

south, spanning Frio Draw and the Santa Fe Railway. Highway Department officials attended the ceremony.

Other highlights of the year from the Chamber of Commerce standpoint included the annual banquet February 2 at the Community Center, attended by over 600 people.

The Chamber once again sponsored the July 4th events at the Center, and they were well-attended. This program has grown into a popular affair the past few years.

Maize Days, the Chamber's annual week-long celebration, was a success as usual. State Representative Bill Clayton acted as parade marshal. Nell Fulks was crowned Maize Queen to reign over the festivities.

Noted personalities visited the city at various times. Speaker of the House Clayton was here on numerous occasions. U.S. Representative George Mahon paid a visit to constituents in August.

Over 1100 people, largest crowd for the Community Center, heard Art Linkletter speak at the teacher appreciation night April 7.

National coach of the year, Grant Teaff of Baylor, spoke in Friona at the all-sports banquet March 18 at the center.

The city continued to excel in several areas. An all-time high of \$107,255.85 in postal receipts was announced by postmaster Wright Williams—and this was before the price of stamps went up.
