## Star Lites By Bill Ellis

**IF YOU HAVEN'T** voted by the time you're reading this, then you ought to hustle on down to the polling place and cast your ballot, but you can finish this column if you wish.

Much as we want you to read every word in the Star, we don't want any of the local voters to fail to cast their ballots in Saturday's Democratic runoff, with so much at stake.

For Precinct 1, the commissioner's seat is at stake, and Saturday's vote could well determine our representative in county government for the next four years.

This is an important decision, and merits a lot more than one-third of the eligible voters making such a decision, which was the prediction by election officials for Saturday's turnout of voters.

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**THERE ARE TWO** important state offices up for election in addition to the local commissioner's race.

For the railroad commission, Jerry Sadler, the former land commissioner who made such a mockery of his office in that department, is trying once again to visit the public feeding trough.

Jon Newton, young, qualified former state representative, is vitally interested in the consumer and in the state's energy problems, and deserves voters' consideration.

At least, we think that voters could depend on Newton to fill the office in a capable manner, which is more than you could say for Sadler, who once tried to choke a state legislator on the floor of the House of Representatives.

The other race doesn't have such a wide range of choice, but the majority of newsmen we have seen make an endorsement seem to favor Carl Dally in the Criminal Appeals race.

It's worth the five or ten minutes of your time. Now, if you still haven't cast your ballot, you may lay aside your paper. Don't be a member of the silent majority. Make your voice heard.

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**FRIONA BUSINESSES** continue to make news, with several changes in the local business community during the last week or two.

Carl and Betty McInroe have bought out Earl and Audrey Graham at the Parmer House Restaurant. Carl is a veteran restaurant owner and operator, and is enthused at the prospects of his new ownership venture.

Wahleah Beck, owner of the Main Place, and Nellie Shelton, owner of Nellie-Jane's, have expanded their businesses, going together under one roof at the former Ben Franklin location on Main Street, and the two have a pretty store. It's good to see that large building again housing business folks.

Then, Jerry Poarch opened his furniture business in the former Hut building this week, opposite Roberts TV & Appliance, giving Friona area residents another furniture outlet.

A little earlier, W.H. Carr opened a muffler and tire shop in the remodeled building at Main and Highway 60. We mentioned a couple of weeks ago the pending opening of XIT Auto Ranch, on East Highway 60, owned by Troy Young.

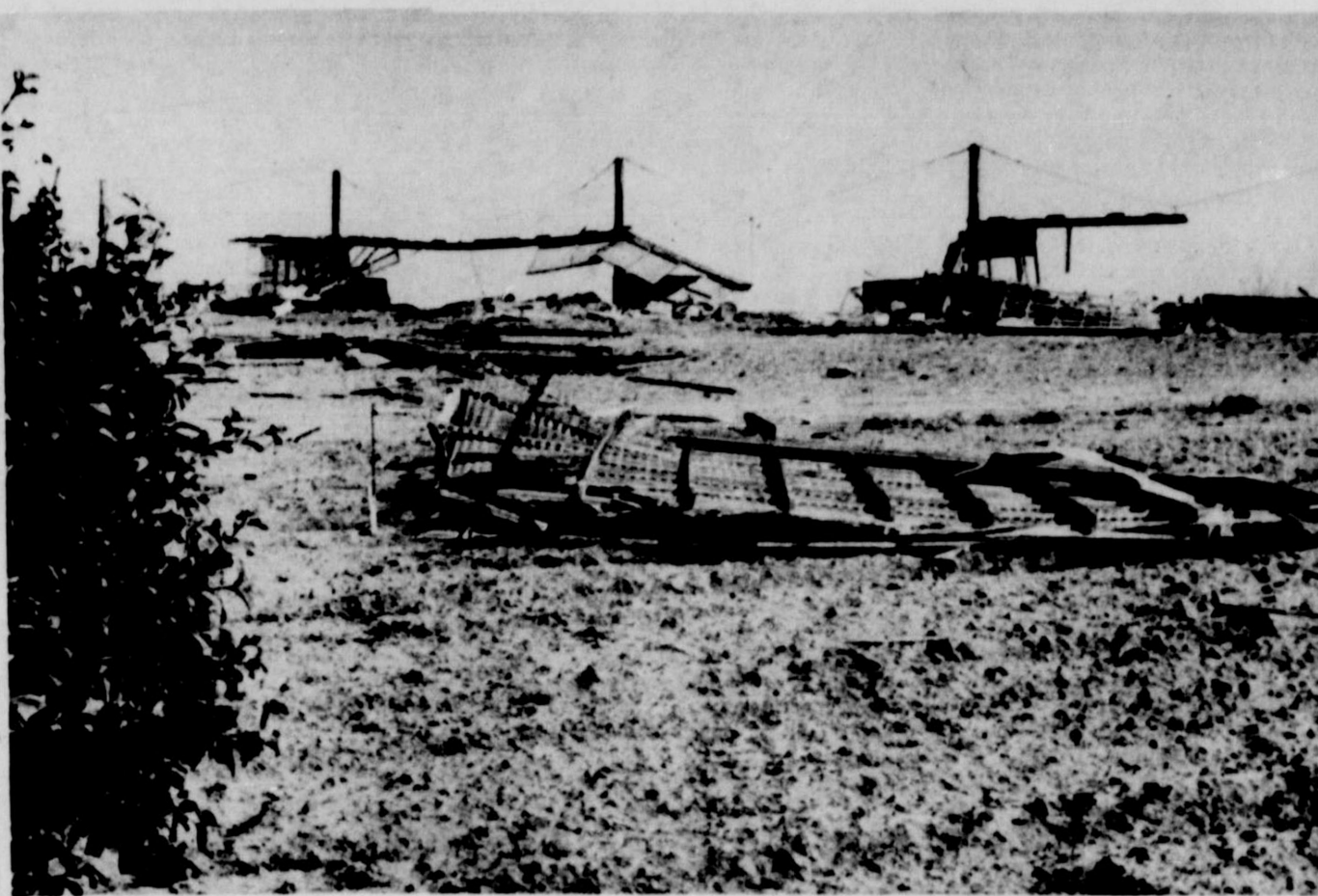
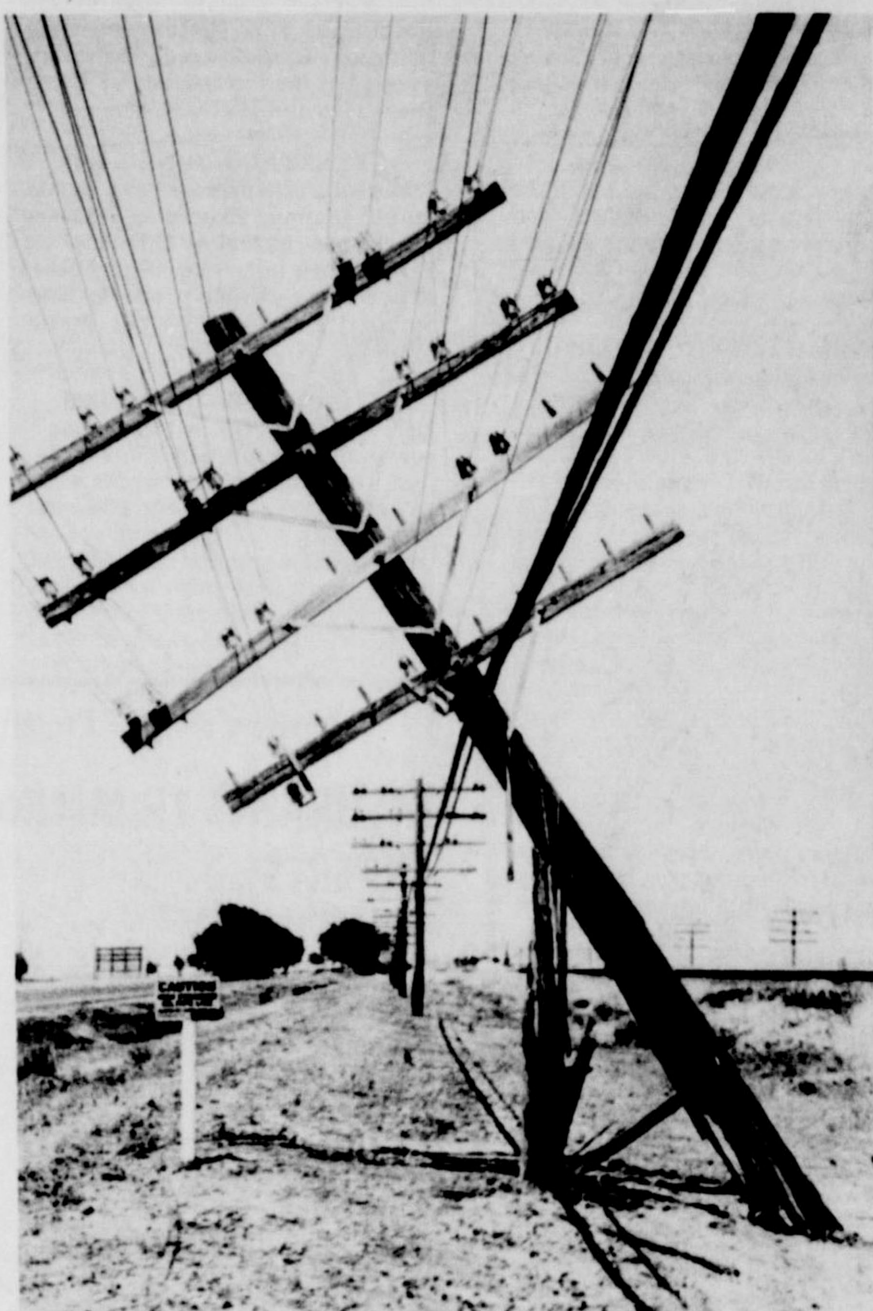
Also, along the business line, Gibson's Discount Center observes its first anniversary in Friona this week. According to the indication we have had from company officials, the Friona store has more than lived up to the expectations they had for it.

**NELSON LEWIS** says that since June is here and vacation plans are in the wind, this is an ideal time to secure family photographs and histories for Volume 2 of the Parmer County History, which is in the planning stages.

The plans are for the second history volume to cover the 20-year period of the 1930s and 1940s, where Volume 1 left off.

"Since this period contains the Dust Bowl days, the Great Depression and World War II, it should provide more than enough data for another book," Lewis says. If this works out, it would set the stage for a third book in the series.

## Hail, Wind Rake Area; Rain Falls

The Friona area has experienced a variety of weather during the past week, with severe hail damage suffered by a large section of the country on two different occasions.

On the bright side, Thursday night brought the most general rain that the area has received in about eight months. An official .83 inch was recorded in Friona Thursday night, with 1.35 inch for the week.

Gary Brown, agriculture specialist for Friona State Bank, said it would be impossible to place a dollar figure on the losses sustained by crops to hail, or an approximate acreage, saying it would be "massive."

"It covered an area at least six miles wide, and about 20 miles long, and hit them two different times," Brown said.

The first blow hit the area, generally beginning north and west of Friona, on Wednesday, May 26. It ruined hundreds of acres of wheat and barley, almost ready for harvest, plus new crops of sugar beets, cotton, corn and maize.

Much of the corn is expected to recover, although Brown indicated the hail damage would throw it behind, causing it to be late and therefore affecting the yield.

Many farmers replanted cotton and maize following the May 26 storm. Ernest Anthony, who farms north of Friona, said that out of 1600 acres he farms, only 300 acres of corn was not replanted.

Sunday night, May 30, a hailstorm accompanied by high winds again took a swipe at the area. The storm hit the northeast corner of the city, causing considerable damage to yards, gardens, trees, etc.

"We have been hauling tree limbs to the dump ground most of the week," stated City Manager Jake Outland late in the week.

Another high wind hit town late Wednesday night. Thursday night's rain was slow and gentle for the most part.

The high wind damaged a number of tall antennas, and broke at least one store window, at Gibson's Discount Center. Some yard fences also were damaged by the "blow," as were utility poles east of Friona. An old hangar at Benger Air Park was scattered by the wind, which also topped the airport's big antenna.

During the Sunday afternoon storm, a twister was believed to have dipped down west of the Bootleg corner northwest of Friona. Two large self-feeders were picked up and one was crashed into a barn on the Brown brothers' place.

Concerning the storm damage, Gary Brown stated that it would have been a bigger financial loss if

the area had had the dryland wheat crop it sometimes does, but due to lack of moisture, the wheat crop was shorter.

However, the dry and semi-dryland areas had cotton crops up to a good stand which were ruined by the weather.

## Reception Slated For Iola Nelson

Iola Nelson, longtime employee of Friona State Bank, will be honored by the bank with a reception on the occasion of her retirement Thursday, June 10.

The reception, to be held at the bank's Community Room, will be held from 8 to 10 p.m. It will be a come and go affair. The public is invited to attend, according to Robert Neelley, bank president.

Mrs. Nelson will retire officially from her position as assistant vice president on June 9. She first went to work at the bank on January 4, 1959.

"I had made application for part-time bookkeeping work. Frank Spring used to tell me that my job turned out to be pretty steady for a part-time position," Mrs. Nelson said this week.

On October 1, 1959, she became head bookkeeper. On May 9, 1960, she became secretary and relief teller. On January 10, 1964, Mrs. Nelson was elevated to assistant cashier, and since April 15 of 1973 has been an assistant vice president.

"I have worked in all of the bank's departments except in the loan department," said Mrs. Nelson. She has been concentrating on Certificates of Deposit and retirement funds in recent years, and was the first secretary the bank ever had.

Mrs. Nelson was born in Denton, and went through school at Quitaque. She attended business college at Plainview, and prior to her marriage worked for the Social Security Administration in Baltimore, Md. She was with the Social Security Adm. for ten years, in Baltimore and Amarillo.

"We'll sure miss her around here," said one of the bank officers. Iola was honored as the commu-

The longtime bank employee has also served as treasurer for the Friona chapter of the Salvation Army for 15 years. She has also served as memorial chairman for the American Cancer Society for 12 years. She is an active member of the First United Methodist Church of Friona.

## Voters To Nominat County Commissioner

The second Democratic primary election in Texas will be Saturday.

At the state level, voters will name a candidate for Railroad Commissioner and the Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 1 (unexpired term).

At the county level, voters in Precincts 1 and 3 will name a candidate for county commissioner in the November general election.

The polling place in Friona will be at the High School with Bessie Holt serving as election judge. The polls

will open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.

In Precinct 1, Raymond Euler and Ernest Anthony will square off for the Democratic nomination. In the May primary, Anthony led the four-man ticket with 282 votes, 29.2 per cent of the total. Euler had 234 votes, or 24.2 per cent; Lloyd

Rector had 217, or 22.3; and W.L. Edelman had 215 votes, also 23.3 per cent of the total.

In the May primary in Precinct 3, Archie Tarter, a former county judge, collected 271 votes with Wendol Christian coming in second with 173 votes in the four-man race. Incumbent Cecil Atchley had 111 votes and A.N. Walls had 101 votes. Tarter and Christian will be on Saturday's ballot.

**Black Post Office  
To Close July 30**

The Sectional Center Manager-Postmaster, C.T. Davis, announced that two small post offices in the area will be discontinued in July of this year.

The discontinuances will be in line with U.S. Postal Services policy of providing as good as or equal postal service to customers in very small communities to effect cost reductions in the over all postal operation.

The post office at Middlewater, Texas will be discontinued July 2, 1976. The eight families served by this office will receive their mail by rural box delivery and-or at the Dalhart Post Office in a lockbox. This will result in cost savings of

\$3,600.00 annually.

The post office at Black, Texas will be discontinued July 30, 1976. The thirty-nine families served by this office will receive their mail by rural box delivery out of the Friona Post Office and-or at the Friona, Summerfield or the Hereford post offices through lockboxes. This will result in a cost savings of \$11,000.00 annually.

The families in these two areas will still receive effective and regular Postal Service and be able to purchase stamps, money orders and other Postal Services from the rural carrier that delivers their mail. Postmaster Davis stated.

**Letter Writer Praises  
Former Coach DeBord**

June 1, 1976

Dear Editor,

I sat down here tonight trying to put down my feelings toward one of the greatest men I've ever known, "Coach Ray DeBord!"

That man is a "Coach" in the fullest extent. He was not only a basketball coach, a football coach, a track coach, he was a "Coach of Life."

I can remember the times when he called our team together for a little discussion. He would tell us of our game strategy, of our mistakes and of our good points!

But you know what I remember most? He would say to us to never make sports No. 1 in our lives; to always put the Good Lord in the No. 1 position. He even said once that sports not just basketball, but sports was not No. 1 in his life, not No. 2 and maybe not even No. 3. He said he tried in everything he did to put the Lord first and his family second and go from there.

Now that is the kind of man I would want my kids learning from!

When we went to state that year, I knew and I hoped that he would get better offers because I felt that that was what he wanted. But when I found out what it might have taken to keep him here all I could do was shake my head and say, "Why, Why?"

Man, I would give him five hundred dollars a year out of my own pocket even if I had to borrow it from the bank! That's how much

I could go to him any day of the week and anytime of the night and get the key to the gym so I could practice. If any thing would have happened in there he would have been held fully responsible because he wasn't supposed to let anyone in there without him or some other coach being present.

He was risking everything he had on some kid that wanted to play basketball. He required one thing of me and that was to bring the key back every night. There would be some nights that I wouldn't bring it back before 10 or

11 o'clock and there were very few nights that he didn't meet me at the door.

Each time he would ask me if I thought that I had improved any since the last practice. He said that each practice you should have some improvement somewhere; if not you weren't doing yourself any good. I could write several more pages on the things that he did for me and the other athletic boys.

Now that a few things have come out I can look back and see some of those things as they developed. I sensed that a problem was arising the day that I told Coach Owen that I wanted to quit football and to play straight basketball.

Coach Owen told me something that day that hurt me very deep. He called me a "Quitter." To me that hurt! I've never considered myself, a quitter in any respect and from that day on I set out to prove to him and the rest of the coaching staff that just because I chose a sport of a little less physical contact that it didn't label me as a quitter, a sissy or any other name.

The day that I stood on the basketball court in Austin, waiting for the jump ball to begin the state championship ballgame and listening to all the screaming and yelling of the Chieftain fans, "Man I knew I was a 'Chieftain' and I dang sure knew I wasn't a quitter."

I hope Coach Owen will forgive me for using his name here because I hold no grudges against

for him. Because during my junior and senior year he realized that just because I chose basketball as my sport that it didn't make me any less of a Chieftain.

As for this new coach, I have never met him and I don't even know his name. So I hold no bad feelings towards him. But I feel that there may have to be some more changes made and probably a few compromises on both sides to settle the problems.

I feel very deeply that any boy who so chooses to go straight one sport should be allowed to do so

whether it is track, basketball or football. I feel that the school board should take the responsibility of seeing that the sports program is made to suit the needs of all boys and girls.

I for one would love to see DeBord come back as head basketball coach and I feel that he is worth a few changes and maybe even more money. If there are other people in this town that feel as I do I wish they would let me know and maybe we could bring him back.

He may not want to come back because when he left he tried to leave the impression on me that he wanted to leave. I think now that he was just holding back his real feelings. I never could figure out why he wouldn't discuss the matter much and sure didn't seem too enthused about it around me anyway.

Now I think I know why. Sure it was more money but it wasn't the money because what little he did tell me, he told me that he would be able to coach the basketball boys full time year round but that he would still be assistant football coach and I think that was all he really wanted.

This town is a good town and I don't imagine I will ever leave it again. In the two years that I have been out of high school I have been to Alaska, through Canada and several other states. I now make

for our family business. In all this travel I have realized what kind of people make up this area called the "Panhandle" and its small town like Friona.

This is the best class of people I have yet to find. So if for no other reason I would like to see Coach Ray DeBord and his family back in the community of Friona because they're our kind of folks.

I just wish I was half the man he is now.

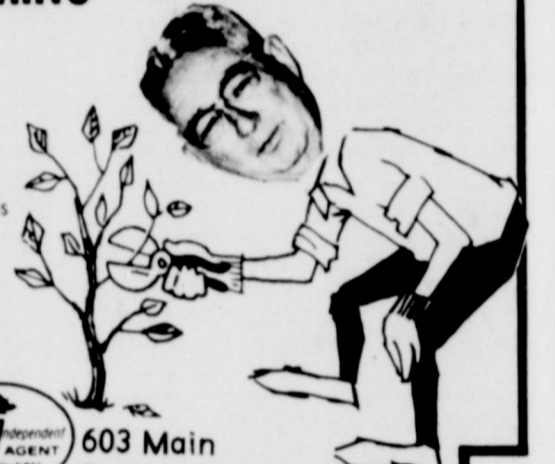

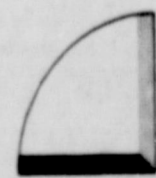

At the state level, Jon Newton of Bee County and Jerry Sadler of Anderson County are seeking the railroad commissioner's nomination.

In the race for judge on the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals, Carl Dally opposed W.T. Phillips.

A sample voting ballot with voting instructions appear elsewhere in this issue of The Star.

In the railroad commissioner's race, Newton was probably the least known of the eight candidates who were in the May primary, but was heavily financed by the gas and oil industries in his campaign. Newton says he will give the consumer a voice on the commission, which regulates utility rates, and has, since the May primary, been endorsed by the majority of weekly and daily papers in the Panhandle-South Plains area.

In the other race on the state level, Phillips has done little campaigning. Dally has served as a commissioner on the court since 1971 and has written over 400 published opinions for the court while gaining almost five years of experience. He has been described as "eminently qualified" to serve and has received endorsements from the Houston Chronicle, Fort Worth Star-Telegram, Corpus Christi Caller and the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal.

Sadler, the former state treasurer, has come under fire since the May primary because of his past record in office and his private affairs. His position in the runoff election has been attributed to voters recognizing his name on the ballot rather than remembering his past record.

On June 1, Benger Air Park won 12-10 over Pioneer and brought their record to one win, against two losses.

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
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
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# Wied's Art Career Came "By Accident"

"Really, my getting into art was accidental...a series of events," said Bobby Wied, local art teacher and one of Friona's more well-known artists.

"I've always enjoyed drawing, but never had a chance to take lessons till I got to college. I went to a small school at Wilson, Tx., about the size of Lazbuddie, and when I graduated from high school I went to junior college at San Angelo on a football scholarship. I played fullback and defensive end...wherever they needed a warm body mostly," commented the still athletic-looking artist.

"The first semester I enrolled in German, and out of 26 by the end of the semester we were down to three. I was the only one to sign up for second semester German, but they couldn't offer the class for just one person so the administration decided I could be tutored and get credit, but the instructor's mother got sick and she had to quit. That left me with two-thirds of a semester left that I needed to fill with something."

"My roommate's friend was an art major, and he suggested I take a life drawing course, and I did. By the end of the semester I thought that my work was halfway presentable and I found out that art was something I really enjoyed and what I really wanted to do," Wied said.

"My parents gave me a lot of encouragement, but it might have been hard for them to do at first," he said. "When I first came home from San Angelo and told them I wanted to major in art my dad asked me, 'What good is it?'"

"I said, 'I don't know, but I know that's what I want to do.' He probably thought at the time that I'd made a mistake, but it was my decision and he backed me up."

Wied has won numerous awards, beginning in 1966, and is versatile in most art mediums, including bronze sculpture, for which he won an award in 1968.

He designed the front face of the bicentennial commemorative medal for Parmer County selected by the Parmer County Historical Society last year, and painted the portrait of Martin Parmer which is on display at the Parmer County Courthouse.

In the most recent art contests Wied entered in the last year, he did well. "I entered a show at Canyon to go along with the opening of

"TEXAS"...the theme was openings...and entered a picture of a sparrow sitting on an open window in a brick wall. It won first place in the painting division."

"Last summer I entered a show at Portales which was open to anyone in the world, and won an honorable mention for an oil of a washed-out road with a farmhouse in the background called 'Martin's Place.' I think the paintings accepted for that show came from 25 different states and six foreign countries," Wied said.

"I get most of my painting done during the summer," Wied explained. "I find two or three hours a night to paint usually, and do some at school when I have some time off."

"I work on one painting till it's finished," he said, explaining that the time he spends on a painting depends on the size and the medium.

"I usually think of the subject matter first and then try to pick out the medium that matches it. I might be driving down the road and see something that catches my attention or see something in a magazine...that's the way I usually do."

"I think very definitely that anyone who paints has got to be aware of shapes, colors and relationships...one object to another," Wied said.

"For example, at the end of Fifth Street there is an old brick building that has an old wooden staircase in back and some elm trees...during the winter the afternoon sun makes a pattern of shadows on the brick building."

"And another example...well, there's a house right down the street here that has a cinder block wall and the bricks have aged and all are a little bit different in color...if you're not really looking for that sort of thing you identify the wall and go on," he said.

"There's so much more there if you just take time to see it," he pointed out. "I think people go through life just identifying things, and there's a difference between just identifying things and really seeing something. If you can't see something you can't put it down on paper or canvas."

"There are all styles of art that don't rely on subject matter, but you can see that my kind of art is striving for something different," Wied said with a wave of his hand toward his true-to-life painting of

"Martin's Place."

"In any painting you look at, you can see as much about the artist as you do about the painting," Wied said. "I'd like for someone who looks at a picture like this to be able to see that there is beauty all around," he pointed toward the painting. "When I show this particular scene to some people they have said, 'I know just where it is...it's three miles west of town!' They probably don't know where Wilson, Tx. is, but it's representative of this part of the country."

"My style in oil and acrylics especially is very realistic with a lot of detail. I like the effect of strong light and shadow," he said. "With watercolors I have a looser style...a small area with sharp detail and some suggested detail. It is all painted on wet paper and the color runs everywhere."

"A little area of sharp detail is enough to give a meaning to the entire painting," Wied pointed out.

Commenting on art as an investment, Wied said, "If you're looking at a painting to buy it or as an investment, you look at that little part at the bottom where the signature is," he held up a finger and a thumb. "If it's got the right

signature on it that makes it worth whatever it is worth."

Wied's own signature is plain and unassuming. "The signature is there to identify it, and the rest of the painting is the important part. The fanciest signature in the world won't make a bad painting good," he commented.

Wied came to Friona 11 years ago in the fall of 1965 teaching elementary art, and this fall will begin teaching art in the high school.

"In some ways teaching art is like teaching other subjects," he said. "It is a real satisfaction to see a student work and struggle and struggle and suddenly see the light, and you feel you've finally gotten across to him. Working with the elementary level, I enjoy the enthusiasm with which they take to art...they are uninhibited. Far as frustrations, it's frustrating at times because at that level you have to be careful you don't get over their level. At times you see them work and work at something they're just not ready for yet."

"Something that bothered me at first a little bit, when a student at this age level is doing artwork, it is

The working process that is more important than the final product... they could care less when it is finished. The fact that it bothered me is a reflection of my shortcoming, not theirs. I've since learned that it is just the nature of that age group."

Nationally-known painters Wied admires are Wilson Hurley, Brownell McGrew and Andrew Wyeth. Closer to home, Wied cited several Friona artists whom he likes.

"Here in Friona, Ethel Ruth Spring is an excellent watercolorist...she may paint in oils too, but I've never seen any," he said. "Billie Homer paints mostly in oils, and is excellent. Carol Ellis does good work...she's recently switched to watercolors, and that takes a while, but I've admired some of her work. There are others too, but those are the most visible ones I've seen the most of."

Wied smiled a relieved smile and commented, "I think I'm just now getting to the point where I'm in control and can sit down and expect the result to match my intentions."

"My wife, Delphine, helps me. After I've worked on a major painting for a number of hours, I ask my wife to look at it and tell me what it needs because I'm so involved with it I'm too close and can't see or don't want to see the work it still needs. She tells me and I look at it and see that usually she's right."

"If it hadn't been for that little old lady at Fredericksburg...my instructor's mother...I wouldn't have taken an art course in college."

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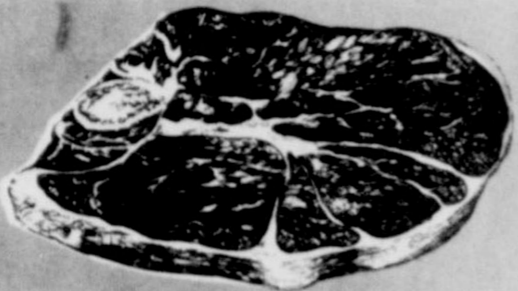
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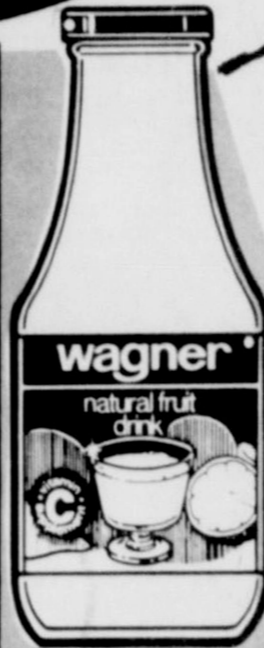
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
