# Voters Here Nix New Constitution

Parmer County voters, like those across the state, expressed the fact that they aren't particularly anxious for a new constitution, by their voting at the polls this past Tuesday.

Voters in the county, turning out in larger than expected numbers to scan the constitutional ballot, turned thumbs down on all eight proposals, by an average margin of eight to

There was little variation in the voting, up and down the ballot. The finance provision was given the biggest beating, with 1208 voters going against it, to only 165 in favor. This was an average of 8.25 voters against for every voter which was favorable.

The "closest" proposal, if it can be termed that, was number four, the education portion, which still was defeated, 1180-200, or better than 7-1.

A total of 1,393 people went to the polls, aided by excellent "Indian Summer" weather, to vote on the proposed new constitution. This was 36.6 per cent of the registered voters in Parmer County, who total 3,801. Only around 50 per cent of the voters voted in the last general election.

There were 524 voters in the Friona precinct, where the voting likewise was heavily against each

The judiciary proposition was the least favored in Friona, where 455 voted against, to only 63 in favor. The finance proposal also was low, with 451 against to 65 in favor.

Friona voters followed the trend by giving a few more votes to the education portion (74), but gave the most favorable votes to proposition seven, the general provisions, where

77 voted "for," but there were still 440 "against."

A complete precinct by precinct voting tally appears elsewhere in this issue. The countywide totals were as follows:

# Friona Industries In Optimistic Report

Friona Industries, Inc., achieved net income of \$360,936, or 29 cents per share, on revenues of \$10.9 million in its first quarter ended September 30, 1975

This compared with a loss of \$379,028, or a deficit of 30 cents per share, on revenues of \$9.3 million in the first quarter of the prior fiscal

"It was the best quarter that the Company has had in the past 18 months," said John G. Carrothers, president. "However, the U.S. cattle industry is still a long way from returning to normalcy and parts of the total industry continue to be hard hit by adverse conditions which

"Most of the profitability for the quarter was attributable to the sale of the Company-owned cattle," he

About 7,900 head of Companyowned cattle were sold during the quarter at an acceptable profit level. Company-owned cattle inventories were at approximately 15,300 head at the end of the first quarter.

The Company's three cattle feedlots also contributed to income. Occupancy at the feedlots, which have a total capacity of 124,000 head, averaged considerably below normal as it was for the industry nationwide.

"There has been some improvement in occupancy since the end of the quarter, but indications are that custom feeding operations will remain relatively stable over the short term," said Carrothers.

"Manufactured feed and grain sales were marginally unprofitable," he said. "However, we expect that both of these operations will return to a measure of profitability in our second quarter."

Sales and income from animal health supplies continued to be depressed, reflecting the overall cautious attitude of both cattle raisers and cattle feeders toward industry conditions.

"We are continuing our comprehensive study of the total needs of cattlemen for animal health supply products along with our program of expense reduction and operational efficiencies for our nine Hi-Pro Veterinary Supply Stores.

"One factor that became evident during our study was that as cattle prices went into a steep decline, cattle breeders became unwilling to

services for exotic and domestic breeding. The Company is now implementing its decision to phase out the sale of cattle semen and related services," Carrothers stat-

In the area of new products, an agreement is being negotiated with a company that has marketing expertise in the sale of lawn and garden products to test market bulk dehydrated, organic humus fertilizer utilizing the cattle manure

from Friona's feedlots. "Over the near term, indications are that our entire complex will begin showing a higher degree of

profitability," he said. "Feedlot occupancy for the nation as a whole is slightly above this time last year but remains well below the 1972-73 level. Many of the people who

were financially wiped out in the past two years do not have the resources to return to the grain-fed cattle business on a large scale," he commented.

"For the cattle industry as a whole there is still much confusion due to the disruption of marketing and supply patterns.

"A large supply of grass-fed cattle, both cows and calves, have been slaughtered to fill the needs of both the rancher to decrease his herd size and the consumer to fulfill her beef needs. We expect this grass-fed volume to markedly decrease as we go into the winter and early spring months. Also, there is a shortage of hogs available for slaughter which should exist into the summer of 1976.

"The combination of these facts lead us to believe that the total tonnage of all red meat will be in relatively short supply. If our conclusions are correct, this will greatly increase the demand for grain-fed beef, which in turn, should strengthen our total business,' Carrothers concluded.


"We're trying to get our cow-calf operation started, and we hope that the girls eventually can have some

Considerable portion of the fall was in the form of fine hail and consequently did not reach a depth of more than half an inch, but produced about one sixteenth of an inch of moisture, most of the snow disappeared during the afternoon.

A.C. Teter, firm manager, said that damage to the grain could reach a \$75,000 figure, with the building loss probably passing the \$50,000 mark. The fire started from unknown sources in the headhouse of the old structure, blazing into the open only when the elevator doors were

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opened, admitting air. Annual meeting of the Parmer County Community Hospital stockholders was held Tuesday evening in Friona, with about 40 people present to hear the brightest financial report yet enabled in the local operation. Total assets of the hospital were revealed at \$167,546.02, with a net profit in 1955 more than doubling the previous 3-year average, and some \$13,000 more than the 1954 report. Operating expenses were up, also, topping the \$100,000 mark before the end of the audit period ending September 30.

The group, which will do business as "Parmer County Broadcasting Company, will locate its transmitter three miles southwest of Friona, just off U.S. Highway 60. It is not known where the studio will be located.

## **Feed Shocks**

Red Top Cane and other similar types of feed crops were harvested with a cussed contraption called a row binder. The binder was pulled behind a tractor or team of horses. When it was working properly (my uncle said there was no such thing as one that worked properly) it cut the feed, tied it in bundles about ten inches in diameter with binder twine and dumped the bundles out behind it on the ground Farm hands came along soon after, gathered the bundles and shocked them Several bundles would be stacked up on their ends by leaning them against each other. They were left that way for several days to dry

The shocks resembled Indian teepees and when we were kids we pretended that's what they were. We used to move the bundles around somewhat to make a door and a little room inside

There would be many shocks in each field so each kid could have his very own teepee. We would pretend a lot and use the places for hideouts Grownups didn't much like for us to play in feed shocks because spiders and snakes liked to play in them, too. Also, if the bundles were moved around too much, the shock might collapse and have to be built back again.

When the feed had dried properly, it was loaded onto a wagon and hauled to the stack lot where the bundles were laid in neat rows side by side and stacked very high. In the winter when all the good pasture grass was gone the cattle were fed from the stack lot. Several bundles were pulled off each night and thrown over the fence to the cows. In most years there was enough feed in the stack lot for the cattle to get by until the next spring when the new crop of grass

# **Hill Issues Opinion**

A seven-point letter designed to answer questions raised by the recent Attorney General's Opinion eliminating many fees traditionally charged public school students was mailed to school administrators across the state Friday by Dr. M.L. Brockette, Commissioner of Education.

The opinion issued on October 1 by Attorney General John L. Hill covered three key areas: tuition for driver education, charges for school supplies and instruction and lab fees, and fees for extra curricular activities.

Hill's ruling confines itself to the specific questions asked, Brockette's letter to the school superintendents points out. It also states that all areas addressed in the opinion that are not permitted by law are prohibited.

"The following statements are submitted in response to the many questions from local school districts," Brockette says in his letter to some 1,100 district superintendents. "We hope the following will help you in implementing the opinion.

(1) The effective date is the date of the ruling, October 1, 1975. The Attorney General's Opinion did not cover fees collected prior to the date of October 1, 1975.

(2) The ruling does not speak to students furnishing uipment.

traditional supplies such as

pencils, paper, etc. (3) Fees charged to buy such materials as workbooks, etc., are covered under the ruling. Fees for typing, labs, etc., are also covered by the ruling.

(4) Materials , necessary for the student to acquire basic skills in vocational education courses must be furnished by the school district. However, the school district may allow a student, at his option, to furnish costlier or different vocational materials for approved projects undertaken for credit in such courses without incurring any obligation to pay for such materials, so long as the materials and the projects created from them remain the property of the student.

(5) A school district may charge tuition for driver training if taught in the student's fourth quarter (summer school). This is one of the areas in which tuition may be charged as indicated in Texas Education Code 16.864.

(6) 'A school district may charge non-participating students admission to extra curricular activities where attendance is voluntary.

(7) A rental fee may not be charged for band uniforms. The opinion does not address the question of students furnishing their own uniforms and-or eq-


#### Postal Service Awards Three







Friona surprised the unbeaten Wildcats (8-0-1) by carrying the fight, and when the dust had settled, Friona held a lead over the potent 'Cats, both in rushing yardage and in total yardage.

But untimely mistakes, which have plagued the Chieftains throughout the 1975 season, once again proved costly, and although Friona moved the ball at will, it could not get the pigskin over the goal-line on critical drives.

The second time Friona had the ball, the Chieftains moved the ball in a picture-perfect drive, going from their own 45 to the Wildcat one. Jeff Whiteside had made the drive's beginning possible by intercepting a Littlefield pass on the Friona 20 and returning it to the 45.

Bobby Zetzsche gave the team a pair of first downs with runs of six and nine yards. Glen London then broke for six yards over the middle, giving Friona a first and go situation at the Littlefield eight.

Quarterback Keith Martin carried the ball three times, making four, two and one, and moving the ball to a critical fourth and goal at the Wildcat one. After a time out, the Chieftains lined up in field goal formation and Davy Carthel calmly booted the ball between the uprights—an 18-yard goal that sent Friona into a surprising lead, 3-0 with just 0:01 showing on the first

Littlefield answered the challenge following the kickoff. The Wildcats' all-purpose back, Bill Turner, and wingback Steve Cruz paced a steady drive from the visitors' 45 that culminated when Turner sliced over from the three with 6:38 left in the first half. Turner's kick made the score 7-3, Littlefield.

Friona committed a clip on the kickoff, and was penalized back to their eight yard line. The bad field position proved more than critical when Keith Martin fumbled on first down after a jarring tackle, and Littlefield took over on the Friona

It took the inspired Wildcats just three plays to cash in, with the elusive Cruz going over from the one. Turner's kick moved Littlefield's lead to 14-3, and the Wildcats had scored a pair of touchdowns in less than a minute of clock time.

The third quarter really took on a Halloween setting, as it was accompanied by thunder, lightning and a rain that hampered play somewhat.

Friona made an inspired drive the first time they had the ball, going from their 38 following a Wildcat punt. London did some fine running, gaining five, four, eight and four yards in four straight tries to move the ball into Littlefield territory.

Then, a personal foul penalty helped things, pushing the ball to the Wildcat 25. However, the visitors' defense stiffened at this point, and facing fourth and three from the 18, Martin was swarmed for a two-yard

loss practically before he could get the play underway.

Late in the quarter Littlefield took over following a short Friona punt and began a drive of their own.

Cruz became the man of the hour for the Wildcats, carrying the ball ten out of twelve times, and moving the ball steadily upfield. Cruz' longest gain was 17 yards. He gave the 'Cats a first and goal at the three, and from there quarterback Ronald Palmer went over.

Turner was set to kick the point, but after a bad snap, he picked up the ball and headed for the flag. The misplay resulted in two points for the visitors instead of the one they were 'after, and Littlefield's lead became 22-3.

Kelwin King broke loose on the next series of downs, and found himself in the Littlefield secondary. He headed for the right sideline, and it was a footrace between him and the Littlefield safety, who unfortunately had the angle on King, and caught him at the Littlefield 25 after a brilliant 59-yard run.

On fourth down, Friona needed just over two yards, and King got the call. The speedy junior slashed for two, but a measurement showed Friona was just inches short of keeping the drive going at the Littlefield 15.

Friona's frustration was even worse a moment later, when the team found themselves on their own five yard line. Martin rolled back into the end zone, and was tackled by the Wildcat defenders for a two-point safety, and the score became 24-3.

Late in the quarter, the Chiefs finally were on the receiving end of a break, when the Littlefield punter got a bad snap and was swarmed by the charging Chieftains at the 18 yard line.

Friona was not to be denied this time. Martin ran to the 11, and King went around end 11 yards for the touchdown with only 56 seconds left in the game. King also got two points

on a running play that was somewhat busted, but still clicked for points

King was Friona's top rusher for the second time this season with 86 yards on nine plays. The Chiefs led in yards rushing, 210-205, and in total yards, 225-213.

It was the fifth game for Friona to lead in statistics but trail on the scoreboard.

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

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

# Salvation Army Helps People In Distress

Manager, was preparing to close up and go home after five one recent afternoon when the phone rang. The caller was a man asking for Outland's help with a problem.

As chairman of The Salvation Army Service Unit Committee, a member agency of the Friona United Fund, Outland was accustomed to receiving phone calls at all hours from troubled people.

"I've started work on a regular job," the man said, "so I can't qualify for help from the county--they have strict rules. But it's ten days to my first pay check and meanwhile there's no food in the house for my family. Could The Salvation Army tide me over with groceries 'til I get paid?"

Outland questioned the man to ascertain his needs, then instructed him to contact the Service Unit welfare secretary who would issue the purchase order for groceries. When the conversation ended, the caller seemed much relieved.

The case is one of many that occur in Friona throughout the year. It illustrates the reason why the Service Unit is an important part of the complex public and private structures that help people in financial trouble.

"We exist to help people who do not qualify-for one reason or another-for help from other sources," Outland explained.

"For example, the county has residency requirements that permit it to send their non-resident cases to us. A non-resident is anyone who has lived in the state less than a year or in the county less than six months.

"When you estimate the numbers of people shifting around the state and country every day, you get some idea of how the case load can build

Salvation Army rules are flexible, making sure that no one goes without food or shelter. If the question of need is borderline, it gives the client the benefit of the doubt, but usually will check out his case to make certain his problem is

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The kinds of help provided by the volunteer committee members are limited only by the number of basic necessities people require to function in our society. Food, shelter and clothing are such basics. But so are utilities, medicines and shoes and school supplies for children. The Service Unit will also pay a client's rent bill for a time or handle a minor medical or dental expense. Last Christmas 74 persons benefitted from food baskets distributed here

in Friona Besides helping local people, the Service Unit also provides stranded travelers with night lodgings and sometimes a meal or bus fare. In Friona recently, the Service Unit provided money for travel and expenses for a Friona resident to qualify herself for a new profession. She is now working in Friona.

"This summer we sent three boys to The Salvation Army Camp Hoblitzelle near Dallas for a week-long outing. They were Jess Trevino, Martin Mercado and Arthur Castillo. The program is carried out in cooperation with Army state headquarters.

There are other state-wide programs available to us: disaster relief in the event of a tornado or some other disaster, the home and hospital for unwed mothers, help for prisoners and their families, and the well-known program the Army runs for alcoholics.

"All of it depends on the United Way to keep going," Outland adds. Other members of the Service Unit Committee are: Mrs. Iola Nelson, Friona State Bank; Rev. Bobby McMillan, Friona Methodist Church; and Chief Bill Denney, Friona Police Department.

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



American Field Service Is United Fund Agency

The Friona United Fund supports the American Field Service which placed 6 foreign students in homes in Friona and has sent one local

American Field Service is the program which selects and places students in "host families" in various parts of the world. While spending up to a year in other countries, students generally participate in school activities and community life.

community life.

AFS is a nonsectarian, non-political organization that is chartered as a non-profit corporation. Its international program is offered without regard to race, religion, political affiliation or economic background. The staff and volunteers are representative of the more than 60 countries involved in the organization.

More than 2,600 students from over 60 different nations spend a year learning and living in the U.S. because of the AFS program. Another 1,500 U.S. students spend a full year or a summer experiencing another society and culture.

The Friona Chapter of American Field Service functions with a membership of ten, representing local service clubs and organizations. Currently Hollis Horton acts as president.

The first AFS exchange student to come to Friona was Annie Jensen who lived with the Meryl Massie family in 1961 and 1962. Annie was from Denmark. In 1963 and 1964 the Massie family were hosts to Nergis Yazgan from Turkey. Both girls

and visited the Massies. Mr. and Mrs. Massie have visited their foreign exchange students in Denmark and in Turkey.

Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Osborn were the host family for Eve Braunschweiger from Switzerland, in 1962 and 1963. In 1969 Eve and her husband came back here for a visit. Brenda Hawker from Australia stayed with the E.G. Phipps family in 1964 and 1965. The Phipps family visited with Brenda when they toured Australia in December 26, 1970. Mrs. Jeanette Teel and her family were hosts to the only male exchange student to come to Friona. Souvanah, came from Laos and was here in 1967 and 1968. Mrs. Teel, communicated with Souvanah for some time but has not heard since Jan. 1973 and the political upheavel and unrest in that

In 1970 and 1971, Jan Wallace from Australia was the exchange student and lived with the Carl Schlenker family.

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




# Farmers Seek Ways To Conserve Fuel

farmer's search for ways to conserve fuel and maintain yields in the wake of petroleum shortages and higher prices, the national leader of the Soil Conservation Service, says.

"Some farming systems will increase rapidly and others will be virtually abandoned," R.M. Davis, Soil Conservation Service administrator, said in the October issue of "Soil Conservation" magazine.

Minimum tillage, including no-till, is emerging as the most promising fuel saver for farmers. "This practice," said Davis, "has especially high potential for feed grains, cereals, soybeans and cotton-the crops most in demand on the world market."

In Texas, a switch from conventional tillage to minimum tillage saves an average of about 5 gallons of tractor fuel per acre per year. Since some 456,000 acres were farmed with minimum tillage last year, this amounted to a saving of some 2.3 million gallons of tractor fuel.

USDA predicts that by the year 2000, minimum tillage could account for annual

Change is inevitable in the fuel savings of 850 million gallons in machinery opera-

> Another energy saver is better management of irrigation water. According to Davis, SCS estimates that by increasing the efficiency of both delivery systems and on-farm irrigation, farmers could save more than 230 million gallons of fuel each

> "Although we can save a substantial amount of petroleum using the knowledge we have now," Davis said, "USDA and private groups are researching ways to save even more. And USDA is researching other energy sources, such as solar energy for drying crops and livestock was-

Davis appealed to soil and water conservation district officials to stay abreast of continuing research on new energy-saving practices and of all the possible benefits and drawbacks involved.

'By keeping informed of current developments in agriculture, SCS and district people can help farmers use fuel more efficiently without cutting agricultural produc-

Marks, a native of Heidenheimer, Texas, is currently state conservationist for Arizona. He began his career with SCS at Rusk in 1950 as a soil scientist and later worked as a soil conservationist and district conservationist at Sulphur Springs, Winnsboro, Jefferson, New Boston and Corsicana.

From 1964 to 1968, Marks was area conservationist at Temple. He then moved to Arkansas as an assistant state conservationist. In 1972, he was appointed state conservationist for Arizona. He received awards for outstanding work in 1967 and

## Triumphs Of Science

NUCLEAR POWER PLANTS SMOKELESS The increasing use of nu-

clear power plants to generate electricity in the United States is due in a large part to their environmental benefits.

Nuclear power and fossil plants (those that use coal, oil or natural gas as fuels) are similar in many basic respects - heat from their fuel boils water, and the steam drives a turbine that generates electricity.

The basic difference is that the heat in a fossil plant comes from burning oil, gas or coal. In a nuclear plant it comes from fission the splitting of uranium atoms. Scientists point out that because there is no combustion, nuclear plants release no carbon dioxide. sulfur compounds or particulates into the environment around the plant.

Another environmental benefit is that less land is used for nuclear than a comparable coal-fired plant,

with the land disruption for nuclear fuel cycle being considerably less than for coal

Last year, nuclear power plants represented only 8



per cent of the total U.S. generating capacity; by 1980 they will account for 20 per cent. The environmental benefits are just one of the reasons that nuclear power is becoming a major source of safe, dependable electric power throughout the United States and the
