POLITICS IN SPOTLIGHT

Denney Announces For County Sheriff

Political activity began to simmer somewhat across the county this week, with 1976 scheduled to be a general election year.

A contest developed this week for County Sheriff, when H.R. (Bill) Denney announced as an opponent to incumbent Charlie Lovelace. Denney is currently serving as Friona's Chief of Police.

It's the first time in a number of vears for Lovelace to have an opponent for the position. He has served in the capacity of sheriff

Denney filed for the Democratic nomination for the position with County Democratic chairman Hollis

Others filing with the chairman include Raymond Euler, who filed for the position of commissioner for precinct one (Friona-Black and Lakeview). Incumbent commissioner Tom Lewellen, who has held the position since 1960, has indicated that he would not be a candidate for

Also filing, for commissioner of Precinct 3 (Farwell and Oklahoma Lane) is former County Judge Archie Tarter. Cecil Atchley is the incumbent commissioner. Hugh Moseley, county tax assessor-collector, has filed for re-election.

In addition to the two commissioner spots and the ocunty sheriff's office, other offices which come up for election in 1976 include the District Attorney and County Attorney.

Denney, 54, is a native of Bovina, and has 14 years experience in the field of law enforcement. He is a veteran of World War II, serving in the U.S. Navy.

Following his service in the Navy, Denney farmed and was a mail carrier for the Bovina Star Route for a few years. In 1962, he was employed as city marshal by the City of Bovina, a position he held until September of 1967.

Denney moved to Friona in 1967, where he was employed by the City of Friona as a patrolman. In September of 1971, he was appointed as Chief of Police, and has served in

this capacity since that time. He is certified as a law enforcement officer, having completed law enforcement courses at

Amarillo College.

"In announcing as a candidate for sheriff of Parmer County on the Democratic ticket in the May primary election, I want the people to know that I would like the opportunity of serving them as their sheriff," Denney said this week.

Ruzickas Establish Senior Scholarship

A perpetual scholarship, to assist graduating senior students at Friona and Bovina High Schools has been announced by Leo and Margaret Ruzicka.

Ruzicka announced that he and his wife had placed in a certificate of deposit a total of \$10,000. Each year, the interest money (\$750) will be made available to seniors from Friona and Bovina, based on the number of students in the senior class, for scholarship purposes. To be known as the Leo and

Margaret Ruzicka Scholarship Fund, the grant will be awarded to students who are first nominated by members of the senior class at the respective schools.

The recipients will then be chosen from a special board of trustees, to consist of community leaders from Friona and Bovina. Ruzicka said that the students chosen for the scholarship would be chosen on the basis of need (40 per cent), scholastic achievement (30 per cent)

and citizenship (30 per cent). "I would hope that the students selected will have been of service to their school, church and community,

Longtime Friona Backer, O.F. Lange, Succumbs

The Friona area lost a pioneer citizen and businessman on December 21, when Oscar F. (Os) Lange passed away in Houston after being ill for approximately two months.

Services for Lange, longtime civic leader and manager of Friona's Rockwell Brothers Lumber outlet, were held on Tuesday, December 23 at the Union Congregational Church. Burial was at Friona Cemetery.

Lange had the remarkable record of serving as manager of Rockwell Bros. for over 56 years. He came to Friona in June of 1919 to run the local lumber yard, and had served in the same capacity until his death. Ever a public servant, "Os" had

Lions Club, of which he was a charter member. He was the originator of Friona's "Trades Day" promotions, an early-day business

Lange also had served on the board of trustees for the Congregational Church, and had served the church in other capacities, including building committee chairman. He

was a veteran of World War I. The longtime Friona resident was born in Llano in Central Texas in 1896, and had been employed by the Rockwell Company there prior to his service in the U.S. Army. His father, B. Lange, managed a lumber yard in Llano for Rockwell Brothers for a number of years.

Following his military service, Lange was given the opportunity of coming to Friona to manage the company's operation. He once said he never regretted his decision to come to the High Plains.

"It took me less than 30 days to decide that Friona was the place I wanted to settle down. I saw the possibilities of a growing community, and wanted to be a part of it," Lange said in an interview with a Friona Star representative in 1968.

In 1926, Lange married Rose Coneway, and for the better part of 50 years, she assisted with his civic work, serving as local Red Cross chairman for 20 years, and earning

Commerce. Rose preceded Lange in death in 1972.

Survivors include three daugh ters, Miss Doris Ann Lange of Houston, Mrs. Carolyn Lynn of Houston and Mrs. Kay Jonte of Chicago; three sons, Charles Coneway of Houston, Albert Coneway of Harlingen and Robert Coneway of Kansas City, Kan.

Three sisters also survive, Mrs. Emma Berry of Burnett, Mrs. Bertha Wolf and Mrs. Anna Gray, both of San Antonio. Nine grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren survive.

Funeral arrangements were under the direction of Parsons-Ellis Funeral Home of Friona. Rev. David Plumb, pastor of the Union Congregational Church, presented the eulogy. Pallbearers were John Fred

MEMBERING.-Chuck Wagon

During round up time on larger cowhands often had to stay out on the range several days. In those times a chuck wagon was a familiar sight to all and a welcomed one to a cowboy who had worked hard all day. It was usually a standard flat bed wag on with short sideboards. The tail gate was left out and the chuck box was bolted in place at the back of the wagon. The chuck box was a cabinet-looking thing that had a large door facing the rear of the wagon. The door was hinged at the bottom and latched at the top. While in use, the door folded down to serve as a table or counter on which to prepare the food. Various sized compartments inside the box held the supplies, tin plates and knives, forks and spoons.

If you were a picky eater you were in trouble on a round up. The menu was not elaborate as any cowboy can tell you. The choice was usually beans, bacon, sourdough bread and fresh beef butchered there on the spot. Canned goods were taken along, usually peaches, corn and tomatoes. Canned milk was used whenever it was needed for cooking. Coffee was the accepted drink.

One cook used to try to be nice to the hands and would make them a cake occasionally. A cowboy was heard to say he didn't mind the cake so much except it tasted a lot like the corn bread, only the corn bread was sweeter. Very little complaining was done about the food though because appetites were usually high by the time the dinner bell

sounded. One thing about the Chuck box though, it was the cook's territory and no cowhand was to ever mess around in it. That was a good way to get shot or at least get a good cussin'

"Chuck" was a term for food but the chuck wagon was more than just a place to eat. It was the cowboy's home away from home, a place where there was always hot coffee and a warm fire. Bed rolls were unrolled around it at night among prickly pears, rocks and sometimes rattlesnakes.

When darkness came in the evening it was a place to gather and tell stories; stories about other days, of gun fights, girls, drinking and lifelong dreams. Of

course a lot of them were lies but that didn't matter. They took the cowboy's mind off the hard day's work just completed and made his life a little more exciting

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

MBPXL Votes For Quarterly Dividend

the Board of Directors of MBPXL Corporation voted a policy of regular quarterly ten cent (\$.10) dividends per share with the first payment to be made on February 11, 1976, to holders of record on January 21, 1976. A special ten cent (\$.10) extra dividend is to be paid with the first regular quarterly dividend.

David J. La Fleur, President, announced that MBPXL Corporation earned \$3.12 per share in the year ending October 25, 1975. This is a 42 per cent increase over the \$2.20 per share in the preceding fiscal year.



Electric Company In Policy Change

Southwestern Public Service Company announced today that it will no longer bill its Texas customers monthly for the one-sixth of one percent of its annual Texas revenues that it is assessed under the law which established the Texas Public Utilities Commission. The company also announced that it would refund the amount that it has collected since the new law went into

A Southwestern spokesman said that, while the company and the Public Utilities Commission were in agreement that the tax clause in the company's rate ordinances made the collection of the assessment

there was a difference of opinion between the Commission and the company on whether the tax clause permitted the company to assess rural customers.

"The question here is what is fair to Southwestern's customers. It would not be fair to collect legally from one set of customers and not assess the others, when all of our Texas customers are part of the jurisdiction of the utility commission," the spokesman said.

Refunds of the assessment already collected will be made to customers as soon as possible.

The Friona High School Chieftains, champions of the first two Amarillo American Legion Holiday basketball tournaments, finally lost their rabbit's foot in the big city event this year, but the team continued its fine play in the Amarillo classic.

Pheasant Season Termed "Best"

which closed locally on December 28 was the most successful ever. This is the opinion of several area hunters, and is shared by Jack Patterson, president of the Parmer County

Game Management Association. Patterson said that he personally went hunting only three days during the 18-day season which spanned three weekends, but that he and those hunting with him managed to easily get their limits each time.

"Since the season closed, I have seen a number of cock pheasants, so this should be a sign that there will still be plenty left for mating purposes. You don't normally see many birds this soon after the season closes, so it should be a good sign," Patterson said.

The county hunting enthusiast said that in visiting with his neighbors and hunters from across the area, the general concensus is that while we have had a number of good pheasant seasons in Parmer County, the 1975 season apparently

was the best of the lot. One thing that apparently made the hunting easier was that due to the excellent weather the area enjoyed this fall, farmers by and large had worked their stubble ground, which caused the pheasants to have to congregate in smaller areas. This made it hard for the pheasants and easier on the hunters.

there were a number of young pheasants killed this year, indicating that there are several younger birds still coming up.

"We have plenty of birds left to provide a good crop, providing that the weather and the farmers cooperate," Patterson said.

On this last point, Patterson said "The pheasant has to be a hardy bird to survive in this area, the way folks farm.

"We bury all of the excellent cover. Some farmers will leave a fence row, thinking that will be enough. But if we should get a three or four inch blowing snow, it will cover the fence row in no time, and the pheasants will be driven out into bare ground," he explained.

'There isn't a farmer in the county who could not afford to leave ten acres of ground through the critical months, to provide cover that the birds need, and insure the success of our great recreation we've developed. Many of these same farmers who plow up all of their ground are hunters, but they expect someone else to provide the cover. Just like on anything else, they want a 'free ride,' " Patterson

He pointed out that burning of stubble destroys a number of pheasants each year, particularly young birds. Farmers feel that it's but studies have shown that it takes away excellent soil builders and removes things from the soil that can't be put back.

And stubble fires at night are doubly destructive, even killing the grown birds, Patterson says. "They can't see the fire until it's too late,' he explains.

But in spite of gross negligence by the majority of our farmers, the pheasants manage to survive.

The hunt now attracts scores of hunters from all across the region. Many people have relatives and friends come from miles away for the opening day of the season.

This year, a special "hunter's breakfast" was featured both in Friona and in Bovina. Restaurants and motels, in addition to service stations and other businesses, benefit from the hunt. Parmer County has a reputation of having some of the best hunting of any of the 32 Panhandle counties which holds a

A number of years, former Governor Preston Smith has helped kick off the season in the local area, and he was once again on hand this year on opening day, as a guest of

Herschel Johnson of Friona. Other dignitaries that we learned of who hunted in the county were

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

Cities Get Monthly Sales Tax Payments

The cities of Friona and Bovina were among Texas municipalities who received sales tax checks in December amounting to \$40.8 million. according to state comptroller Bob Bullock.

Friona received a check of \$5,824.15, and the City of Bovina received \$1,743.23.

The checks were for the tax period which ended November 30. Friona's check included \$805.30 due from the previous period, while Bovina received \$196.92 from the prior period.

Bullock said that the checks mailed December 15 made a grand total of \$233.7 million which Texas cities

had received as their share of the sales tax. Municipalities which have voted the tax receive one cent for every \$1.00 spent on taxable goods.

The checks mailed out in December ranged from a check for 10 cents to the city of Graford in Palo Pinto County to \$8,707,145 to the city of Houston.


St. Ann's

Sprinklers --Cure-All For Area?

How are your irrigation wells doing? Are they healthy or are they sick? Many wells are getting weak enough that people are starting to worry. Water application efficiency is weighing heavy on a lot of minds.

Sprinkler irrigation gives the appearance of being a cure for many evils. However, before jumping up and making a sizeable investment for a sprinkler there are a few things to consider.

First of all and probably most important is the water supply. Some circle type sprinklers may run on 200 to 300 gallons per minute, but how well will the crop be irrigated? It does no good to run irrigation wells and-or sprinklers if the crop is burning up before it can get another shot of water.

so it stands to reason if you cannot water but 50 acres of corn with furrow irrigation, you probably cannot water the 130 acres of corn that a sprinkler

Adequate amounts of irrigation water changes all this. With 800 to 1000 gallons

optimum. Irrigation intervals are better and water leaves the picture as a limiting factor.

Sprinkler irrigation also complements minimum tillage operations. This is a consideration with many producers. Sprinkler irrigation coupled with minimum tillage can save water, labor and equipment.
