ALTHOUGH THE WEATHER has been somewhat of a problem for some of the area's farmers—as well as a number of businesses and residents of the city of Amarillo this summer—for the segment of the farm community which has not experienced hail, the summer of 1982 has been above-average in many respects.

From the standpoint of moisture, farmers have received much better rainfall than average during the May-June-July quarter, and this has been great for the farmers who are strictly dryland farmers, or who have had to cut back on their irrigation due either to weaker water or high energy prices.

The rainfall received during the month of July was much better than average. Many times the "middle month" of the summer will pass with scarcely any moisture received, at a time when growing crops are at the height of their moisture need.

Not only was a good amount of rainfall received during the month just passed, but the rains were also spaced out good in many sections of the county, and this is also worth a lot.

Farmers in the dryland section in the northern part of Parmer County got another good rain last Friday morning, and this should give them more than adequate ground-moisture to plant their wheat crops.

If farmers could just see the prices on their farm commodities take an upward trend, it would go a long way toward making the 1982 farm year a successful one. Prices have been on the down-side for so long a time, that it seems they surely will take a turn for the better.

THE PROBLEM OF a better deal for farmers is one on which Bovina resident Ralph Roming has been working on the political level for the past three years or so, and Roming is announcing this week that he plans to devote full time to his position in a lobbying effort on behalf of agriculture.

Virtually every one of the area's elected representatives, from Representative Bill Clayton to Congressman Kent Hance, has said that the key to getting something accomplished for agriculture in congress is more work along the "Political Action Committee" line.

Roming, with his farming experience, and agri-business background, should be a natural to work in this arena. In fact, it was this background which prompted Speaker Clayton to name Roming to his staff a couple of years ago.

With the recent publicity the farm sector has received due to the hail-related disaster all the way from Parmer County on down the line, this could be a good time for agriculture to get its story across.

A number of national figures, both in and out of agriculture were made aware recently of the plight the farmers are in due to weather-related losses.

If the farmers can get the message to congress and the administration that they at least need a fighting chance to make a profit in the marketplace, then perhaps the farm economy will "turn the corner," and once again offer the profit potential that it formerly did.

Elevator Employee Dies In Accident

An employee of West Friona Grain, Miguel Huerta, 19, suffocated after becoming covered with corn while working at the elevator Thursday afternoon.

Don Huckabee, general manager of West Friona Grain, said that three employees were in the barn, as the barn was being unloaded. They were stationed at the top of the corn, and were helping the corn flow to the bottom, where it is carried out of the enclosure.

Although the men were instructed to stay at the top of the corn, on the sides, the co-workers told elevator manager Waymon Wilkins that Huerta went to the bottom, perhaps to "speed things up."

Apparently, in an effort to walk back up the pile of corn, Huerta began to be covered, and yelled for assistance.

The other two, Julian Gomez and Estrevo Leyqv said they managed to grab Huerta by the arms, at which time he was covered about to the waist, but could not dislodge him. They ran to shut off the loading apparatus, but there was more than enough corn in a sliding motion to cover up the victim.

The two elevator employees then

shouted for help, and the Friona Fire Department and Emergency crew were summoned.

The emergency workers cut an opening in the steel storage unit, and brought machinery in an effort to uncover the victim. It took almost three hours for rescue workers to find Huerta.

Hampering the operation was the dust from the corn, and cutting the opening also was a chore.

Huerta had only been employed by the elevator about a month, when several new employees were hired. He had come to Friona from Muleshoe, and had been living at the Saratoga Gardens apartments.

Huckabee said it was always the elevator's policy to use three men in the unloading operation, for safety purposes. Wilkins said he had checked with the crew "not more than five minutes prior to the accident," and that everything was running smoothly.

MBPXL To Change Name

MBPXL Corp., the beef processing subsidiary of Cargill Inc., today changed its name to Excel Corp.

Excel President Bill Nicholson said the move would eliminate confusion over the company's name.

"The old name combined the initials of Missouri Beef Packers (MBP) with initials representing the Excel brand name of Kansas Beef Industries," he said.

Missouri Beef Packers and Kansas Beef Industries merged in 1974 to form MBPXL Corp. Since the merger, Nicholson said, the company has steadily expanded its range of boxed beef items and marketing programs for domestic and export markets.

He said the new corporate name will be identified closely with the Excel brand.

Excel is based in Wichita and also has plants in Rockport, Missouri, Dodge City, Kansas, Friona and Plainview, Texas.

Company spokesman Les Williams said Excel has about 5,000 employees.

The firm was acquired by Cargill in 1979.

25 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 8, 1957

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Mosquitoes Threaten Animals

Local residents have been warned to check their pets and horses for special diseases this summer, due to the unusual amount of rain, and the high mosquito population.

Dr. Gary Cash, Friona veterinarian, said that there had been a confirmed case of viral encephalitis in a horse this summer in Bovina, so horse owners need to be on the lookout, lest there be an outbreak of this disease, otherwise known as "sleeping sickness."

Dr. Cash said the symptoms of encephalitis in horses include staggering, severe depression and incoordination. The viral germ is transferred to horses from birds to mosquitoes.

The germ is not transferrable from horses to humans, Dr. Cash said, but the same mosquitoes that transfer the virus to a horse could give it to a human.

The local veterinarian said that there had been some unconfirmed reports of humans contracting sleeping sickness in the Hereford area

this summer. Dr. Cash warned that this could be a bad year for viral encephalitis, due to the weather conditions, but that if horse owners will keep an eye on their animals, such an outbreak as was seen in the area in 1977, and again in 1980 might be avoided.

In 1977, around 100 cases of the equine encephalitis were recorded in Parmer County, as the disease reached epidemic proportions. The situation was not nearly as bad locally in 1980, although neighboring counties were severely affected.

Concerning household and yard pets, such as dogs and cats, Dr. Cash said that heartworms, a problem affecting dogs, is transferrable from birds, also by the pesky mosquito.

Fleas and ticks also can become a problem, and fleas are the intermediate hosts for some types of tapeworms. When dogs chew fleas and break them open, the tapeworms are swallowed and can get into the animal's digestive system.

Dr. Cash said that the area's

weather conditions of 1981 also has been conducive to a heavy infestation of fleas--the mild winter which was followed by a rainy season and hot humid summer days.

The veterinarian suggested that there are several remedies for controlling fleas. One is a solution which can be sponged over the pet. There are also sprays and powders, and oral pills.

Pet owners were reminded to read the product label and follow the instructions carefully, as improper use of flea and tick products can kill a pet.

But treating you pet is not enough, according to Dr. Cash. Unless the premises, including the house and yard, have been treated, the fleas or ticks may come back. Pets should also be kept within the confines of the treated areas, the veterinarian said.

If in doubt about the best method for controlling fleas and ticks, contact your veterinarian for his suggestions for your particular problem.

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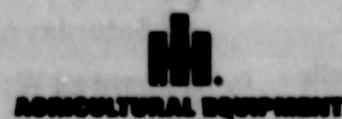

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VISION SCREENING SCHOOL CHILDREN

Vision screening programs conducted in school are valuable in measuring how well or how poorly a child sees with each eye at 20 feet. Our School Nurses who conduct the screening programs do a good job, but such screening cannot substitute for a thorough vision examination by an eye specialist. For instance, problems with near vision, eye coordination and focusing ability and eye health conditions may not be discovered merely by using the typical school screening tests.

The American Optometric Association lists these basic vision needs for school: Near Vision—the ability to focus and see clearly at 13 to 16 inches; Binocular coordination—ability to make the two eyes work together; Distance Vision—the ability to see clearly at 10 feet or more; and Adequate field of vision—ability to see to both sides and up and down while focusing on a small object.

A complete visual analysis is needed to evaluate these abilities. All school children should have a complete vision examination each year and healthy adults at least each two years by an Optometrist.

Education—Our Money's Worth?

In my travels over Texas, it has become clear that Texans rate crime, the economy, and the education of their children among their principal concerns.

This week I would like to discuss education. As the father of six children, this has long been one of my principal concerns also.

We currently spend over half our tax revenue on education, and many people raise the question to me: "Are we getting our money's worth?"

The questions put to me indicate some think we are spending too much, others, not enough.

I am concerned about the amount of money we spend on education, but I am more concerned about the quality of that education. I believe the quality of education our children receive can be improved by making some fundamental changes in the way we pay and treat our teachers. I believe in merit pay for teachers. Frankly, I think good

teachers ought to be paid more than poor teachers. A good, conscientious teacher cannot help but become discouraged and disillusioned when he or she ends the month with the same pay as one whom they know to be indifferent. The result is apt to be that they leave the teaching profession altogether.

I also think we ought to enter a system of competency testing not only for new teachers, but for those who are currently teaching. We test our kids, why not also test those who teach them?

In short, I think we ought to bear down on the basics, relieve our teachers of burdensome paper work now placed upon them, and recognize and reward our better teachers with better pay, for the sake of our children, and our future.

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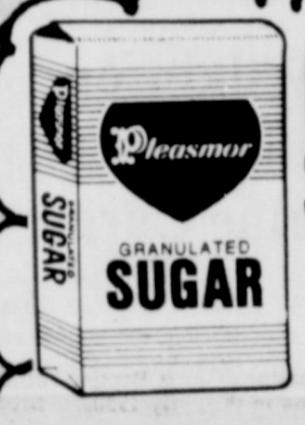

Sunday evening was a night of fellowship, food, swimming and singing for members and friends of Union Congregational Church.

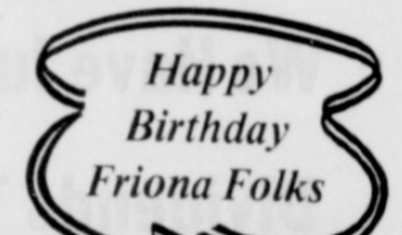
The evening was begun by two hours of fun and frolic in the
