PERHAPS YOU SAW it featured in the national newscasts of the past weekend; but if not, then we at least need to mention this fact in passing.

This past week, August 7, to pin it down more precisely, was the 100th anniversary of the beginning of the most famous of all the family feuds that ever existed in America.

We're referring of course, to the great Hatfield-McCoy dispute, which raged for the better part of two decades after that fateful day in 1882, when three McCoy brothers attacked Randolph Hatfield, who later died.

What we didn't know until the centennial coverage of the event, was that the event which set off the feud happened at a local polling place, when members of the Hatfield family began arguing with the McCoy's.

It was theorized that members of both groups had been hitting the "moonshine whiskey" pretty heavily on that day in August a hundred years ago. Due to the fact that the feud happened in the part of the country which is well known for its "spirits" this theory probably comes pretty close to the truth.

After all, how many states outside of Kentucky do you know that have a county by the name of Bourbon?

Anyway, back to our family feud. Although the dispute may have been glamorized through the written word and made "bigger than it actually was," one report said that during the latter part of the 19th century in the area along Blackberry Creek, more than 100 men, women and children had been killed or wounded.

The feud even had its romantic angle, when Johnse Hatfield courted Rose Ann McCoy and the two ran away together, "living in sin." Adding insult to injury as far as the McCoy's were concerned was the fact that later, young Hatfield abandoned Rose Anne.

At one point during the height of the feud, the two states of Kentucky and West Virginia came close to having their own private war, when governors of the two states threatened to send out their respective militias to put down the disturbance.

But the fighting finally ended, and when the patriarch of the Hatfield clan, "Devil Anse" Hatfield died in 1921, it was said that the fighting had been over for at least 25 years.

But the old feud was never officially laid to rest until a public ceremony in 1976, when the oldest members of the two clans, Willis Hatfield, 88, and Jimmy McCoy, 91, meeting on Blackberry Creek to dedicate a monument for six of the feud's victims, finally shook hands.

This past weekend, in the Appalachian hills, hundreds of Hatfield and McCoy descendants came home for a joint Hatfield and McCoy reunion, and according to reports, they all got along pretty well.

Time has a way of healing things, it appears—even the most bitter of feuds.

Maloufs Worry About Relatives In Lebanon

While the eyes and ears of the entire world have been focused on the war-torn country of Lebanon for the past several weeks, Friona businessman Hannah Malouf has had more than just a passing interest in the violence that has destroyed portions of the country.

Malouf's brother, Yousef, his mother, Jamileh Malouf, and his sister, Labibe Abboud, as well as families of the brother and sister, live in Lebanon. The brother lives in East Beirut. The mother and sister live in Tyre.

Communicating has been virtually "nil" since the fighting was begun. Malouf said Wednesday it had been a month and a half since he talked by telephone with his brother, and even then the brother had not heard from the mother.

"If there was bad news, we would probably hear it quickly," said Malouf regarding his relatives in Lebanon, indicating that "no news is good news."

In addition to the close relatives, Malouf has a number of nephews and cousins in Lebanon. Mrs. Malouf's only close relatives in the Mid-East are cousins, in Jerusalem.

Malouf explained that the constant instability of the Mid-East was the reason he brought his family out and to America, in 1959.

"We were living in Jerusalem in 1948, during the Jew-Arab war. We lost everything, and fled with our three young children to Lebanon," the Friona businessman said.

From 1948 until 1959, the Maloufs lived in Tyre, where he was a merchant. He became very familiar with the city of Beirut, 60 miles away, as this was the supply center for the material for his business.

But by 1959, Malouf could see the handwriting on the wall, and decided to move his family to America.

"There will never be peace (in the Middle East)...Not in 2,000 years," Malouf declared. "Why, Iran and Iraq...they could fight 100 years," he said.

"I know the Palestinian people. I

know the Lebanese people, the Syrian people, the Iraq people—everyone there. It was my life and my country, my people...They should give them (the Palestinians) land," Malouf stated.

There are untold numbers of Palestinian refugees scattered across the Middle East as a result of the Arab-Israeli wars of 1948 and 1967. The Palestinians were driven from their homeland by the Israelis.

Malouf, who himself is Lebanese, said that people in the Middle East with Arab backgrounds are raised with a "hate the Jews" attitude, and boys grow up with the idea of fighting well cultivated.

The Maloufs said they are abhorred by the destruction which they see in pictures in publications and on television, because they show familiar places. "They are tearing up the country," Malouf said.

"The Lebanese are a peaceful people. They welcomed the Palestinians with open arms. There are over 500,000 Palestinians in the city of Tyre alone," he said.

Malouf said the PLO was able to gain a foothold in Lebanon due to the fact that Lebanon had no strong army.

"They don't want the PLO in Lebanon—but no other country wants them, either," he said.

The Maloufs say that natives of America don't know how to appreciate their country. "This country is the best country in the world, I'll tell you...it's a peaceful country, a free country. I don't like war—that's why I came here."

"I can't understand why those Arab countries won't take the PLO...only Sudan is willing, and they don't want to go to Africa," Malouf said.

After landing in New York in 1959, the Maloufs went by boat to Brownsville, and then to Lubbock and later to Lockney. For a time, Malouf had stores in both Lubbock and Lockney. He drove back and forth on a daily basis to see after the two stores.

From Lubbock and Lockney, the Maloufs moved to Hereford, where he specialized in the cloth business. He opened his first store in Friona in 1966, and in 1969 expanded to his present location, the former Friona Lanes building.

The Maloufs had eight of their 13 children when they first landed in America, with the last five being born here.

"Maybe this weekend we'll be able to talk to our relatives. We're going to try again. I appreciate the people of Friona, for their concern. Friona is like one big family. People care about you. We like it here," Malouf concluded.

Chieftains Have Good Turnout

Some 83 prospects have been going through two-a-day workouts at Friona High School this week, and Coach Tommy Moss says he has been well pleased with the first week of practice.

Number-wise, the Chieftain squad is running ahead of last year's pace.

"The freshmen weren't actually required to come out, but 18 of those 26 boys have been out this week. We have 91 players committed to play football in high school," Moss said.

Coach Moss said that there were 43 players in the junior and senior classes alone, compared to only 27 in the top two grades a year ago.

"This will give us an opportunity to have some latitude. There will be probably eight or nine juniors on the junior varsity team, a luxury we didn't have last year," he said.

Moss said he felt that the squad was somewhat ahead of where they were after a week a year ago. "They know what we're doing and what to expect," he said.

The Chieftain coach pointed to another "plus" for the 1982 squad, the fact that there are three or four players who have played quarterback, when last year the team was almost starting from scratch.

Friday was slated to be the first contact for the players, as they donned pads and uniforms for the first time. The squad has been working out at 8 a.m. and 6 p.m. each day.

School Gives Details On Enrollment Plans

Schedule for the opening day of school, and where students are to report to register were announced this week by Superintendent of Schools Tom Jarboe.

There will be no pre-registration for students from kindergarten through eighth grade, who will report on the first day of school, August 23.

Jarboe also asked students new to the system to report to the proper principal during the week of August 12-18. New students should also bring report records from their former school, as well as immunization records and birth certificates.

The cafeteria will begin serving on Monday, August 23. All students in kindergarten through the fifth grade are required to stay on campus for the lunch hour, so must plan to either eat in the cafeteria or bring their lunches.

Pre-registration will be held for high school students on Friday, August 20. Students in the ninth and tenth grades will register at 9 a.m. Those in the 11th and 12th grades register at 10:30 p.m.

For the other students, Jarboe gave the following schedule for the first day of school:

Kindergarten: report to north entrance of Primary Building; first grade: south end of Primary Building; second grade: new wing of grade school building, using north entrance (behind cafeteria) on Cleveland Street.

Third grade: west entrance off Cleveland Street; fourth grade: east of grade school off Euclid Avenue; fifth grade: south (main entrance) of Grade School.

Last Chance To File Farm Acres

If farmers failed to report their crop acreages by August 2, they can still get it done, but a "late" charge will be assessed, and this must be done by August 15, according to Prentice Mills, County Executive Director of the ASCS.

"You can make a late-filed acreage report provided that you pay us to visit the farm to verify and measure the acreage. This beats not having your acreage on record," Mills says, especially if you suffered hail damage.

Mills also pointed out that if, due to adverse weather, a farmer's wheat yield in 1982 was less than 60 per cent of normal, their farm is probably eligible for disaster payment. Once again, the acreage needs to have been reported, and if it has not been already, this needs to be done immediately.

Such wheat farmers will be given a 15-day grace period to report weather damage, after which a late filing fee will apply.

Mills also pointed out that public comment is being sought as to what the farmers think should be done about the 1983 feed grain program. Comments are requested on what the loan and purchase price should be for feed grains; what the target price

should be, as well as national program acreage, acreage reduction program or set-aside program; should there be a paid diversion program, should we have offsetting compliance, or any sort of cross-compliance, and what improvements can be made in the reserve program.

Comments should be made to Howard C. Williams, director, Analysis Division, USDA-ASCS, Room 3741-S, P.O. Box 2415, Washington, D.C. 20013, and should reach Williams by August 26.

As to when disaster payments will be made, Mills said they would be made as soon as possible, but indicated that it would be "at least early September before we can get started."

"After such a rush period like we have just completed, we are always grateful for the patience and consideration that you extend to us. Of course, we are here for the sole purpose of serving you and you make our job a very nice experience. We appreciate your friendly cooperation," Mills concluded.

Commissioners Pass Highway Resolutions

The Parmer County Commissioners Court this week passed a resolution supporting the Texas Highway system, recognizing its importance to the growth and development of the Panhandle area, and asking the state legislature for an increase in the state fuel tax, in order to obtain additional highway funds.

The passage of the resolution came after contact by the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce, which is asking for such a resolution from each city and county in the Panhandle, in an effort to get more money for highways.

Bills on county foster children in the amount of \$1,252, which will be reimbursed the county, were approved. Another bill for a foster child and a child in need, amounting to \$141 was also approved.

Approval was given to Ben Rejino, Jr., granting him an easement to

cross a county road in Precinct 2 with a water line.

Renewal of a contract between the county and R.D. Dale, for supplying of water for the Precinct 3 maintenance barn was approved. The county pays Dale \$100 per year for furnishing the needed water, and the contract was renewed for a ten-year period.

Judge Porter Roberts told the court that he had been contacted about the possibility of the county participating in an area "food bank." This matter was tabled pending receipt of further information.

Five requests for soil conservation work on county farms were approved, to be performed by county machinery when they are in the respective areas, and the county to be reimbursed for the costs involved. Requests were from Billy D. Baxter, C.W. Stallings, Randy Bush, Hoppy Jennings and D.M. McGuire.

Ty and Grant Stovall of Floydada, cousins of the bride, lit the candles.

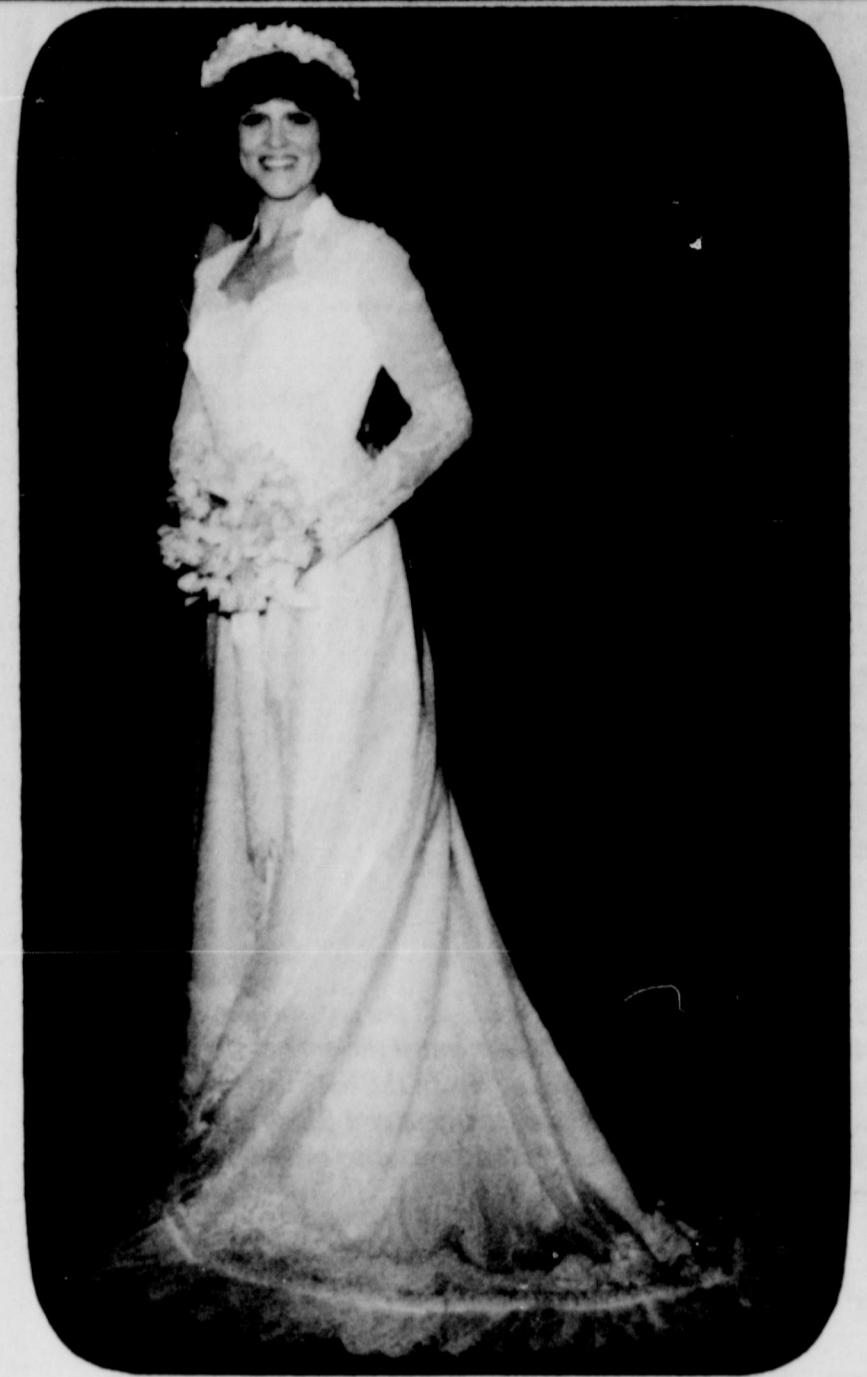
A reception was held in the foyer of the church.

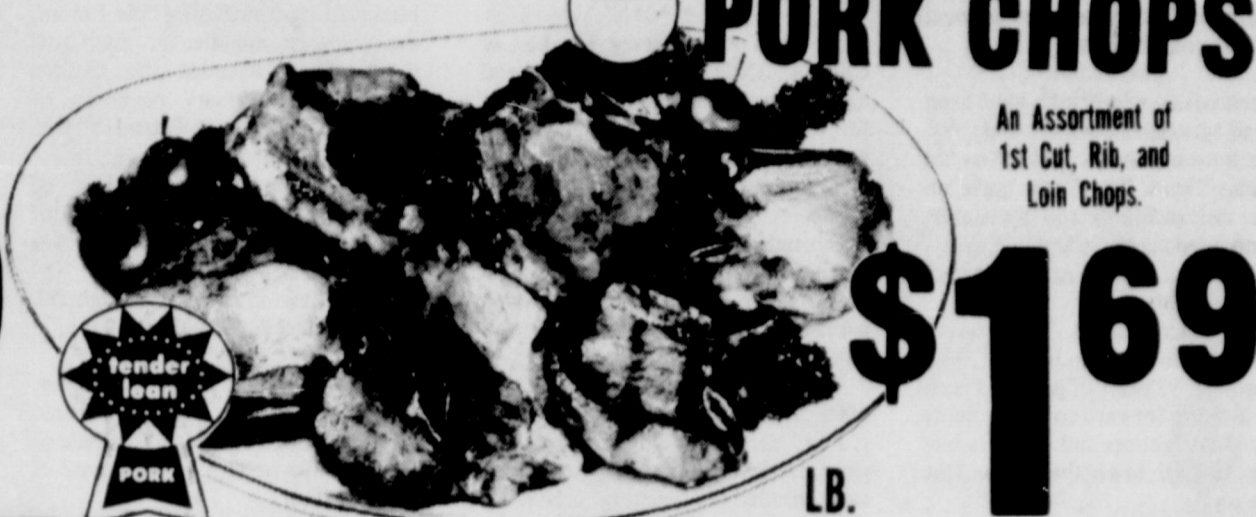

FREE SPEECH AND THE A.C.L.U.

On May 20, 1982, U.S. District Judge John Singleton ruled that the children in Aldine schools, outside Houston, could no longer include a phrase praising God in their school song.

That made the American Civil Liberties Union (A.C.L.U.) very happy. They had been party to the suit, claiming that the song violated constitutional provisions of separation of church and state.

On July 3rd, the Supreme Court ruled that states can indeed ban the distribution of child pornography. That made A.C.L.U. very unhappy. One of their spokesmen was quoted in the press as complaining this violated the constitutional provisions of free speech.

If this all seems strange to you, perhaps it is because it is strange. The A.C.L.U. is constantly worried about the "free speech" rights of pornographers, but seemingly is on the other side of the fence

when the question turns on the free speech rights of school children. One cannot escape the conclusion that the "right" of school children to distribute smut, but they would deny them the right to sing the praises of God.

And if you ever wonder where the A.C.L.U. gets the money to pursue its goals, consider this: a lot of rich people in high places give them a lot of money. Our current Lieutenant Governor Hobby, for example, held a fund raiser for them in his Houston home that raised some \$60,000. He is very proud of his efforts in this regard, defending it repeatedly while out on the campaign trail seeking reelection. That is one of the many areas where he and I are in disagreement. 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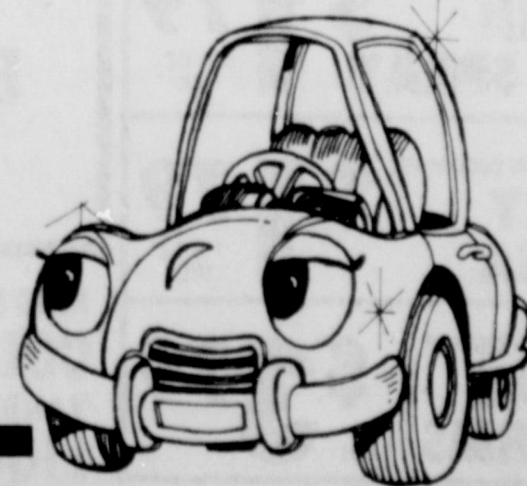
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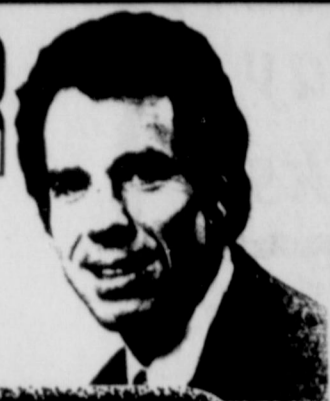
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
